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# Hearne named wing commander

Gen. Thomas M. Ryan, com- pilots annually. mander of the Air Training Command, has announced that Col. Richard E. Hearne will assume command of the 64th Flying Training Wing from Col. Monte D. Montgomery here Monday.

Colonel Montgomery has been selected to serve as special assistant to the ATC deputy chief of staff for Logistics at Randolph AFB, San Antonio.

As wing commander, Colonel Hearne will be responsible for the activities of more than 3,000 military and civilian personnel who train and support the training of more than 450 new Air Force

A native of Texarkana, Ark., Colonel Hearne began his Air Force career following his graduation from Louisiana Tech University and commissioning through the Air Force ROTC program in 1958.

Colonel Hearne received his pilot wings at Greenville AFB, Miss. in April of 1959. Colonel Hearne's first flying assignment was as a fighter pilot in the F-86D in Okinawa.

His first introduction into the pilot training atmosphere was as an instructor pilot at Laredo AFB, Texas. During this time he received orders to fly the F-4 Phantom with the 480th Tactical Fighter

nam.

Upon completion of his tour in Vietnam in 1969, he returned to ATC, this time as an instrument pilot at the Instrument Pilot Instructor School at Randolph AFB. This assignment was soon followed by an assignment at ATC Headquarters.

In 1973 Colonel Hearne moved to Sheppard AFB near Wichita Falls, Texas, as commander of the 80th Student Squadron and the 89th Flying Training Squadron, respectively.

Colonel Hearne will assume command of the 64th Flying Training Wing during a formal change of command ceremony scheduled for Monday at 9 a.m. The ceremony will include pass-in-review by units assigned to Reese AFB and music will be provided by the Air Force Band of the West from Lackland AFB, San Antonio. The ceremony will be opened to the public.

# **Col. Montgomery reflects on base achievements**

"I've never felt more part of a community in my entire life," said outgoing wing commander Col. Monte D. Montgomery on the eve of his departure for Randolph AFB, Texas.

In an interview Monday, Colonel Montgomery revealed that this assignment - at four years the longest in any one place he could remember-has been one of his best. "I've never felt more involved in a community that I have here," he reiterated, recalling the numerous positions of civic as well as military leadership he has filled at Reese as base commander, director of operations, and finally, wing commander.

During those four years, which began in July 1978, Colonel Montgomery has served on the board of directors of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, as co-chairman of the Reese-Lubbock base community council and chairman of the Combined Federal Campaign Division of the Lubbock United Way in 1980 and 1981, and has encouraged improved base-community relations through twice-monthly retreats, science fairs, Camp Blue Yonder, Easter Seals Day Camp, the Special Olympics and blood drives, among other activities.


And, while admitting that he hadn't realized all his goals for Reese, Colonel Montgomery said he was "well pleased and gratified" with the way things have gone here. "Our inspections have been absolutely remarkable," he said, adding that the completion of the transient living facility has been especially pleasing to him: "It's been in the works for four years."

When asked what he thought was a major factor in Reese's success, he laid it on the people doing the job.

"We're re-emphasizing the soldierly qualities" of military life, he commented, referring to the Air Force's ongoing efforts to increase the military awareness of its personnel. "People are really joining the Air Force because they want to be airmen," he continued. "They want to be in the Air Force, not some quasi-civilian organization. So, our people are happier because they know where they stand. We try to do it right, try to do it well and our people have responded beautifully. I think the people really want to be in a first-rate outfit."

Colonel Montgomery listed several high points of his tenure as wing commander: high ratings on inspector general and wing standardization-evaluation team inspections, safety awards from Air Training Command and the Air Force, and AFRAP base of the year for ATC.

"People at all levels are doing their jobs very well, people ho care about the success of the wing," Colonel Montgomery said



"We've got young people in responsible jobs who might lack experience, but who make up for that with hard work and dedication. We've got some problems, but I think we're coming along well. I think we're just doing the job better than anybody else.





SOME CALLERS **HAVE EXPRESSED CONCERN** about the automatic cycling of air conditioner compressors in



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family housing. The installation of radio switches to control air conditioning in base housing was directed by Air Training Command to reduce peak load usage, which accounts for 27 percent of the electric cost each month. These switches cycle the air conditioning compressors in the housing area for seven of each 30 minutes, which is slightly less than 25 percent of the time. To further conserve energy, the Base Energy Committee directed civil engineering to shut the compressors off when temperatures dropped below 75 degrees. Until the middle of July, this was being done. However, with temperatures remaining in the mid-70s until midnight or later, this practice has been discontinued for the summer.

I apologize for any inconvenience anyone may have experienced. Civil engineering is aware of the heating and air conditioning limitations in family housing and is constantly working to ensure a comfortable living atmosphere for our residents.

**ANOTHER CALLER IS CONCERNED** that his

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# Satellite photos help base forecasters

Twenty-four hours a day something called Meteorological Satellite Readout Equipment is receiving pictures of the weather, here and around the world.

While the procedure is not new, Reese's having the equipment available is. Since its arrival in early June the six Air Weather Service forecasters here have been getting two pictures an hour from thousands of miles above the earth.

Pictures of the weather that is. "The equipment is used for short-range forecasting and aircrew briefings," said Maj. David M. Meier, commander of Detachment II of the 24th Weather Squadron here.

He mentioned that the machine has the capability of taking up to four pictures an hour, but works at a rate of only two an hour. Because of the new forecasting aid. weather forecasts here should

be more accurate than those given before the equipment's arrival.


Major Meier pointed out that there are two types of pictures received by the machine-one visual, taken with light, and the other infrared, taken with heat.

He explained that the visual photos helped forecasters see what was happening weatherwise in the area, but pointed out that infrared photos could be enhanced. By enhancing an infrared photo, he said, "We can get the temperatures of some clouds" allowing the forecasters to better identify cloud types.

The pictures the Reese forecasters get come primarily from the eastern satellite because of their quality and coverage of the continental U.S., the Caribbean and even parts of the Atlantic area.

Reese does get some photos from the western satellite, which covers the Pacific area, but usually only when they are needed to brief crews flying across country to Arizona.

The new equipment now used here is tied to a small circuit with Sheppard AFB, Texas, and Vance AFB, Okla. Vance, however, is the only one of the bases to be tied into the Kansas station receiving the photos. As such they can request the photos needed by all three Air Training Command bases.

# Housing referral speeds Reese apartment hunting

The Housing Referral Office here has a lot more to offer Reese families, old and new, than just listings of where to find an apartment or home.

One of the first stops a new base member makes, is at the housing office. Quick to aid new families settle in, the HRO staff offers current, upto-date listings of hotels and motels in the area for new families to stay at during their search for an apartment in Lubbock.

The Reese HRO has shortened the apartment hunting process considerably said one recent arrival. The HRO researched and developed a listing of the apartment complexes in the area for those seeking offbase homes.

In the HRO compiled list, they have included current monthly rental charges, the types of leases available, if pets or children are allowed and in some cases even what appliances are already in the apartment.

The list of furnished and unfurnished apartments is only the tip of the iceburg according to one HRO customer. HRO has several pamphlets available to Reese families regarding everything from renting to buying homes.

For those families wanting an on-base home, get your name on the waiting list—now. HRO reports that from the time someone requests an on-base home and gets it, they will have waited an average of 3-6 months.

Because of the long wait to get on-base housing, most base families have to take an apartment at least for a few months after their arrival here. Before entering into a rental agreement families must check with the base housing office. It is also advisable to have an attorney with the staff judge advocate's office look over the lease.

HRO does get involved with off-base housing problems occasionally mediating disputes between landlords and Reese families. At the same time, they get involved when an Air Force family does not meet rental agreements or leaves the rental unit in a mess.


Terri Boggess, Housing Referral specialist, did point out that Reese does have 10 one bedroom units available for airman basics on up. She added that because they were considered to be substandard, HRO only halts a members variable housing allowance and 75 percent of the basic allowance for quarters.

Boggess stressed that families can stop by HRO at anytime to speak with one of the staff members about the "ins and outs of renting."


For those living off-base when families change addresses they should stop by HRO and give them the change too. If a member is thinking about applying for a home on-base, you'll need two copies of the orders assigning you to Reese when you apply.

Following graduation ceremonies this morning the new pilots, their guests and the instructor pilots will attend a luncheon in their honor at the officers' club.


Later that day, there will be a Parents Red Carpet tour sponsored by the 64th Student Squadron and a dinnerdance this evening at the officers' club for the new pilots.
