

Texans to vote on water funding vehicle

As the drought continues and water resources dwindle in Coke County and across the state, Texans will have the chance to vote in November on a constitutional amendment to provide funding to priority water projects.

Proposition 6, which was established by Senate Joint Resolution 1 (SJR 1) during the 83rd Texas Legislature, is up for a statewide vote on Nov. 5.

"Water is critical for our growing state. We need it to grow our food and maintain our cities and households. But as those resources grow scarce, Texas needs a way to prioritize our water infrastructure projects," said John Ross Copeland, president of Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau.

The amendment would create the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas. Proposition 6 would allow state money to be allocated to priority water projects outlined in the state water plan.

"No matter where you live, water is an important resource, and we need a way to be sure the areas that need it most can get enough," John Ross Copeland said. " Passing Proposition 6 will ensure our state's water security through whatever the future brings."



Tailgating Food Safety

The football tailgating season is here. "Tailgating," literally means serving food and drink from the tailgate of a car or

Tailgating has evolved more elaborate. With an outdoor kitchen comes food safety concerns that could put tailgaters at risk for foodborne illness.

WHAT ARE THE RULES OF THE TAILGATING FOOD SAFETY GAME? Keep It Clean

Over 50% of all foodborne illness is caused by unclean hands. The best option is washing hands with soap and warm water for 20 seconds before and after handling food.

Bring water for handwashing, if none will be available at the site. Include liquid hand soap and paper towels with handwashing supplies.

Pack disposable hand and kitchen wipes, as a cleaning alternative.

Keep Cold Foods Cold

Use an insulated cooler with sufficient ice or ice packs to keep the food at 40°F or colder.

Pack the cooler last, taking foods directly from the freezer and refrigerator.

Securely contain raw meat and poultry to prevent the raw juices from contaminating ready to eat foods such as sandwiches and salads.

A cooler becomes a portable refrigerator; the temperature of 40°F or colder should be maintained. This can be determined by placing a refrigerator freezer thermometer in the cooler.

Bring a separate cooler for beverages. Frequent opening lowers the internal temperature of the cooler and can put food at risk of being in the temperature danger zone.

The temperature danger zone, is 40 -140°F, bacteria multiplies quickly on perishable foods. Foods in the temperature danger zone for two or more hours, are unsafe to eat and should be thrown out. If it is 90°F or higher outside, food should be thrown out after one

Keep Hot Foods Hot

To keep home prepared foods like sloppy joes or chili hot, insulated thermos containers work well. Fill the container with boiling water, let it stand for a few minutes, empty, fill with hot

If electricity is available on site or you have an auto converter, slow cookers are an option for keeping hot foods hot. To retain heat, keep the cover on the slow cooker until serving.

Hot foods should be held at 140°F or above. This can be determined by using food thermometer.

Grill It Right

When grilling, the only safe way to determine doneness is to use a calibrated food thermometer. Reaching a safe minimum internal temperature ensures that harmful bacteria will be destroyed.

Clean the food thermometer after each use avoid cross contamination.

SAFE MINIMUM INTERNAL

TEMPERATURES All poultry (whole, parts,

ground) 165°F Ground meats (beef, pork, lamb) 160°F

Beef, pork, lamb and veal steaks, roasts, and chops

Hot dogs and bratwursts

Remember to measured food on the grill with a food thermometer before removing meat from the heat source. For safety and quality, allow meat to rest for at least three minutes before carving or consuming. For reasons of personal preference, consumers may choose to cook meats and poultry to higher temperatures

Serve It Safe

When taking foods off the grill, put them on a clean plate. Don't put cooked food on a platter that held raw meat. Raw meat and poultry juices are full of bacteria that could contaminate the cooked product.

Bring ample long handle serving spoons and tongs to minimize possible contamination by bare hand contact with foods.

Disposable plates, cups, and silverware minimize clean-up and the risk of cross contamination.

Clean Up

Try to plan the right amount of perishable foods to take. That way, you won't have to worry about the storage or safety of leftovers.

If you do have leftovers, place leftover perishable food promptly in the cooler. Remember the two hour rule! It's one hour, if it is over 90°F outside.

Remember garbage bags, twist ties, and other cleanup supplies.

The final tailgating cleanup, is an important step before you leave for the game.





Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 5, 2013

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 62)

HIR 62 proposes a constinational amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an eveniption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying bomewhich the surviving spouse received the exemption

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislattue to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence bornestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed ser-vices of the United States who is killed in action."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitunotal amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund neither of which is operational"

Proposition Number 3 (HJR 133)

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend the length of time that aircraft

parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that ancialt parts that are exempt stead charing the last year in from ad valorem taxation thie to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 24)

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valovem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was doctated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organi-MOOL

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valuem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 18)

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of re-

legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan.

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by gen-eral law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
The constitutional amendment providing for the creation SJR 42 would expand the poof the State Water Implemen-Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 87)

HJR 87 proposes a constituhome-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. HUR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's roaximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district, the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo
