"He went on to say how good his food was, that his day at the office had been especially hard because Roger had come in and told him that he and his wife were getting a divorce after 33 years. "Did you hear from Junior and the kids today? I told you they'd be all right" he went on to say and from that part of the conversation they discussed not any of the children coming home for Thanksgiving but that all planned on being there for Christmas.
The conversation then turned to one of the grandsons that was in Vietnam and how worried they were about his wife and him not getting to see the new baby. They discussed the weather and what he was going to buy her for Christmas.
Finally I could not stand it any longer. I turned to the man and asked "Are you talking to me?" "No" he said, "I'm talking to my wife. You see, she died last yoar and we lived together for 47 years. I've always enjoyed taking her out to dinner. We're discussing the day's happenings, our business and our children. " Andwith that he turned to his wife and asked her "Would you care for pecan pie? You didn't get any and you've always liked pecan pie."
He was unembarrassed and unashamed that others besides myself could hear him but I know one thing for sure he was especially proud of her. No doubt she was not only a good wife, but a good mother and a good grandmother.
He paid out right in front of me. He opened the door and waited for her to go through and left the establishment with a smile on his face.
Somehow there must be a thousand lessons in this somewhere.
