## 58 earn aviators wings

Fifty-eight members of Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 82-06 will accept their aviators wings this morning in graduation ceremonies set for 10 a.m. at Simler Theater.

During the past week the class has been busy wrapping up the loose flying ends and getting ready for their big

moment this morning.

Presenting the special class awards with Col. Jerald Ellington, Deputy Commander for Operations, will be guest speaker Maj. Gen. Jack I. Gregory, commander of the U.S. Air Force Tactical Fighter Weapons Center, Nellis AFB, Nevada.

The Reese training en-

vironment is "a little more challenging than Williams AFB, Ariz." explained 2nd Lt. Gary Dobbins, Class 82-06 classmate, who recently transferred here from Williams AFB, Ariz. "Out there, the weather was clearer. Here, the weather changes constantly," he said.

Both Lieutenant Dobbins

and 2nd Lt. Rodney Williams were moved from Williams to Reese upon completion of their T-37 phases because their original class was too large for the T-38 capabilities of Williams.

Throughout the past year the 58 graduating student pilots have been through extensive academic training

through their T-37 phases and three quarters of the way through the T-38 phase.

The new pilots began training July 7, 1981 as they stepped into classrooms for the first two and a half weeks. During that time the students were acquainted with parachuting and the Physiological Training Unit.

Once acquainted with the basics they moved to the T-37 phase in conjunction with academics. T-37 training complete, they moved down the street to the 54th Flying Training Squadron where they began flight training in T-38's.

Now at the culmination of their training the students are ready to accept the aviators wings of the U.S. Air Force. Lieutenant Dobbins summed the class mood up best saying, "everyone's real excited."

Following graduation ceremonies the new pilots, their guests and instructor pilots will be attending a luncheon at the officers' club. The 64th Student Squadron will then sponsor the parents' red carpet tour of the runway supervisory unit, the simulator building, the 64th itself, a static T-37 and T-38, and the 54th. At the 54th the students will divide into their former flights for friends and family to get an idea where they spent their 12 hour days in training.

This evening there will be a dinner dance at the officer's club in honor of Class 82-06.

## ROTC cadets get experience

### Reese plays host to ROTC advanced training

This summer Reese will be the sight of advanced training for an estimated 20 U.S. Air Force ROTC cadets. The Reese participation will be handled by Capt. Kevin Knutson, Reese's program coordinator.

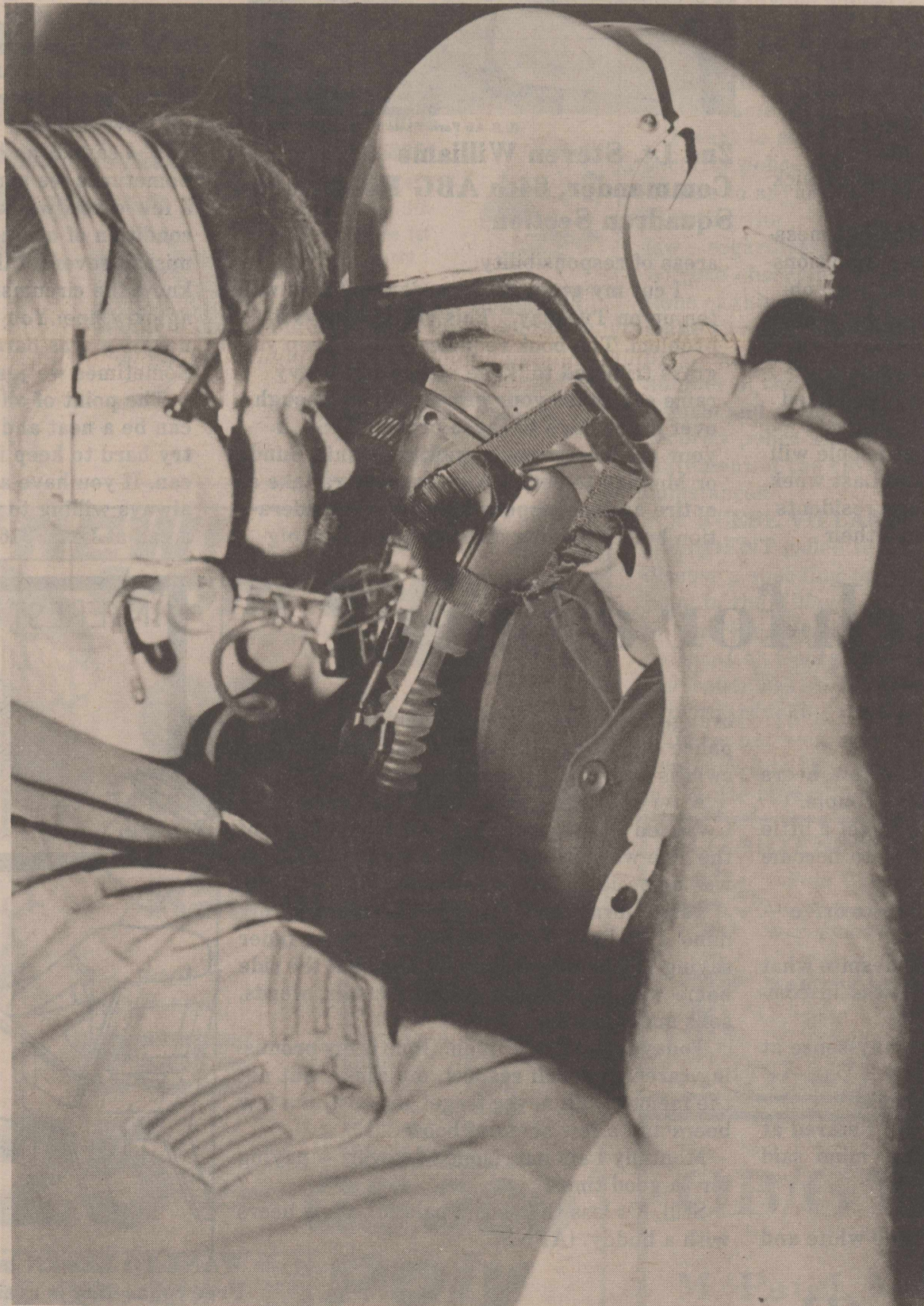
During the cadets two week stay Captain Knutson pointed out that they "learn a lot." The Advanced Training Program "gives them insight into what it will be like as a second lieutenant" after their graduation and commissioning.

While here, they get hands-on experience doing most of the jobs that their predecessors have done as maintenance and support officers. They also get T-37 orientation rides. Captain Knutson did say that only those cadets who have been selected as potential pilot candidates get to come to Reese.

He described the program's usefulness saying that "most of the cadets coming here will be returning here or to other pilot training bases" in a year or two.

The goal of this ROTC program is to give the cadets specialized career orientation, chances to be Air Force leaders, opportunities to deal with others in the military walk of life and to experience the problems and challenges common to Air Force junior officers.

The cadets will be here throughout the summer until Sept. 3, when the last group departs for their home ROTC units.

# Editorials

## Keep the 'Village' clean

As the grounds inspector for Reese Village, I hear a lot of the same questions and comments about how the inspection program works and why some people don't do so well on their inspections. Here are a few of them:

"How and when are grounds inspections conducted?" Reese village is inspected the second workday of each week during the inspection season, which runs roughly from mid-April through mid-October. Inspection standards are published in Wing Regulation 90-1 and information of special interest is relayed to village residents by hand-delivered letter. The 64th Air Base Group Headquarters Squadron Section conducts the inspections in conjunction with the base housing office.

"I got written up for something I didn't know about." The old axiom, "Ignorance is no excuse," applies here. Wing reg 90-1 has detailed instructions on the upkeep of base quarters and everyone gets a copy of this publication upon assignment to quarters. Anyone who doesn't have a copy should pick one up at the housing office.

"My area was clean but the weather messed it up." We try to take weather conditions into consideration when we inspect and, obviously, we won't write anyone up for blown-in trash, tumbleweeds, etc. However, most of our write-ups for "area/carport needs policing" come from an accumulation of assorted garbage that wasn't blown in on the last wind. You'd be surprised at what people will store in their patios and carports. Last week, for example, we asked two Village residents to remove entire car engines from their

areas of responsibility.

"I cut my grass on Saturday, but was written up on Tuesday." This one is always a problem. The book requires you to keep your grass trimmed to three inches and heavy rains can cause your grass to grow enough over a few days to cause problems. So, if your grass is growing well, wait until Sunday or Monday to cut it. Also, inspectors take an entire area of responsibility into consideration before logging discrepancies. Our big-

gest problem in this regard comes from those who cut their front yards but not the backs. Most of our discrepancies come either from disputed areas of responsibility or from unmowed back yards.

"Why didn't you notify me before calling my commander?" Squadron commanders need to know about problems before they get out of hand. For this reason, we adopted a policy of notifying commanders immediately, in addition to leaving you a letter at your house. A second letter requires an answer from your squadron commander to the base commander and a third letter to you means you and your squadron commander must pay a personal visit to the base commander to explain your failure to comply. One warning is normally sufficient and our Reese villagers usually keep their areas neat.

"I got written up while I was on leave (or TDY)". Your responsibility to maintain your area doesn't stop when you leave the area temporarily. Remember that there are 400 other families living in the Village. It's their home, too; we need to keep it looking good.

"How come my neighbor didn't get written up?" I saved the hardest question for last. Sometimes we simply miss your neighbor. In a few cases, we've been so distressed by the condition of one house that we've probably missed several others nearby. Sometimes we know the circumstances or we draw an imaginary line: You crossed it but your neighbor was barely safe. And, don't forget: Sometimes we just make mistakes.

The point of all this is that Reese Village can be a neat and beautiful place to live. We try hard to keep it looking as good as we can. If you have an inspection concern, we're always willing to take another look. Give us a call at Exts. 3167 or 3715.

**A CALLER IS CONCERNED** about the number of high-ranking NCOs and officers disregarding stop signs, not using turn signals and going the wrong way in parking lots. He referred to a CARE Line in a recent issue of the Roundup concerning how the security police make illegal maneuvers while responding to emergencies and went on to state, "I don't see why anyone should complain about the security police anyway when senior officers and NCOs do the same thing."

I want to stress that the security police issue tickets to anyone caught violating the law — regardless of rank. Anyone observing violations of this nature can make a traffic complaint by getting the license number of the offending vehicle and giving the security police a written statement of the circumstances.

**A REESE VILLAGE RESIDENT** called to discuss a speeding problem in the Village, in light of the altered traffic patterns on George Street. The caller has seen drivers traveling at up to 30 miles per hour and has complained to the security police. He is justifiably

concerned for the safety of his children, but wrongly believes the police have done nothing about the situation.

Each intersection on George Street is now controlled by four-way stops and a security police patrol has been assigned specifically to the family housing area. We think these actions should help alleviate the problem.

**FINALLY, ANOTHER HOUSING RESIDENT** would like to see a change in the way mail is delivered on Mitchell Boulevard. Our caller would like to see delivery times alternated between the north and south sides of the street to allow southside residents to get their mail before 3 or 3:30 p.m.

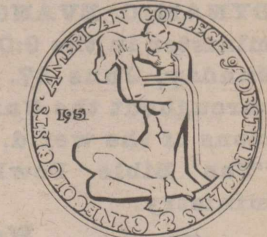
Unfortunately, there is little we can do about mail delivery in base housing, since it's handled by the U.S. Postal Service and not the base distribution system. Also, it would be unreasonable to ask the Postal Service to constantly change their routes since any change would have effects that reach far beyond Mitchell Boulevard. Sorry, but you'll just have to be patient.

We think one reason for people wanting earlier mail delivery is so they can get their paychecks earlier in the day. For those for whom this is true there is a simple solution: Start a SURE-Pay account at your bank or credit union.

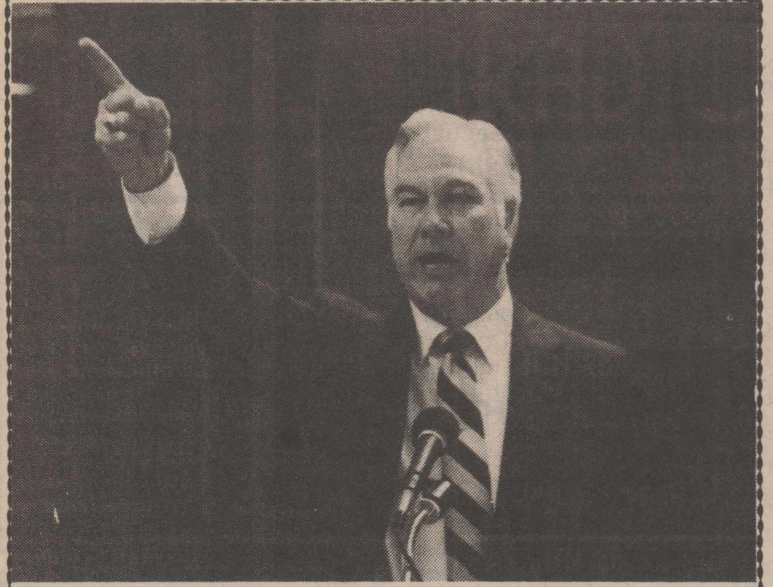

# IRA

### PART 2: MAKING DEPOSITS

**What is an IRA?**  
IRA is the abbreviation for an Individual Retirement Account, created by an individual to provide for his or her own retirement. It is an account sheltered from current income taxes. You qualify for an IRA if you have earned income.

**How much can I contribute to my Individual Retirement Account in a year?**  
You can deposit up to the lesser of \$2000 (\$2250 for a spousal IRA) or 100% of compensation and shelter that amount from your current year's income tax.

**If I'm self-employed, what can I deposit to my I.R.A.?**  
The same basic rules apply whether you are employed by someone else or are self-employed. You may deposit up to the lesser of \$2000 (\$2250 in the event of a non-working spouse I.R.A.) or 100% of your compensation in any one year. However, you may not make a deposit in any year in which you did not show a profit.

**If my last employer had a qualified profit-sharing or pension plan and I can take my funds with me, can I put these funds into an I.R.A.?**  
YES ... provided you deposit these funds, withdrawn from your profit-sharing or pension plan, into your I.R.A. within 60 days of withdrawal. These are called "Rollover" contributions. However, you must subtract from these funds any voluntary contributions you have made.

**To what extent is an I.R.A. sheltered from current and future income taxes?**  
Your I.R.A. is sheltered from current income taxes up to the amount of your contribution each year. All earnings (interest) in your I.R.A. are also sheltered up to the time you start withdrawing your funds. You will then pay income taxes on the funds as you withdraw them.

**When and how can I make deposits to my I.R.A.?**  
You can deposit funds in any way you care to set it up. You can make deposits weekly, monthly or once a year. (You can even make contributions up to the time you file your income tax return, including any extensions, and have your contribution qualify for the preceding year.)

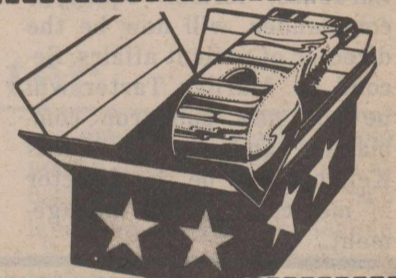

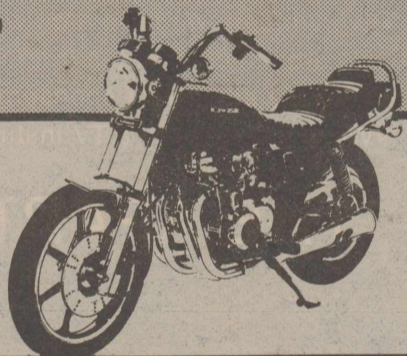

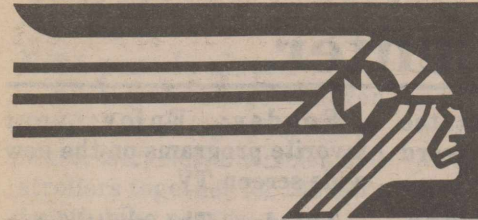

In World War II, the gunners of U.S. Eighth Air Force heavy bombers expended 76,887,000 rounds of .50 caliber and 653,000 rounds of .30 caliber ammunition to destroy 6,098 enemy aircraft. The gunners of the 15th Air Force heavy bombers expend-

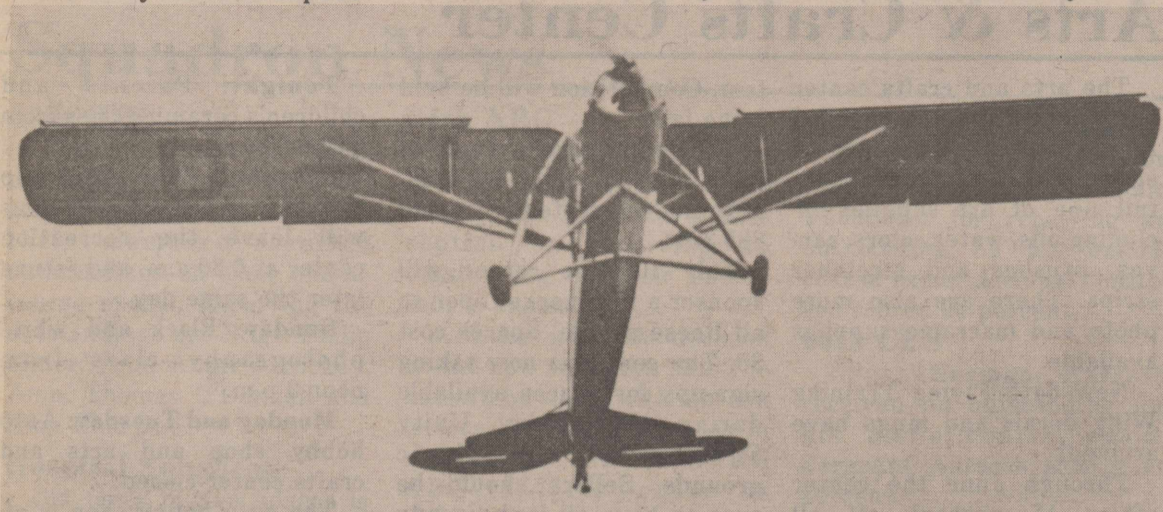
ed approximately 30,000,000 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition to destroy 2,110 enemy aircraft. The B-29 units of the 20th Air Force destroyed 914 enemy aircraft with 11,368,000 rounds of .50 caliber and 32,000 rounds of 20 mm ammunition. This comes to about 13,039 shots for each downed enemy air-

craft.

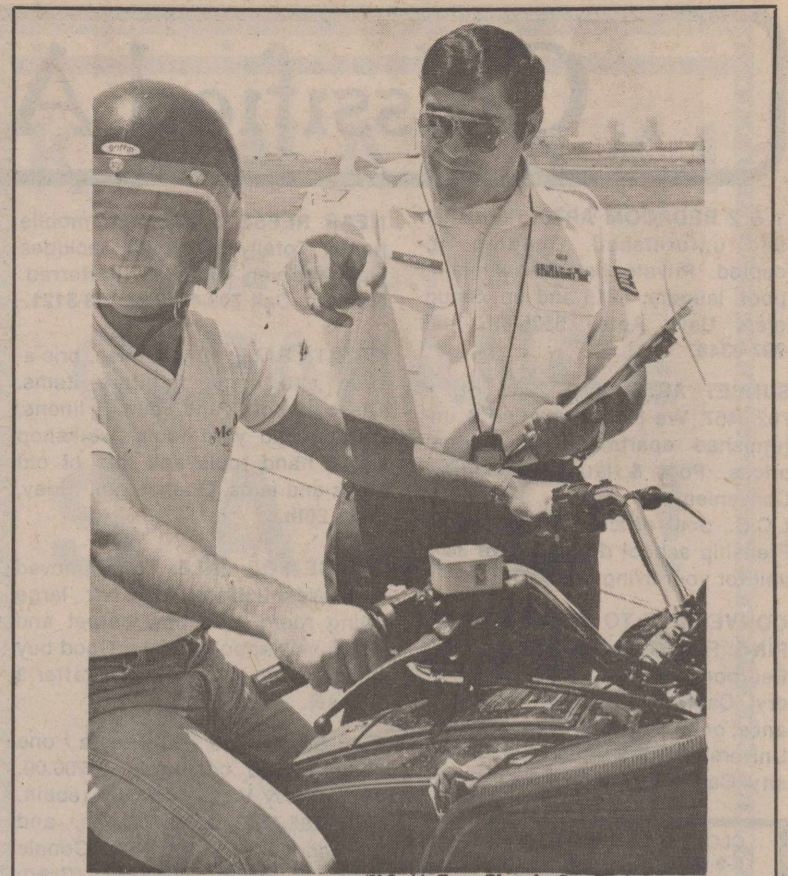
