
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

Lockney to end contract for **Floyd sheriff** services City looking to reestablish PD

The City of Lockney expects to terminate its contract with Floyd County for law enforcement services effective Sept. 30; 2021, according to Floyd County Judge Marty Lucke on Monday.

During the Floyd County Commissioners' meeting July 26, commissioners were provided a letter from Judge Lucke to Lockney city manager Buster Poling outlining steps following a June 21 notification of estimated services for the coming year.

Poling told the Hesperian-

FLOYDADA'S J.R. COMPTON: "TIME TO GET **A WHIRLWIND ATTITUDE"**

I.R. Compton became Floydada's new head football coach starting last spring, with time to get used to a new school facility and a new student body. Compton brings with him a wealth of experience, having been a teacher and coach for 30 years at the 2A, 4A, 5A and 6A levels.

Last week in a fieldhouse so new that doors hadn't yet been installed on the locker room restrooms, Compton sat down with the Hesperian-Beacon to offer perspective on his upcoming season at the helm of the Whirlwinds football team.

"I came here primarily because of Coach (Todd) Bandy and Dr. (Gilbert) Trevino," he said. "I grew up in Hale Center and actually interviewed for the job in Floydada about 12 or 13 years ago, but it didn't work out. But I have known both of those guys for years and have a great deal of respect for them."

Compton said his first coaching job was in Clarendon, and from there, he moved on to Hereford, where he coached for eight years. "At Hereford I got the opportunity to coach in a state championship," he said.

From Hereford he went to Temple, and again he had the opportunity to coach in

QB at Copperas Cove High School.

A single dad of two, Compton soon felt the tug to return back to West Texas so that family could see his children play in sports and participate in school activities. He was in Plainview for six years and most recently served as the running back coach at Coronado High School in Lubbock.

Compton has a daughter, Megan, who graduated from Oklahoma University and now lives in Hoboken, New Jersey, where she works for the NBA; and a son, Jared, 21, who plays football for the West Texas A&M (his father's alma mater) while majoring in sports science.

The new Whirlwinds football coach said he felt very fortunate to have been brought on in February because it took awhile to get to know students because everyone was behind masks at the time due to Covid-19.

Even though it was only the third week of July when we met with Compton, plans were already lined up for a new season of Whirlwinds football, starting with a parents meeting scheduled for July 30, two scrimmages in August and then Meet the Whirlwinds on August 20, which will also be media day and picture day. Compton also talked about working with the booster club to get it rolling for the new season.

"It's going to be really important that we get a Whirlwind See **COACHES**, page 8

CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS Workforce commission announces job surge

AUSTIN—The Texas Workforce Commission released June employment figures that showed Texas employers added nearly 56,000 jobs in June, while the unemployment rate dropped to 6.5%.

"The Texas economy is booming," Gov. Greg Abbott said in a statement. "Businesses are investing in the Lone Star State at a record pace because we've built a framework that allows free enterprise to flourish and hardworking Texans to prosper."

TWC's latest statistics show that the leisure and hospitality industry led all others in job growth, adding more than 19,000 jobs. Education and health services employment ranked second, adding 9,500 jobs in June.

TEXAS DEMOCRATS STILL HOLED UP IN D.C. More than 50 Texas Democratic legislators remain holed up in a Washington, D.C. hotel, blocking an effort by Republicans to pass more restrictive voting laws during the present special session since state law requires at least 100 reps to have a quorum.

The legislators have been meeting with national Democratic leaders, such as Vice President Kamala Harris, but also dealing with an outbreak of Covid-19 among its members, according to KUT. At least a half dozen legislators, who say they were already vaccinated, have tested positive for the virus while in the nation's capital.

The legislators are pushing for federal voting legislation, called the For the People Act, which has already passed the U.S. House but remains bottled up in the Senate. Without changes to the Senate filibuster rule, passage seems unlikely. The special session in Austin ends Aug. 7, but Abbott has vowed to call another one if the Democrats remain absent, effectively stopping any legislation from passing.

PUC, ERCOT UPDATE CONSUM-ERS ON GRID RELIABILITY. In a joint press conference last Thursday, the chairman of the Public Utility Commission and the interim CEO of the Electric Reliability Council of Texas outlined steps their organizations are taking to improve electric grid reliability during the dog days of summer.

The PUC oversees ERCOT, which is responsible for maintaining the electric grid. ER-COT has drawn heat after the widespread blackouts during the February winter storm, and subsequently pleading for less energy consumption during an early summer heat wave.

"We expect there is sufficient generation to meet summer 2021 electric demand; however, there may be times when we will call on customers to conserve just as other grid operators across the country and around the world do. It's just another tool in the toolbox," Brad Jones, ERCOT interim CEO, said. "In response to a conservation notice, Texans may need to take some simple steps for a limited duration such as doing laundry in the morning or running the pool pump at night instead of the afternoon - to ensure grid reliability."

Abbott recently issued executive orders directing the PUC and ERCOT to improve grid reliability. Critics say the measures passed in the last regular session to address the issue fall short of what is needed to ensure another grid failure doesn't occur.

AS CASES RISE, NEW POP-UP VACCINE SITES ANNOUNCED. Covid-19 cases and hospitalizations are on the rise again in Texas, largely spurred by the highly contagious delta variant. The Texas Department of State Health Services is again hitting the road to encourage folks to



get vaccinated.

Rates of those who are fully inoculated continue to lag, particularly in younger populations. DSHS will hold 18 pop-up events at Walmart locations across the state to talk with parents and families about the importance of vaccination for younger Texans as they prepare for next school year and as the Delta variant spreads more widely in Texas. The DSHS pop-ups last four hours each day and will travel around the state through the first week of August. The events feature a 16-foot video wall, a "Take the Shot" basketball game, and free frozen treats.

Covid-19 cases the past week in Texas continue to rise sharply, up 60% from the previous week, when cases nearly doubled. A total of 36,451 cases were reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University along with 190 deaths, flat compared to the previous week. However, hospitalizations continue to spike, with DSHS reporting 4,137 labconfirmed Covid-19 patients in Texas, up more than 30 percent from the previous week.

The number of Texans fully vaccinated rose slightly to 12.51 million, about 43 percent of the state's population. As the delta variant spreads, the state's positivity rate has exceeded 10% for the first time since February.

Texas Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 6–8

STAFF REPORTS

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on clothes and school supplies during the state's sales tax holiday on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 6–8.

State law exempts sales tax on qualified items — such as clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks — priced below \$100, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. The date of the sales tax holiday and list of tax-exempt items are set by the Texas Legislature. "For many families with children who are going back to their school campuses for the first time since the pandemic began, the sales tax holiday is the perfect opportunity to save money on school supplies and other tax-free items," Hegar said. "As a father with three school-aged children myself, I know how these expenses can add up."

Texas' sales tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999, allowing consumers to save millions of dollars in state and local sales taxes each year. The comptroller's office estimates that shoppers will save an estimated \$107.3 million in state and local sales tax during this sales tax holiday.

A casserole like fried squash

Yellow squash, crookneck squash, or summer squash all come in strong in west Texas. Our summer gardens typically yield plenty, just like the zucchini.

I grew up on fried squash. Mom would slice it thinly, then give a light commeal coating that would get nice and crunchy when it browned in the hot grease. She also made stewed squash and the occasional squash casserole. All of them speak the language of a summertime gardening in the South. Each one will make the perfect side dish for a summer supper, or a Sunday dinner.

Normally, I make the same kind of casserole she would. It would have sliced squash, onion, butter, and usually topped with crumbled Ritz crackers. Occasionally, we would add a little cheddar cheese.

This particular recipe serves up a little differently. I puree the cooked squash, and combine it with a little cheese and sour cream, an egg, and sautéed onion. The crunchy topping, in this case, comes from panko bread crumbs that have been toasted in butter.

Zucchini or butternut squash would be a very acceptable substitution for the yellow squash. Even cooked cauliflower that has been pureed would be very good in this recipe.

This will be a variation for a mid-summer casserole to use up some

of your summer squash. Or you may want to hold on to this recipe for a warm, rich butternut squash casserole this fall. Enjoy food made fresh!

Yellow Squash Casserole

2 tablespoons olive oil, divided 1 small onion, peeled and diced 4 small, or 3 medium yellow squash 1 egg 1/2 cup grated Colby, cheddar, or jack cheese 1/2 cup sour cream 1/2 teaspoon salt 1¹/₂ tablespoons butter, plus some to grease the baking dish 1/2 cup panko bread crumbs, or other dried bread crumbs


Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease a medium baking dish with butter. Heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add diced onion and sauté until translucent. Set onion aside and add remaining oil. Add squash to the skillet and cook over medium heat until tender.

Place squash, egg, cheese, sour cream, and salt into a food processor and pulse until smooth. (A blender, or electric mixer may be used, or even a handheld potato masher.)

Fold in sautéed onion and pour into the prepared baking dish. Heat butter in skillet over medium heat. When melted, add bread crumbs and stir to coat with butter. Continue over medium heat, stirring frequently for a few minutes until crumbs are toasted.

Sprinkle crumbs over the squash mixture. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes in preheated oven. Serve warm. Makes 6 servings.

Tip: Spice this casserole up a bit by adding diced green chiles.

Beacon the following day that Lockney plans to staff its own police department and has had several prospective offiers express interest.

Lucke said the move would "release more deputies to patrol out in the county," though in any circumstance "sheriffs have always been supportive of local law enforcement."

Floyd County Sheriff Paul Rassiez was ambivalent on the matter. The existing city-county agreement is slated to termnate Sept. 30 on the 3 p.m.-to midnight shift.

In other action, commissioners approved an order establishing criteria for redistricting. Judge Lucke said that he would work hard to keep boundaries of precinct officers and other officials from. changing radically.

Commissioners approved a capital acquisition of \$17,500 for the purchase of a front-end loader in Precinct 3 and tabled a separate purchase of a utility tractor, rotary cutter, box blade, pallet forks and trailer for Road and Bridge until cost estimates on a larger tractor could be obtained. Judge Lucke reported that he is still awaiting prices on motor graders for Precincts 2 and 4.

Judge Lucke reported that bids will be entertained through September 8 for the biennial county depository bank contract.

The court approved expenses of approximately \$150 per month, with a package discount, to sponsor live-streaming of area athletic competitions on local radio this year.

The court approved the interlocal agreement with SPAG concerning the PSAPS (Public Safety Answering Point Services).

Judge Lucke reported that Covid-19 cases are on the increase again in Texas and the U.S.; he clarified that no active cases have yet been reported in Floyd County recently.

Regarding the county budget, Judge Lucke received certified property values on Friday and said he anticipated the budget to be the same figure as last year when it's filed August 2.

"We are financially in my opinion in one of the best fiscal positions we have been in years," said Lucke, though he described the budgeting process as "a little more stressful- trying to get raises without increasing spending."

County clerk Ginger Morgan addressed the matter, thanking the judge and commissioners for providing raises but adding a request for equity in the salaries of deputy clerks and a request for another full-time deputy in her office.

The meeting adjourned at 8:41 a.m.



ABILENE, Texas - On July 23, the U.S. Postal Service released four new designs of its Forever stamps, all illustrated by Ryan Feerer, associate professor of design, director of the graphic design program and designer-in-residence at Abilene Christian University.

Feerer was tasked with illustrating

the four new USPS stamps with the theme of "Western Wear." The designs he created include a boot, a pearl snap shirt, a belt buckle and a cowboy hat.

"I cannot explain to you how excited I am to share the stamps with the world," Feerer said in and ACU press release. "I feel a huge sense of pride and accomplishment."

After graduating from ACU in 2002, Feerer earned his Master of Fine Arts from the School of Visual Arts in New York City. One of his professors there, Gail Anderson, served on the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee for the USPS and recommended Feerer for the project.

When it was officially offered, Feerer said accepting the task didn't require much deliberation."I responded within seconds. Creating stamp art was a dream opportunity I never thought I would be able to do. I was ecstatic but a little nervous that it might fall through because of how significant it was."

In addition to the primary images, Feerer incorporated small plants, animals, western-inspired flourishes, the sun and other related elements to frame each clothing illustration.

"I had never created something so delicate and small. I instantly became obsessed with every detail. I tried to be strategic in the placement of every dot and stroke of each line," he said. "I would often find myself up late into the morning hours, not realizing how much time had passed. The result was pages and pages of stamp variations that I was constantly studying and comparing. It

was overwhelming at times but in a fun way. This project is probably the most significant thing I will ever work on and I wanted each stamp to live up to that."

Feerer's illustration experience includes logos, album covers and projects for brands like Fossil, Etsy, Snapchat, Academy Sports and Outdoors and Target. Locally, he's the artist behind the logos for many businesses, restaurants and Allen Ridge, a shopping center named for a family of early Texas settlers.

"The USPS releases less than 40 new stamps every year, and I was fortunate enough to design four of them with a run of 175 million," he said. "To me, that is mind blowing."

The first day of issue was in Abilene on July 23. The stamps can be ordered at USPS.com.





Lockney ISD seventh graders must have immunizations

All incoming Lockney ISD seventh graders must have a Tetanus (Tdap) booster and their first dose of Meningococcal (MCV4) before school begins in the fall.

It is against state law for students to start school without their needed vaccines. Some students may have already had these vaccines, however, the school does not have record of this unless you have sent us an UPDATED copy. USDA to provide pandemic assistance to livestock producers for animal losses

This is part of the ongoing Rangeland, Wildlife and Fisheries Management Stewardship Series of webinars. The program focuses on coupling prescribed fire and grazing.

The featured speaker is Laura

Goodman, Ph.D., Oklahoma State University Extension rangeland ecology specialist, Stillwater.

THE PRAIRIE PROJECT. The Prairie Project integrates research, education and extension programs to facilitate the adoption of new strategies to increase livestock production and promote rangeland health in the Great Plains.

Goodman is the co-leader of the project's extension and education efforts and assists with applied research.

The project's research, education and extension agenda was developed through more than a decade of intensive stakeholder interactions across the Great Plains. Its goal is to facilitate the adoption of management practices to increase food production and more sustainable rangelands. The Prairie Project aims to increase livestock productivity by 20% in the Great Plains, thus also increasing the resilience of rural communities in this area.

SAVING GRASSLANDS. The webinar will discuss how grasslands and savannas worldwide are an imperiled biome—particularly as a result of woody plant encroachment, increasingly extreme climatic conditions and more frequent and intense wildfires.

"Saving the remaining grasslands in the Great Plains and elsewhere will require a widespread shift in cultural norms—facilitated by targeted government incentives and a coordinated program of regional research, extension and education," said series co-coordinator Morgan Treadwell, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension range specialist, San Angelo. "This webinar will cover the steps needed to achieve that and how we can start to shift public policy and perception."

Goodman will explain how widespread adoption of pyric herbivory– the interactive ecology process where fire and grazing interact– as well as mixed-species grazing, such as cattle and goats, would not only make grasslands and savannas more resilient to environmental change but also enhance the profitability of livestock production systems.

Treadwell explained these management strategies control woody plants, enhance forage quality and increase animal production, and although this new management paradigm holds tremendous promise, it has not been widely adopted yet.

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Panel discussion to open 'Fire in the Pasture: Prescribed Burns' exhibit July 30

Panel participants will include Paige Purvis, Texas Forest Service Regional fire coordinator; Bobby Schat, Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. burn manager; Dr. Carlos Villalobos, Texas Tech University associate professor of natural resources management; Annie Braack (moderator), president of the Texas Tech Student Association for Fire Ecology; Dr. Nathan Gill, Texas Tech University assistant professor of natural resources management; and John R. Erickson, rancher and author.

"John Erickson will be on the panel and can speak from experience about out-of-control fires." Hodges said. "His ranch home burned to the ground in 2017 when strong winds damaged a power line and sparked a prairie fire. Erickson is also a rancher who understands that prescribed burning can be used to reduce weeds, brush and shrubs that act as high-risk fuel for dangerous wildfires."

Most people on the Southern Plains connect fire images with house fires or out-of-control wildfires, but a new exhibit opening Friday, June 30 at the National Ranching Heritage Center will emphasize the land management benefits of prescribed, controlled burns.

Supported by the Helen Jones Foundation, the "Fire in the Pasture: Prescribed Burns" exhibit will open with a sevenperson panel discussion from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. in the main gallery of the museum.

"Both the exhibit and panel discussion are meant to draw public attention to the importance of prescribed burns for maintaining and promoting certain plants, wildlife and conditions that successfully contribute to land-use activities," said Julie Hodges, Helen DeVitt Jones Endowed Director of Education at the NRHC.




