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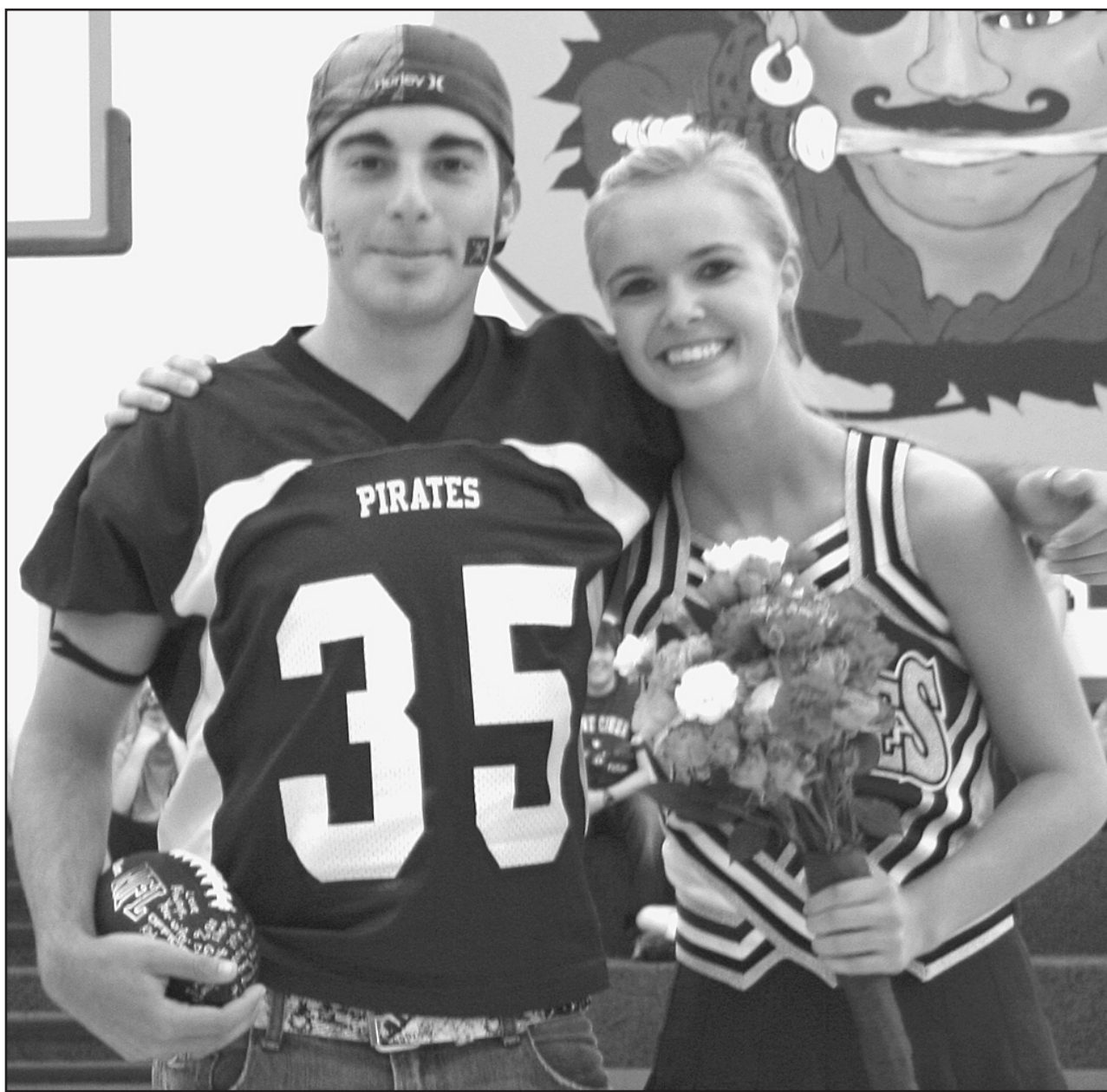

Indian Band receives first division rating

For the third consecutive year, the Haskell Indian Band has earned a first division rating at marching contest.

The Region II UIL Marching Contest was held Oct. 16 at Memorial Stadium

in Wichita Falls. The Indian Band, under the direction of Mike Aston, achieved near perfection in every aspect of the performance. In fact, Aston says, "The only negative comments the judges made were that

someone's hat was on crooked, and that a few people were holding their horns a little low. Positive comments included excellent control, blend and balance, solid performance."

Aston is in his fifth

year as band director and is assisted by Teresa New. The fifty-six member band played two songs from a Las Vegas show called Cirque du Soleil, "Distorted" and "Incantation." The band does an old time military drill called a Step Two drill, seen mostly in the 1950's and 60's. As part of the performance, the percussion section played Oye Como Va. On a humorous note, the band also played a few seconds of "The More We Get Together the Happier We'll Be."

Not only did the band receive a number 1 rating, but they received superior ratings from all three judges, a feat not easily accomplished. The competition included twelve bands in the Class A division, with only Haskell, Electra and Throckmorton receiving

superior ratings.

Aston gives credit for the positive results to the students willingness to give up ten days of their summer to come to the band hall and spend twenty hours of practice time before school even starts. They also practice every Tuesday evening until contest. Aston says, "If they did not commit to this kind of work ethic, then the results would be quite different."

This year's Indian band includes sixteen seniors, who have been a part of the band since starting in sixth grade.

High school bands, according to their classification, advance on an alternating basis. Class A does not advance this year.

Congratulations to the Haskell Indian Band and their directors, on a job well done.

Early voting underway

While some Americans are more "politically minded" than others, we all have a responsibility to be informed and then vote on the leaders of our great country.

The upcoming midterm election, scheduled for Tues., Nov. 2, will decide office holders on the federal, state and county levels. Early voting began Oct. 18 and will continue through Oct. 29 at the County Clerk's office in the Haskell County courthouse. A request for a ballot by mail, must be received in the clerk's office by Oct. 26.

Although the republican and democratic parties have long been the dominant political parties, representatives of the libertarian and green parties are also on the ballot.

On the federal level, the only office up for grabs in our area, is for U.S. Representative, District 13. Mac Thornberry, the incumbent, is being challenged by John Burwell, Jr. and Keith Dyer.

There are seventeen state races, with perhaps the most prominent one being for Governor of Texas. Governor Rick Perry is facing Bill

White, Kathie Glass and Deb Shafto. Other contested state races include Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Commissioner of Agriculture, Railroad Commissioner, three Supreme Court justice positions, three judges on the Court of Criminal Appeals, and one member to the State Board of Education.

Drawing no opponents are State Representative, District 68, Rick Hardcastle; Justice, 11th Court of Appeals District, Terry McCall; and District Judge, 39th Judicial District, Shane Hadaway.

Of the eight county races on the ballot, only two are opposed. Vying for County Judge are incumbent David Davis and Dennis Ashley. County Commissioner, Precinct 4 democratic nominee Neal Kreger is facing two write-in candidates, Johnny Stulir and Rob Kittley.

Democratic nominees for District Clerk, County Clerk, County Tax Assessor-Collector, County Treasurer, Commissioner for Precinct 2, and Justice of the Peace are not facing challengers.

To be eligible to vote in

this election, you must be a registered voter. Voters will need to bring their voter registration card or some other type of identification.

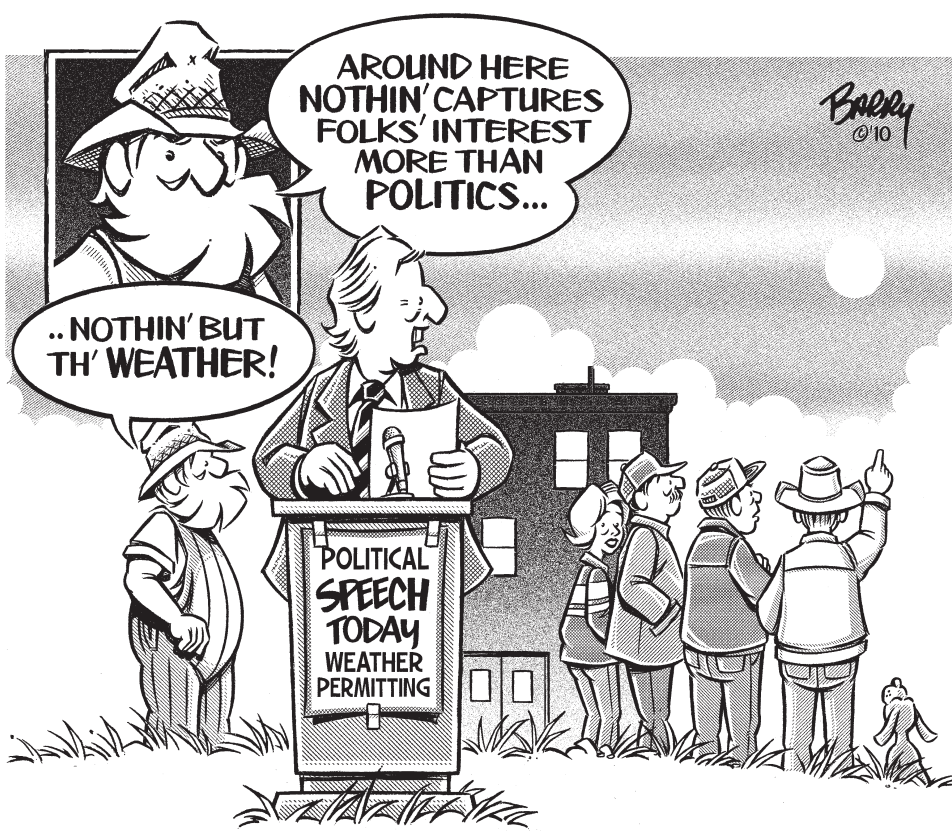

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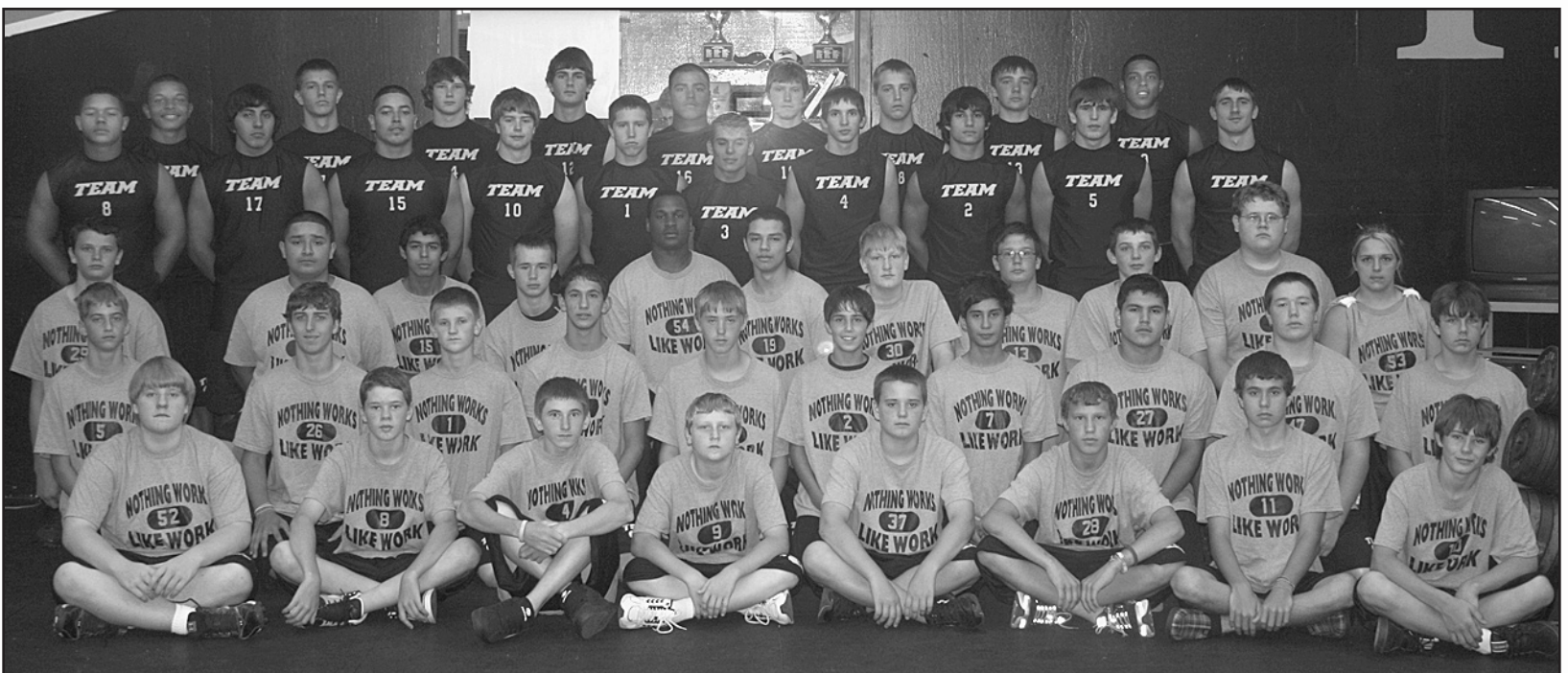

The team participated in nine different contests during the year placing third or better in every contest before topping 50 other teams to win the Texas State Dairy Foods CDE.

“This event ensures an educational competition that changes the relationship to social progress, technological advances and industry trends,” said Melissa Brown, CDE program manager.

Participants test milk samples for flavor, identify cheese samples, as well

as, score milk sediment pads according to USDA standards. Members evaluate milk samples using the California Mastitis test and also evaluate and score milker unit parts. Finally, the participant’s knowledge of milk production and marketing is assessed by a written exam.

The National FFA Dairy Foods CDE is sponsored by Dairy Farmers of America and the National FFA Foundation. The event is one of 23 CDEs held annually at the national FFA convention.

Methodist Church celebrates century of spreading the gospel

It's one hundred and twenty-five years old and still spreading the gospel. The First United Methodist Church in Haskell recently held a big celebration commemorating this impressive milestone.

Records indicate that one fall night in 1884, Reverend J.H. Wiseman rode up to the F.G. Alexander residence and announced himself a minister from Anson. He was warmly received, and before long he began preaching on a regular basis. This was the first "regular preaching" in the county.

In May 1885, Rev. Wiseman took down the names of those Methodists attending and soon afterwards the church was organized. Charter members were R.G. Alexander, Mrs. Mary Alexander, Seaton S. Cummings, Mrs. Mary E. Cummings, Mrs. Luella Dewees, Mrs. Mattie C. Lomas and Mrs. Mary E. Smith. The Annual Conference attached Haskell County to Jones County as a Mission Field in the Abilene District. This was the beginning of religious work in Haskell County.

Originally, services were held in the homes, however when they could no longer accommodate the congregation, the church moved services to the courthouse. By 1889, it was felt that a permanent church building was needed, and by the spring of 1890, the church bell in the first church built in Haskell, could be heard as it called people to worship. A beautiful sound still heard today, as the church continues to ring its bell.

Membership increased over the next twenty years and the little one room church was no longer adequate to hold the congregation. A new brick church was planned with the ground breaking for the sanctuary and fellowship hall taking place July 5, 1909. The cornerstone for the new church was laid Jan. 15, 1910. It was in 1928, that the wing which now houses the offices, parlor and classrooms was added, with the children's education building being built in the early 1960's.

Through the years the First United Methodist Church grew from the original seven charter members to as many as six hundred, and still has a membership of over three hundred thirty. It has been served by forty-six pastors.

The congregation today is made up of not only members from the Haskell church, but also from Methodist churches that disbanded in the surrounding communities of Paint Creek in 1995, Weinert in 1999, Rochester in 2006 and Rule in 2009.

It continues to be a very active influence in the community. Among its many outreach efforts, the church conducts an annual Church in the Park, once a month Monday services at the local nursing home, as well as Sunday morning services two months a year. They also hold a yearly Men's Cowboy breakfast for men of the community, have a Doorstep Ministry for new families in town, assist in the food bank distribution, and broadcast services each Sunday morning on KVRP.

In addition, an annual Senior Angel Banquet is held to honor the ladies who have served in the church for many years, serve as the site for Scout activities, host 5th quarter for older students, Vacation Bible School for younger students and Trunk

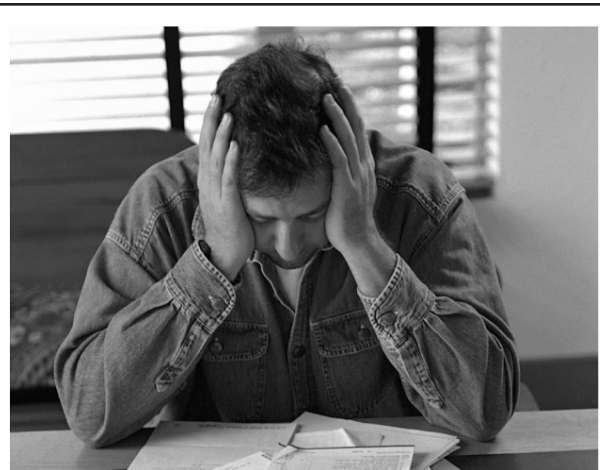

On September 17, 2010, Atmos Pipeline – Texas, a division of Atmos Energy Corporation ("APT" or the "Company"), filed a Statement of Intent to change its natural gas transportation rates for firm and interruptible customers and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all transportation customers receiving service under existing Rate Schedules CGS and Rate Schedule PT. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is October 22, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 4 firm transportation customers and 63 interruptible transportation customers. 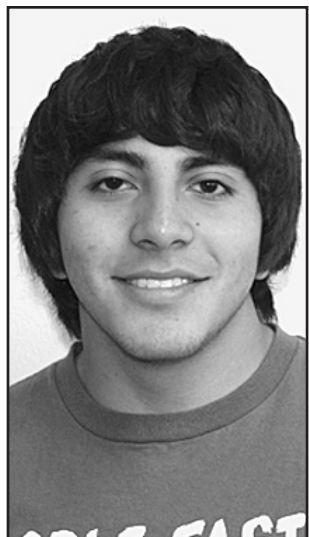

In addition to rate revisions, APT seeks to adopt a Rate Schedule CGS – Mid-Tex to be applicable solely to Atmos Energy Corp., Mid-Tex Division. This Rate Schedule will, consistent with the Commission's Final Order Nunc Pro Tunc in GUD No. 9869, include recovery of ad valorem taxes related to Mid-Tex's working gas in storage, as well as the return and related taxes on Mid-Tex's working gas in storage, the Accumulated Deferred Income Tax for UNICAP Section 263A and the WACOG to FIFO change related to the Mid-Tex working gas in storage. A second Rate Schedule CGS - Other is proposed for all other city gate customers that is identical to the proposed Rate Schedule CGS – Mid-Tex with the exception of the requested changes related to Mid-Tex's working gas in storage. Other proposed tariff changes include a new Rider REV, a new Rider WGIS, and minor wording changes in the other existing Riders applicable to service provided by APT. 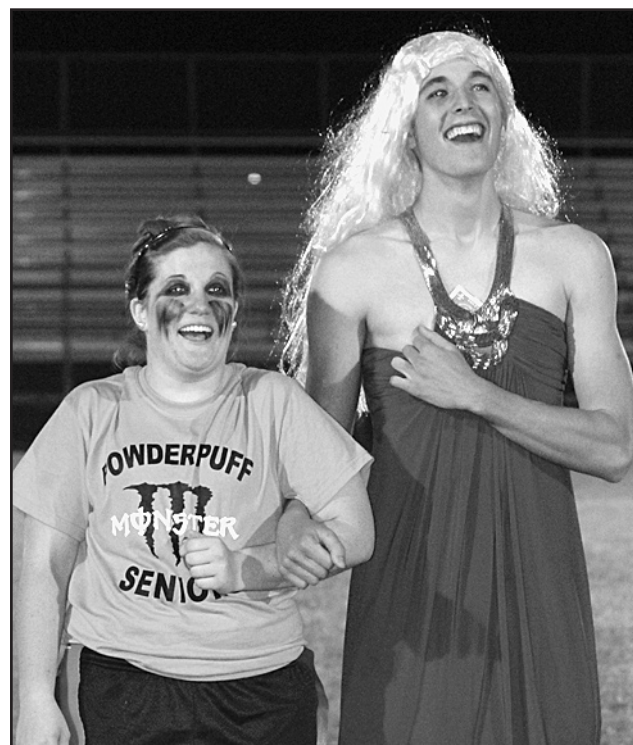

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has notified the City of Weinert water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for Nitrate. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established the MCL for Nitrate at 10 mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for Nitrate indicates a level of 25.6 mg/L.
