Region celebrates expanding harvest

AS SUMMER COMES TO AN END AND THE STANDS FILL WITH FOOTBALL FANS ON FRIDAY NIGHTS, Texas temperatures cool and shift to autumn. For regional fruit and vegetable growers, the time has come to begin the harvest. Some of Floydada's famous pumpkins are already on their way to destinations across the state and beyond. The cotton harvest will follow, starting in late October.

This year, local pumpkins, watermelons, apples and grapes are seeing growth in both wholesale and retail markets, while rural residents are also seeing broader availability of Texas products in the region.

PUMPKINS A FLOYD COUNTY STAPLE

Legend has it that the pumpkin is native to the region and possibly saved the lives of Coronado and his men when they explored the area in the 1500s—and modern times have yielded praise for the pumpkin as well.

Floydada became well known as "Pumpkin Capital USA" in the 1980s, though the distinctive squash was initially only cultivated on five acres belonging to a farmer named B.A. (Uncle Slim) Robertson, who had a pumpkin crop starting in the 1950s. Now multiple growers have introduced more varieties, and the area produces millions of pumpkins every year. Some pumpkins can reach two or three hundred pounds each.

"My dad grew pumpkins in the '60's, but back then we only had one type," said Tim Assiter of Assiter Pumpkin Ranch, explaining that Floydada growers have expanded to become an influence on

The Floydada Whirlwinds found their way back into the time, the victory column Friday night over the Smyer Bobcats 34-8 before a celebratory Homecoming crowd at Tyer Stadium.

The game got off to a quick start. With 11:12 still left in the first quarter the Bobcats fumbled the ball, and Floydada's only score of Andres Mendoza recovered it. Eleven seconds later running back Mendoza was rushing into the end zone for the first score

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CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

Abbott calls third special session for Sept. 20

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—Gov. Greg Abbott has called a third special legislative session to deal with redistricting, to decide how to spend billions of dollars in pandemic funding from the federal government and to determine to whether state or local governments can mandate Covid-19 vaccines, as well as some pet issues of the governor that failed to pass recent sessions.

The third session begins Sept. 20 and by law can last no longer than 30 days. The second special session resulted in passage of hotly contested voting restrictions and what are considered the most restrictive abortion laws in the country, both of which are under legal attack. In the case of the latter, the U.S. Justice Department is suing the state, saying the abortion law banning the procedure at roughly six weeks of pregnancy is unconstitutional.

"The (Texas) act is clearly unconstitutional under long-standing Supreme Court precedent," Attorney General Merrick Garland said Thursday, as reported widely by media outlets.

Several groups have filed suit against the elections bill signed by Abbott last week, including Voto Latino, LULAC Texas, the Texas Alliance for Retired Americans, and the Texas American Federation of Teachers.

The law limits early voting hours, ends drive-in voting, and restricts mail-in voting. GOP leaders maintain that other provisions in the measure make it easier to cast a vote than before.

AUGUST COOLER, WETTER THAN NORMAL FOR MOST OF TEXAS. August is in the books and the first day of autumn beckons. Dr. Mark Wentzel, a hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board, reports the month was cooler than normal for most of the state, and wetter than normal for about half of Texas. The U.S. Drought Monitor map for Texas shows just 1% of the state in drought.

"Over the last 22 years, we've averaged about 40% of the state in drought by the end of August, Wentzel wrote in his monthly report. "Since 2000, we've only had two other Augusts that ended with less drought area: 2004 and 2007."

EMERGENCY SNAP BENEFITS EXTENDED AGAIN. The Texas Health and Human Services Commission is extending emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program food benefits once more in September, meaning SNAP recipients will again get an additional \$95 in emergency allotments. The funding comes from the United States Department of Agriculture.

"As we continue to navigate through the pandemic, we are pleased to provide this additional support to ensure Texans will be able to keep food on their table for themselves and their families," said Wayne Salter of the HHSC.

Wildlife Department say habitat conditions point to another productive season for hunters.

"Teal numbers are already impressive in many areas of Texas, especially the rice prairies of the Texas Gulf Coast and the playa wetlands of the Panhandle,"

Kevin Kraai of TPWD said.

The 16-day statewide early teal season runs through Sept. 26, with a daily bag limit of six. Blue-winged teal are by far the most prevalent duck found in Texas this time of year, according to TPWD.

TUITION PROGRAM OPEN ENROLLMENT UNDER-WAY. Open enrollment in the state's Texas Tuition Promise Fund began Sept. 1 and runs through the end of February. The plan allows parents and others to lock in today's tuition and fees at state public colleges and universities. The accumulated funds can also be transferred to private colleges and other institutions such as vocational schools, though the tuition is not locked in.

The TTPF program offers webinars throughout the enrollment period. More information can be found at TuitionPromise.org or by calling Monday through Friday at 800-445-GRAD (4723). Press Option 5.

COVID-19 CASES, HOSPITALIZATIONS DROP SLIGHTLY. The number of new Covid-19 cases in Texas decreased slightly in the past week, with the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University reporting 120,494 new cases, down 4.6% from the previous week. Total deaths statewide increased slightly to 1,789.

The number of lab-confirmed Covid-19 hospitalizations dropped slightly, with 13,285 reported in Texas, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. Available intensive-care unit beds remain scarce, with just 330 open in the entire state, the least since the pandemic began early last year. Even more concerning are the few pediatric ICU beds open, with just 80 available, according to DSHS.

It's the time of year for Tailgate **Beef Tips and Fondue**

You may have heard about the recent trend of preparing queso on the grill, or in the smoker. I can't think of anything I'd like better for tailgating, or autumn barbecues than a bubbling tray of ooeygooey cheesy dip.

Tailgating may still be a little uncertain this year, but who's to say we can't enjoy a little "home-gating," if not well-spaced actual tailgating at the field?

I couldn't wait to try my own version of smoked queso, but my mind went to planning all kinds of good things to serve with it. This led me to think about steak tips and fondue.

The fondue can be prepared the same way the queso is made. A disposable aluminum pan works great for the grill or smoker.

We prepared the beef tips in a grill pan, but an aluminum pan with holes punched in the bottom will also work well. Or even skewers would be good method for grilling or smoking the beef tips.

Other serving suggestions with the beef tips: fresh veggies, or cubes of cooked potatoes, or bread. Enjoy food made fresh, and enjoy the big games!

Tailgate Beef Tips and Fondue

- 2 pounds good sirloin, cut into bitesize pieces
- 2-inch knob of fresh ginger, peeled and sliced
- 4 cloves garlic, peeled and sliced
- 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 3 tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon balsamic glaze
- 1 tablespoon packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted

FONDUE

- 10 ounces asadero cheese, cut into small chunks
- 4 ounces Monterey Jack cheese, grated
- 4 ounces Neuchatel cheese, or cream cheese
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder

- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

Place cubes of steak in a shallow dish. Add ginger, garlic, Worcestershire sauce, soy sauce, and balsamic glaze. Stir to combine. Add brown sugar, salt, black pepper, red pepper flakes and stir to combine. Drizzle with melted butter and stir to coat. Let marinate for a minimum of 1 hour, covered. Or place in refrigerator overnight.

Set up the grill, or smoker, to your liking. We used a small tailgating charcoal grill and added a few pieces of lump charcoal for extra smokiness.

Place asadero, Monterey Jack, and cream cheese in a disposable aluminum pan. Top with garlic powder, onion powder, and white

Spoon marinated beef into a grill pan. Depending on the size of the pan, work in batches. Place grill pan and aluminum pan with the cheese mixture onto the grill. Keep over medium heat. Let beef sear before tossing. Turn beef tips several times until reaching the desired doneness.

Cheese mixture will begin bubbling. Stir occasionally to ensure even cooking/melting. Once it is fully melted and of good dipping consistency, add Worcestershire sauce and Dijon and whisk to fully incorporate. Place the pan on a cooler part of the grill for serving. Or pour fondue into a fondue maker to keep warm. You can also pour it into a microwavable dish and reheat in microwave if fondue thickens before serving.

Dip beef tips, and other items such as fresh veggies, cubes of bread, or potatoes into the smoky fondue. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Gathering bois d'arc trivia

Everything is searchable. Not everything is findable. Don't quote me. I'm misusing the word "searchable." I'm still right. You can search for anything, but sometimes you won't find it, not even via the Internet.

My new hobby is gathering non-Internet knowledge. A book in the works.

Unfortunately as soon as I share any non-Internet info in a newspaper essay, I've shot myself in the foot. These musings end up online for the world to see. Scary thought. Hello world.

Here goes anyway:

If you put bois d'arc apples in a burlap bag and drive over it with a vehicle, thereby crushing the bois d'arc apples, and if you then submerge the bag, plus rocks, in a fish-inhabited pond, you can cruise by in your fishing boat and scoop up fish in the vicinity of the bag because the smushed bois d'arc apples will take oxygen out of the water, forcing the fish to the surface.

That fishing technique isn't findable online. I just looked.

Maybe it works. Now that the whole world knows, we can sit back and see if bois d'arc apples come into their own in fishing circles.

One of my farmers market non-customers told me that bois d'arc tale.

If you want to learn about all the various uses for bois d'arc apples or any other curious organic items, try selling what you have at a farmers market or festival. You'll create a mild buzz. They're the perfect fruit to make your fall arrangement different from your neighbors' display. Trust me.

At the market many of the non-buyers of my bois d'arc apples told me about properties that make them useful as well as ornamental. My sales pitch improved as I added the selling points, roach and spider prevention included. Still nobody bought any. Texas Proce I

My neighbors made good money selling watermelons and black-eyed peas. Me, I managed to make a little selling wild plums and home-baked bread. Mainly I gained a treasure trove of trivia and inspiration from various non-customers.

My friend and fellow-vendor Larry shared a beautiful story he wrote about an angel train. A Vietnam vet shared with me tips for tracking the enemy and navigating difficult terrain.

I'm mostly a talker. Sometimes I'm smart enough to shut up and listen.

Now I'll be dreaming of angel trains, catching fish with bois d'arc apples and using my nose to track the Vietcong. Search the Internet. You'll find some of the sniffing

techniques. But I can say I learned them firsthand.

Firsthand is special.

Postlude:

I just chased a hanging spider back into the window valance with a bois d'arc apple.




She was a faithful member of First Baptist Church in Floydada for most of her life until she and Joe moved to the Raider Ranch retirement community in Lubbock in 2015.

The election will be held by mail ballot in the three voting regions. Ballots for eligible voters will be available Oct. 25, 2021, at local AgriLife Extension offices in each of the appropriate voting regions, or by writing TCPB at the address stated above. Voters may also vote for board members by "writing in" the name of any eligible persons. Ballots must be postmarked no later than Nov. 15, 2021, to be valid.

Constitutional Amendment Election Proposition Number 1

HJR 143 proposes a constitutional amendment expanding the circumstances in which a professional sports team charitable foundation may conduct raffles to raise money for the foundation's charitable purposes. The proposed amendment would allow professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to hold charitable raffles

(HJR 143)

at rodeo events. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowbovs Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to conduct charitable raffles at rodeo venues."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 99)

HJR 99 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to authorize a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county and to pledge for repayment of those bonds or notes increases in property tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county. The Texas Constitution gives the legislature the power to authorize an incorporated city or town to issue such bonds or notes but does not expressly give the legislature the power to grant that same authority to counties. The proposed amendment also provides that a county that issues bonds or notes for transportation improvements may not pledge for the repayment of those bonds or notes more than 65 percent of the increases in ad valorem tax revenues each year, and a county may not use proceeds from the bonds or notes to finance the construction, operation, maintenance, or acquisition of rights-of-way of a toll road.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a county to finance the development or redevelopment of transportation or infrastructure in unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted areas in the county."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 27)

SJR 27 proposes a constitutional amendment barring the State of Texas or a political subdivision from enacting, adopting, or issuing a statute, order, proclamation, decision, or rule that prohibits or limits religious services. The proposed amendment would apply to religious services, including those conducted in churches, congregations, and places of worship, in the state by a religious organization established to support and serve the propagation of

a sincerely held religious be-

Proposition Number 4 (SJR 47)

SJR 47 proposes a constitu-

preme Court, a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge. The proposed amendment provides that a person is eligible to serve on the Supreme Court if the person, among other qualifications, is licensed to practice law in Texas; is a resident of Texas at the time of election; has been either a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas for at least ten years or a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas and a judge of a state court or county court established by the legislature for a combined total of at least ten years; and during that time has not had the person's license to practice law revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspension. The same eligibility requirements would apply to a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals and to a justice of a court of appeals. The proposed amendment further provides that to be eligible for appointment or election as a district judge, a person must be a resident of Texas; be licensed to practice law in Texas; and have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court in Texas, or both combined, for eight years preceding the person's election, during which time the person's license to practice law has not been revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspension.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment changing the eligibility requirements for a justice of the supreme court, a judge of the court of criminal appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge."

Proposition Number 5 (HJR 165)

HJR 165 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the State Commission on Judicial Conduct (SCJC) to accept complaints or reports, conduct investigations, and take any other authorized action with respect to a candidate for a state judicial office. Currently, the Texas Constitution only permits the SCJC to take such actions as to persons holding a judicial office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing additional powers to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct with respect to candidates for judicial

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 proposes a constitutional amendment establishing that residents of certain facilities have the right to designate an essential caregiver with whom the facility may not prohibit in-person visitation. The proposed amendment would apply to a nursing facility, assisted living facility, intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability, residence providing home and community-based services, or state supported living center. The proposed amendment also would authorize the legislature to provide guidelines for these facilities to follow in establishing essential caregiver visitation policies and procedures.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing a right for residents of certain facilities to designate an essential caregiver for in-person visitation."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 125)

HJR 125 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting a person who is 55 years of age or older at the time of death of their spouse who is receiving a limitation on school district property taxes on their residence homestead on the basis of a disability to continue receiving the limitation while the property remains the surviving spouse's residence homestead.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the surviving spouse of a person who is disabled to receive a limitation on the school district ad valorem taxes on the spouse's residence homestead if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of the person's death."

Proposition Number 8 (SJR 35)

SJR 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty. The Texas Constitution provides a property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services who is killed in action, but the current exemption does not include members of the military who die during their service due to injuries sustained that are not combat-related.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

the market nationwide.

"Now we raise fifty to seventy-five different varieties with different characteristics," said

A range of sizes and colors are now available, from tiny white decorative minis to large orange jack-o'-lanterns.

Three generations of the Pyle family have farmed in Floydada, and they joined in producing pumpkins in 1991. Their warehouse on North 2nd Street in Floydada is recognizable for its "Pumpkin Pyle" logo—as are the cardboard bins in which tens of thousands of pumpkins are exported each fall.

While Assiter is focused more on local retail and agritourism at his Punkin' Ranch and Pumpkin Patch this year, he describes Pumpkin Pyle as "a class-act of the wholesale business." Over 90,000 pumpkins were shipped from the Pumpkin Pyle to the Dallas Arboretum just last week.

Preparations for Punkin' Days are underway as Floydada plans for visitors on the second Saturday in October. The Pumpkin Patch, located eleven miles south of Floydada on Highway 62, will be open starting September 17.

WINE GRAPES DIVERSIFY REGIONAL GROWING

Down US Highway 70 east of Floydada, some might be surprised to find a vineyard with 1,200 acres of grapes.

In what is now Texas, Spanish missionaries began growing grapes and producing wine near El Paso as early as the 1650s, but prohibition interrupted the practice in the 1920s. By the 1990s, thanks to research efforts centered at Texas Tech over several decades, cultivation of wine grapes was flourishing on the Plains.

Texas cotton growers Rick and Brenda Heflin started their vineyard in 2015 to diversify their crops. Now they're harvesting a crop from their 1,200 acres of vines, which require less water than cotton.

"We're losing water each year, so we looked at grapes because they take very little water," said Rick Heflin, though he also considered that grapes were expensive to start.

According to Brenda Heflin, grapes are laborintensive, but the rewards are different.

"To hold a bottle of wine and know you grew it—you see the final product is fun," said Heflin.

The Heflins grow several varieties of grapes, including Aglianico, Roussanne, Dolcetto, and Marsanne, Harvest can begin as early as mid-August, but veraison (the time when the grapes begin to turn purple) came late this year. The Heflins began harvesting their Dolcetto grapes this week.

QUITAQUE TO EXPAND OFFERINGS

The Coffee Mill in Quitaque, gateway to Caprock Canyons State Park, is creating an environment ripe for attracting Texas-produced wines and reaping the benefits of other homegrown commodities.

Jackie and JonAnn Welch had been growing corn and cotton in Victoria, Texas, for forty years when they decided in 2014 to convert 120 acres to an olive orchard on their family farm. The Coffee Mill, among other Texas shops, has hosted recipe demonstrations as the family's olive oil, balsamic vinegar, and a range of cooking products became available in bakeries and boutiques across the state.

Soon the Welches plan to open their Turkey Creek Winery in Quitaque. They're hoping to convert a downtown building and complete remodeling by the end of the year.

IDALOU FAMOUS FOR ORCHARDS

Austin Williams, a fifth-generation fruit grower, has partnered with Tucker Crawford to reimagine Idalou's beloved apple orchard. It has been a favorite family attraction in the region since 1982, and it is now known as Top of Texas Farms.

Though the trees have been replanted this year and visitors will not be able to pick their own apples as they have traditionally, there will be Honeycrisp and Gala apples available for sale in the shop, which will be provided through the sister Williams Orchard in Colorado.

"We will have apples into late fall and we'll have Pink Ladies at the end of October," said Elaria Williams, who manages the roadside shop.


The doors are now open every day of the week and the shop is offering apple cider, pies, peach bread and other baked goods. Peaches will also be available until the end of September, and fresh pressed apple juice can be purchased within the next few weeks.

Though the cherries did not survive the frost this year, there are plans in place to introduce more options by next summer.

"It's great to have the support of the community," said Williams.

The new partners are preparing for the Apple Blossom Festival in March and aiming for fall of 2022 to restore the tradition of allowing visitors to pick their own fruit from the orchard. Next fall will also bring the Apple Butter Festival.

"The orchard has a lot of history and people have fond memories. We want people to bring their kids to make new memories," Williams said.


