Parents of Spanish speaking students need to know this and I know they appreciate it. It is further unfortunate that all Spanish families do not speak some English in their home when their children are small, like the Joe Aguilars, the N.N. Calderons, the Crispen Mejias and numerous other Spanish families. This editorial is written to point out what great advantages the Spanish speaking student has in our country, in our community, and in our school if they are faithful in attendance and will try.




My brother Paul was a good horse rider and, like the rest of the boys in the family, he could ride bareback or with a saddle, sirsingle, or holding onto the mane. He could ride a horse sitting way back at the back or where the collar goes, or in between. He could put a horse up about as steep a place as there ever was for a horse to go, jump about the widest stream, or go down the steepest embankment.

I never will forget the day when he was telling all these cousins and all these friends what a rider he was. He knew he was a good rider and he was telling them about it. On this particular day he had his horse bridled and saddled and was telling everyone how fast that horse could go, how quick he could stop, cut, and come back.

While he was telling them the story and they were begging him to show them, he had a little brother that was ornery enough to be loosening the girt. He pulled his hat down, stepped into the saddle (somehow the saddle stayed erect) and, with a burst of speed and the yell of an Indian, he headed to the north. I can still hear that horse grunt and groan as he was urging him to his utmost speed. He changed his position as the horse reached maximum speed and that pony slid to a halt.

As he slid to a halt and leaned to the left to come back the saddle turned and my brother Paul headed on north. As the ohs and the ahs went up from the audience the little brother started talking to himself, "Maybe he won't be dead but be stove up real good which is. what he deserves".

Paul hit the ground, slid and

The car was headed east. Impact occurred in the east bound traffic. 

The following terms you should know. Please study them. Please, girls, your husbands will like you better if you'll use one of these terms. BLITZ (RED DOG): When one or more defensive linebackers rush the quarterback.

BOMB: Long, high forward pass to gain long yardage.

DOUBLE WING: An offensive formation where both halfbacks line up behind or outside of their ends. Quarterback and fullback line up behind the center.

DRAW (TRAP, DELAY): A lure to induce defensive linemen into a hard rush on the quarterback. The quarterback fakes a pass and gives the ball to his fullback or halfback.

EAT THE BALL: Passer elects to be tackled rather than throw the ball away.

FAIR CATCH: By raising his hand as a signal, a player receiving a punt has the right to catch the ball without being tackled. Ball is put in play at exact po sition of catch.

FIELD GOAL: 3 points for successful kick. Ball must clear crossbar and be between uprights. "I" FORMATION: Offensive formation in which four backs line up directly behind center. MAN-IN-MOTION: An offensive back in motion before the ball is snapped.

MOUSETRAP: An offensive guard pulls out of the line to block defensive tackle or end who has been "allowed" to crash in. POCKET: Teammates form semicircle around quarterback about 7 yards from center for maximum protection while he tries to pass. QUARTERBACK SNEAK: Quarterback takes snap from ecenter and plunges straight ahead. ROLL-OUT (BOOTLEG): Quarterback fakes handoff to another back and hides the ball against hip. He runs toward sideline and can either pass or run. SAFETY: Two points for defensive team when offensive ball carrier is tackled behind own end zone.




