CRIME IN COKE COUNTY How we got here ... What we can do

Coke County, like the rest of Crime Lab where it takes a Texas, is seeing a spike in crime rates from previous years. Coke County is fortunate that violent crime within our borders has not seen a similar spike.


Most crimes are considered "property" crimes and occur in the towns of Bronte and Robert Lee. The majority of the recent "out-in-the-county" larger burglaries were traced back to one suspect and these cases are making their way through the court system.

Citizens must also remember, real life policing and CSI, Wherever are very different from each other. In real life, the probability of getting a fingerprint that meets the 9 point legal requirement for our court system is low. Also, Coke County does not have a crime lab. Evidence gathered in Coke County must be sent to DPS with traffic for funerals, parades,

number and waits.

Coke County is different than many of the counties mentioned in the table accompanying this article. Not only does Coke County have two small cities, it has two lakes, a portion of another small city, and three more communities.

The only full-time law enforcement for the county are the officers employed by the Coke County Sheriff's Office. Sheriff Wayne McCutchen and his four deputies are responsible for covering all 928 square miles of Coke County twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. These men work wrecks, put up livestock (a lot), investigate burglaries, handle domestic disputes, assist EMS on ambulance runs, assist Child Protective Service officers, assist

increased, the law enforcement welcome in homes, businesses agencies serving these cities were given additional funding to add personnel to their forces as required to keep up with the crime rate. As more officers were added, it became harder for thieves working within these cities to escape detection. 

(Continued from page 1) custody disputes, fear of CPS, wanting to be their child's "friend", or just too busy making a living. Many of today's parents were not taught right from wrong by their parents. It's extremely clear across our country that today's citizens do not have the same level of respect for authority or the rule of law as previous generations.

So far, we've focused on the problem. Now, let's look at some possible solutions. Many counties similar to Coke County with multiple cities have police departments within those cities. These departments focus only on crime within the city limits, freeing that county's sheriff's office to work on the crime occurring in the unincorporated areas.

Nearly all law enforcement departments across the state and nation - both sheriff's offices and police departments, work their officers on a "shift" schedule. This enables multiple officers to work at all hours of the day and night. To be able to implement shifts, Coke County would need additional deputies. This would add close to \$100,000 a year in salaries alone

applied for the position due to the pay disparities between Coke County and other departments (see table).

previous The possible solutions hinge on tax money and hard decisions made by our elected officials. Anything government related is slow and in poor counties with poor cities, it may just not can happen. With that said, what can we do to help curb these spikes in crime? We need to be proactive citizens and not reactive citizens. We need to lock our homes, storage buildings, vehicles, trailers, etc. We need to keep a record of all serial numbers on our property. We do not need to leave valuables in our vehicles or where they can be easily taken. We need to keep an eye on our property and our neighbor's property. We need to live by the saying "If you see something, say something." That doesn't mean wait until business hours

to say something. That doesn't mean wait until you run into one of our local deputies at the grocery store, restaurant or post office. That means if you see something suspicious that looks out of place, pick up the phone and call (325) 453-2717. That number is answered 24/7 by a Coke County Sheriff's Office dispatcher.

Above all, pray for our first citizens, responders, communities, counties, state and nation.

Judge Blair announced the presence of a quorum.


Commissioner Robertson moved to accept the minutes for May 23, 2017. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sefcik. The motion carried.

Extension Agents Morgan Runyon and Kandice Everitt presented their reports.


