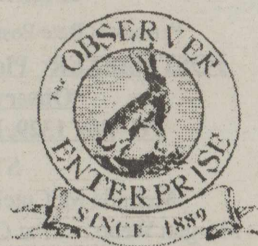

Pets 4 months of age or older should be immunized.

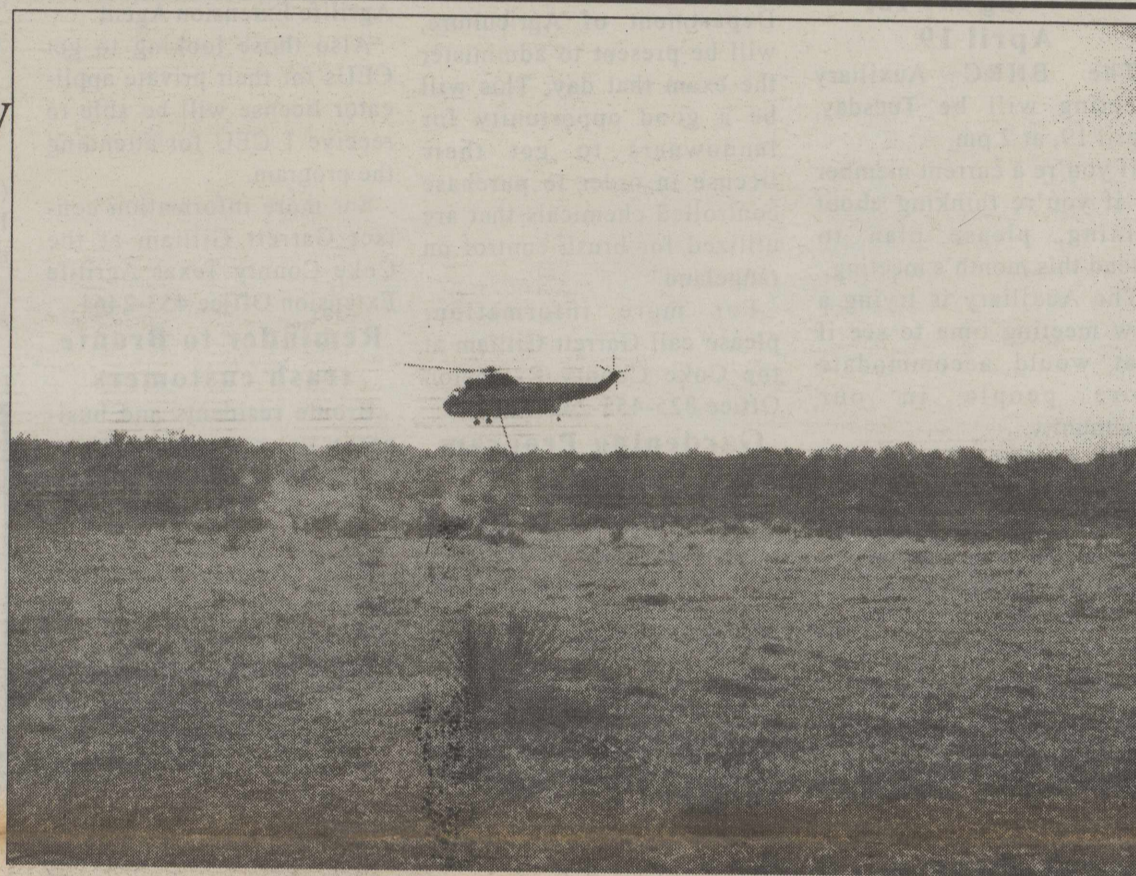
Pets should be vaccinated for rabies annually.

Conservation Reserve Program sign-up ends April 15

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will hold a Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up from March 14 through April 15.

CRP is a voluntary program that helps agricultural producers use environmentally sensitive land for conservation benefits. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to control soil erosion, improve water and air quality and develop wildlife habitat. In return, FSA provides participants with rental payments and cost-share assistance. Contract duration is between 10 to 15 years. Accepted contracts for sign-up will begin on October 1, 2011.

Also those looking to get CEUs for their private applicator license will be able to receive 1 CEU for attending the program.

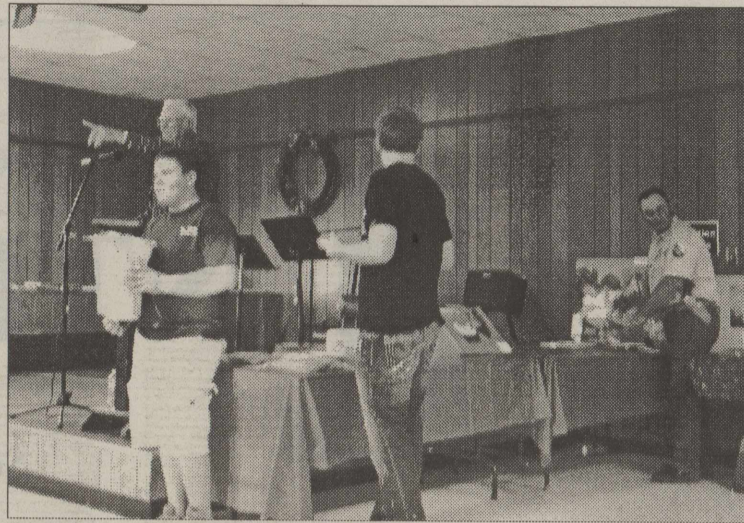

County Clerk no longer accept passport applications

As of April 12, 2011, the County Clerk's office will no longer accept applications for passports.

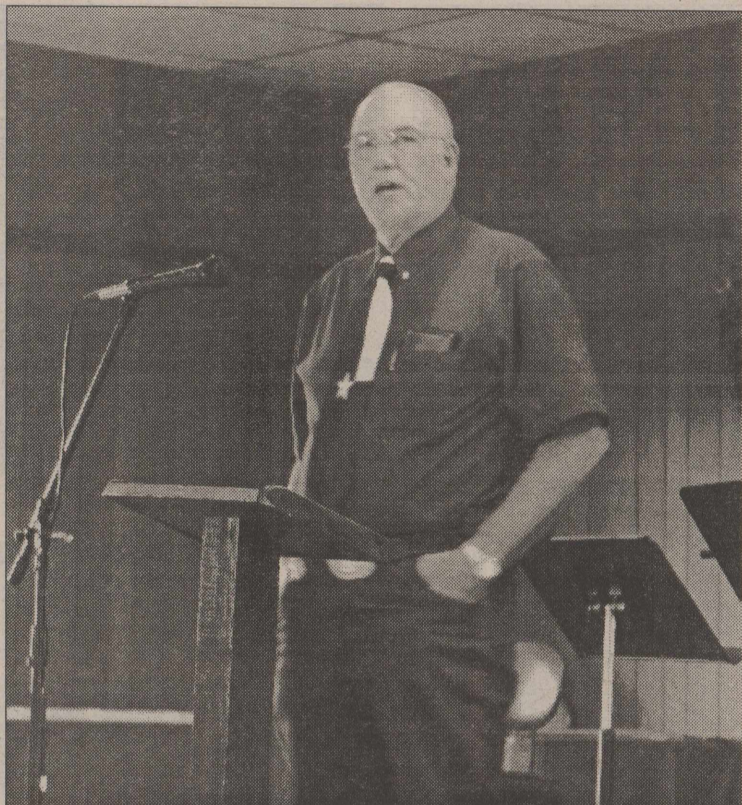
In 2003, the Passport Department stopped designating new passport acceptance facilities that also issue primary birth documentation, unless the two functions were physically separated and acceptance agents could not create, amend or issue birth documents. At that time, our facility, which was already designated and issuing birth documentation, was "grandfathered" into the Passport Acceptance Program pending future action. The Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative now sees the need to modify the initial proposed policy delayed follow-up action for the "grandfathered" facilities until now.

Because we have overlapping duties between the Passport Acceptance Program and the birth document issuance functions, we can no longer accept passport applications. Anyone needing a passport will need to go to the San Angelo post office.

Warden reminds residents to leave baby fawns alone

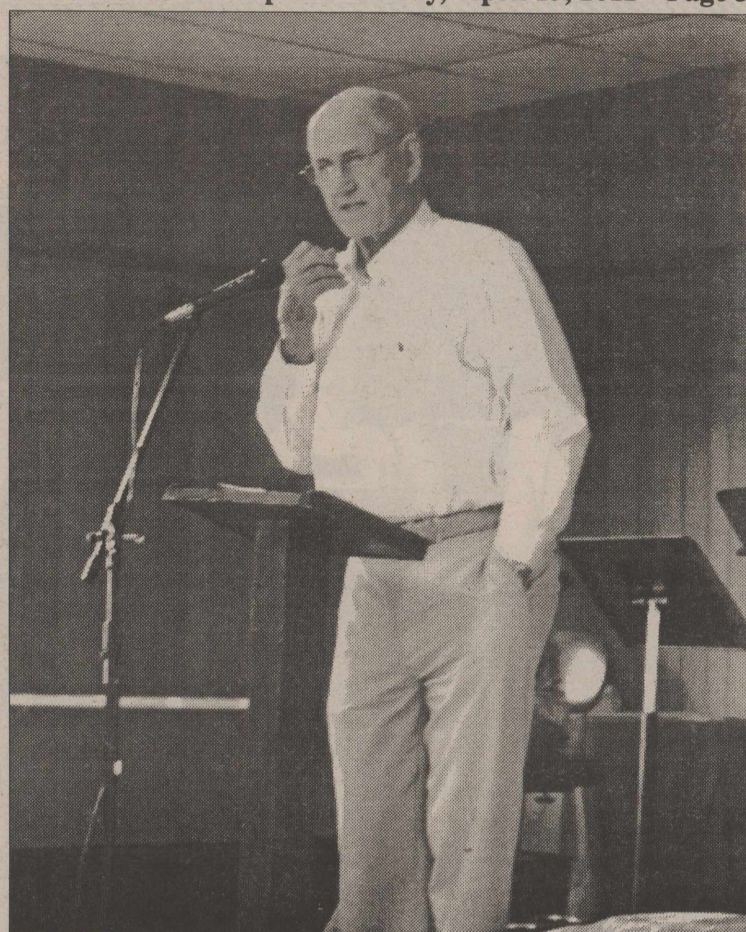

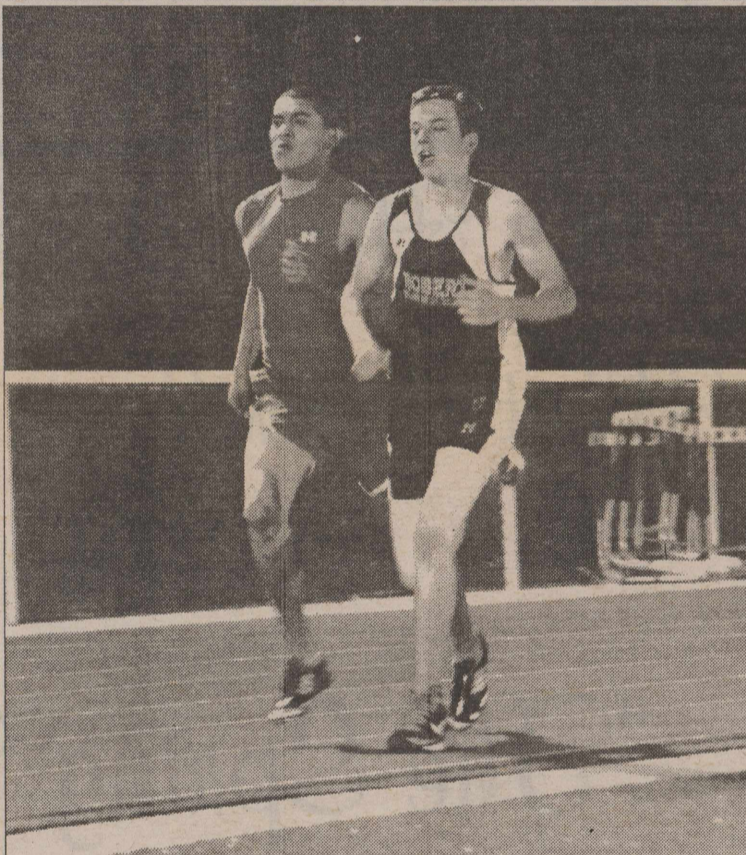

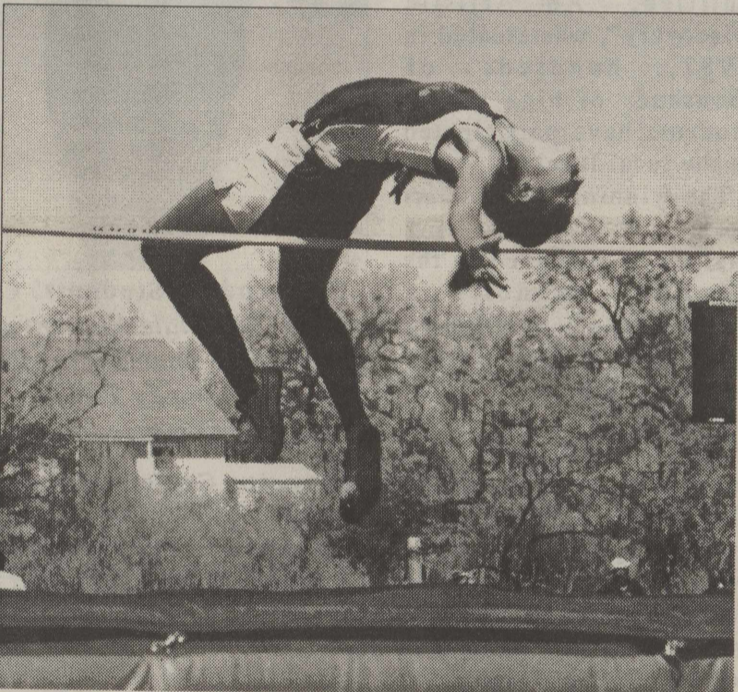

Dear Editor,

I would like to address the folks (taxpayers, students, employees, and voters) of the Bronte Independent School District.

The last three years I have served on the Bronte Board of Trustees, having served this year as your Board President and the prior year as the Secretary. These 3 years have been both personally rewarding and frustrating. The single most frustrating scenario has been dealing with the bureaucratic nightmare of the mandates that are forced on our local district by both the State of Texas and the federal government – mandates that are directed but not always funded. It amazes me as to how severely the state/federal government ties the hands of our independent school district's elected officials.

Some of the positive contributions that I feel your Board has made in the last few years include the following:

Personnel: On March 28, 2011, the Board voted 6-1 to take back the hiring authority for the certified personnel of the District. Previous Boards had decided to give 100% of the hiring authority of the District to the Superintendent, thereby taking the community-elected Board out of the decision process of one of the historically most important duties your representative Board has. Starting in April, your Board now has significant input and oversight as to who is hired to teach and serve the kids of the Bronte ISD.

Record keeping/reporting: This year we voted to change how the minutes of the meetings of the Board are written and recorded. Locally, the Secretary of the Board has a duty to write down the minutes of Board actions. To do this correctly, the Secretary becomes multi-tasked as to his/her level (or lack thereof) of participation in the meeting and/or different writing styles. To better align this important responsibility, the Board now has an employee of the district write the minutes and the meetings are also recorded on audio and video. Community members are now able to go to the district's website and listen to the audio of the meetings at your convenience. Also, taxpayers can go to the school and request to watch the entire video. We realize that most folks do not want to take the time to come to the meetings of the Board, as they are held in the evenings when most folks want to be doing something else. These changes in record keeping provide a more open and accessible means to stay abreast of your school district's status and the financial and other business conducted during Board meetings.

Academics: If you will look at the April 8, 2011, *Observer/Enterprise* news article "Bronte UIL Advances to Region" you will find that the 35 Bronte students participated in and had great success at our district UIL academic competition. This is a direct result of the community members asking for this participation in UIL at the District's "Site Based Planning Retreats," and the Board acting upon that request to promote a greater level of participation and success in UIL academics. This desire of community members gave new energy to school faculty & UIL sponsors, and the result is the highest number of student UIL participation in years achieving a second place District finish, along with seven students going to Regional competition, two to state debate, and alternate area for the One-Act Play.

Financial condition: The Board passed the first balanced budget the District has had in several years for the fiscal year 2010-2011. Your district has been financially blessed for more than a decade. These blessings have resulted in facilities that are second to none, and a District that is financially healthy with no debt and a local tax rate that is comparably low. It is no secret that our state budget is in crisis in Austin, and many school districts are proactively making tough decisions in terms of personnel, class sizes, and facilities. Because BISD is dependent upon state funding, this budget crisis will eventually affect us. However, I believe with prudent fiscal management and by keeping a focus on academic support, Bronte ISD will be able to survive these perilous economic times with minimum impact on our children's education and or the community.

Folks, let me be clear, these achievements are a product of the entire Board of Trustees. I have served with a fine group of people that have been responsive to the wishes of the community.

Increased student academic achievement and fiscal responsibility has been and will continue to be my top priorities if you will allow me to serve another term on the Bronte ISD Board of Trustees.

I am asking for your vote on May 14, 2011.

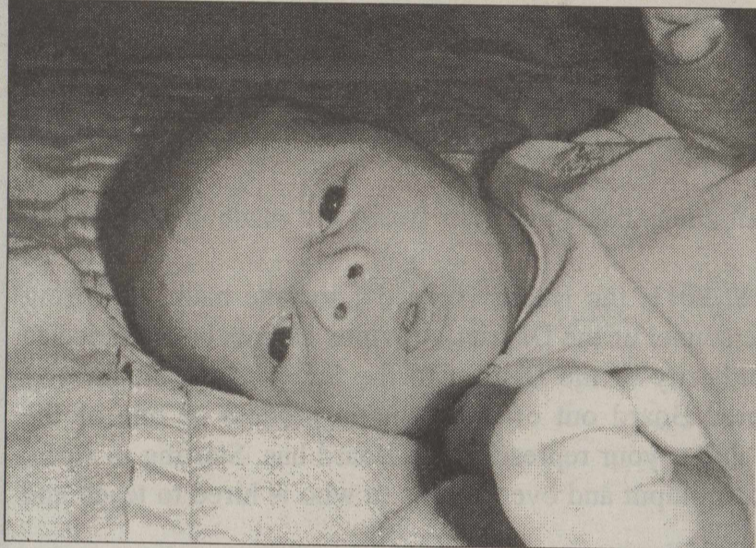

**Cattle Management:

Spring-Calving Cows - The spring calving season should be in full swing now, top priority should be to get a live calf and keep cows in sufficient body condition to rebreed early. Calving areas should be accessible and as clean and as free of mud as possible. Pastures which have

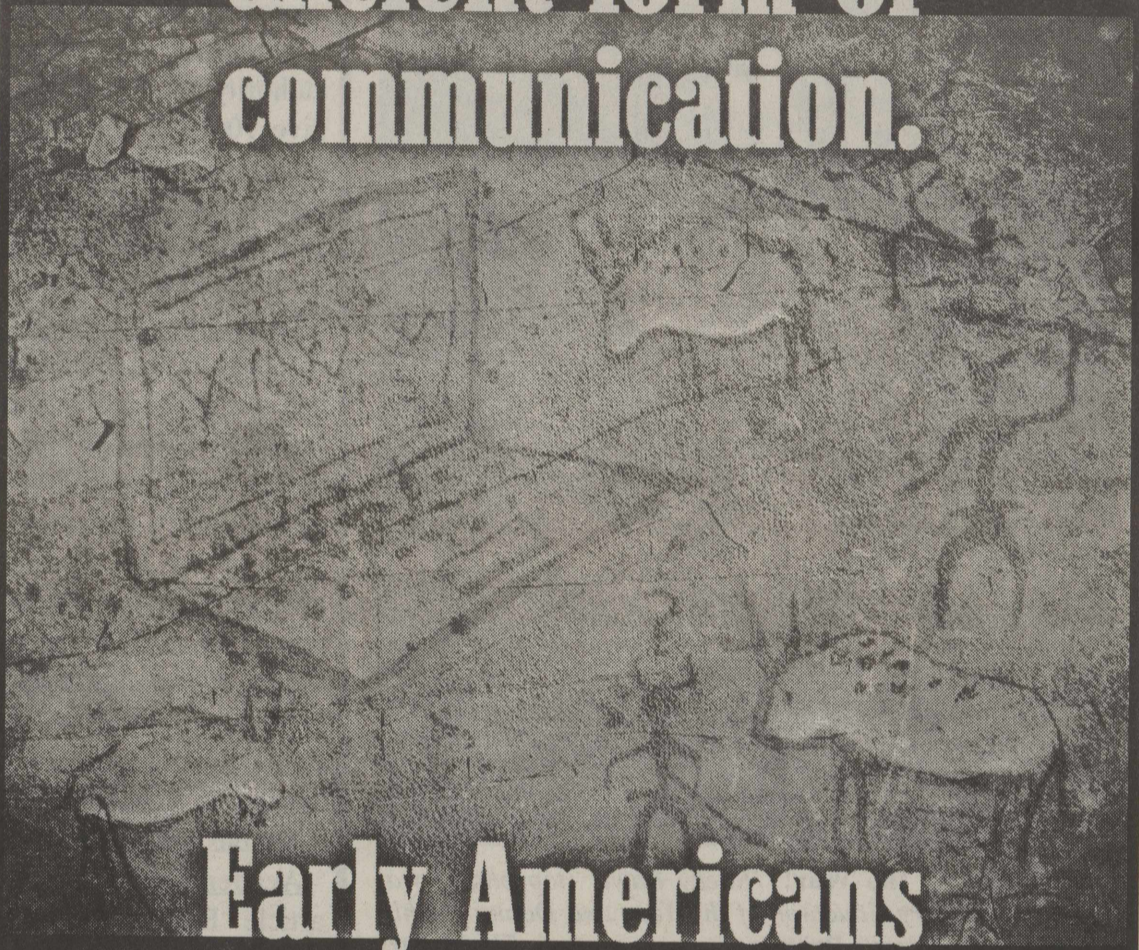
good sod and are close to handling facilities work best.

- Continue grass tetany prevention. Be sure that the mineral mix contains magnesium and that cows consume adequate amounts. You can feed the UK Beef IRM High Magnesium mineral.
- Obtain yearling measurements on bulls and heifers this month (weight, height, pelvic area, scrotal circumference, ultrasound data, etc.) if needed for special sales. Heifers should be on target to be cycling by the start of the breeding season.
- Check cows at least twice daily and first-calf heifers more frequently than that. Be ready to assist those not mak-

ing progress after 1 to 2 hours of hard labor. Chilled calves should be dried and warmed as soon as possible.

- See that each calf gets colostrum within an hour of birth, or administer colostrum (or a commercial colostrum replacement) with an esophageal feeder, if needed.
- Identify calves with eartags and/or tattoos while calves are young and easy to handle and record birthdate and Dam ID. Commercial male calves should be castrated and implanted as soon as possible. Registered calves should be weighed in the first 24 hours.
- Watch for calf scours! If scours become a problem, move cows which have not

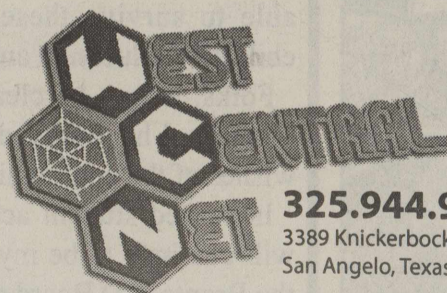

calved to a clean pasture. Be prepared to give fluids to scouring calves that become dehydrated. Consult your veterinarian for advice and send fecal samples to diagnostic lab to determine which drug therapy will be most effective. Try to avoid feeding hay in excessively muddy areas to avoid contamination of the dams' udders.

- Separate cows that have calved and increase their feed. Energy supplementation to cows receiving hay is necessary to prepare them for rebreeding. For example, a 1250 lb cow giving 25 lb/day of milk would need about 25 lb of fescue hay and 5 lb of concentrate daily to maintain condition. If you need to go from a condition score of 4 to 5, you will need to add about 2 more lb of concentrate. Cows must be in good condition to conceive early in the upcoming breeding season.

- Plan to vaccinate calves for clostridial diseases (Blackleg, Malignant Edema) as soon as possible. You might choose to do this at the pre-breeding working in late April or early May.

- Prepare bulls for the breeding season. Increase feed if necessary to have bulls in adequate condition for breeding.

- Finalize plans for your spring breeding program. Purchase new bulls at least 30 days before the breeding season - demand performance records and check health history including immunizations. Use visual evaluation and expected progeny differences (EPD's) to select a bull that fits your program. Order semen now, if using artificial insemination.

Fall-Calving Cows

- Bull(s) should be away from the cows now!

- Creep feed calves with grain, by-products or high quality forage. Calves will not make satisfactory gains

on the dam's milk alone after about 4 mos. of age - since there isn't much pasture in March, fall calves need supplemental nutrition. Consider creep grazing on wheat pasture, if available. Calves can also be early-weaned.

- Calves intended for feeders should be implanted.

- Plan to pregnancy check cows soon.

- Consider adding weight and selling your fall calves as "heavy" feeder calves while prices are high. Keep them gaining.

General

- Repair fences, equipment and handling facilities.

- Renovation and fertilization of pastures should be completed.

- If you have a dry, sunny day, use chain-link harrow to spread manure in areas where cattle have overwintered. This may be done in conjunction with renovation.

- Watch for lice and treat if needed.

- Start thistle control. They can be a severe problem in Kentucky pastures. Chemical control must be done early to be effective.

The Hunt for a Healthy Easter

Just when you thought all the holidays were behind you—and no longer threatening your diet—along comes Easter.

Towering displays of marshmallow chicks and chocolate bunnies tempt you in the stores, and you or your relatives may be planning a massive feast. But you can enjoy this festive celebration without abandoning your diet. All it takes is a little

planning.

A holiday is one day! So if you do tend to overindulge, don't fret. It's not something to throw the towel in for. There is only so much damage you can do in 24 hours.

Watch That Basket- The best approach to Easter? Focus on the meaning and the non-fat traditions of the holiday, instead of obsessing over the meals. Then, once you're looking at the bigger picture—not just your child's Easter basket—figure out how to incorporate some of your low-calorie foods into the holiday for a healthy approach to weight loss. Here are some more tips:

- Since you know sweets will be around, plan for them—save calories elsewhere in the day for a small splurge. Some chocolate can be good for you. Try buying small, individually wrapped chocolate eggs and jelly-bean packs. Avoid the giant chocolate bunnies, no matter how cute they are!

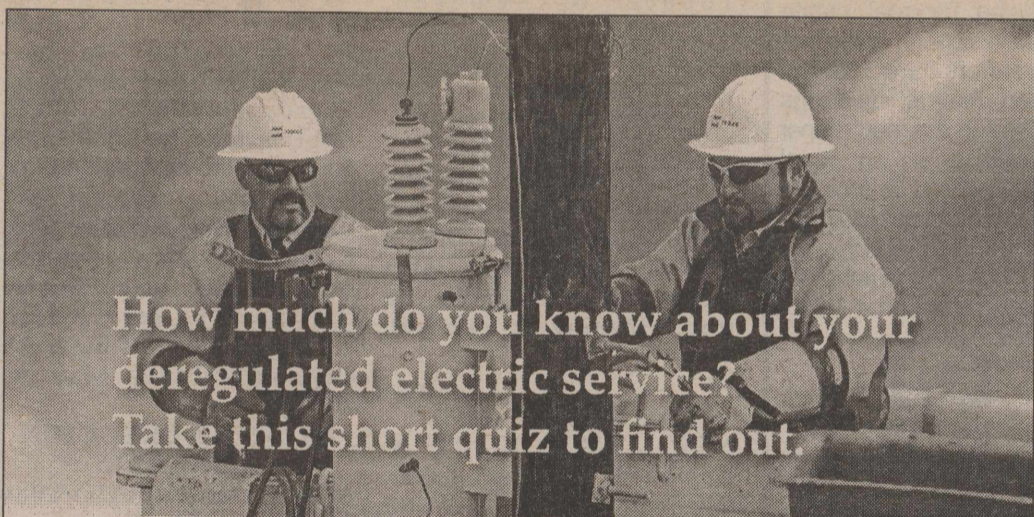
Permanent markers need not be large, but they do need to be permanent.
