like you are in my life, I hopefully never will experience again.

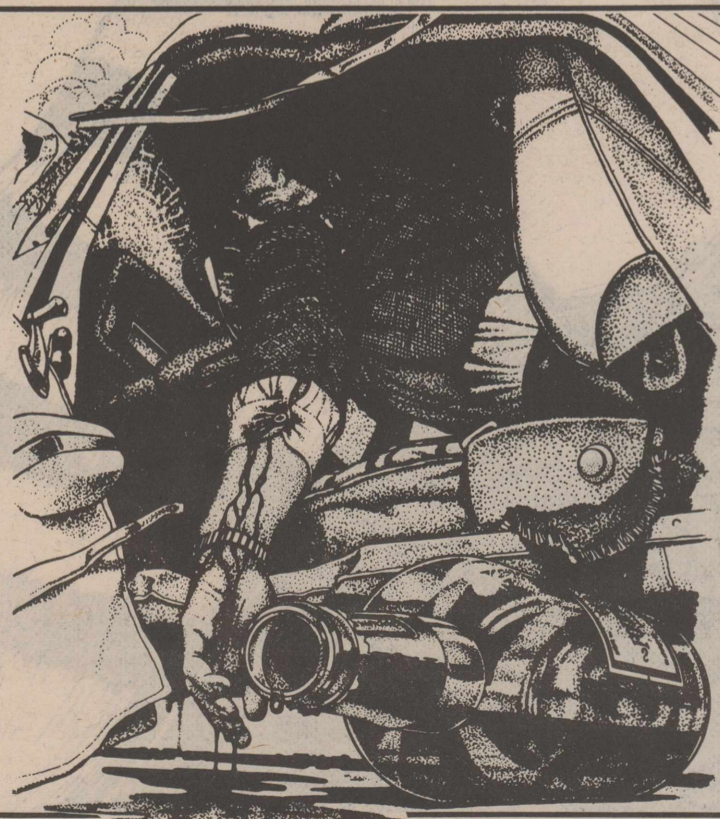
I want to share this with you as my friend Rick, who cares, shared it with me.

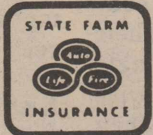

"I WAS WONDERING why, in the base newspaper each week, you've had a letter written by an ex-alcoholic condemning the use of alcohol when at almost every base function you encourage social drinking," asked a recent caller.

The Roundup includes articles by alcoholics to illustrate what irresponsible drinking habits can lead to. We do not encourage social drinking. The Air Force allows mature adults to make their own choices about drinking; however, the Air Force does not approve of problem drinking, which can lead to death and injury

on the highways, time missed from work and a host of other ills.

We think alcoholics are authentic and believable spokesmen in this effort to encourage responsible drinking habits.

SOMEONE WHOSE WIFE WORKS during the week asked why we don't schedule tours for dependents on weekends.

The "Behind the Lines" tours the caller is referring to are scheduled for weekdays in order to give the tourgoers the best view of Reese at work — something we can't do on weekends when most of the operations and support activities are off today.

SOMEONE CALLED a few days ago to report that she'd seen a security policeman driving above the speed limit while on patrol.

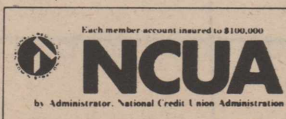

A holiday meal will be served at the Wing Dining Hall from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Christmas Day for active duty military, retirees, dependents and guests.

The featured menu includes: shrimp cocktail with lemon wedges, roast turkey with cranberry sauce, cornbread dressing, giblet gravy, baked ham with cherry sauce, roast beef with natural gravy, mashed potatoes, candied sweet potatoes, French cut green beans with mushrooms, buttered corn, buttered peas, cherry and pecan pies, assorted cakes, hot rolls with butter, fruits, nuts and candies.

Does AAFES make a profit?

Does the Army and Air Force Exchange Service make a profit? If so, what does the exchange service do with its earnings? Both are recurring questions, exchange service officials report. They point out that there is a profit. In fact, in fiscal 1981, the exchange service earned \$183.7 million on sales of more than \$4.2 billion. Earnings were 4.71 percent of sales. In fiscal 1981, \$92 million was contributed to Army and Air Force morale, welfare and recreation activities for sports equipment and uniforms, gyms, hobby shops, tennis courts, softball diamonds, swimming pools, recreation centers, squadron picnics and other functions. The remaining earnings were spent for renovation, construction, equipment and expansion projects to serve customers, officials added.

BAS can be paid even while TDY

Air Force directives allow finance units to pay all enlisted members their BAS while they are TDY. BAS is paid through the TDY member's paycheck. The BAS payments are based on the period of TDY. For example:

TDYs less than 30 days mean the member gets paid after the TDY and after completion of the appropriate voucher which is processed by the finance's Travel Pay Section.

TDYs lasting 30 days or more entitle the member to BAS payment even while TDY. The start and stop dates are determined by the travel orders. When the TDY member files their voucher, then the Military Pay Section makes adjustments for over-payments and under-payments.

Over-payments happen if a member's TDY is suddenly shortened, military pay has no way to know when it happens. All together, it takes prompt filing to insure good customer service and correct BAS payments.

From F-4 nav to F-15 pilot

Capt. James B. Pack, an electronic warfare officer, recently topped his classmates being named a Distinguished Graduate, earning the Section I Leadership Award, the Flying Training Award and receiving the Air Training Command Commander's Trophy. Captain Pack swept Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 83-02's honors Friday during class graduation ceremonies at the Simler theater.

The captain's background as a flyer goes beyond flight training here, he graduated navigator school in July 1977 to earn his first set of aviator wings.

An ROTC graduate of Florida State University, Captain Pack left navigator school at Mather AFB, Calif., for the back seat of an F-4D at Kunsan AB, South Korea. After his tour in Korea he was stationed at George AFB, Calif., where he began flying

back seat in an F-4G "Wild Weasel".

He flew the F-4G navigator slot until November 1982 when he was selected to attend flight training here.

Captain Pack and his wife Cindee are winding down from graduation ceremonies, but gearing up for training to come. He will leave Reese for Hollomon AFB, N.M., where he will get Fighter Lead-in Training. After Holloman, the captain will travel to Luke

AFB, Ariz., for F-15 RTU. When his training is complete he expects to arrive at Langley around September 1983.

One point he did make was that "it feels good to be flying front seat now."

Second Lieutenant Stephen J. Ellison, a Wheaton, Ill., native, received the class Academic Award. Lieutenant Ellison will fly the T-37 at Mather AFB, Calif.

Capt. Harry B. McCarraher III, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., received the Section II Leadership Award for Class 83-02. He will fly the B-52 at

Barksdale AFB, La.

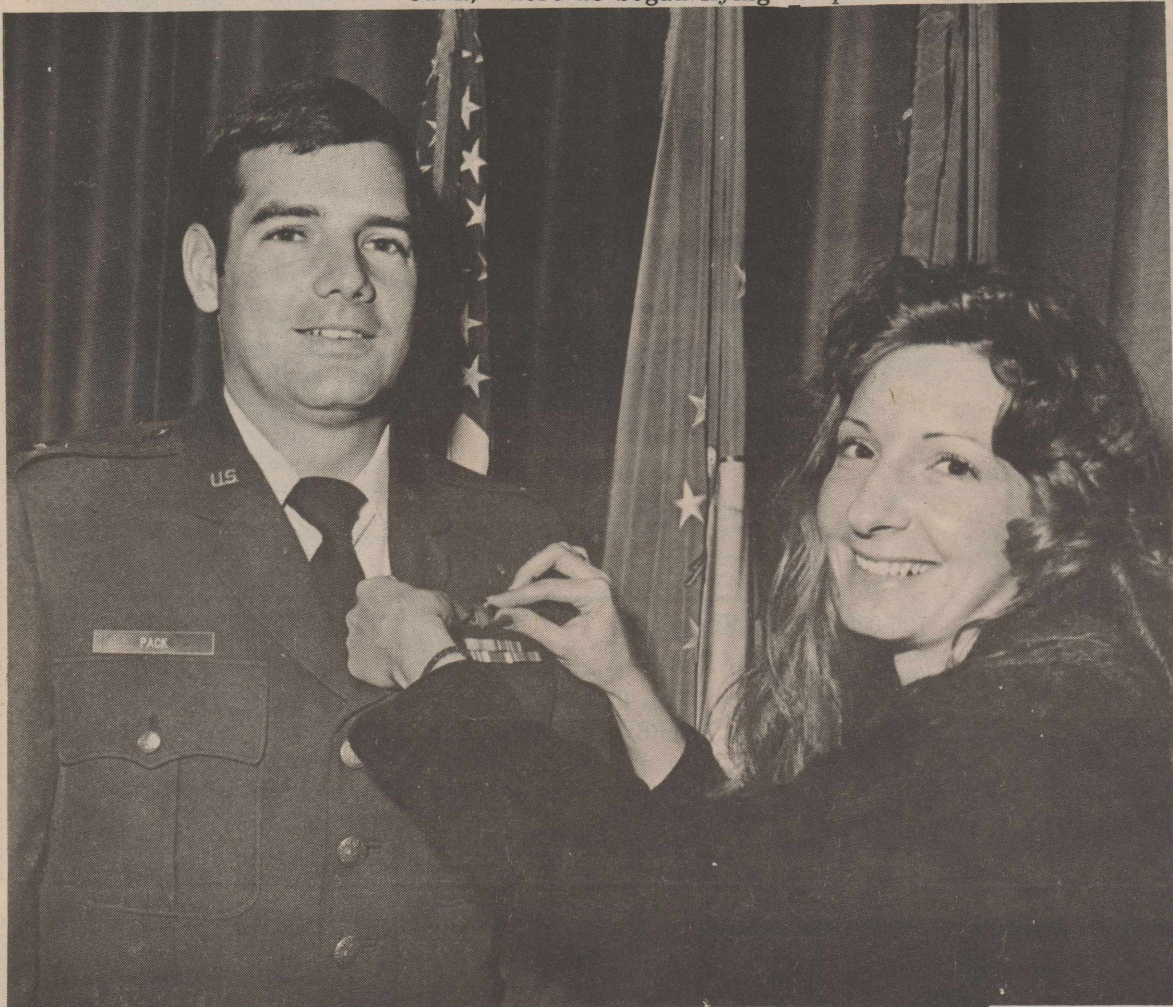
Distinguished Graduates in UPT Class 83-02 included 2nd Lts. James B. Coleman, Larry A. Cross and Eugene B. Imes.

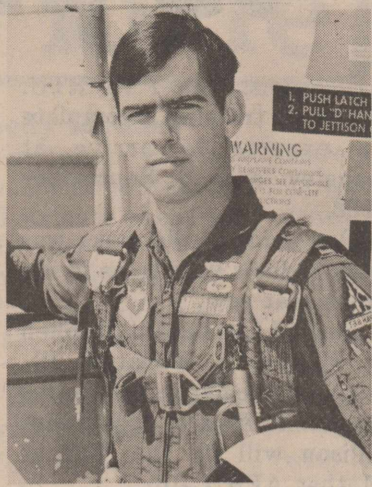

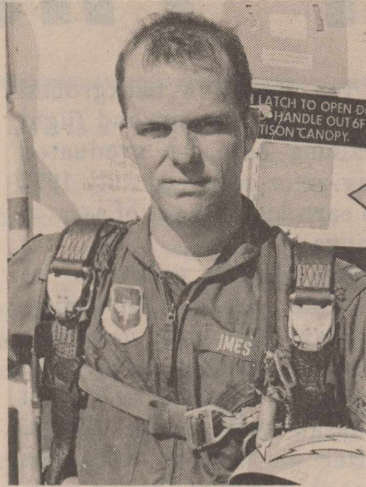

Dodds reminisced about her arrival in Germany explaining that she was there while they were constructing Ramstien. She also mentioned that at that time she became the chief of her unit working with both U.S. citizens and German nationals.

She must have enjoyed her West German Assignment, she spent 26 years there. That's not to say she took alot of time off for sick days to see the countryside, Dodds retires with almost two full years of sick leave days accrued.

Dodds and her husband Jim will remain in Lubbock after her retirement from federal service.

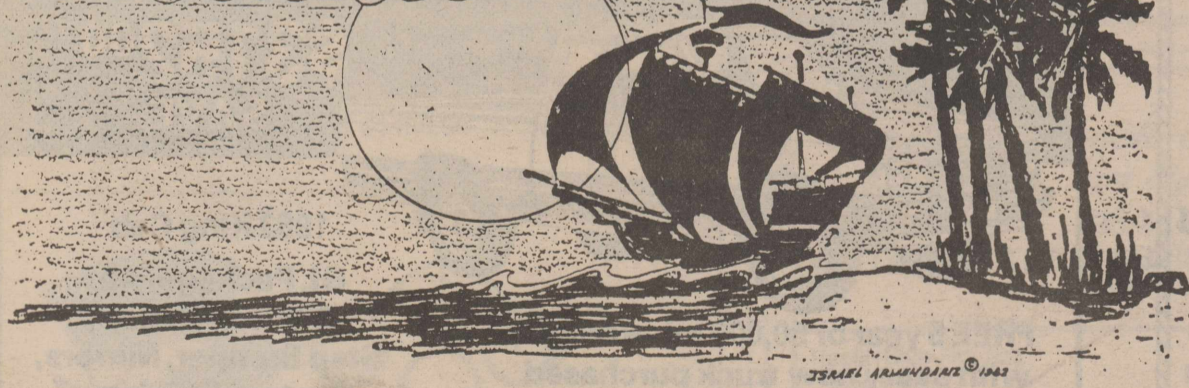

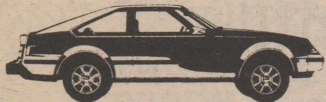

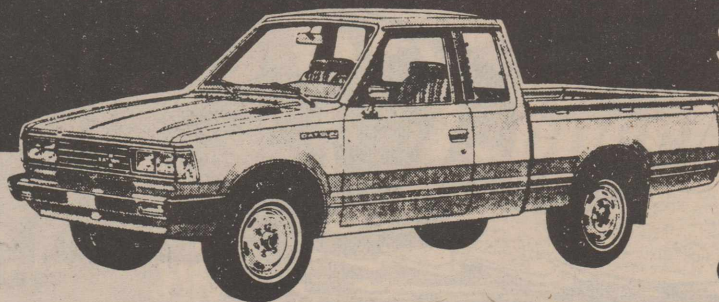

Denver City, Dimmitt win tourney

Two teams each won three straight games to rise to the tops of their respective divisions in last weekend's Eighth Annual Reese Christmas Classic basketball tournament.

Round Two opened Friday with a loser's bracket game between Canyon and Goddard, Goddard coming out on top 61-54. Kimball led Kermit to a 72-51 win over Hale Center with his 31 points, Big Spring beat Roswell 62-46 led by All-Tournament pick

Jerald Wrightsil's 25 points, Lorenzo blasted Clyde 79-59, Slaton beat Frenship 71-63, Denver City downed Lubbock Christian 62-53, Dimmitt leveled Brownfield 85-54 and high-scoring Morton drove

Arlington Heights from the gym with a 106-49 rout. Four Morton players scored in double figures, with All-Tournament pick Robert Johnson and Donald Kuehler leading the way with 26 each.
