

Improved methods of operation in management and utilization of personnel are currently being stressed at Reese Air Force Base. Working along the lines of industry in the interest of increased efficiency and economy, Reese has recently employed an organization methods examiner, Mr. Pat S. Tillman.

Mr. Tillman is assigned to and is a key member of the Management and Utilization division of Personnel, which has the responsibility of insuring through good management practices the proper utilization of personnel. process of conducting a management audit that will cover every section on the base. Since approximately fifty per cent of all firstline supervisors (officers, NCO's, and civilians) are graduates of the Air Force's military management course conducted at Reese AFB, the survey will also serve as an aid to these supervisors in their jobs. A tentative schedule has been set up whereby each section will be surveyed on an annual

The first section to be covered by the survey is the Civilian Personnel Office. It was started 22 August and is expected to be finished by 6 September. During the survey Mr. Tillman examines methods and procedures used and evaluates the organization structure and duties assigned to individuals by reviewing organization-functional charts and by personal interviews.

After thoroughly studying the office layout in view of good management principles to eliminate wasted motions in the process of operation he recommends changes which are submitted to Colonel George W. Pardy, base commander, for aproval and necessary

Mr. Tillman has had considerable training for this undertaking in better management. He has had formal training in this field from the establishment of the Public Employment Service in 1933 on through his wartime ac-






