The Tax Story

The 1967-1968 proposed budget of the Seminole schools was studied carefully, item by item, by the Board of Trustees. There is a dificit of \$25,350, which does not include any increase in salaries of teachers or auxiliary personnel. To cut the budget further would most surely damage our school system.

Drop in enrollment has been considered also, and we took advantage of this at mid-term of the 1966-67 school year. We had two teachers to resign in the departments where the enrollment had decreased the greatest, and we did not replace the two teachers.

Our children will be living in a "specialized world." In order for them to compete (or be successful) in this world, they must continue to be educated to the fullest extent. In order to provide this education, the school must be staffed with adequate and qualified personnel and have the needed teaching tools and supplies, and Mrs. Faresta Brock. Each year it becomes harder to staff schools with teachers. This is a situation that has become acute recently due to low salaries. In our area it is even harder to attract such teachers due to our location and the size of our town. Teachers must have in their classrooms good teaching materials and supplies to adequately present the subject matter. Such materials and supplies have increased in cost from year to year.

We all are aware of the increasing cost of living. Our school must meet this problem by increasing its tax rate. This is necessary in order to maintain the high level of education for which Seminole Schools have become known.

28,001 Workers Leave Seminole



THE HONEY HAS BEEN REMOVED. THE BOX IN THE FOREGROUND IS THE NEW HOME

To make one pound of honey, bees may have to travel a total distance of about 50,000 miles. This is more than twice the distance around the

Last week about eighty to one hundred pounds of honey was removed from a house in Seminole. It was three feet wide and nine feet long or the distance between the eve of the house and the floor. A hive generally is made up of about two gallons of bees. The one found on the Lamesa highway, accross the street from C. M. McCain was about a ten gallon size or about 28,000 to 30,000 bees. A party from Denver City removed about ten gallons of honey. The honey had been there for about two or three years.

Soon after coming out of its cell, the worker bee begins its life of hard work. It never stops working until it dies. Its first duty is to feed the grubs and pupae which are still developing in their cells. Young worker bees also guard the entrance of the hive to prevent insects enemies from entering. Some workers stand within the hive near its entrance and beat the air rapidly with their wings. Currents made in this way keep the air fresh and at the right temperature.

During their early lives, worker bees do not gather nectar. But after two or three weeks at home, they try their wings on short outdoor flights. They soon learn to know their surroundings and begin to gather nectar and pollen. They spend the rest of their short lives in this work.

The great times for making honey are Spring and summer, when flowers bloom in the largest number. During these seasons to be "as busy as a bee" is to be busy indeed.

When a bee returns to the hive with a full load of nectar it may carry a weight half as heavy as its own body. Con't Page 10

COTTON QUALITY IMPROVEMENT THROUGH BLOCK GINNING IN GAINES CO.

One of the major problems in marketing cotton produced on the South Plains and Gaines County is the lack of fiber uniformity -- within the bale and from bale to bale. Fiber uniformity can be improved through block ginning; and thereby, create a greater market demand for the area's cotton.

What is block ginning? This concept is the ginning of cotton from a single variety and with similar fiber properties in large lots (40 to 50 or more bales). One variety gins or communities would be classified, of course, as block ginning. However, this program can be carried out without all farms within the community being involved or even the total acreage of the participating growers.

The cotton grouped within a block should be not only of the same variety but also produced under similar conditions — soil type, irrigation practices, planting date, etc. Hail, insect or disease damage should be considered. It should be remembered that the main objective is to obtain bales of uniform fiber quality to better supply and meet the demands of the market.

Advantages to be gained in block ginning.

As a result of uniform fiber quality, several advantages can be realized under this program in Gaines County.

- 1. By approaching the market with a large supply of uniform fiber, the producer, is in a better position to market cotton from a quality stand point.
- 2. The fiber properties -- length, strength, etc. -- can be represented to the mill with a good degree of realiability.
- 3. The movement of two-sided bales into market in avoided.
- 4. Ginning in large lots enables the producer and ginner to meeting mill demands. Specific markets may be attained through variety selection, production control and custom ginning.
- 5. As a group, quality problems which may arise between the producer and the mill can be solved more effectively. Also assistance from county agents, specialists and other agriculture leaders can be furnished more effectively under such programs.
- 6. The production of good planting seed is simplified. Varietal mixtures of seed are avoided by ginning in large lots.
 - 7. Group action by producers can accomp-

lish better insect and disease control in the area.

Development of a Block Ginning Program

Employing the block ginning concept will usually be initiated by producer groups in a county or community. The program may involve (1) cooperative effort between producers and ginners, (2) working through cotton breeders and seed producers, (3) cooperative organizations and (4) working independently as producers. The method employed to best meet their objectives must be determined by the local producers and county Agricultural leaders. Factors to Consider by Producers Groups to Initiate Block Ginning

- l. The producers must investigate the market potential of the variety to be considered in the program. This and the environment at hand -- soil, insects, diseases, availability of irrigation water -- should be used as the basis for selecting the variety.
- 2. Producers under this program must agree on the major cultural practices to be conducted on their selected variety. This involves a similar planting date or similar soil type. The participating growers should agree on an irrigation schedule -- timing and the amount of water. Particularly, a staring and cutoff date for irrigating should be set.
- 3. Planting seed must be of high viability and varietal purity and from a reputable source.
- 4. Cotton subjected to damage from hail, insects, diseases, or late-planting which may lower fiber quality should not be included in the block program with undamaged cotton.
- 5. To be successful, the participating producers must police themselves to exclude poor quality fiber or cotton of any other variety in order to market a uniform, high quality product.
- 6. Each producer must be encourage to use the best cultural and management practices.

The block ginning program will demand close cooperation between the producer, ginner, mill and the merchant, in order to meet a common goal, that of marketing cotton fiber of uniform quality.



Your open letter gave us a genuine case of nostalgia and we awoke the following night, in the wee small hours, reminiscing about the "Good Ole Days", don't think we would want to go back to them now though. Even though your readers, most of them at least, haven't met your "Cowtown Kin", they can probably tell, from a glance at our picture, that we were not born yesterday. Actually we have lived through four pretty big wars and are now living in the fifth, though the officials in Washington didn't call the Korean conflict a war, nor do they admit that the hassle we are now having in Viet Nam is a war. But we say, "Try to tell that to the fellows who are fighting there." Yes, we can recall those Good Ole Days very vividly. After a person passes the three-score and ten mark in life, he or she is very apt to live a lot in the past. Heard a fellow say recently that "the reason so many of our senior citizens live in the past, is that so much of their future is already behind them." Sounds silly doesn't it? But come to think of it, a person 70 years old, or older, doesn't have much future, does he? At least not according to statistics.

We recall the days of the covered wagon, the horse and buggy days, the first automobile that ever was owned in the County where we lived, the first airplane that ever flew in Texas , the first gramophone we ever saw or heard a sound over the crystal set radio and a number of other things that the present generation did not have the advantage of. We can recall the woodburning locomotives, then the coal burners, the hay balers and threshing machines operated by sure enough horsepower, before the days when steam or gas engines were in common use.

Being the 7th of 10 children in our family we remember getting out of bed in the wee small hours of the night, driving to the County Seat in time to watch the Circus unload from the train, the Big Tops being erected and then watching the street parade with its horsedrawn wagons, with the big brass band playing martial music and the steam caliope blaring away; the cry "Hold Your Horses" as the elephants came near. Our family, being very poort, that was all of the circus we got to see in those days, but it was thrill enough to warrant the time and trouble expended.







A worker bee does a "dance" in the hive after finding a patch of flowers. The dance seems to be a signal to the other bees to visit the same flowers.

The workers rule the hive. The large, egglaying female in the queen, but the real rulers of the hive are the workers. They decide when to increase or decrease the number of young queens which are to be born. They guard the queen while she lays the eggs. When she grows too old, they press around her until she dies. It is they who bring in the honey and pollen. The community life of the honeybees could not exist if it were not for the workers.

3 medium eggs
1 t. vanilla
4 cups flour
1/2 t. salt
1/2 t. soda
Filling:
1 cup lt. brown sugar
1 cup chopped pecans
2 T. flour
1 cup hot water

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar; add eggs, vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients; mix well. Form in roll, 1 1/2 inches in diameter; wrap in waxed paper and chili. Slice and arrange half the slices on greased cookie sheet. Place I teaspoon of Date Filling on each and top with remaining half slices. Press together edges of slices with fork. Bake in 350°oven for 20 minutes.

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

He was all-district foward this year under the coaching of Leland Caffey.




FIRST BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL OUTING
