

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF

A Proclamation

WHEREAS the Armed Forces of the United States, having dedicated themselves unselfishly to the service of their country, are now fighting and dying on foreign soil in defense of the principles of freedom which this Nation has cherished since its birth; and

WHEREAS it is appropriate that we dedicate one day each year to paying tribute to the Armed Forces and to rendering homage to them as the defenders of our people, our Nation, and our democratic

NOW, THEREFORE, I, HARRY S. TRUMAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 19, 1951, as Armed Forces Day; and I invite the Governors of the States, Territories, and possessions of the United States to provide for the celebration of that day in such manner as to honor the members of our armed forces.

As Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces of the United States, I direct the Secretary of Defense and the Secretaries of the Army, Navy, and Air Force to mark the designated day with appropriate ceremonies, and to cooperate with civil authorities in suitable observance of the day.

I also request my fellow citizens to display the flag of the United States on Armed Forces Day, and by fitting exercises to demonstrate their recognition of the gallantry, sacrifice, and devotion to duty of the men and women of the armed forces.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed. DONE at the City of Washington this second day of April in the

year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-one, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and seventy-fifth.



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FREEDOM OF RELIGION

The term "Freedom of Religion" is well-known to most people in these United States of America. But to many of us the term only means that we are free to do nothing about it. However, any freedom of expression, whether of speech, or the press, or religion, is kept in balance only when the people who enjoy such freedom also exercise responsibility in the matter of stating their points view.

This aspect of liberty we call Freedom of Religion was established and is maintained for the purpose of allowing each man to hold and practice our own religious convictions. The American view of religious freedom is broader than that of some other countries which also boast of having this liberty. These nations where a phrase "freedom of religion" is used usually mean that an established religion, a state-church, is free to propogate and disseminate its particular views, but that other religious groups must be limited in their rights and freedoms. But among us, freedom of religion includes the right of all to practice and propogate their particular religious views.

Freedom of Religion is written large in our traditions and history chiefly because people of many religious backgrounds came to America is search of security against oppression in this regard. 

The latter will make an informal inquiry to verify the cause of the absence, and, if it occurs after the araignment of the accused, will report his findings to the court."

41 (d) (3) "Before arraignment -The unauthorized absence of a member of a general or special courtmartial from a session of the court may be a military offense, but his absence prior to the arraignment of the accused will not prevent the court from proceeding with the trial if a quorum is present. However, the trial counsel will report any unauthorized absence of a member to the convening authority."

At any time after arraignment of the accused before the court, if the accused should absent himself or escape, the trial could continue.
