

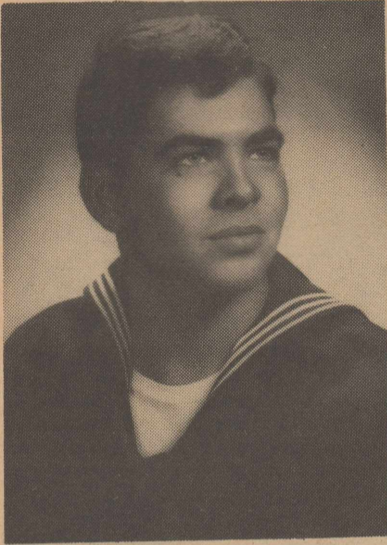

Editorial

We live in better homes, we have better air conditioning, we have more bathrooms, but what has happened to the family arrangement? Parents have turned into taxi services. Many families never eat breakfast anymore, or eat a meal together. The kids all eat lunch at school. Too many activities to have supper (excuse me, dinner) together. No wonder cold cereal has gone up so - we all eat it. No wonder our kids are fiddling with dope. No wonder our kids give us problems; they don't hardly have time to know us. No wonder Mama and Daddy fuss; they both work so they can live in a better house. They both work so they can have a color TV. They both work so they can drive new cars. They both work so they can go out to eat. They both work so they can make payments on clothing and on last summer's vacation. They pay big insurance premiums 'cause they know they're gonna die young. (Then they have to work overtime to pay the extra taxes.) Families are transferred, move and forget they were church going people. Sons never have the opportunity to work with fathers. Mothers are so busy they have such little time to teach their daughters to cook, to sew, or how to clean up the house. Then parents are so tired that it's difficult to practice the age old art of give and take or be patient when the other one gets mad.

So from week to week on the police report there is the story of husbands beating their wives, of mothers that beat their children, stories of mothers and fathers getting drunk and neglecting their children, of children suffering from malnutrition. When, oh when, are we going to wake up to the point and do something about drunken drivers that are protected by loose laws? When are we going to demand that fathers and mothers be responsible for their children or take them away from them? When are we going to punish a man that beats his wife and breaks bones of his children, instead of saying that he's drunk or he's sick - only to see it repeated in another community or a few months later in the same community? The schools cannot correct the evils that come out of community families. The church cannot correct the evils caused by a delinquent mother or a delinquent father. The jails will not hold the iniquities that are produced in the home. If the plight of the American people, the Seminole people and the American family is not checked the atomic bomb will not destroy our great country. Neither will God destroy it by calling a halt to time. Our great nation will fall because it is another Rome, another Assyria, another Jerusalem, or another Paris. It will crumble from the decay and the stink of a rotten inside. We will turn our head once too often and one day we will wake up minus the head. (Thank goodness, Madolyn O'Hare's getting so contrary she wouldn't come to Lubbock and plague our area further and add further problems.)

Farm hand



Plant cover stops wind erosion. Don Sanders is shown here in small grain planted following cotton harvest. Sanders, the Outstanding Conservationist in the Gaines-Andrews SWCD for Gaines County in 1969, plans to manage the wheat for seed production this spring. It was drilled following cotton harvest without any type of seedbed preparation. The cotton stalks, which helped offer protection to the young plants by breaking up some of the wind velocity, are shredded once they are no longer needed. Sanders also seeded small grain in some of his sorghum stubble following harvest.

Seeding small grain following a crop such as this not only helps control erosion, but also helps add valuable organic material to the soil. The costs of production are also minimized with this type of minimum tillage or no-til farming. Economists today agree that lowering the expense of land preparation affords one of the best ways to lower production costs. This type farming also affords maximum soil and water conservation benefits. Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the Gaines-Andrews SWCD will be glad to furnish additional information. 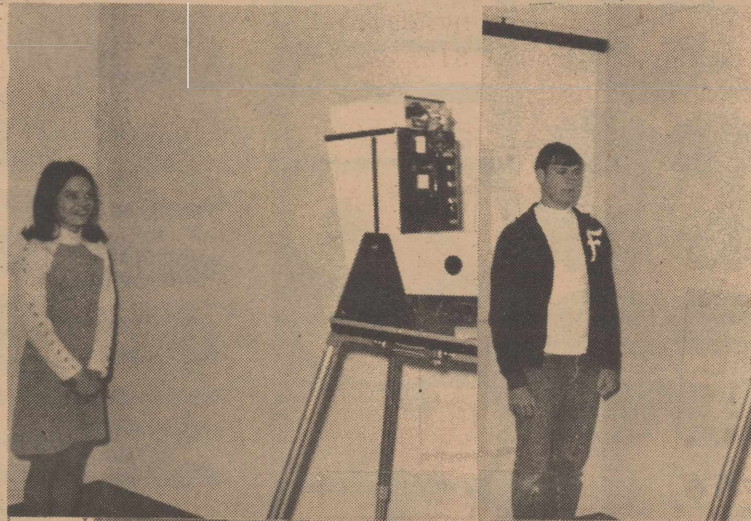

"Dayton, can I quote you?" "All the way," he said, "tell them that I said what Marcus Lincoln Crow said and it's a fact."

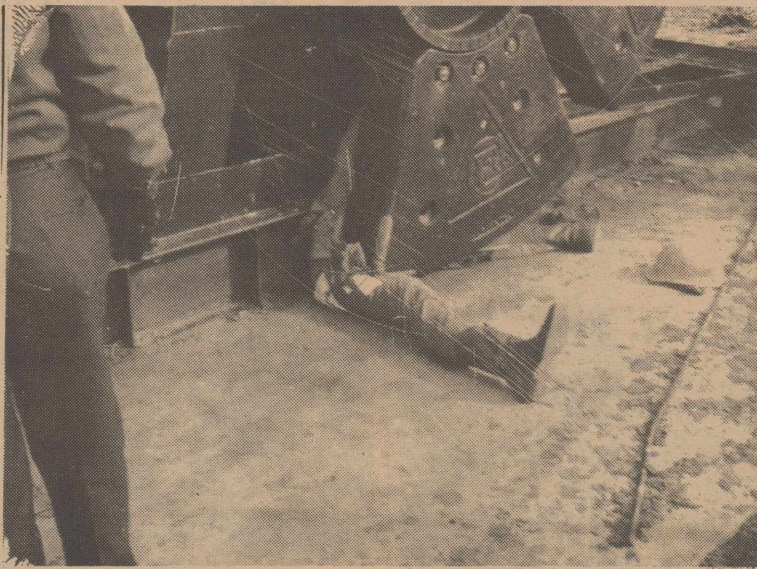

The brake failed, letting the huge balance, weighing several thousand pounds, swing in its regular path to the base where Benabidz was unbolting the steel structure from its concrete foundation.

His address was given as 721 South Selman, Hobbs. He was the father of three daughters and one son. His wife's name is Calixtra. He was employed by Nolan H. Brunson, Inc. where he had been working one year.

Because of the great weight of the balance, workers were about two hours removing the body. W. E. Cox, Jr., coroner, pronounced Benabidz dead at the scene of the accident.
