

Oliver William "Bill" Newell Jr., age 69, of Grand Marais, Minnesota, died Thursday October 11, 2012, in Lubbock, Texas, from injuries sustained in a motorcycle accident.

Bill was born on January 11, 1943, in Longview, Texas. His family moved to Silver, Texas, in 1949 and Bill grew up adventuring around Silver and the surrounding area. He attended school in Silver and in Colorado City, Texas, and loved participating in sports, especially football.

After graduating high school, he attended El Dorado, Kansas, Junior College on a football scholarship and then attended an aircraft mechanical school in California. He later served in the Army and was stationed in Alaska where he excelled at and received awards for his biathlon participation.

After his time in the military, he moved to Mississippi and began working off the Louisiana coast on offshore oil rigs.

He married Gayle Hart of Colorado City and had two daughters. He and his family then moved to Fredericksburg, Texas, in 1972. Bill became a seasoned veteran in offshore drilling and worked in the field until his retirement in 2004. His work took him to Peru, Libya, Cameroon and different areas of the United States while he oversaw many aspects of the petroleum industry including drilling, production, maintenance and safety training. Upon his retirement, he spent his time between Texas and Minnesota.

Bill had the soul of an explorer and enjoyed flying planes, riding motorcycles, skiing, traveling, golfing, boating, hunting, dancing and building. Forever young at heart, he was a wonderful companion in any adventure. His greatest loves were spending time with his family and friends and watching his grandchildren grow. He had an infectious smile and heart-warming laugh, made friends wherever he went, and his generous nature endeared him to people around the globe. His legacy of generosity will continue even after his death due to Bill's choice to become a tissue donor. As many as 100 people could have their lives enhanced through Bill's gift.

In a recent column I talked about population control for white-tail deer and how a better handle on the population can lead to better quality deer. In this column, I want to continue talking about deer management and discuss deer nutrition.

As any cattle rancher knows as we approach the fall and the plants go dormant what is on the rangeland is no longer sufficient enough to meet the nutritional demands of the body for livestock, the owner solves this problem by feeding a supplement to allow the livestock to make use of what is left on the rangeland.

For deer when the weather cools off the plants go dormant many of the higher stress functions of their body start. For example around thanksgiving the rut (breeding season) starts and the bucks body condition will decline through the rut, the does are about to enter their breeding season you can improve your conception rate by getting the does in good body condition prior to the breeding season.

As we all know it is not essential to feed the deer, being that they are wildlife they can survive in the wild, I think lots of times this is a forgotten fact. To improve your deer quality and quantity it can be beneficial to supplemental feed the way

you would a livestock operatal feeding when the plants go dormant (August or September) and ending around spring green up (March or April) you benefit both the does and the bucks ties for pedestrians and bicyclists and is more cost effective than feeding year round. This will improve the buck's body condition prior to the rut and will allow them to return back to good body condition after the rut. For the does the extra nutrition can increase the conception rates leading to an improved fawn crop which can lead to an improved deer size.

TxDOT to award funds to beautify, enhance Texas communities

- · Landscaping and other scenic beautification
 - Historic preservation
- · Rehabilitation and operation of historic transportation buildings, structures, or facilities (including historic railroad facilities and canals)
- · Preservation of abandoned railway corridors (including conversion and use for pedestrian and bicycle facilities)
- · Control and removal of outdoor advertising
- · Archaeological planning and research
- · Environmental mitigation to address water pollution due to highway runoff or reduce vehicle caused wildlife mortality while maintaining habitat connectivity
- · Establishment of transportation museums.

Selected projects are eligible for reimbursement of up to 80 percent of allowable costs. The entity nominating a project is responsible for the remaining cost share, including cost overruns. Submissions will be accepted until 5 PM CST on Nov. 16, 2012. Applications should be submitted to local TxDOT district offices.





1" meter \$ 35.00 1 1/2" meter \$ 50.00 2" meter \$ 75.00 3" meter \$100.00 the next 9,000 gallons shall be \$1.75 per thousand gallons; the next 13,000 gallons shall be \$2.00 per thousand gallons, next 15,000 gallons shall be \$2.50 per thousand gallons; next 15,000 gallons shall be \$3.00 per thousand gallons; next 20,000 gallons shall be \$3.50 per thousand gallons; next 25,000 gallons shall be \$4.50 per thousand gallons; next 25,000 gallons shall be \$6.00 per thousand gallons; next 50,000 gallons shall me \$20.00 per thousand gallons, and all over 200,000 gallons shall be \$30.00 per thousand gallons.

Residential customers outside the City Limits receiving water shall pay 1-3/4 the minimum charge with a maximum allowance of 3,000 gallons; the next 9,000 gallons shall be \$1.75 per thousand gallons; the next 13,000 gallons shall be \$2.00 per thousand gallons; next 15,000 gallons shall be \$2.50 per thousand gallons; next 15,000 gallons shall be \$3.00 per thousand gallons; next 20,000 gallons shall be \$3.50 per thousand gallons. Next 25,000 gallons shall be \$4.50

per thousand gallons; next 25 thousand shall be \$6.00 per thousand gallons; next \$25,000 gallons shall be \$10.00 per thousand gallons; next 50,000 shall be \$20.00 per thousand gallons; and all over 200,000 gallons shall be \$30.00 per thousand gallons. All service charge amounts shall also be charge at a rate of 1 3/4 times the amount charged inside the City Limits.

Commercial Service Outside The City Limits: Hook-up and service rate shall be negotiated by private contract.

The program will be run by the Texas Grain Producer Indemnity Board (TGPIB), which is made up of nine representatives including farmers, storage Facility representatives and grain buyers.

In addition to listening to the emergency alert system and local health officials, you also need to know about other sources of help that are available when a disaster happens. Please become familiar with the following resources; they can provide emergency assistance and critical information during a time of disaster.

Emergency 9-1-1

9-1-1 is the universal emergency phone number for residents of the United States to use to request emergency assistance. During a disaster, do not call 9-1-1 unless the situation is life threatening.

Parents should teach their children how and when to dial 9-1-1.

> 2-1-1 Texas First Call For Help

2-1-1 is a non-emergency information and referral hot line. It is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to every resident of Texas. Specialists are trained to provide callers with current information such as evacuation routes and during a disaster.

Texas Poison Control Center

If you suspect that someone has ingested or inhaled a toxic substance, immediately call the poison control center at (800) 222-1222. A trained professional will give you specific instructions on how to handle the incident. Poison control specialists are available to take calls 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

When making a family disaster plan, you will need to consider escape routes, family communication, utility locations of food and shelter shut-off and safety, insurance and vital records, special needs, caring for animals and safety skills.

To establish escape routes from your house or apartment, draw up a floor plan and make sure that all family members understand the plan. Each room should have two exit points. Family communication: It's important to plan how your family members would contact one another if they were separated when disaster strikes. Fill out a contact card for each family member and have everyone keep a copy of it in a wallet, purse or backpack for easy reference.

Communication with emergency personnel: If you are injured because of an accident or disaster, you may be unable to speak with emergency medical technicians. In these cases, paramedics and other emergency response personnel often turn to a victim's cell phone for clues to his or her identity and emergency contacts. You can make their job much easier by simply adding an entry in the contacts list of your cell phone: ICE. ICE stands for "In Case of Emergency." Add an entry, label it ICE, and enter the name and phone number of the person whom the emergency services should call on your behalf. Adding this entry takes only a few moments, but it can save time for the emergency personnel who can contact your loved ones quickly. Paramedics know what ICE means, and they look for it immediately.

Discussing a Disaster with Children

During emergencies, children often feel afraid, anxious, confused and worried. To help give them a sense of comfort and security, discuss the disaster with them.

Below are some tips suggested by Judith A. Myers-Walls of Purdue University.

· Assume that the children know about the disaster. Children know more you think. They are often exposed to the events as soon as they are able to watch television and interact with others.

· Reassure them. Help your children feel safe by giving them reassurance.

· Be realistic—although you try to support and protect them, you cannot prevent all bad things from happening. Tell them that you love them, no matter what happens

· Be available. Be available and "askable." Let your children know that it's OK to talk about unpleasant events

· Say how you feel. Sharing your feelings can help children know that others also are upset by the events.

· Recognize their fears. Support your children's concern for people they do not know. Children often are afraid not only for themselves, their family and their friends, but also for people they do not know.

· Be aware of other emotions. Look for feelings beyond fear. Let your children express all of their emotions.

• Find emotional outlets. Help your children use creative outlets such as art and music to express their feelings.

· Help them take action. Children may want to take action. The action can be very simple, such as writing a letter or getting involved with a disaster preparedness
