Open house offers AF variety

The 1982 edition of the Reese AFB open house, Sept. 18, begins at 9 a.m. when gates open to the general public.

Civilian aviators will be able to fly their private aircraft into Reese that morning for a safety symposium.

During the symposium, civilian and military persons with their private pilot's license will get to experience the altitude chamber, ride in the flight simulators and get briefings from various organizations around Reese.

Weather will be presenting their briefing in order that civilian aviators can get a better understanding of what military pilots get.

Later during the open house, military working dogs and their handlers from Dyess AFB, Texas, will be on hand to demonstrate their drilling techniques and how the dogs react under gun fire. The canines will also use their keen noses to demonstrate how they sniff out drugs and/or ex-

plosives when they're called upon to do so. The Dyess teams will also demonstrate the closeness between handlers and their dogs as they use hand and voice signals to get the dogs to attack would be agressors.

Throughout the day open house spectators can get first hand looks at a lot of the equipment used at Reese. The maintenance squadrons and the security police will display much of the equipment they use daily. The Fire Department here will be displaying their large crash fire and rescue trucks too.

From downtown, the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and the Air Force will have recruiting displays set up to answer questions about their respective services.

Some of the over 35 jets spectators will see include the F-15 "Eagle", the F-16, the C-141 "Starlifter" and the propellor driven C-130 "Hercules". Planes on display at the Reese Open House are from the Air National Guard, the Air Force Reserve, the Navy and Marine Corps.

There will also be performances by the U.S. Air Force Academy's Drum and Bugle Corps, Sabre Drill and Falconer teams, "Wings of Blue" jump team, the 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C., and the Confederate Air Force. The CAF will display aircraft previously used by the Air Force.

This the 35th anniversary of the Air Force will display a broader spectrum of Air Force life to the public and Air Force families than ever before.

pled guilty to writing nearly \$1,000 worth of bad checks, most of them to a base exchange in California while on leave.

The airman was sentenced to four months in confinement and hard labor at the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks at Fort Riley, Kan.

An airman first class from the 81st Civil Engineering Squadron-who elected to be tried by a military judge-was found guilty of writing nine bad checks totaling more than \$500. The judge found the airman had written each of the checks with intent to defraud.

Base legal officials said the judge weighed the fact that the airman's supervisors spoke on his behalf at the trial. Although his supervisors felt he should be punished, they also stated they wanted him to return to work.

The judge sentenced the airman to serve three months in confinement at hard labor, to forfeit \$600 of his pay and to be reduced in grade to airman basic.


AAFES gets tough on delinquent accounts


As agreed by the customer, at purchase time, default of payment can get the customer's check cashing privileges suspended.

Air Service issues first press release

(Editor's note: This was the Air Service's first press release. It was sent out in August 1907).

WASHINGTON, D.C. (August 1907) - The Army announced today the creation of an aeronautical division for all matters pertaining to military ballooning, air machines and all kindred subjects.

The memorandom, signed by Brig. Gen. James Allen, the Army's chief signal officer, named Capt. Charles de Forest Chandler to head the new division.

In a press release this week, Captain Chandler said the new division would consolidate the Army's current data on ballooning and heavier-than-air craft and would plan future tests and experiments.

An enthusiastic aerialist, Captain Chandler, with Maj. Samuel Reber, represented the Army in the American Aero Club's free ascent competition in Massachusetts last year.

The captain will be assisted in his new duties by Cpl. Edward Ward and Pfc. Joseph

Being a doctor or medical technician in the emergency room can be a rewarding, but often hectic experience. What most people don't realize is what goes on behind the scenes.

"There are a lot of responsibilities for the techs on duty," commented 1st Lt. Jeff

Demain, emergency room physician's assistant. Lieutenant Demain, an Air Force emergency room veteran of 10 years, explained that after duty hours there are only two techs and a doctor left to cover emergencies. They make ambulance runs to Lubbock, support flight line

emergencies, act as control center for aeromedical evacuation flights and they're present at all sports or base events.

"For two techs and one doctor, that's a lot of work and patient load," stated P.A. Demain. "Many patients come in and feel they're being ig-

techs may only treat a patient for so much-beyond that point, the patient must wait for the doctor who may be treating another patient."

The wait can be a long one but it's not because the medical personnel lack professional knowledge. Often, it's the patients who indirectly bring on the waiting. "If a patient comes in with the flu and temperature and then another comes in with the same symptoms but has a higher temperature, I have to take the second patient first regardless of how long the first patient has waited," explained P.A. Demain.
