MINI-SKIRTS AND THE RISE OF CRIME ... Apart from the lack of modesty and decency involved, do provocative mini-skirts cause sex crimes? The nation's top law enforcement officials in 62 cities think so. They are convinced that the mini-skirt is a serious cause of sex crimes. All 56 of the nation's largest cities were surveyed, plus 72 others ranging down to 10,000 population, to provide for a valid cross section. Sixty-two per cent of the cities responded, from 37 states. The replies were submitted for inspection to the Police Chief in Pasadena (who was not involved) and were approved as authentic. The survey, which has just been completed by Hollywood Social Studies, is a survey that was sorely needed.

An article published in the National Education Association's magazine this year scored school board officials for blindness to the problem of shorter and shorter skirts. The author, a high school senior in Rialto, California, said that sitting across from mini-skirted classmates was like going to a "burlesque show." It was acutely embarrassing to boys and male teachers alike, he said, and was also harmful to the girls - slaves to fashion though they be. You can try to argue that the alarming rise in sex crimes is a coincidence, but the experts disagree. Said the Commander of the Juvenile Department in one city of 700,000 people: "I personally feel we are in great trouble. Immorality has taken over, and if you attempt to do anything about it, they say you're old-fashioned." Others expressed similar concern. Not only did the crime of forcible rape increase 12.9 per cent last year, but related sex problems such as venereal disease and illegitimacy suffered an alarming growth. The unavoidable sight caused by short skirts when a girl is seated causes an inner problem to all normal boys, in the opinion of the Juvenile Bureau Commander of an eastern city of 350,000. Yet skirts get shorter and underclothing skimpier. There is no need to belabor the obvious. Women and girls alike, married as well as unmarried, are setting bad examples. Parents, husbands, pastors, teachers, writers, and young men on dates have been almost equally guilty for not doing what we can to discourage this brazen habit. (Thanks, Tom R.)

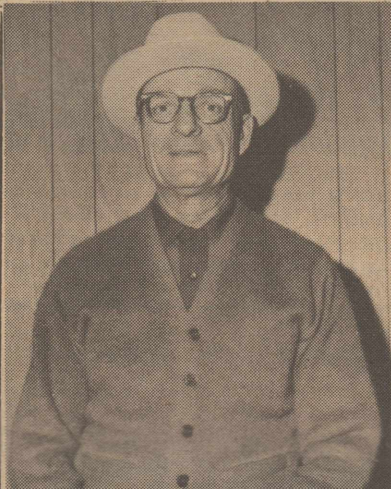

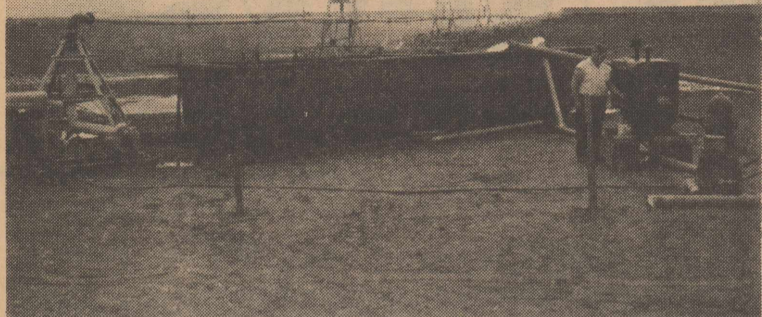

In the above photo M. R. Shrauner of Seminole adjusts one of the engines pumping water into the gathering tank of his collective irrigation system. A total of three wells pump open discharge into the tank and then a booster pump and motor pumps the water under pressure into the circular-type sprinkler irrigation system. With this type collection system water can be pumped more economically than if all the wells are pumped under pressure.

A very good advantage of the gathering tank shown in the photo is that it is portable. Mr. Shrauner's operation consists of 160 acres of milo and 160 acres of small grain. The growing season of these two crops comes at different times of the year and the sprinkler system and the tank can be moved and used to irrigate both crops. This type system is especially good where several small producing wells can be used to provide one good source of water.

For assistance in developing a collective irrigation system for your farm contact the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Gaines-Andrews Soil and Water Conservation District.

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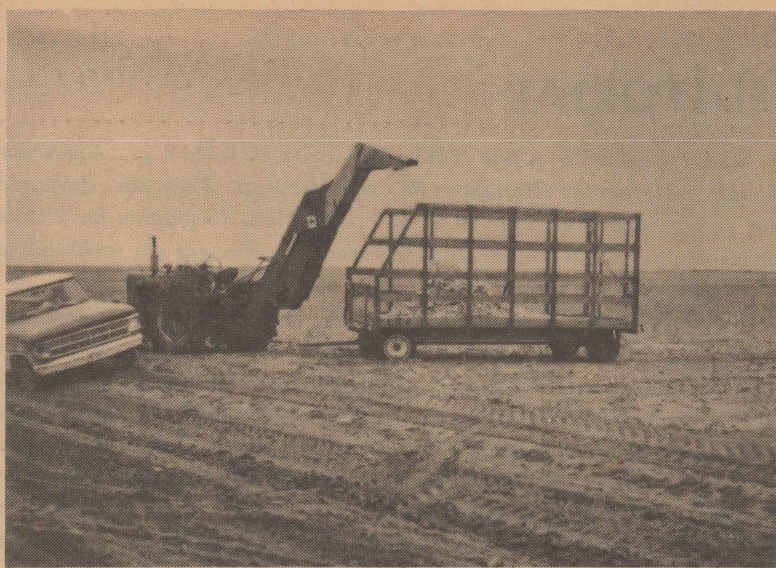

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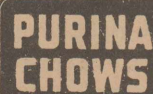

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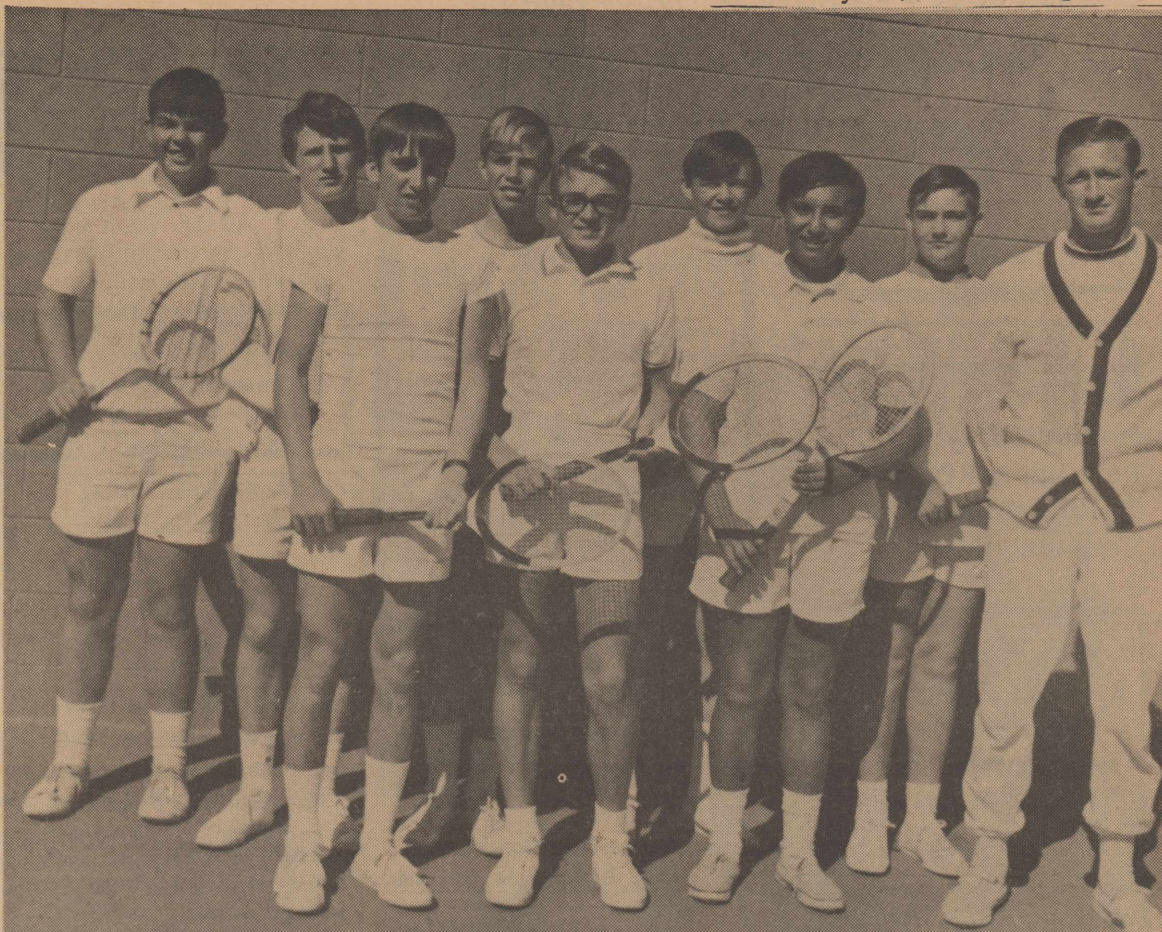

Permian Basin Railroad would show a profit. Within the last few days speculation has soared anew as to when the dream road would begin.

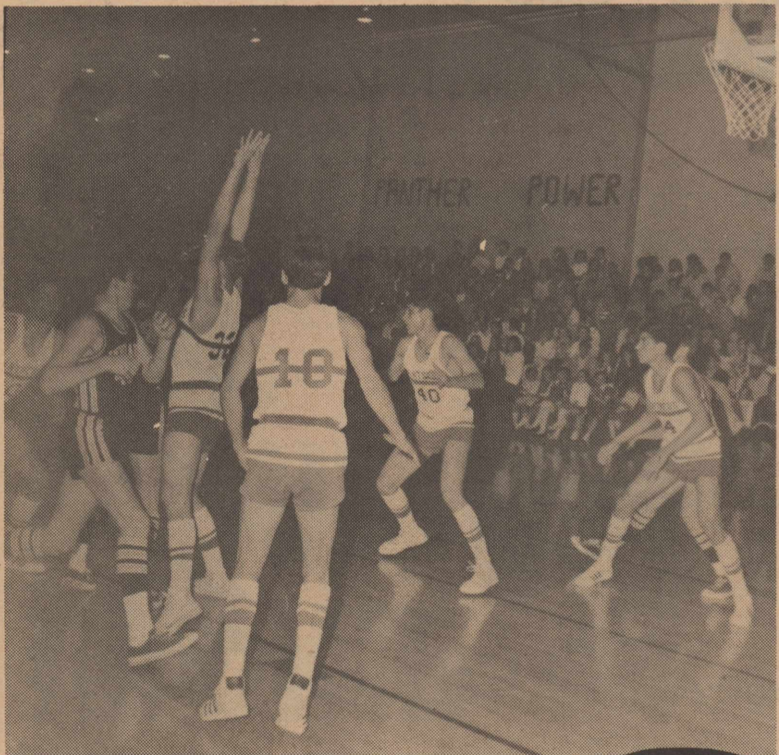

The victory sewed up the district for the talented Panthers and gave the Indians a record of 3 losses and 6 wins in district play.

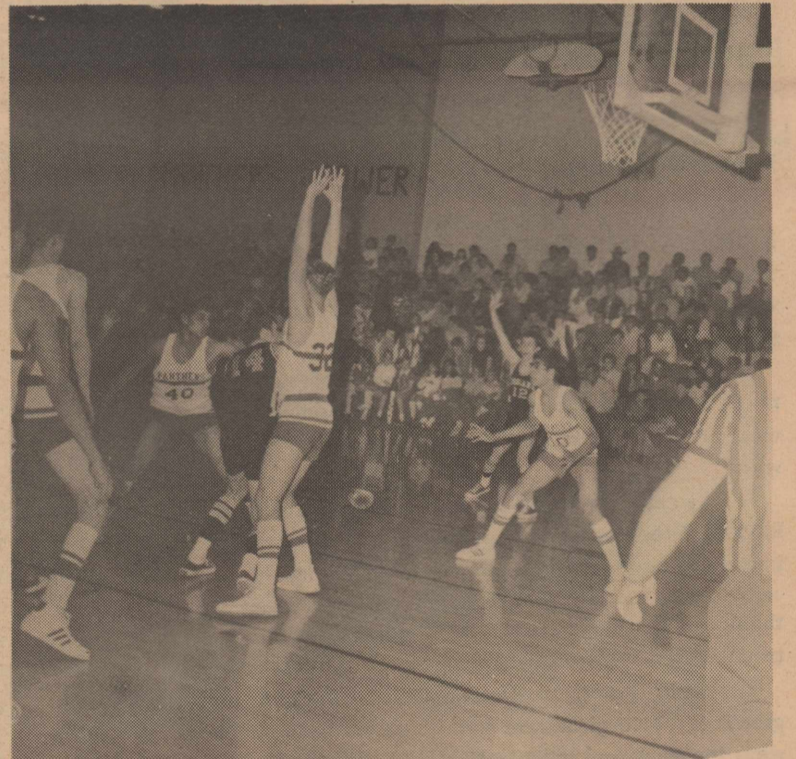

1970 EASTER SEAL APPEAL TO OPEN IN GAINES COUNTY

The 1970 Easter Seal Appeal will open in Gaines County on Monday, February 23, according to C. V. Shelton, who serves as Easter Seal Representative for the county.

Mr. Shelton said that Easter Seal Appeal letters would begin arriving at homes in the county about March 1.

As Easter Seal Representative, he is the local contact to request rehabilitation services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing program and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Last year 20,378 handicapped people received help from the Texas Society, Shelton explained. But the costs of providing expert professional care are rising, and more money than ever will be needed, he said.

Funds help support 20 centers in Texas, where crippled children and adults are treated, regardless of their ability to pay. Walkers, wheelchairs and related services are provided to those who cannot provide for themselves.

"Since 1929 the people of Texas have always responded to our needs, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year," Shelton said.

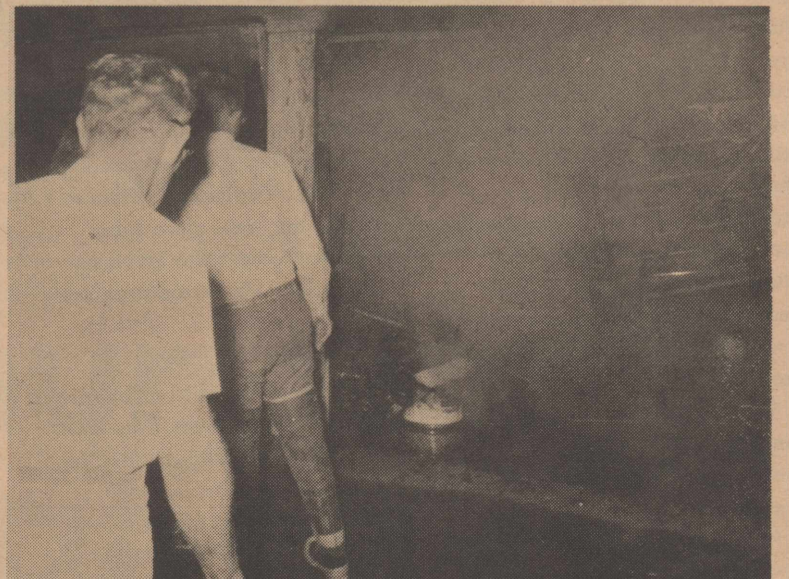
