# AACS Detachment Fixes Own Equipment

Vital to the successful operation of America's military air highways is the work of the AACS detachments who are found wherever military craft fly. But these men, like any other worker, need equipment to ply their trades and responsible for the operation of the equipment are the maintenance men of each detachment who care for

the weather and radio equipment

used. The radio maintenance men install, inspect, test, and repair radio transmitting and receiving equipment, using such test equipment as voltmeter, ohmmeter, tube testers and oscilloscope. Many repairs are effected by repairing some of the units or by replacing the parts. Many times improvisions or substitutions have to be made when replacements are not available.

Responsible for the maintenance of the weather and teletype equipment are the Teletype Maintenance men who install, inspect, maintain, and repair these machines, including receiving, transmitting, and relay units.

M-Sgt. Dan L. Dowell, an AACS veteran, is commander of the Reese detachment, which includes operating and maintenance crews. With over eight years service in AACS, three in the Signal Corps. and five and one-half in the First Calvary Division, all of his service time has been in some communications unit.


### "Your Chapel" GROWING DAILY

## Book Blurbs THE MOTOR POOL STORY CHINA SHAKES THE WORLD

#### by Jack Belden

When World War II ended, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek appeared to be one of the most powerful rulers in the world. The only possible threat to his regime was a small group of Communistled guerillas whom eight years before he had all but liquidated. Today he has taken refuge on the island of Formosa with only a handful of followers and a few chests of gold bullion. Here he lives stripped of his authority, deserted by his generals, his army shattered and the people in revolt. In the meantime, these formerly despised guerillas have conquered all of Manchuria, and North and Central China, seized the national capitol at Nanking and are storming unchecked across Asia.

Here for the first time, Jack Belden tells this story of one of the most amazing turnabouts in history. The tale he weaves is a tangled one of war and politics, strategy and dialects, of murder, poison and seduction, all taking place in the midst of a struggle for survival between three different types of civilization: feudalism, Capitalism and nascent socialism.

This is a story of a civilization in ferment.

Written at a time when the U.S. policy toward China has divided a multitude of Americans into bitterly opposed factions, Belden's book is bound to produce controversy in this country. But no matter what your political views, CHINA SHAKES THE WORLD is worth reading solely on the merits of the book. It is a mass of instructive facts and is a fascinating story in its contemplative originality.

As for the importance of the events he describes, the author recalls Napoleon's famous prophecy: "China! There is a sleeping giant; let it sleep, for when he wakes, he will move the world." BASE LIBRARY HAS A COPY

Q. When is it mandatory for members of the regular establishment (both officers and airmen) to convert to the new Air Force blue uniform?

A. Air Force Letter 35046, as is presently written, authorizes the old Army type clothing until 1 July 1952.

Q. For what length of period have all AF Reserve officers appointments been extended?

A. Indefinitely. (Ref. AF Reserve Briefs, No. 9, Nov. 50)

Q. If a member of the organized Air Reserve is recalled to active duty and has been receiving monthly Veterans Administration compensation benefits, may he still continue to receive those VA payments at the same time he receives his monthly service pay? A. No. Acceptance of Veterans Administration benefits after reenlistment, recall to active duty, or re-induction into any component of the Armed Services will result in overpayments, and the VA is obligated by law to recover any such overpayments. Upon reentering active duty, a veteran should promptly notify the Veterans Administration office from which he receives compensation or pension so that the payments may be stopped. (Ref. AF Reserve Briefs, No. 9, Nov. 50).




#### Haney & Hagle Take Crown Handball
