

# Last Chance to be 'Part-Time College Men' Offered A-men

A last chance to register for evening classes at Texas Technological College is available this week, the base Information and Education office announced. All personnel interested in taking college level courses for credit are urged to contact the office no later than noon tomorrow.

A few of the enrollment procedures have been changed in that preliminary registration is being handled at I&E. Registration will be completed at Tech at

the first meeting of classes.

Those planning to take regularly scheduled day classes must register before Monday, 24 Sept.

A general list of courses available for night and Saturday morning study at the college and the credits of each follows. As yet, four added courses, Psychology 230, Mathematics 434, Spanish 131 and German 131, have not been assigned a meeting time. Personnel enrolled in those courses should contact I&E for details.

Education courses include: Children's Literature, Reading Development in the Elementary School, Audio Visual Education, Supervision and Curriculum Development, Elem. School Org. and Admin., Ed. Research, Applied Ed. Research, Elem. Sup. and Curriculum Dev., Curriculum Workshop, Admin. of Business Serv., Gen. Ed., Ed. Thesis Seminar, Fed., State, County and Local School Admin. All are three credit-hour courses.

Regular three-hour courses in English are: Composition, Lit. 237, Short Story and Shakespeare.

One history course, Constitutional Development in Texas, is a three-hour offering.

Algebra, Trig and Advanced Calculus, all three-hour, make up the math department listings.

The only evening music course is master's Seminar in Music Ed.

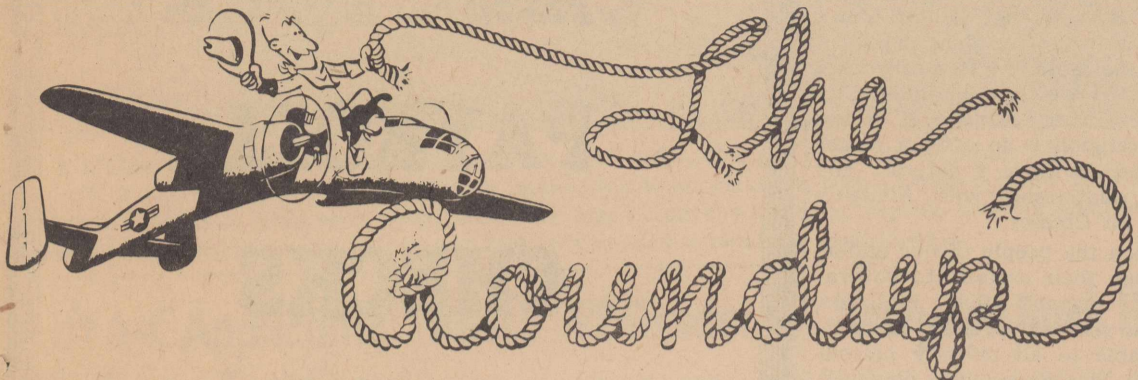
Three-hour courses in psychology are: Psychology of Behavior, Personality Development, Adv.

Ed. Psychology, Exp. Child Psychology, Practicum in Intelligence Testing, Practicum in Technique of Counseling and Guidance.

Beginning German and Spanish, three credits, compose the language department courses.

Business and Professional Speech and Speech Correction Methods, three hours, are speech courses available.

## USAF Best Defense .... 'Captain Eddie'

"Airpower is peacepower," E. V. "Captain Eddie" Rickenbacker, president and general manager of Eastern Air Lines, told 23 aviation cadet and 37 student officer graduates of class 51-F of the pilot school here in the graduation ceremony in the base theater Saturday.

The World War I "Ace of aces" said that "Airpower, coupled with manpower, is our best insurance policy," in speaking of the threat of future aggression against America. He

urged the newly-graduated pilots to protect such democratic rights as being able to attain success on a second or third try after an initial failure.

"Preserve your rights as Americans by exercising the responsibilities that make you free," Rickenbacker told the class.

Three of the cadet graduates received awards during the ceremonies: Charles F. Watson, Shreveport, La., was honored with the outstanding military award, and was also cited as the only member of the class to receive notification of receiving a regular Air Force commission; Francis J. O'Donnell, Alpena, Mich., a former Navy man, won the award for the highest academic standing, and the physical training award went to James M. Gann, Varnado, La.

A review of the 3500th Pilot Training Wing and an aerial fly-over was held on the flight line following the theater ceremony. An Air Medal cluster, four Humane Actoin medals and the American Spirit Honor Medal were awarded Reese officers and airmen during the review.

Rickenbacker visited with his son, Aviation Cadet William F. Rickenbacker, class 52-A, during his visit to the base.

## Modernistic Base Ops Building to be Ready for Flight Line Use Next Week

A gleaming new base operations building as modern as any in the Air Force is rapidly being completed by workmen and is scheduled to be in operation about the middle of next week.

Located directly behind the present base ops building and facing the flight line, the sharp-looking modernistic structure will be a great boon for flyers "since present facilities are inadequate." It has been designed to offer comfort as well as to facilitate flight planning and the clearance of base and transient aircraft.

Good news for flight-weary birdmen is the installation of a well-equipped lounge and snack bar which is planned to give 24-hour service.

Built in three sections, the main section or dispatching room is the only "new" part of the building since the two remodeled wings adjoining it formerly housed weather's radar storm detection unit and the maintenance control office.

Construction and remodeling work is being done by civilian contractors from Lubbock.

A color scheme of predominantly grey and green walls and white ceilings with maroon trim will grace the flight planning room with its maps and charts, the lobby and corridor, personal equipment room, the "Form 5" room where flying records are maintained, and the operations office.

Ever-important and ever-near will be weather data, for in the same building will be included a forecasting room, weather observation room, weather office, instrument and equipment storage room, and teletype room.

Maj. Robert Terrell, Jr., base operations officer, says the move from the old to the new building will be accomplished rapidly with not more than one hour break in service.

Air Base Gp. Hq. will occupy the north wing of the old operations building and M&S Gp. Hq. will set up its offices in the vacated south wing.

## FlyTAF Seeks Insignia In Contest

Plans were announced this week by Flying Training Air Force Headquarters in Waco, Tex., for a command-wide contest to select a distinctive insignia for one of the nation's newest commands.

Headquarters for the Flying Training Air Force were established early this summer in Waco under the command of Maj. Gen. Warren R. Carter. Under his jurisdiction are all Air Training Command bases training pilots,

bombardiers, navigators, observers and combat crews.

Through the efforts of Nellis Air Force Base, the winner will be awarded a three-day stay for two persons in one of the five luxurious hotels on the fabulous "strip" at Las Vegas, Nev.

All military personnel—officers and airmen—are eligible to participate in the contest.

In announcing the contest, Flying Training Air Force officials emphasized that entries need not

necessarily be in "finished form"—that is, exact drawings in color. A rough sketch of an idea, which might be turned over to an artist for finishing touches, may be the winner.

Each sketch should be accompanied by the name, rank, serial number and address of the person submitting the sketch.

All contest ideas and drawings should be submitted to the public information office, building T-1, not later than noon, 15 October.

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## Col. Tom Says . . . .

The Department of Defense recently announced the opening of the Blood Donor Drive to replenish the stock of plasma that has been so severely diminished by the War in Korea. To emphasize the seriousness of this situation the Defense Department cites these figures: In World War I, between eight and 11 men died out of every 100 wounded. At this time neither whole blood nor plasma was being used. During World War II the comparable rate had dropped to 4.5 per 100. In Korea the rate has been 2.6.

Unless we here at home take immediate steps to replenish the now practically non-existent blood bank, some of our men are going to die needlessly for the want of blood plasma.

This is a service which behooves every one of us to consider. Only by making it our own personal responsibility can this vital task be accomplished. Over three million pints of blood are needed before July of 1952. Your donation, through your local Red Cross, will essentially aid in our nationwide interest of preparedness, and the personal well-being of our compatriots on the battlefield.

possibility of what spiritual leadership can accomplish for you by attending the services provided? Protestants are being given a special opportunity during the coming week as the "Protestant Preaching Mission" is held.

partment of agriculture course.

In the School of Business Administration, courses are Elementary Accounting, four hours, Income Tax Accounting, three hours, Machine Accounting (IBM), four hours, and C. P. A. Problems, three hours, all in the accounting department.

Under Finance, Business Law I, Real Estate Law and Property and Casualty Insurance are three-credit courses.

Advanced Personnel Management, senior three - hour, is the only management course.

Intermediate Typewriting, Elementary Shorthand II, Office Machines, and Voice Writing and Duplicating come under the department of secretarial administration. All except shorthand, three-credit-hours, are of two-hour value.

In Business Ed., a three - hour Research Seminary in Business Education is listed.

Two credits are offered for the architecture course, Life Drawing II.

In the E. E. department, Symmetrical Components Laboratory is a two-hour graduate course.

A late bulletin from I&E states that Physics 337, a junior course, is open to those who already have six hours of physics and six hours of calculus. The class will meet Mondays and Fridays from 1900 to 2030 hours.

The School of Home Economics offers 131 Design, under applied arts, Basic Clothing Problems, Slip Covers and Upholstering, and Food Preparation, all three-hour courses.

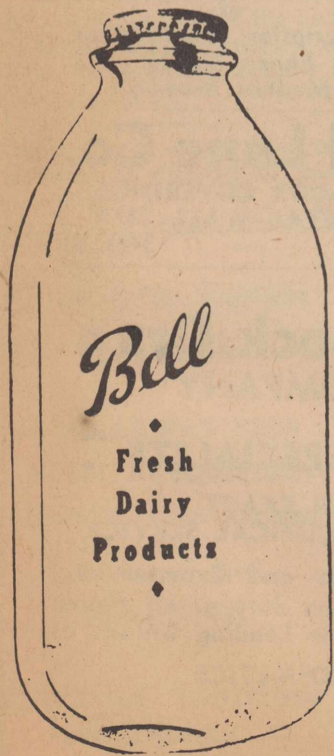
