### Editorials

### The hospital's piece of the mission

Ever wondered what in the world that tall, white metal tower across the street from the hospital is used for? If you haven't been through UPT or just happened by when the equipment was in use, there is little chance you would know what it is. This particular training device is called a Swing Landing Trainer. It is used to teach student pilots how to perform proper parachute landing

Simply getting out of a disabled aircraft at altitude does not ensure that you will walk away without serious injury. You still hit the ground pretty hard even though you do have a parachute above you. Learning how to "break" your fall when you hit the ground is a big part of a successful ejection from a disabled aircraft. After students demonstrate that they can do a proper parachute landing fall, they are taken about 12 miles from the base to the parasail field. Here they are fitted with a parachute harness and hooked up to a parasail canopy (modified parachute).

Next the harnessed student is connected to a 600 foot rope which is attached to a special apparatus in the back of a truck. The student is then towed up to an altitude of

about 300 feet. From this point the student experiences almost exactly what it would be

like to parachute to the ground after a succesful aircraft ejection. This training is designed to build the student's confidence that he or she can successfully get out of a disabled aircraft and reach the ground safely.

This training is one portion of an intensive program conducted by the Aerospace Physiology Unit (a section of the hospital). The stated mission of this unit is to instruct all aircrew members in the hazards of high altitude flying.

The Swing Landing Trainer is only one of several training devices used by the unit. There are actual T-37 and T-38 ejection seats which are used to teach ejection procedures and ground egress from these aircraft. A Vista Vertigon is used to demonstrate spatial disorientation and the largest of the devices, the altitude chamber, is used to simulate the environment the student will experience at altitude.

The use of these training devices is accompanied by many hours of classroom instruction to ensure students are fully capable of handling any physiological incident that may occur during flight.

This is only one more way in which your hospital attempts to prevent injuries and incidents before they occur.

### IG defines fraud, waste & abuse

Recently, Joe Scherick, Assistant to the Secretary of Defense, mentioned that DoD is coming under probably the hardest scrutiny ever, due to the perception that our budget is untouchable while the rest of society suffers. there are newspaper articles and TV programs that are critical of defense spending on almost a daily basis. Because there is this notion of financial irresponsibility, it is our job, I believe, to communicate to the general public and our civilian leaders that we care about what happens to our tax dollars and to ensure that we get the most out of the budget which Congress approves for us. This is the primary reason the Air Force, Reese, and each one of us should be constantly aware of detecting and preventing Fraud, Waste and Abuse. What is Fraud, Waste and Abuse?

-Ordering 50 tool kits for friends or for private resale.

- A requirement exists for 50 tool kits and 100 are ordered. Extra 50 serves no purpose.

- Taking a tool kit home to work on personal items.

Although these examples are very general you would be surprised how often they occur. If you suspect Fraud, Waste and Abuse is taking place, you can report it by calling 885-3273 or you can call directly to the DoD hotline 227-1061. However, I recommend that you give local authorities first chance at solving the problem. Remember, our Reese goal is to use all resources as efficiently as possible. Keep up the good work.

"The Air Force's basic approach to drug rehabilitation is keyed to early identification of abusers,' says Maj. Gen. William Usher, director of personnel plans for the air Force's manpower and per-

"Once iden- return to duty when aptified, we thoroughly evaluate the extent of an individual's drug involvement and ensure that any medical consequences of abuse are treated," he told a House subcommittee. The tokens can be used in the club's dining room, the package store and in the club's bars.



### Base pilot earns wings 30 years after father

"I think it's great" that Steve is getting his wings, said M.R. "Bud" Henderson, 2nd Lt. Steve Henderson's

Here for the graduation, Lieutenant Henderson and his father enjoyed a unique moment . . . it was almost 30 years ago that Bud Henderson had earned both his wings and his Air Force commission

As an aviation cadet, Bud spent six weeks in preflight, six months in primary, and then was sent here when he got his multi-engine advance training in the TB-25.

Unlike his father, Lieutenant Henderson graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy before coming to Reese for undergraduate pilot training.

Bud added that, back in 1952, there were few officers going through pilot training: "Most of us were aviation cadets when we were learning to fly and be officers at the same time."

In 1952, "I had no idea that this would happen," Bud quipped. During flight training here, Bud met Steve's mother. He attributes Steve's liking the Lubbock area so well to the fact that he's got family here.'

Recalling the past appearance of Reese "right after the base had been reopened on permanent status" Bud described the 1952 look as very temporary. The modern buildings around the base give things considerably different look.

Unlike his won, Bud joined the Air Force to fly and fight in the Korean Conflict, but he did not arrive in Japan until August 1953 - just a month after the conflict had ended.

During his five year tour with the Air Force Bud flew numerous airplanes, including the B-25, a "Target" B-25 for weather, A B-29, and finally a B-47. Having left the service life nearly 25 years ago, Bud has kept his hand in flying. He pilots a private aircraft and works as an aircraft insurance broker in St. Louis.

Lieutenant Henderson, a St. Louis native, will be remaining here as a T-38 instructor pilot with the 54th Flying Training Squadron. Around October he will be flying to Randolph AFB, Texas, where he will go to an instructor pilot school.




(Continued from page 1) prior to his talk to the new pilots. Colonel Montgomery will work for General Breckner as his special assistant at ATC headquarters.

The Deputy Chief of Staff, Logistics, ATC Headquarters told the new aviators in the spirit of the occasion that there are three things that go into the making of a pilot:

"First, you gotta bust a ride and feel lousy; you solo and get wet; and then after 49 weeks of pilot training you still have to listen to one more speech" before you get your wings.

General Breckner also told them that if they "wanted something bad enough, they had to go for it" for now they had accomplished the task of entering the "hallowed halls of aviators."









Many misconceptions apparently exist throughout the base when it comes to the operation of bicycles on Reese. A majority of the time, problems associated with improper bicycle operation result from riders not being familiar with base rules.

In an effort to clear up the misconceptions and eliminate the confusion, security police are stressing the base rules governing bicycle operation

ply to motor vehicles also apply to bicycle operation. For example, bicycle riders are required to stop at all stop signs, ride with the flow of traffic, use hand signals when making turns, and yield at yield signs.

Bicycles operated during hours of darkness must have a head light emitting a white light visible from a distance of 500 feet. Carrying a flashlight will not meet this require-

this week. Please remember ment. Bicycles must also have the same traffic rules that ap- a red tail light or rear reflector visible from a distance of 500 feet from the rear. Operators must sit astride the bicycle and are not authorized to carry another person unless additional seats are provided for each rider. Bicycle operators may not attach themselves to any moving vehicle. The carrying of a package, bundle, or object which prevents a bicycle operator from keeping at least one hand on the handle

bars is prohibited.

Within the Reese business district, bicyclists will not ride on the sidewalks. Bicycle riders traveling on roadways must ride with the flow of traffic, single file and as close to the right curb as possible. Bicycle riders off the street will yield to all pedestrians.

Each adult bicycle rider is must insure their children registered on base.

### **AAFES** hotline nails fraud, waste and abuse

DALLAS (AFNS)-More than 3,300 calls to the Army and Air Force Exchange Service hotline in the past two years have led to recovery of \$137,000 in cash and merchandise, 249 disciplinary actions and 23 corrective management actions. Sixteen contractors also were sent letters of warning.

Service members and their dependents can call the AAF-ES hotline toll-free 24 hours a day at 1-800/527-6789 in all states except Texas where the number is 1-800/ 442-6345. Members in Italy, Turkey, Greece and Spain do not have an AAFES hotline. In Italy, calls may be made to the safety and security specialist at 0444-500-381, and in

Spain calls to the safety and security specialist may be made to 0034-1-723-7767.

Customers also may write to Headquarters AAFES, Safety and Security Division, Dallas, Texas 75222.

The hotline is part of the AAFES fraud, waste and abuse program begun in 1980 to uncover misuse of AAFES assets. Although members sometimes use the hotline for making other types of calls such as customer complaints, 25 to 30 percent of the calls and letters received in the past two years concerned fraud, waste and abuse. Forty-three percent of those proved to be valid.



### **Project Warrior**

In conjunction with Project Warrior, the Roundup will periodically publish book reviews taken from the Air University Review. Below is one such review: The Pictorial History of the Flying Tigers.

The Pictorial History of the Flying Tigers by Larry M. Pistole, Orange, Virginia: Moss Publications, 1981, 288 pages - bibliography and four appendixes, \$29.95. (Available from the author, P.O. Box 400, Kennesaw, Georgia 30144).

Written by a man who probably knows more about the human side of the Flying Tigers' story than anyone else, this fascinating compilation of photographs, afteraction reports, personal accounts, and unit historical data falls somewhere between a photo album and pure source documentation.

Originating in the author's acquaintance with most of the surviving members of Chennault's American Volunteer group (AVG) - his father was a member - this wellproduced volume contains the most impressive and surely the most complete photographic coverage of the Flying Tigers ever published or likely to be published. It is short on text and much of the message is in the photo captions, but this is not a serious

drawback. Where AVG members and activities are concerned, Larry Pistole has taken pains to ensure accuracy in the captions; the numerous photos tell their own story, supplemented by short personal accounts, reproductions of contemporary press clippings and selected pilots' after-action reports. The connecting passages-describing the AVG's recruitment, organization, training, short but glorious combat career, and disbandment, though lacking the usual scholarly apparatus—are based on research and interviews with survivors. They effectively convey the flavor of the Flying Tigers' experience.

The vintage photographs, many of them snapshots of less than optimum quality, are remarkably clear, and the sixteen pages of color photography are impressive. The author deserves credit for having the persistence to publish privately, avoiding the compromises a commercial publisher would have insisted on. For those interested in a single chapter of aviation history. The Pictorial History of the Flying Tigers is well worth the price.





Cycle Talk

Terror in Tulia . . . 'An almost disasterous motorcycle accident occured on the 4th of July. It's one thing to hear of accidents. It's another to see one happen. It occured right in front of me.

There were eight of us on our motorcycles out to enjoy a picnic on the 4th of July. We were returning from a very beautiful roadside park on FM 207 located on the backside of Palo Duro Canyon and were proceeding through an intersection in the little town of Tulia (about 70 miles north of here). Five of the eight cyclists had already passed through the intersection and three of us were straggling behind.

#### Danger approaches

I was the last of the three, yet the first to see a car approaching at a high rate of speed from my left. We had the right of way and the car had a stop sign. But, something told me he wasn't about to stop. I went for my brakes and had plenty of time to stop, and did so prior to arriving at the intersection itself. To my horror, the brake lights of the two cyclists ahead of me had not even flashed. I thought to myself, "What in samhill are they thinking about? Why aren't they looking to check for idiots like this?" Finally, the first rider's brake lights flashed. He had spotted the danger. His tires began smoking as he screeched to a stop, barely in time. The second rider's brake light still had not flashed . .. Horrors! He'll never make it now. It's too late! Talk about a sick feeling . talk about panic . . . talk about calling on God to stop what was about to happen in front of me ... for the rider in front of me was not a friend, nor stranger . . . but my husband. And I was about to watch him get ground into ham-

Understand, that all of this happened in slow motion . . . like watching a movie ... one frame at a time clicks by, then the next. There was a city policeman issuing a traffic ticket at this very intersection. He witnessed the whole thing. He said he's heard people scream before, but never like the ones I cut lose with that afternoon! I was sitting on my bike screaming at my husband, Ernie, to stop. The policeman said, apparently when I realized that he wasn't going to get stopped in time, I screamed ... "NO". .. three times, loud enough to bring people out of their houses.

#### Sliding by

Ernie and the car had both entered the intersection. Now, Ernie saw the deathly peril bearing down on him and hit the brakes. The rear brake took hold ahead of the front and when that happens, the rear end of the bike tries to come around and meet the front, and down you go, into a

that car, only the good Lord knows... but none the less, he missed, sliding by the car's rear bumper by the thickness of a sheet of paper. He slid, and slid, and slid . . . I was almost cheering ... it looked like he would ride it out. Often times when you're down with a bike, if you can just stay with it until it skids to a stop, your injuries may be nothing more than lost skin. I thought Ernie had it made. The bike had almost stopped, when a foot peg, tire or something dug into the concrete and the bike flipped over on its other side, throwing Ernie into the air.

He came down with all of his weight falling on the right arm and right side. I rode up to him and tried to hurriedly put my kickstand down and get off. In my fright, I couldn't find the kickstand. I looked into his eyes and could see a look of desperation, the sort of look of one who had grave doubts as to whether or not he was going to make it. I did something I'll probably never be able to do again. I got off my 588 pound, 1100 Yamaha and heaved it aside like a rag doll. To heck with the kickstand

#### Injuries bad

Ernie couldn't talk and could barely breathe. He was in bad shape. His right elbow looked like a limp sack of marbles. Later, X-rays showed it to be exactly that. It was crushed, the joint was broken in seven pieces. All of his ribs were broken on the right side. His right lung was punctured and his shoulder broken in two places. Even though he had a shirt on, the concrete street on a 97 degree day was roasting him alive. I observed if he could move his feet and wiggle his toes. He could, so we decided to very carefully work a blanket between his back and the hot concrete. He wanted water. A bystander cautioned me on that one. Said he might choke on it. Good thinking! We wet a towel and placed it in his mouth.

An ambulance was on the way. I'll never forget the lonely wailing of its siren as it approached. The police had the driver of the car sitting in their cruiser. I stood up and glared at him. I had a couple of thoughts go through my mind concerning his behalf and durn the consequences, until I saw his face ... he was old ... just an old man . . . sitting there with his head bowed.

Ernie was rushed to the little hospital there in Tulia where they checked him over to be sure he could make it to a bigger hospital. We decided he could stand the trip to Lubbock General and not have to go to Amarillo. We were off. They gave him a lot of pain killer so he was quiet all the way to Lubbock. I had plenty of time to think. That 70 mile ride was a real nummer! slide. How he missed broadsiding All kinds of things raced through my shocked brain. The accident for one thing. It never should have happened. It shouldn't have happened even if an old man did run a stop sign. There was time to look and plenty of time to react. I call it defensive driving. I've preached and harped on it in one way or another in almost every CYCLE TALK article you see in this paper.

#### Attitude proves important

We passed many motorcyclists as I sat in the ambulance on the way back to Lubbock. Some of them were smart and a lot of them were dumb. The dumb ones were riding around with bare backs, sandals and no helmets. Dumb! Just plain dumb! It's strange but the day before our picnic, Ernie and I had had a discussion on the value of helmets. Ernie had always believed in them more so than not, but he did feel that under certain crash conditions a helmet would be of no use. In the ambulance, Ernie said to me, "I guess I didn't hit my head, did I? I don't even have a headache." I told him I'd just be more than happy to show him his helmet first chance we got. (the back and side of it had deep gouges dug out of it).

In the Lubbock General Emergency room, I stood by Ernie while the doctors worked on him. A nurse motioned to me to step aside for a minute. She handed me a plastic bag which had the words printed in big wide letters on the side, "Personal Effects". The bag gave me a cold chill. I have been handed a few of these as base mortuary officer, only. They contained the personal effects of dead accident victims. I've never had a close loved one pass away suddenly. It must be devestating to have that happen to you-quickly, suddenly and totally unprepared and without warning. It's something to think about.

I walked back to Ernie's side. He took my hand and weakly managed a question, "How do you do it," he asked? "Do what," I asked. "Ride 55,000 miles without an accident," he said. I guess I just do a lot of looking . . a lot of look-

Ernie is up and around and doing fine. At this point only his elbow rmains in doubt as to whether or not he'll recover full

One last word on defensive driving . . . when is the last time you had an accident?

#### The other "guy"

You remember it don't you? The accident report said it was the other driver's fault. I ask you to think about that a minute. Don't feel smug. Are you absolutely sure that there wasn't any possible way that you could have or should have anticipated that wrong move by the other driver? There just were no preventive measures you could or should have been taking? You weren't talking or listening to the radio or thinking about a problem? You were giving your undivided attention and watching out for that driver to make an error? Are you willing to bet me on it and then let's sit down and watch a replay of your accident. You'd probably lose the bet and I'd be a millionaire in a week!

Those types of accidents where there is just no way out, and no way to take any defensive measures are fewer and further between than we humans care to admit. Japan has the right idea. They'll sight the driver of the vehicle who caused the accident but they may also sight the remaining driver for failure to take proper precaution or evasive action, if, they determine that it was possible for him/her to do so. Don't forget, DRIVE DEFEN-SIVELY!
