Under the present V.A. regulation, the majority of veterans are barred from starting after that date. There are exceptions, however, for those discharged after July 25, 1947, and for those who enlisted or reenlisted.

Veterans who have started courses or who are receiving training may continue after July 25, 1951, even if they have interyond their control. But if a vet-

parliamentary before the umpire does, and the balk is his special pet. From the spring training scenes comes word that hardly a game goes by without that familiar bleat that roars from the stands whenever the pitcher makes a suspicious move: "Balk, balk!" And the new rule change will put the fan in the position of being right, in addition to being knowing and articulate. Balks are readily recognized now.
