Celebrating 206 years of freedom

Reese plans July 4th, AHW activities

Across the United States and Armed Forces' Bases throughout the world, Americans will celebrate their 206th year of freedom Sunday and American Heritage Week beginning Monday.

The Reese populas is invited to attend various activities throughout the week and weekend comemorating Independence Day and the A.H.W.

Tonight at the Enlisted Open Mess there will be a country and western band featured. The Copper Creek Band will play 1950's style country western music from 9 p.m.-1 a.m. Admission is free to members and \$3 for non-members.

Activities kick off Saturday morning with the Reese Annual Golf Championship. Tee off is at 8. The tournament plays through Monday.

Reese members will march in the Fourth of July parade Saturday at noon. The parade begins at the Lubbock Civic Center and ends at the Texas Tech University's Jones Stadium.

The bike parade through Reese Village begins at 2 p.m. Saturday. Children participating should

decorate their bikes, tricycles, unicycles and strollers in order for judges to select those with the best decorations and costumes.

A "Night of Escape and Illusion" begins at 7 p.m. at the Simler Theater. The show features Bob Doggett performing magic and creating illusions with the help of a lion, tiger, boa constrictor and his own pet cougar. Mike Russo an escape artist, will also be performing in the show. Russo challenges anyone here to produce a restraint from which he cannot escape.

"More than six-thousand people a year are injured due to fireworks. Some of the accidents are caused by malfunctioning fireworks, lack of supervision and knowledge of safety practices," according to Base Security Police. Reese regulations prohibit the use or possession of fireworks within the base and Reese Village grounds.

According to Maj. Keith Stuart, Lubbock Police Department, "possession of fireworks within city limits is illegal." Reese members planning to be out of the area for the holiday should be sure to take precautions against injuries and fires that fireworks may cause. Make this holiday a safe one.

Make sure the manufacturer's label and instructions for use is on each firework item. Illegal fireworks seldom have instructions. Store your fireworks in a dry, cool place and avoid rough handling. Adults should supervise their children. Young children should not play with the fireworks. Cleaning out an area to insure that there are no flamable items within the area. When the fireworks have been fired, soak them and duds with water.

Continuing into the week more activities are planned as the beginning of American Heritage Week gets underway. Tuesday at noon a swim meet will pit squadrons against each other at the Enlisted Pool. A bowling tournament will also begin that day at the bowling center from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. The tourney will continue through Thursday.

Productivity increases pay off

The ever-increasing demands for improving the quality of Air Force training and education, combined with the anticipated reduction in resources authorized to accomplish these tasks, make it mandatory that we find ways to do our job better with less

This may seem like a strange way to do our job, but as the price of almost everything continues to spiral upward with inflaton, we must look for ways to improve the use of our resources and obtain the best return possible for the taxpayers' dollar. As managers of public funds, each of us has a responsibility to seek economies and efficiencies in all that we do.

Your reaction so far may be "it's not my job" to increase productivity. What you must realize is that the Air Force needs your help. An example of savings realized by increased productivity is seen in the results of the Fast Payback Capital Investment Program (FASCAP).

In 1980-81, 275 projects were initiated

under this program with estimated life cycle savings of over \$60 million. This represents a return on investment of 7-1 for these projects. Another example is the Air Force Suggestion Program.

In 1980 alone, some 90,000 suggestions were received. Of these, approximately 20,000 were adopted for a total savings of over \$72 million. What does all this have to do with you? A lot! Now you can get in on the action - in fact, there is no action unless you get involved. Every base in the Air Force is developing a Base Productivity Enhancement Plan.

At Reese, we have developed a council that will be working with every functional area to develop ideas and identify areas or initiatives that may make your job easier, more enjoyable, or more productive, but we need your ideas. You can do your share starting right now! When your unit starts putting together your functional productivity plan-support it. Let's work together and make the Air Force the most effective provider of defense possible. In the end, it all comes back to you as a taxpayer.

Capt. Wells defines Project Warrior

The recent implementation of Project Warrior by the highest levels of the Air Force caught many of us by surprise. Those of us who have studied military history and the employment of airpower had been resigned to an Air Force pushing the more scientific or technological aspects of the busines. In an age dominated by technology, the study of hard science, engineering and mathematics appeared to be the key to a successful Air Force. During the last few years we have been proceeding in that direction, as surely as an algebraic equation results in an

What we had been forgetting, at least in small measure, was that war and its successful prosecution are as much an art as a science. Technology may give us the necessary implements of modern aerial con-

flict but it does not give us the wisdom to employ them. For this we must look to ourselves and our past.

We must, for example, understand completely that we are first military professionals; officers and airmen serving as a team in the greatest Air Force yet assembled. Our job, quite simply, is the defense of this great nation. While we may have individual specialties, each of us must be prepared to face the ultimate test of our commitment-I'm speaking, of course, of war. It's easy enough to ignore the disturbing possibility while working regular hours and enjoying the "good life". Those of us serving in a peace-time training capacity might even have it better than most. But to forget or isolate what you are doing on your day-to-day job from what you might have to do in a time of crises is worse than dangerous; it's almost disloyal.

One of the ways we can remind ourselves of our grave responsibilities is by studying history. This reflection on the past, particularly on the heritage of the Air Force, is vital to the strength of our service. The intention, of course, is not to turn everybody into academicians or history majors. The purpose, rather, is to impress us with the variable circumstances of war. We can learn from our predecessors in the great conflicts of this century; they were, after all, not so different from us. Their actions during times of great stress, even their mistakes, can serve to enlighten us about the nature of

If we can carefully apply some of the lessons of the past, without rigidly following outmoded or archaic doctrines—we will truly "learn from history." That is one of the reasons for PROJECT WARRIOR.

RECENTLY A SEN-IOR AIRMAN called and expressed his concern about people who do not show proper respect for our flag. He also asked some questions that lead me to believe that some of us really aren't sure of the proper procedures for showing our respect. With this in mind, perhaps it will help to go over the proper procedures to honor our flag.

To begin with, a brief explanation is in order. At Reese our ceremony consists of the playing of two songs. The first song is a bugle call entitled "Retreat" this is followed by our National Anthem.

The actions you should take are covered in AFR 30-1, Section A, para 4d(3). In brief, the procedures are as follows: When you are outside you should

stop and go to parade rest during the playing of "Retreat"; at the first note of the National Anthem you should come to attention and render the salute (in uniform use the hand salute, in civilian clothing remove your hat and place over your left shoulder, if not wearing a hat, place your right hand over your heart). The salute should be held until the last note of the music and the flag is grasped. If you are in a vehicle (military or civilian) simply stop and sit at attention. If you are riding a motorcycle you should dismount and render the proper salute. If you are present at a formal retreat and not a part of the ceremony these same rules apply. Do not follow the commands given the formation.

I wholeheartedly agree with the caller that all Americans (military and civilian) should know how to honor their flag and more importantly, do it. You should never be in such a hurry you can't take a few minutes to respect this symbol of our





Brothers get together at the academy

Barton and Jeffery Blessing — the seemingly inseparatable brothers — were the first team of brothers to graduate under-graduate pilot training together this year.

The UPT class is not the first time the brothers have been together during their Air Force schooling, both were graduates from the U.S. Air Force Academy Class of 1981.

The Air Force brothers, though not twins, joined each other in their college sophomore year at the academy.

Barton was first accepted into the academy for the Class of 1979, but because of knee injuries he was medically discharged. He then continued in a civilian college and reapplied for the academy and again earned acceptance, but was dropped from the Class of 1980's roster due to academic problems.

Barton was forced to finish his freshman year at a civilian school.

Both Jeff and older brother Barton then applied for the class of 1981 and both were accepted. During their three years together at the academy both worked toward degrees in astronaumical engineering.

Following their graduation and commissioning from the academy both received orders to Reese for pilot training.

Reese meant home so to speak for Barton who quipped, "I began my Air Force dependent career here." He explained that he was born at the Reese hospital during his father's tour here as a B-25 instructor pilot, 1956-57.

Now having earned their aviators wings both anticipated Reese would be the last they were to be together, but they got a surprise. Both brothers joked that when the assignments came down they thought they would be flying together for a few more years at Oson AB, Korea.

"The computer had printed my assignment twice," said Barton. After some investigation the mistake was found and Jeff got an assignment to Shaw AFB, S.C.

Even with the change of permanent assignments separating the brothers after four years of Air Force training they will continue together in forward aircontroller school until Dec. 15.

The brothers explained their assignments as challenging describing what is expected of FAC pilots. "They are the ones who lead the fighters and bombers into hostile areas lining up the targets as they go," they agreed.

Jeff will be flying the OV-2A at Shaw and Barton will fly the OV-10 at Oson. Barton explained that each of the three year assignments they had were a must at some point in every Tactical Air Command pilots career.

Both agreed that they had become closer as a result of being together these past few years. Following their current assignments Barton hopes to get an F-15 and Jeff wants an F-15 assignment.


