Before receiving the graduating honors May 14 as coveted aviators wings, the -comprising Italian as well as Norwegian and American

students- was congratulated and commended by Col. Monte D. Montgomery, commander, 64th Flying Training Wing. After a few brief complimentary words the Reese

wing commander introduced his boss and visiting guest speaker Gen. Thomas M. Ryan Jr., commander, Air Training Command.

General Ryan took the podium, explaining that being back at Reese brought many memories. The highestranking Reese graduate broke the aviator's career into three branches.

He indicated that new pilots have to face the "you and the machine" phase first. He told the graduating students that they must command the aircraft and not be commanded by it.

He called step two the "operational flying phase," in which the pilots went into their particular types of aircraft - bombers, tankers, cargo and fighters. In this phase he told the new pilots that, they must become as familiar with their new aircraft as they can.

for whom flying now comes second nature, is able "to remember how much he really loves flying and maybe why he got into it in the first place." He called it, with a slight hint of embarrassment, "the romantic phase."

"Right now there are those who would tell you that public favor is turning from the military. I don't agree with that," said the general. He emphasized that the new pilots can help the Air Force keep the good feeling the services now enjoy by being leaders and professionals on and off duty.

The good news is that public opinion is in our favor, he indicated. "The bad news is that the B-1 is 34 months away," he added. "The Russians have a similar aircraft coming on line."

"The modernization of our tactical forces is coming along well. This is an exciting time to be in the Air Force," the general said.

He then reinforced his point about the new pilots determining how the nation's people perceive the military. "Not the Washington level," but the base level was responsible for shaping American opinion. The community members see only the local Air Force people and what they see will determine how much they support the services, the ATC commander added.

With a military service record of nearly 33 years, In the third phase of flying, General Ryan concluded with aid General Ryan, the pilot, a piece of advice he had learned a long time ago. "Don't focus on jobs to come," he said. "Concentrate instead on what you're doing now. That way, when jobs come open, your squadron commander or supervisor will remember you."



"Make it Click - 101 Most Critical Days," an annual campaign to call attention to the life-saving benefits of wearing seat belts and using child safety seats, begins with one of the worst motor vehicle accident periods of the year the unofficial 101 days of sum-

Air Force Inspection and Safety Officials and Air Force installations worldwide have joined with business, industry and civic volunteer groups working through the National Safety Council in the "Make it Click" campaign beginning May 29.

In 1981 alone, 14,320 people were killed in motor-vehicle accidents during June, July and August - the highest number for any three-month period of that year.

Safety experts say "first timers" who begin to use their safety belts during this critical period will realize safety belts are easy to use.

They take just six seconds to click on.

Safety belts also have proved effective. They can, if used, save 12,000 lives each year, according to safety studies. And once the "first timers" experience a safe and comfortable trial period of wearing the belt, safety officials hope they will develop the lifesaving habit.

Officials report the "Make it Click" campaign is a national effort in occupant restraint use. Many groups and programs are now working toward its major goal: to encourage more people to use their safety belts.

Safety experts give this advice: "Safety belts are smart, easy and effective. Let's begin the campaign by having safe Memorial Day weekend." Norton AFB, Calif. (AFNS)

Every 12 minutes 1 person is killed in a motor vehicle accident.\* Every hour 5 people are killed in motor vehicle accidents. Every week 800 people are killed in motor vehicle accidents and 35,000 are injured.\*

Motor vehicle accidents are the #1 killer of children age one and older. Each year about 810 children under the age of five die from injuries received in accidents

The chances of being killed in a motor vehicle accident are 25 times greater when an occupant is thrown

It is the second collision that injures and kills people in an accident. The initial collision is the crash of a motor vehicle into some object. The second collision occurs when unbelted occupants, still moving forward, are stopped by something - the car's windshield, steering wheel, doors, dashboard or other

Most motor vehicle accidents happen within 25 miles of home, at speeds of less than 40 miles per hour When a driver brakes at a speed of 30 mph, an infant held in an occupant's lap/arms will be thrown

windshield. The unrestrained occupant will also be propelled forward, probably into and crushing the child.

Motor vehicle accidents cost America an estimated \$39.3 billion each year. In addition to incalculable grief and emotional suffering, each death is estimated to cost the community \$170,000. Even relatively minor injuries create an unnecessary and costly drain on the resources of families and communities.


The grand prize, a donated waterbed went to A1C Randolph Slaughter.


