



AF Assistance Fund campaign off to good start

The 1982 Air Force Assistance Fund campaign got off to a good start. Three base squadrons have already surpassed the 100 percent mark.

The 1958th Communications Squadron lead the jack-rabbit race to over 100 percent donating over \$400 to this years effort. Capt. John Motley is the communications squadron's campaign project officer.

The 35th Flying Training Squadron leads in total contribution participation after having reached 130 percent of their squadron goal. Capt. Robert Lines is the officer in charge of the 35th's 1982 campaign.

The third squadron to cross the 100 percent line was the 64th Student Squadron. The student squadron under the direction of AFAF project officer 1st Lt. Rick Devereaux has already accumulated \$3,549 surpassing their squadron goal by \$249.

Lieutenant Devereaux indicated that the money collected was contributed by approximately 229 people in the approximately 620 strong squadron. Base personnel are encouraged to contribute to the fund remembering that this is the only one solely for Air Force families.

**Public** area dress codes established

When the uniform is worn, the complete authorized combination in accordance with AFR 35-10, less cap will be worn.

When in civilian dress, the overall appearance must conform to AFR 35-10, Chapter 1, paragraph 1-8.

Some examples of clothing items that do not meet proper grooming standards for public facilities are cutoff shirts, bandeau tube tops, halters, bikini tops, and short-shorts (wherein the buttock is visible). Specifically prohibited: Wear of undergarments (T-shirts, etc.) as outer garments. Bare feet, shower clogs or thongs.

Wear of clothing upon which is printed obscene, profane, or lewd words or drawings.

Appearing without shirts or blouses. Any unsanitary dress or grooming standards. All hats will be removed when indoors.



A CALLER ASKED for an update on the progress of the wind generator tests. I'm glad to report that the generators we took possession of Jan. 8 have produced approximately 9,800 kilowatts of electricity as of today. At this rate, it appears that the turbines will produce just under one percent of the base's electricity needs each month.

The wind generators are producing electricity at approximately the same rate quoted the Air Force by the manufacturer. At this rate we can expect the generators to have paid for themselves in about seven years.

This is a U.S. Air Force test program designed to evaluate the feasibility of saving money by supplementing commercial power with power produced by USAF owned wind generators. The program is set up so that the 64th Civil Engineers can evaluate the data collected from the generators as they are used throughout the year. At the end of the year, all of the information about the generators performance at noon on Wednesdays, will be evaluated.

"We want to stress more the health aspect of the program than the 'someone told you to' weight control program of the past," said Physician Assistant, Capt. Charles Pillow.

Captain Pillow prefers that the spouses be present because they too play a large part in a successful weight loss program.

Captain Pillow made it clear that patients assigned to the program would see him once every two weeks until he was sure the patients weight was under control. When the weight loss is sufficient, the patient will be placed on schedule or 30 day appointments until the prescribed weight is attained.

stressed that the new program will focus more on good health than in the past. "We are here to help save careers, not throw them away," he said.

Captain Pillow author of "Your Health is no Accident" heads the new program. Beginning Monday, he will start seeing the first of approximately 150 base folks that may have a weight control problem. Because of the new weight changes, most base officials agree that work loads for weight control monitors will increase greatly. This will make the program available only to active tion and a discussion with the duty military who are overweight.

P.A. Pillow explained that a few months down the road he hopes to open the program up P.A. will then go into detail to those who want to lose un- with the patient about the

the weight control program. Under the new program, the overweight personnel will be identified by squadron orderly rooms. To accomplish this, they will weigh in all newly assigned pesonnel; check all squadron members weight annually (prescribed by AF regulations); or as directed by the unit commanders, first sergeants or immediate supervisors.

The squadrons are then responsible for insuring that the identified member gets an appointment with Captain Pillow.

The half hour session will consist of a medical examinapatient about the medical history. P.A. Pillow will then prescribe both a diet and exercise program. The Reese backgrounds in physical fittness will evaluate the patients at their 3- day check-up.

Based upon their findings, patients may be removed from the program; granted additional dieting and exercise help; or returned to their squadron for the commanders to take necessary action.

Captain Pillow continually stressed that the objective of the program is not just to wear off pounds, but lose weight while at the same time improving their health.

P.A. Pillow did concede that for those who have difficulty loosing weight, "we have a behavior modification program." The captain also commented that for those active members not quite ready for the new program, but a little hefty there is TOPS.

## Keeping the mission first means working late shifts

When it comes to working late, most think of the security police or emergency room teams, but have you ever wondered just what happens on the Reese flightine at night?

The flightine is busy 24 hours a day, aircraft maintenance specialists, jet engine mechanics, crew chiefs and numerous other specialty technicians work throughout the night insuring that Reese T-37s and 38s are continually ready to fly.

For the grave-yard shifts the work begins at midnight each Sunday and does not end until midnight Friday. The day shift works from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., like most of the base, but once each six to eight weeks these maintenance troops get to pull weekend duty, unlike most of the base,-something they may or may not get compensation time for.

The weekend duty is pulled Saturday and Sunday from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The first of the evening

shifts takes over from 4 p.m. to midnight. Swing shift mechanics are generally responsible for getting the necessary maintenance work done so that the midnight shift can get the jets preflighted. The day shift is usually responsible for safe launches and recoveries of base aircraft.

During the two nights a week that student pilots fly at night, all three shifts get heavily involved with the launch and recovery of base trainers.

CMSgt. Robert Christopher, maintenance supervisor, estimated that about half of the total maintenance






Next time working nights comes to mind add to the list the aircraft mechanic – they're insuring the mission continues.



Rather, it will be enough to state by phone or letter when the military member entered California, that he or she was not a California resident in 1980, what state he or she was then a resident of, and that he or she had no California income. If the board does not receive a response to the second notice, write Franchise Tax Board, further notices will be issued.






