

Ask the Mayor

We have yet another "facelift" to our city... Modern Way is renovating the front of its building which will include columns. The Bitners are also putting a fence around the back of their building. All will enhance the appearance of our community. Do you sense the enthusiasm? I believe it is contagious.

I visited with the foreman on the Stripes construction and he was very complimentary of the friendliness of Haskell. He said that Brandon Anderson, City Manager; Wallace Emerson, DCOH head; Thomas Rodriquez, Director of Public Works; and I, as Mayor, had welcomed him to the city and extended our help if he needed it. 




