Motivation: leadership's key

Supervisors and commanders, have you ever really thought about how you lead or supervise people? It sounded easy until I sat down to write about my leadership philosophy. It is a simple one based on three principles - Understanding, Loyalty and Motivation. I have been frequently asked by junior officers and NCOs which of the three elements is the most important. Priority is not the key ingredient to my leadership philosophy but the linkage of the three elements is. In the following weeks I will address each one of these elements in this column. Today I will address the motivation aspect of leadership.

People are the key to any effective organization. The overall goal of leadership is to enable individuals to contribute to a group goal. To be an effective leader you must motivate your people to perform their job to the best of their ability and within accepted performance standards. As a supervisor and commander I feel there are several key elements that go into motivation.

The first element concerns the "single voice of management". You must be willing to go to bat for your troops. Sometimes you will be able to participate in the decision process and other times you will not. You may not always agree with the decisions or guidance, but your boss' decisions must become your own. I am convinced that this single voice will serve to reduce the turmoil and uncertainty (rumor mill) which seems to exist in all units.

Secondly, supervisors need to attack the tough crises immediately. Don't be afraid to make the tough decisions, and don't delay in making the decision. Those tough decisions will still be around the following day. Your personnel will appreciate you as an individual who tackles the tough problems.

Finally, don't accept incompetence. The mission or job will be delayed or jeopardized if someone is incapable of performing their duties. This will ultimately lead to more of your time being spent in crisis management. Don't accept incompetence but on the other hand don't forget to reward outstanding performance. The pitfall is that person who is not doing his job requires more of your time. I found it difficult to insure the correct balance but the dividends to the unit and individuals for recognition of excellent performance is lasting.

Motivation is essential to mission ac-

complishment. As a supervisor and leader it is your responsibility to motivate your people. By keeping frustrations minimized, attacking the tough problems and not tolerating incompetence you will be on the road to gaining the performance and dedication required to accomplish the mission.

In my next article, I will address the loyalty aspect of the ULM leadership philosophy.

The Job of the mortuary officer

It can't happen to you? Well it just did, and it's a killer! You died last night. Dead on arrival at Lubbock General . . . auto accident. Ever wonder what sequence of events takes place when something like this happens? I am the base Mortuary Officer and I can tell you all about it.

It's 4 a.m. in the morning, I am home, sound asleep. The phone rings. It's frantic ringing finally penetrates my sleep. Even before I can stumble my way to the clanging pestilence, cold chills sweep over me, first from the cold winter morning and secondly from already knowing why I am being called at 4 a.m. in the morning. I pick up the phone, it's the Command Post, "Is this the mortuary officer?" "It is?" "Well there has been a death ... yes ... an auto accident ... DOA at Lubbock General ... it appears the vehicle rolled over on him . . . no, no seat belt."

I make a few necessary phone calls. After that, all there is to do is wait. Your parents must be notified of your death before I can call them and talk to them. It's a sick feeling. I put on a pot of coffee and get the fireplace going. I sit there in front of it, listening to the flames crackle and sip coffee. An hour and a half goes by, along with two pots of coffee. I think about you, the deceased and hope you didn't suffer too much. I look at my watch and make a calculated guess that your parents are getting a knock at their front door just about now. The nearest military installation must go out to your parents place of residence and break the news to them. I asked our base chaplain not long ago, "How do you tell someone their son or daughter has been killed?" He explained that when a chaplain, doctor or nurse, and squadron commander, all in military uniform are standing in one's doorway, there's not much that has to be said. The parents know right then and there that something has happened to their son or daughter.

Casualty Affairs calls me and informs me that the next-of-kin have now been notified. Now, the tough part for me begins. I call your parents, seeking instructions from them on how they want things handled. Their pastor answers the phone. In the background, I can hear a mother wailing her heart out and a full grown man in tears. That's a killer! I inform them of what I can and cannot do as a Mortuary Officer. They want the Air Force to handle all the arrangements. Good! I call Lubbock General and my contract funeral home. Lubbock General has performed the autopsy and are ready to release your remains to our contract funeral home. At the funeral home, the necessary embalming is quickly performed. I obtain one of your military uniforms (Class A) from your belongings or if you don't have one that is in perfect condition, the

Air Force buys one from Clothing Sales. I deliver it to the funeral home. After you are dressed, I perform an inspection to make sure everything is in order (yep, AFR 35-10 all the way, even after your dead). I sometimes ask the morticians to touch up the cosmetics on your face, maybe to cover up some bruises a little better or just attempt to have you look as natural as possible. Sometimes I even help them. It doesn't bother me. But when I hear your mother and dad cry, that's a killer.

Let me introduce you to the Summary Court Officer. This is the person that drops his/her normal duties for awhile and concentrates fully on settling your estate. We go to your room, which has been secured from the moment we knew of your death and start determining what is yours and what is your roommates. We must go through any mail or papers you have and attempt to determine who owes you money and to whom you owe money. The Summary Court Officer finds an envelope and opens it. It's a birthday card from your parents. It reads, "Dear Son, Happy Birthday and please write us more often. We love you. Mother and Dad." That one gets to me. I turn away from the Summary Court Officer and busy myself with something else. I don't want him to see a pair of slightly misty eyes.

I call your father to get some questions answered. He growls at me, "Why didn't my kid write more often. Don't you Air Force people make kids write home, anymore?" He really catches me by surprise with that question. "Well, no sir, we cannot make them write, but we do encourage them to do so." He regains control and apologizes. But that is ok. It's really tough on parents to lose a kid like you. Your dad asks if you were wearing a seat belt. He said he bet you were because he always preached to you about it. You weren't, but I haven't the heart to tell him that. I cough and sputter and decide to attempt a "quarterback sneak" around the question by subtly changing the subject. It doesn't work. How could you possibly be wearing a seat belt and have a car roll over on you?

Memorial services are hard on me. A flag draped coffin will get to me every time. Your friends and co-workers, maintenance people, file in. They do important and hard work. As a matter of fact, your boss said you were one of the best mechanics he had.

And why? Because there is always a few people who abuse the booze or who refuse to wear a seat belt or a helmet when riding a motorcycle. Dumb! I wish you would have a change of heart. I don't need the business.

AF approves new mess dress

The Air Force Uniform Board has approved a new mess dress uniform to replace the black-and-white combination, according to the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center.

"The Army and Air Force Exchange Service expects to have limited quantities available in approximately December 1982 or January 1983," read the MPC message dated Nov. 18. "The new mess dress, which may be worn year-round, is similar to the current mess dress except for color

(midnight blue) and a longer jacket. The shoulder boards (officers), chevrons (enlisted), bow tie, tab and cummerbund are all midnight blue." The shirt and blouse to be worn with the new uniform are the same as can be worn presently.

The message continued that, "effective immediately, the new mess dress may be worn if procured through a military clothing sales store or from a certified manufacturer" in which case the garment should carry a military certification label. The MPC message gave bases the authority to begin purchasing the new mess dress.

Toy manufacturer offers voluntary repair

DALLAS (AAFES release)—Graco Metal Products, Inc., has initiated a voluntary repair program for its "Swyngomatic converta-cradles" manufactured from September 1979 through July 1980. The item was sold through the Army and Air Force Exchange Service catalog.

The "Swyngomatic" is a three-in-one unit, converting from cradle to swing to carrying cradle. The cradle has mesh sides with a steel tubular carrying handle which connects to a windup mechanism. Graco initiated the repair program after learning of instances in which the cardle's Masonite bottom collapsed, allowing the infant to fall out.

Graco has redesigned the bottom board and added supporting rods. Cradles which have two metal rods supporting the bottom board are redesigned models and are not part of the repair program. The redesigned cradles are offered in current editions of the Exchange catalog and the Home Shopping Guide.







Supply supports the customer

by 1st Lt. JoAnn Darlington

The primary responsibility of the 64th Supply Squadron is customer support. In order to provide the most effective support to each organization in accomplishing the wing mission, it is important for the customer to have a basic understanding of the organization and function of the supply squadron. Supply is divided into six separate branches, each with its own unique role. Of the 223 people assigned to the squadron, 36 percent are civilians.

Management and Procedures Branch

The M and P Officer acts

for the chief of supply in matters where responsibility has been delegated by the COS. Since the management and procedures branch is considered the eyes and ears of the COS, the M and P officer usually is the next highest grade under the COS. He has supervisory responsibility for the following sections: trading, Procedures and Standardization, funds management, management analysis, and administration. Training monitors the on-the-job program and conducts an average of 15 to 20 customer training sessions with an average attendance of 40 to

50 people per month. P and S reviews all changes so as to keep the entire account updated and visits and inspects supply branches at least semiannually. The funds management section manages and monitors assets valued at \$2 million. Management analysis provides monthly briefings for COS complex to the wing commander. This is also the focal point for comparison of performance to prescribed standards. They analyze and interpret data to determine the effectiveness of supply support, computer use, personnel utilization, and requirements. The administration section routes the incoming and outgoing correspondence and all noncomputer prepared reports.

Material Management Stock Control and MICAP management are part of this branch. The excess program, in which excess assets have been reduced from 14 to 5 percent, and 1.754 line items with special levels are both monitored by the Requirements unit. Requisition exceptions, status, and dueout validations are handled by the Requisitioning Unit. This unit also acts as liaison between Supply and Procurement on approximately 55 local purchase requests per day. The MICAP management section requisitions all MICAP requirements and handles all MICAP reporting.

Customer Support Branch

Direct customer support is provided by this branch. The customer liaison office serves as a single point for customer assistance and conducts monthly visits to all the organizations. This activity receives computer products needed to provide responsive support of approximately 150 customer inquiries a month. Material support section consists of demand processing, bench stock, and repair cycle support units. Over 240 expedite and routine requests for supplies are submitted to the demand processing unit daily and an average of 225 equipment requests are referred to the allowance and authorization section. The bench stock support unit establishes and maintains 39 bench stock accounts totalling 4,183 line items with a dollar value of \$474,000 for supported units. The repair cycle support unit establishes and operates 15 supply points and

controls over 5,000 items under the due-in-frommaintenance concept. There are 968 line items in the base service store and 435 line items in the individual equipment unit. In addition to operating a centralized onbase issue, storage, and turnin point for all items authorized to individuals by AFSC, IEU processes approximately 65 student pilots per class every six weeks.

Supply Systems Branch

The ADPM/PCAM operation, inventory, document and control records maintenance sections make up the supply systems branch. the ADPM/PCAM schedules and processes 60-75 reports/listings daily and handles all functions of the computer. The inventory sec-

toin prepares and maintains inventory schedules and conducts all complete and sample inventories for over 27,000 line items in Supply. Records maintenance maintains internal records while document control maintains the document and suspense files as well as performing quality control and monitoring the delinquent document listings.

Material Storage and Distribution Branch

The Material storage and distribution officer is responsible for receiving, inspection, issue, storage warehousing, and pickup and delivery. Inspection determines the condition, security classification, status, and identification of items received, stored, issued, and transferred.


Receiving is responsible for processing over 200 receipts daily. Storage and issue section stores over 12,000 line items in 10 warehouses and provides secure storage and handling of classified and sensitive items. The pickup and delivery section acts as the single control point for vehicles and delivers an average of 350 supply requests daily.

Fuels Management Branch

The base fuels management officer is responsible to the COS for the fuels account. This includes requisitioning, receipt, storage, issue, quality control and accounting of two million gallons of aviation fuels and 17,000 gallons of ground fuels monthly.
