FOR MERITORIOUS SERVICE WHILE SERVING WITH FRIEND LY FOREIGN FORCES ENGAGED IN ARMED CONFLICT AGAINST THE NORTH VIETNAMESE AND VIET CONG COMMUNIST TEMBER 1968 TO SEPTEMBER 1969 AS A RIVER PATROL BOAT PATROI OFFICER LIEUTENANT (JUNIOR GRADE) DECKER PARTICIPATED IN ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE COMBAT PATROLS IN THE ENEMY'S DELTA STRONGHOLD IN THAT CAPACITY, HE BOARDED AND SEARCHED OVER FIVE THOUSAND WATERCRAFT, INTERDICTED ENEMY CROSS RIVER SUPPLY ROUTES, ENFORCED CURFEW, INSERTED AND EXTRACTED FRIENDLY FORCES IN HOSTILE TERRITORY AND PROVIDED FIRE SUPPORT FOR BESIEGED UNITS AND OUTPOSTS. AND THERE WILL BE SOME TIMES WHE WE'LL HAVE ALL THE POWER ANYBODY NEEDS, BUT STORM OR A SQUIRREL IN A SUBSTATION OR AN EQUIP MENT FAILURE OR A HUMAN FAILURE, AND WEILL HAVE A SERVICE INTERRUPTION FOR SOME OF OUR CUSTOMERS.
