Roger Alexander, Administrator, was not in attendance for the whole meeting due to the annual State inspection at the facility, which happened to run concurrent with the monthly Board meeting. Dessie Kendall gave the invocation.

Minutes from the previous meeting were approved, and there were no absent Board members from that meeting.

In the census count, there

are currently 39 residents in the facility as of the meeting date.

In the Administrator's report staffing update, Roger hired a week-end RN, and hopefully will have some applicants for CNAs in the near future. The future RN, Gloria Witten, was highly complimentary of the facility and is looking forward to her employment here.

Local student attends Farm Bureau Youth Leadership Conference

Attending the Texas Farm Bureau's 50th annual Youth Leadership Conference (YLC) held at Tarleton State University, June 17-21, was James Roberts.

James was sponsored by the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau. He joined more than 353 high school juniors and seniors from over 132 counties across the state.

The purpose of the conference is to provide the students with a better understanding of their American heritage, the capitalistic free enterprise system, and to inspire leadership development, according to John Ross Copeland, president of the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau.

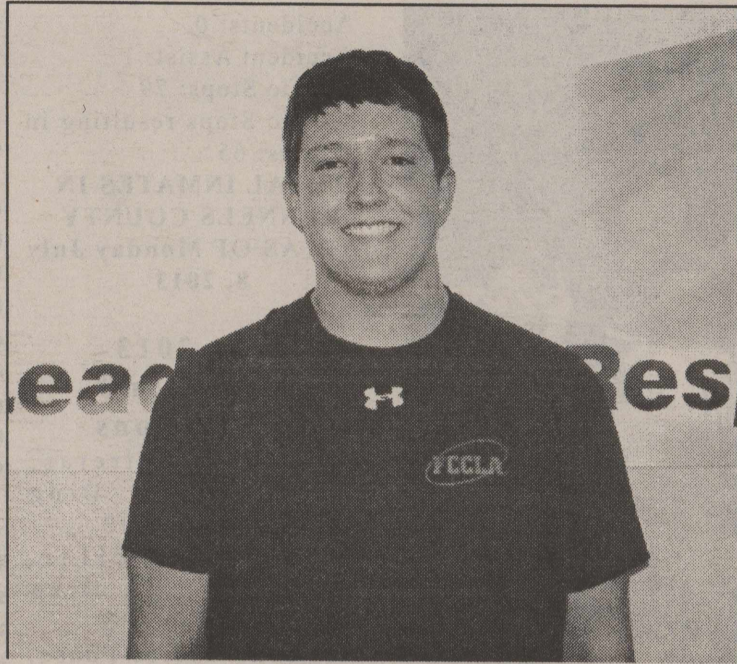
During the weeklong event, three areas are emphasized: Patriotism, Leadership and Responsibility. Students discuss topics such as the free enterprise system, constitutional government, Americanism, Leadership and goal setting, and are encouraged to meet with school and civic groups upon their return home to share what they've learned.

"We are extremely proud to celebrate the golden anniversary of this important program, which aims to encourage and develop the future leaders of Texas," John Ross Copeland said.

Tarleton State University President Dr. Dominic Dottavio welcomed students to campus at Monday's opening session, along with special guest Chance Cerda, Tarleton's student body president and an YLC Alumnus. Afterwards, Vernie R. Glasson, executive director of Texas Farm Bureau, presented "Farm Bureau - Your Host."

Jim Sartwelle, TFB Director of Public Policy and Dr. Roger Hanagriff, Agricultural Leadership, Education, and Communications Professor of Texas A&M University, each presented sessions on "Basics of Free Enterprise," Ronald Trowbridge, former assistant dean at Hillsdale College in Michigan, presented two-part sessions on "The Constitution," Lou Kennedy, a professional development consultant, led a session on "Professionalism in Life," and Gary Evans, a registered investment advisor, offered advice on "Managing Your Money."

Gary Montgomery, a motivational communica-

tor and story-teller from Louisville, Kentucky presented sessions on "Public Speaking" and Sandra Grant, a communications instructor at Midwestern State University assisted students with their group president speeches and hosted the entertaining Mr. YLC contest. Special evening events included a presentation on Tuesday by Trent McKnight on "My Life Story...So Far!" and on Wednesday a music/devotional performance by Mark Swayze. In addition, students participated in a program called "Congressional Insight," which allowed them to simulate a Congressional office and election.

At Thursday evening's banquet, Gary Montgomery shared his personal message of "Living with an I Can Play attitude!"

Students who complete the Youth Leadership Conference and have given a speech on free enterprise to at least five groups will have taken the first step towards qualifying for the Free Enterprise Speech contest, which awards more than \$27,500 in scholarships. After qualifying, students compete at the district level and the winners advance to finals at the TFB Annual Meeting in San Antonio in December. In addition, all 2013 district speech contest winners will have the opportunity to travel to Washington, D.C. with TFB representatives.

Farm bill ensures safety of American food supply

Passage of a full, five-year farm bill is important to the safety and security of America's food supply, according to John Ross Copeland, Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau president.

"Farming is risky due to unpredictable weather, the drought and a fluctuating market," John Ross Copeland said. "Without an effective safety net, farmers across the country could be forced to leave the business entirely."

Fewer American farmers would mean an increase in the amount of food imported from other countries, John Ross Copeland said, and without the checks and balances employed in our food system, an uncertainty of safe and abundant food.

"The best way to ensure the health of our supply is to support the American farmers who produce it," John Ross Copeland said.

The farm bill recently passed by the Senate reforms farm programs and assists farmers with tools like crop insurance to manage the risk associated with agriculture. The House will begin debating its farm bill proposal later this month.

The current farm bill expires Sept. 30. Without a new farm bill, legislators will have to approve an extension to keep the country from reverting to 1949 farm legislation.

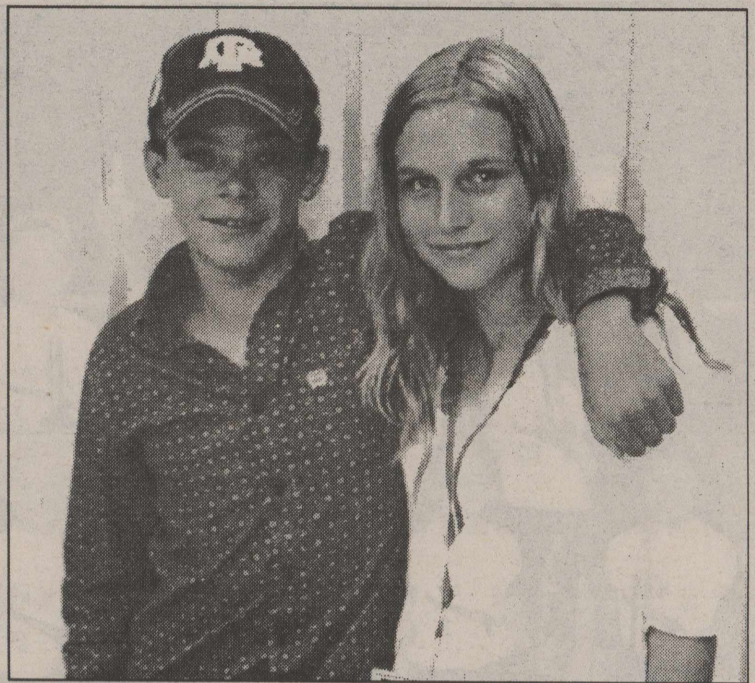
Court decision good for private property rights

A decision by the Texas Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals is good news for property owners in Coke County.

The Texas Ninth Court of Appeals in its Crosstex v. Reins Roads Farm decision affirmed that property owners have the right to challenge common carrier status and the eminent domain power that comes with it in court, said John Ross Copeland, Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau president.

The decision does not mean that pipelines will be more difficult to build, John Ross Copeland explained, because the same court upheld the common carrier status of the TransCanada Keystone pipeline. These decisions do mean that pipeline companies cannot have free rein to build pipelines with no accountability to the landowners they affect.

"The bad actors will have to defend themselves in court," John Ross Copeland said. "Those who respect private prop-

erty rights and operate in good faith can continue to build Texas' energy infrastructure."

John Ross Copeland said ill-advised legislation in the just finished session of the Texas Legislature would have left these critical issues to the Texas Railroad Commission.

"The decisions by the Ninth Circuit Court demonstrates our system works," he said.

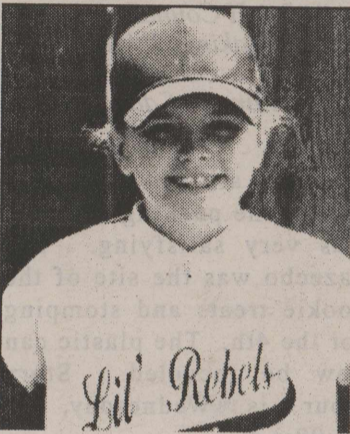

Purchase of Property was discussed and a budget workshop for 2013-2014 was held.

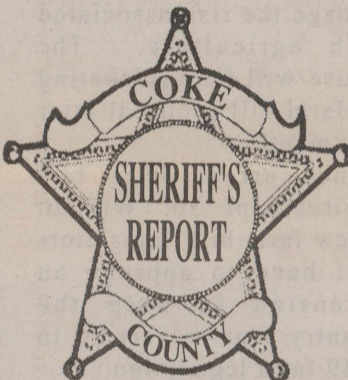
Supt. Hood gave his respective report on the football schedule, homecoming, summer maintenance update, My College Options, and upcoming agenda items.

These conferences will assist with providing information that can be incorporated into their operations, making them more profitable."

Cleere said the conference will feature presentations on analyzing the performance of an operation, potential to expand an operation, purchasing or leasing equipment, operation diversity and where the agricultural economy in the southern region is heading.

"The program will also discuss developing a marketing plan for the farm and ranch, protecting your operation from volatile commodity markets and weather, new tax and estate laws, as well as programs on rebuilding the cow herd."

Featured speakers from AgriLife Extension in College Station include Cleere, Dr. Ron Gill, beef cattle specialist; Dr. Mark Welch, grains economist; and Wayne Hayenga, economist. Also speaking will be Dr. Jason Banta, AgriLife Extension beef cattle specialist, Overton, and Stan Bevers, AgriLife Extension economist, Vernon.

Experts from Capital Farm Credit will include Jason Gibson and Dan Byerly.

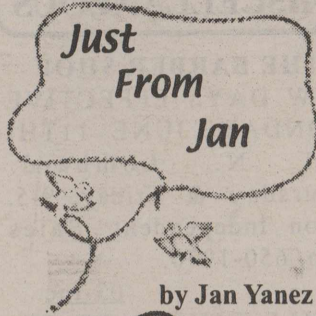

How to Choose a Watermelon

LIKE relationships, watermelons offer no guarantees. But a little wisdom from the experts can help you choose a good one at the store.

First, find a melon that's dull, not shiny, and uniform in shape. Odd bumps and curves can mean it was grown with irregular runs of water or sun.

Then look for a creamy patch. It's called the field spot — the place where the watermelon rested on the ground. The deeper in color, the longer the fully grown melon was on the vine getting sweet. Yellow is better than white, but white is better than no patch at all.

Pick it up. Your watermelon should feel heavy for its size. Compare its weight with one of similar size.

Then there is the controversial thump. Some watermelon farmers swear by it. Other say it's hoey, with too many subtle variables to make it useful.

But believers say to hold the melon away from your body and give it a few good raps with your knuckles. (There are slappers, but that's an even tougher sound to decipher.)

Listen for a melon that sounds full and more like a tenor than a bass. A deeper sound can mean it's not ripe and full of water. It can mean the center of the fruit is separated into chunks, a condi-

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF COKE ORDER RESTRICTING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning.

ate a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Coke County that outdoor burning is restricted in the unincorporated area of the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code §352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for: (1) fire-fighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048. Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

BE IT ALSO ORDERED THAT the purpose of this order is the mitigation of the hazard posed by wildfires by curtailing the practice of outdoor burning, with the exception of barbecuing in an enclosed fire box with water hose or fire retardant accessible at all times and someone attending the fire at all times, and materials used outdoors in activities such as welding and any other activity that could result in a fire. The purpose is to be taken into account in any enforcement action based upon this order.

A. Burns that are conducted after submission of a Natural Resources Service approved burn plan to the Coke County Judge.

Burns conducted under this section must meet the following conditions:

1. Prior to beginning a burn in Coke County, the Sheriff's office must be notified by calling 453-2717 on each day for each occurrence;
 2. The person giving notification to the Sheriff's office must identify the area to be burned by describing the pasture or range by address, by location of County Road or State Highway, and also must give the name of the person requesting the burn;
 3. A water sprayer apparatus or water containers and other fire fighting tools must be available on site;
 4. Fire guards are to be used whenever possible;
 5. Wind speeds must not exceed 15 MPH;
 6. The Humidity index must be 20% or higher as determined by the Texas Forest Service for Coke County; and,
 7. A cellular telephone or other reliable radio communication must be available on site for emergency notification and response.
- B. Outdoor welding or cutting and grinding associated with welding activities are permitted under the following circumstances:
1. Welding and cutting and grinding associated with welding activities shall not take place when the wind is over 15 miles per hour;
 2. The welder must notify the Coke County Sheriff's Department before any welding, cutting or grinding begins;
 3. All grass, leaves, brush and other easily combustible materials must be cleared within a fifty (50) foot radius surrounding the area where the activity is to take place before any welding, cutting or grinding begins; and
 4. A spotter with water and a ready pressurized delivery system must be on

- hand before any welding, cutting or grinding begins and remain on hand until the activity is completed.
- C. Burning of household trash is permitted under the following conditions:
1. Shall take place only when the wind speed is 15 miles per hour or less;
 2. All grass, leaves, brush and other easily combustible materials must be cleared within a fifty (50) foot radius surrounding the area where the activity is to take place and before any burning of trash begins;
 3. The burning takes place in a container with a mesh cover; and
 4. A spotter with water and a ready pressurized delivery system must be on hand before any burning begins and remain on hand until the burning is completed.
- D. Outdoor cooking is permitted under the following conditions:

1. Shall take place only when the wind speed is 15 miles per hour or less;
2. All grass, leaves, brush and other easily combustible materials must be cleared within a fifty (50) foot radius surrounding the area where the activity is to take place and before any outdoor cooking begins; and,
3. A spotter with water and a ready pressurized delivery system must be on hand before any outdoor cooking begins and remain on hand until the outdoor cooking is completed.

In accordance with Local Government §352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

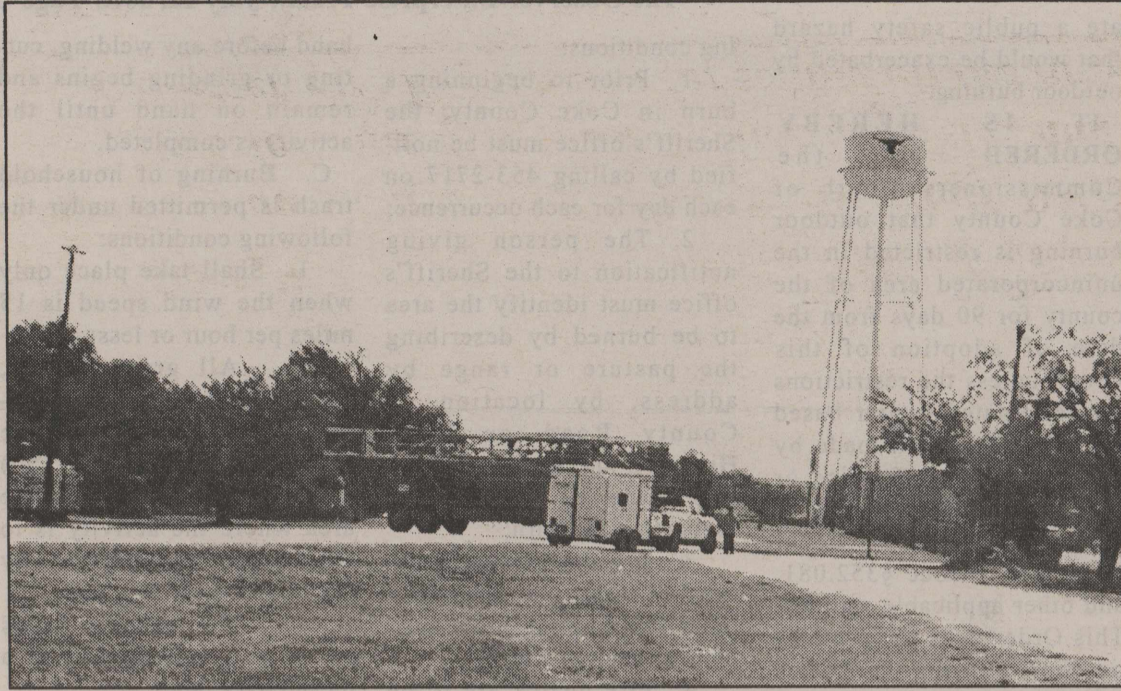

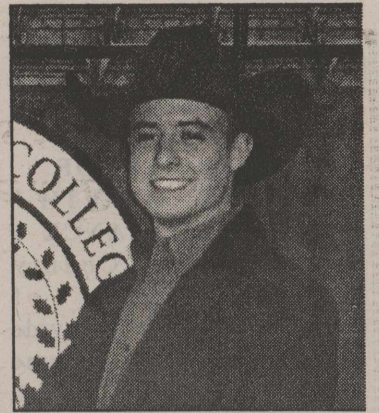
