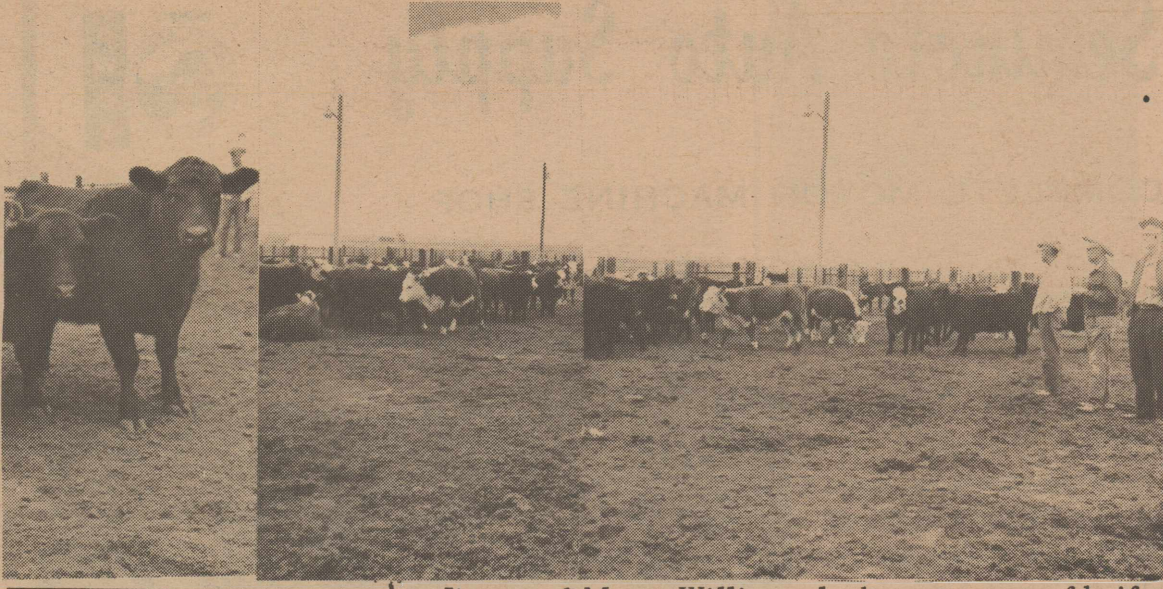


Feed Lots

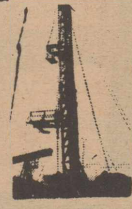
Users of the M. S. Doss Youth Center, the Scout Center and the buses will hold in high regard those who cared.

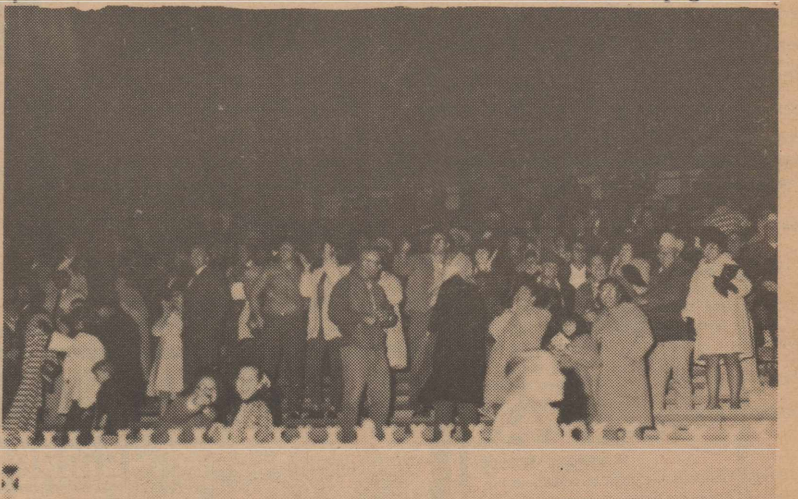

At least three times after he was blocked out, with a sweeping motion of his hand, he stood the ball carrier on his head. Whisenhunt kicked out on the 18 yard line. He kicked out on the 8 yard line, the 9 yard line and kept the Ponies penned on their end of the field. Third quarter Seminole 0, Andrews 0.

The 4th quarter kicked off and Andrews made a determined bid, only to have Bill Hearme intercept a pass and run like a halfback. Then it was Gene Sims' turn. He caught a pass and raced to his own 20 yard line. Bennett got 6 with 5:52 remaining. Andrews suffered an infraction. Only 4 yards to break the tie. Andrews suffered another penalty. First down, 2 yards, Seminole TD. What, an infraction of the rules? First down and 7 to go, 2nd down and 6 to go, 3rd down and 4 to go, 4th down, 3:30 showing on the clock.

Whisenhunt did it again with his educated toe and the Indians (the underdogs) had defeated the wild hosses from Andrews. Contributing to the victory had to be Charles Donohoe when, on a fine defensive effort, he racked up their halfback passer. 500 Cattle In Feed Lots

JIGGS "ANDY" AND MONTY WILLIAMS ARE LONG TIME GAINES COUNTY RESIDENTS, TO THEIR RANCHING OPERATIONS 14 MILES NORTH-EAST OF SEMINOLE, THEY HAVE RECENTLY ADDED FEED PENS. AT THE PRESENT TIME THEY HAVE 7 PENS FILLED WITH ABOUT 500 HEAD OF CATTLE.

FOUR OTHER PENS ARE NEAR COMPLETION AND ALL SPACE HAS BEEN SPOKEN FOR. THE WILLIAMS BROTHERS, ALONG WITH KENNETH NEWCOMB, THE MANAGER, FEED OUT CATTLE FOR OTHER PEOPLE. IT WORKS SOMETHING LIKE THIS.

ON AUGUST 22, 1969 THEY FILLED ONE PEN WITH 541 LBS. HEIFERS. 70 DAYS LATER THE HEIFERS WEIGHED 742 LBS., FOR AN AVERAGE DAY'S GAIN OF ABOVE 2.75 POUNDS.

ANOTHER GROUP OF HEIFERS WEIGHED 440 POUNDS EACH, AND GAINED AN AVERAGE OF 2.33 POUNDS PER DAY FOR 45 DAYS.

THE ONLY STEERS IN THE PENS AT THE PRESENT TIME ARE SOME 600 POUND STEERS PUT IN BY PURINA COMPANY. GAINES COUNTY FARMERS WHO HAVE CATTLE IN THE FEED LOT ARE GRADY TURNER AND TROY MARTIN.

AREA MEN WITH CATTLE IN THE PENS ARE DOYLE NEWCOMB, RALPH WHITE FROM COAHOMA, OTIS WINBURN AND KENNETH NEWCOMB.

"OUR ONLY PROBLEM," SAID MONTY WILLIAMS, "IS GETTING A PEN FOR OURSELVES AND FOR OUR OWN CATTLE. BEFORE WE GET A PEN READY, SOMEONE ELSE HAS IT SPOKEN FOR. THE FOUR PENS UNDER CONSTRUCTION WILL BE FILLED WITH OTHER PEOPLE'S CATTLE JUST AS SOON AS THEY'RE READY, THE PLAN GOES SOMETHING LIKE THIS", HE WENT ON TO SAY, "FRESH CATTLE ARE BROUGHT IN, WEIGHED ON THE SCALES AND ISOLATED FROM THE OTHER CATTLE. THEY ARE FED ALFALFA HAY AND A BULKY TYPE FEED FOR 10 DAYS TO 2 WEEKS, UNTIL THEY RECEIVE THEIR SHOTS AND PROVE TO BE IN GOOD HEALTH." THE WILLIAMS' WILL FOLLOW A PURINA PLAN, (THEY HAVE THE PURINA STORE IN SEAGRAVES) KEEP THE CATTLE SPRAYED WHEN NECESSARY, GIVE THEM SHOTS WHEN NECESSARY AND THEN INCREASE THEIR GRAIN IN THE FEED PLAN, PROBABLY REACHING ABOVE 80 % DURING THE LAST 30 DAYS ON FEED. THE BULK FEEDERS HOLD 12,000 POUNDS AND IS TRUCKED OUT AFTER BEING MIXED IN THE SEAGRAVES PLANT.

"STILBESTEROL (A PREPARATION TO AID CATTLE IN GAINING WEIGHT WHEN THEY ARE OFF THEIR FEED), IS IMPLANTED IN EACH CALF'S EAR WITH 3 SHOTS FOLLOWING.

THIS IS THE ONLY FEED LOT ACCORDING TO WAYNE HARDY, PURINA FIELD REPRESENTATIVE IN GAINES COUNTY, LYNN COUNTY, TERRY COUNTY OR YOAKUM COUNTY. ITS NAME WILL OFFICIALLY BE "FEED AND SEED CUSTOM FEED LOT".

A FIELD DAY IS BEING ANNOUNCED FOR NOVEMBER 29, 1969 FOR AREA PEOPLE TO VISIT. IT IS PAST TIME FOR GAINES COUNTY, WITH ALL THE FEED AVAILABLE, TO HAVE THEIR OWN FEED LOTS. CHAMBER MEMBERS ARE HOPING TO ANNOUNCE OTHER FEED LOT OPERATIONS IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

WE CONGRATULATE THE WILLIAMS BROTHERS AND LOOK FORWARD TO OTHERS MOVING TO THE AREA.

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NEWS RELEASE FROM PCA

Announcement has been made by Alton Strickland, President of Lubbock Production Credit Association that it is now possible for a member of a Production Credit Association to invest in Federal Intermediate Credit Bank Debentures. Strickland reported that the information available, the debentures would yield an estimate of 8%. Anyone other than a Production Credit Member that is interested in purchasing debentures may do so, but their purchase will have to be handled through their local bank.

W.H. Griffith, a Director of the Lubbock Production Credit Association feels that there will be several farmers in this area that will want to take advantage of the substantial return on their investment. Griffith also reports that during the entire operation of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, there has not been a default on a debenture payment.

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD MONDAY FOR JOHN SCOTT

Funeral services for John Isaias Scott, 5 year-old-son of Mr. and Mrs. Von Ray Brinkley, 505 S.E. 4th Street, Seminole, were held in Andrews Monday.

The little boy was shot at his home about 4:52 p.m. on Wednesday of last week when his stepfather started to lay a rifle across the hood of the car and the child walked by. The bullet bounced off the hood of the car and hit the young boy in the right temple. The father and son had just returned from a rabbit hunt when the accident occurred.

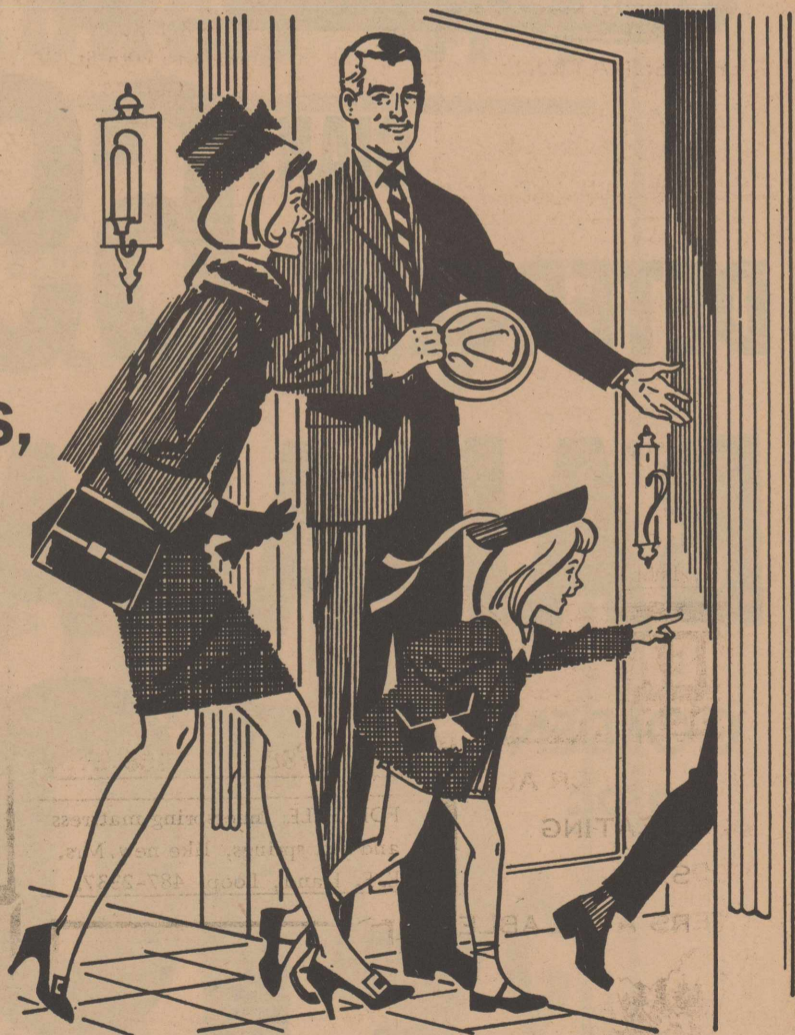

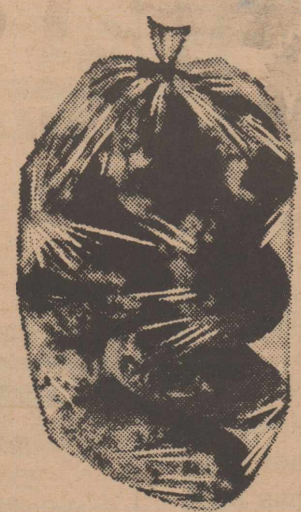

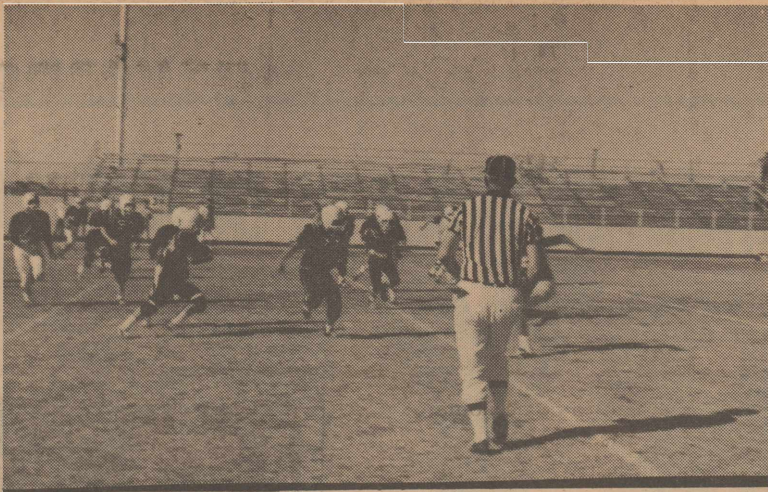
SEMINOLE 7th 6 - KERMIT 14

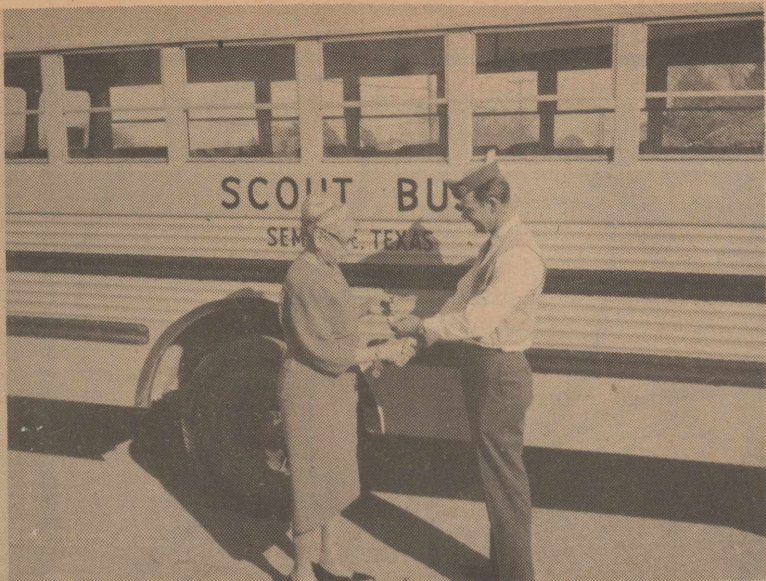

Editorial

Seminole and Gaines County has been trying to organize a local chapter of Water, Incorporated. It seems if the water plan is ever successful that local chapters will be necessary to get it passed. It is not that Gaines County farmers are not interested and that all citizens do not realize the shortage of water, we're just too busy doing other things.

The corps of engineers is still working on basic plans to bring lower Mississippi water to West Texas, to Eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle. No doubt, Texas can receive as much as \$6 billion from the Federal Government for such a plan but Texas must show their willingness to help foot the bill.

On August 5th the plan barely escaped passing by less than 6300 statewide votes. The Texas legislature has provided money so that studies might be continued. The only counties in West Texas turning down the plan were Loving, smallest populated county in Texas; Dallam County, in the northeast Panhandle; Roberts and Childress Counties, over on the Red River.

West Gaines County is indeed fortunate because of its underlying water basin. Other counties such as Lubbock, Castro, Floyd and Crosby, are not so fortunate, as 10 inch wells over the last 25 years have gradually been reduced to 6 inch, 4 inch and then to small submersible pumps.

The Texas Water Plan that calls for two big canals, one across North Texas, and across the South Plains of West Texas and another along the Gulf Coast, may not be the best water plan available but until this date no one has come forward with a better one. When we think about water we think about crops but in this plan there are many other things to think about. Fifty to one hundred reservoirs will be necessary for the plan to work. Just think how nice it would be to hook onto your boat and run out to Cedar Lake and fish and ski on Saturday afternoon. Think of the amount of power this many reservoirs would generate in electricity, running back downstream. Think what it would do for industry with plenty of water available, also the major cities could be fed any amount of water they needed from upstream at any given time. The time is coming and fast approaching when many areas once with an abundance of underground stored water will be depleted. Certainly it's a big plan, but where else in the world would it work except in Texas?

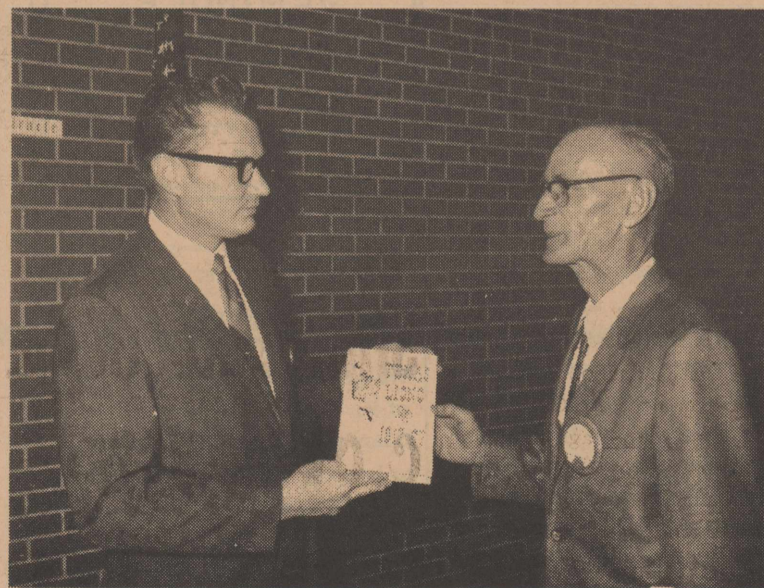
City Council Has Meeting

"BLAZE ORANGE DOES NOT OCCUR IN NATURE AND CAN BE SEEN BETTER UNDER MORE VARYING LIGHT CONDITIONS THAN ANY OTHER COLOR", THE FOUNDATION SAYS. EXPERIMENTS HAVE SHOWN EVEN COLOR-BLIND PEOPLE CAN DISTINGUISH BLAZE ORANGE MORE EASILY.

THE TRADITIONAL HUNTING COLOR RED IS NO LONGER RECOMMENDED BECAUSE OF THE COLOR-BLIND FACTOR AND BECAUSE IT BECOMES DIFFICULT TO SEE AT DUSK, THE SOUTH PLAINS OPTOMETRIC ASSOCIATION SAYS.
