# Reese Open House set; AF's 35th anniversary

The 1982 edition of the Reese AFB open house, Sept. 18, begins at 9 a.m. when gates open to the general public.

Civilian aviators will be able to fly their private aircraft into Reese that morning for a safety symposium.

During the sumposium, civilian and military persons with their private pilot's license wil get to experience the altitude chamber, ride in the flight simulators and get briefings from various organizations around Reese

Weather will be presenting their briefing in order that civilian aviators can get a better understanding of what military pilots get.

Later during the open house, military working dogs and their handlers from Dyess AFB, Texas, will be on hand to demonstrate their drilling techniques and how the dogs react under gun fire.

The canines will also use their keen noses to demonstrate how they sniff out drugs and/or explosives when they're called upon to do so. The Dyess teams will also demonstrate the closeness between handlers and their dogs as they use hand and voice signals to get the dogs to attack would be agressors.

Throughout the day open house spectators

can get first hand looks at a lot of the equipment used at Reese. The maintenance squadrons and the security police will display much of the equipment they use daily. The Fire Department here will be displaying their large crash fire and rescue trucks too.

From downtown, the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and the Air Force will have recruiting displays set up to answer questions about their respective services.

Some of the over 35 jets spectators will see include the F-15 "Eagle", the F-16, the C-141 "Starlifter" and the propellor driven C-130 "Hercules". Planes on display at the Reese Open House are from the Air National Guard, the Air Force Reserve, the Navy and Marine C or ps.

There will also be performances by the U.S. Air Force Academy's Drum and Bugle Corps. Sabre drill and Falcone teams, "Wings of Blue" jump team, the 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C., and the Confederate Air Force. The CAF will display aircraft previously used by the Air Force.

# Several take new jobs

Summer at Reese was anything but ho-hum this year. As the summer nears its end, there are only a handful of key base positions that have not changed hands.

Locally, the departure of Col. Monte Montgomery last month opened up the wing commander position, which has been filled by Col. Richard E. Hearne, former base comander. Col. Hearne's old slot has been filled by Col. John R. Hullender, recently arrived from the Pentagon where he had served in the Directorate of Personnel Programs since June 1980.

Another relatively new arrival to Reese is deputy base commander Lt. Col. Elton "Speck" Brian, who comes to Reese from San Angelo, Texas, where he was assistant profesor of aerospace studies at Angelo State University. Lt. Col. Brian replaced Lt. Col. Donald Neff in July.

The wing inspector general, Lt. Col. Michael R. Hollomon departed PCS in August. His position was filled by Maj. Elvy Pettit, lieutenant colonel selectee, who moved across the base from the 54th FTS.

Col. Jerald Ellington retired and incoming Col. James P. Ulm took over as the 64th's Deputy Commander for Operations, arriving in May from the Air War College.

Col. John D. Herbert is still the deputy commander for maintenance. Col. Donald McCullough remains the deputy commander for resources. Col. Clint E. Chambers is still the commanding physician at Reese's U.S. Air Force Hospital.

Command of the 64th Student Squadron has remained with Lt. Col. Peter P. Cerrow, but former operations officer Col. John D. Vrettos succeeded Lt. Col. David A. Warner as commander of the 54th Flying Training Squadron in June when Lt. Col. Warner moved to the maintenance department.

Lt. Col. Galand D. Kramer still commands the 35th Flying Training Squadron.

Maintenance commanders now include Maj. Stanley W. Zalace, 64th Field Maintenance Squadron; and Maj. Gary F. Norris, 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron.

Major Zalace took command of FMS from Lt. Col. Peter L. Schill.

Commanders were not the only people on the move this summer, Lt. Col. Edward C. Priest announced his plans to retire from the Personnel Division chief's slot. Lt. Col. Daniel P. Gomez has since stepped in to assume the duties as Personnel Division chief, arriving here last month from Little Rock AFB,

Speaking of "chiefs", former OMS maintenance superintendent Jerry A. Price is now the 64th's senior enlisted advisor. Chief Price replaced CMSgt. Coy Martin who left for Vance AFB, Okla. last month.

From the top, President Ronald Reagan continues to lead our military as the commander-in-chief and Caspar Weinberger is still the Secretary of Defense.

Verne Orr is still the Secretary of the Air Force, but the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Gen. David C. Jones, Air Force, was replaced by Gen. George W. Vessey Jr., Army.

During late June, Gen. Lew Allen Jr., Air Force Chief of Staff, announced his retirement plans. President Reagan appointed Gen. Charles A. Gabriel to fill the vacant Air Force position.

Gen. Thomas M. Ryan Jr., commander, Air Training Command, completed his first year as ATC's top man during August.

Soundslike something from a cheap B movie, doesn't it? Fortunately, the goals we set for ourselves have very little to do with fortune tellers. What we select or desire for ourselves involves a somewhat deeper process. First and formost, what exactly is a

A goal is something desired, some positive reward that must be earned. For everyday purposes we will divide goals into two basic catagories: short term and long term. A short term goal is something that we decide is needed for the betterment of ourselves or

position and can be accomplished in a relatively short period of time, say within a couple of months. Examples of such might be to save money for a desired items, to meet someone, or to get recognition at work. A long term goal would be the same with the exception that the amount of time required to secure this desire is longer. For example you might want to own a yacht someday, or enroll and graduate from college. Let's face it, we all have goals. The danger of establishing only long term goals is that we are setting ourselves up for a defeatist situation. In effect, what we're saying to ourselves is that we aren't going to receive the positive strokes we want and need until we get that yacht, or graduate from college.

Our two catagories of long and short term goals can each be subdivided into goals that are tangible and those that are intangible. Tangible goals would include such items as clothing, housing, money and transportation. Examples of intangible goals would be higher self esteem, to be more assertive, to become

a better parent, spouse or worker. One of the best ways to precisely pin down goals is to sit down and write them out; in effect, make a contract with yourself.

Write the goal down, regardless of how vague it sounds. Determine if your goal is stated positively, or if it is perhaps simply the means of achieving some unidentified goal. Be sure you state positively the exact goal you desire or are setting for yourself. Sort your list out, removing any duplication. Finally, write a statement that describes what you expect for each goal stated, what you are going to have to do to accomplish this goal.

Remember that the key for your success depends in part on how you feel towards yourself. Don't set yourself up with a defeatist attitude, or get pinned down with a goal that stands little chance of success. It's important to get some positive strokes for yourself so incorporate some viable short term goals. Now that you've read this, get to work on those goals. Hurry, hurry, hurry.

# Riding rules geared for cyclists' safety

In case you have not heard, Reese now has a motocross track. The track is located near the base firing range.

With the aide of civil engineering's bulldoziers the track has really began taking shape. The track is designed to challenge the skilled rider without scaring new motocross riders.

Because of the nature of the sport, there are some guidelines for using the Reese track.

Only members of the base motocross team may ride the track. If people wish to join the club, they should contact Capt. Patricia Andrepont, Ext. 3800, Sgt. Jack Petrie, Ext. 3598, or SSgt. Kenneth Neitzel, Ext. 3390.

Dirt bikes can be taken to the track on trailors or trucks, but they may not be ridden on base streets. They may be ridden on the grass from MWR Supply to the track at the legal speed limits posted. Never use the north end of the runway to get to the track.

Until a trash barrel is set out, riders will have to take their garbage back with them. Alcoholic beverages are out.

Riders may enjoy the track from noon to dusk.

Helmets and eye protection must be worn at all times. Other body protection is also required.

Riders must never ride alone. Riders will ride in pairs or with an observer.

The trail gets dusty, bring lots of water.

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

Players will be vying for the base championship, but because the Central District Tournament begins only days after the regular season here ends, players will be competing for slots on the Reese all-star team.


# Eight golfers win tournament
