## Editorial

Why do we always have to read and hear just the bad? It seems a popular way to sell newspapers, to be heard on the radio and to have a popular newscast is to be continually reporting big doings of the mistreated few. It also seems that all news media is fast to jump on the band wagon of the screaming few, more so that cameramen are anxious to get so close that they can smell the unwashed, the extremely long hair and a minority that has never worked, are not looking for jobs, and would be insulted if they were offered an honest days work with an honest days pay.

I want to see more news of honest people. I want to hear more news of the many who are grateful for our great institutions. I want to live next to people that wash their clothes and break into a pleasing smile when they see the flag raised. The News this week will try to report on the Spanish speaking students in our school and run a series of pictures, not of the unfortunate, but of the advantages they receive in the Seminole Public School. I want to answer in part because all things concerning a minority group are not bad. I feel there is a language barrier between us. I further feel that the Board of Education, the superintendent, the principal, and teachers are doing something about it. I would like to point out that instead of some of these students costing the tax payers $\$ 752.95$ a year, the attention they are receiving in special classes, special library work, special play periods, and speech therapy, they are receiving upwards of twice that amount being spent on them. Parents of Spanish speaking students need to know this and I know they appreciate it. It is further unfortunate that all Spanish families do not speak some English in their home when their children are small, like the Joe Aguilars, the N. N. Calderons, the Crispen Mejias and numerous other Spanish families. This editorial is written to point out what great advantages the Spanish speaking student has in our country, in our community, and in our school if they are faithful in attendance and will try.

He pulled his hat down, stepped into the saddle (somehow the saddle stayed erect) and, with a burst of speed and the yell of an Indian, he headed to the north. I can still hear that horse grunt and groan as he was urging him to his utmost speed. He changed his position as the horse reached maximum speed and that pony slid to a halt.
As he slid to a halt and leane to the left to come back the saddle turned and my brother Paul headed on north. As the ohs and the ahs went up from the audience the little brother started talking to himself, "Maybe he won't be dead but be stove up real good which is what he deserves".
Paul hit the ground, slid and turned over a time or two. The horse came trotting back to the crowd with his head to one side so he wouldn't step on the reins and the saddle at a 45 degree on the other side. ADVANTAGES FOR SPANISH STUDENTS ONE KILLED


The death vehicle with Grady Allen Brown, age 61, visible in the back seat, was headed east, the pickup below headed west.


Grady Allen Brown, age 61, was killed last Thursday morning at approximately $3: 30$ when the 1967 Cadillac in which he was a passenger was involved in a carpickup accident 13 miles west of Seminole on the Hobbs Highway. Roger Allen Brown, 35, was the driver of the vehicle in which his father was killed. Other passengers were Laneta Brown and Viola Brown, wives of the victim and the driver. The Browns are from Denver City. They were reported in fair condition in the Yoakum County Hospital with multiple lacerations and bruises.
Cipriono B. Amador, 38 years old, tem porarily staying in Hobbs, New Mexico with a permanent address in Sterling City, Texas, was driving west when he apparently went to sleep, striking the Cadillac. Brown, the other driv er, swerved to his right, taking the full impact of the pickup down the driver's side of the car.

The car was headed east. Impact occurred in the east bound traffic Texas Highway Patrolmen Kenneth Selman and Clayton Koonce, reported that the driver of the pickup truck stated that he had been working all night, had been loading out sheep for his employer, Bill J. Cole of Sterling City, and was on his way to another farm when the accident occurred.
The Cadillac ended up in the mud in the bar ditch on the south side of the road, the pickup on the same side of the road, approx imately 300 feet away.
Amador was treated at Memorial Hospital in Seminole and released. He was later arrested and will be charged with murder with malice with a motor vehicle - DWI.
Funeral services for Brown were held last Sunday in Denver City under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

BLITZ (RED DOG): When one or more defensive linebackers rush the quarterback
BOMB: Long, high forward pass to gain long yardage.
DOUBLE WING: An offensive formation where both halfbacks line up behind or outside of their ends. Quarterback and fullback line up behind the center DRAW (TRAP, DELAY): A lure to induce defensive linemen into a hard rush on the quarterback, The quarterback fakes a pass and gives the ball to his fullback or halfback
EAT THE BALL: Passer elects to be tackled rather than throw the ball away.
FAIR CATCH: By raising his hand as a signal, a player receiving a punt has the right to catch the ball without being tackled. Ball is put in play at exact poition of catch.
FIELD GOAL: 3 points for successful kick. Ball must clear crossbar and be between uprights. "I" FORMATION: Offensive formation in which four backs line up directly behind center. MAN-IN-MOTION: An offensive back in motion before the ball is snapped. MOUSETRAP: An offensive guard pulls out of the line to block de fensive tackle or end who has been "allowed" to crash in. POCKET: Teammates form sem circle around quarterback about 7 yards from center for maximum protection while he tries to pass. QUARTERBACK SNEAK: Quarterback takes snap from ecenter and plunges straight ahead. ROLL-OUT (BOOTLEG): Quarterback fakes handoff to another back and hides the ball against hip. He runs toward sideline and can either pass or run
SAFETY: Two points for defensive team when offensive ball carrier is tackled behind own end zone.
SCREEN PASS: Center, guard and tackle of offensive team form a protective screen to hide the receiver behind the line of scrimmage.
SHOTGUN OFFENSIVE: An offensive formation designed to allow quarterback to throw passes from position 5 to 7 yards behind the line of scrimmage with out moving back.
SNAP: The start of each play by passing of the football from the enter to a back
SPLIT END: End lines up bvery wide of tackle - usually 6 to 7 yards away.
