I want to share this with you as my friend Rick, who cares, shared it with me. **No More Resolutions**



Does AAFES make a profit?

Does the Army and Air Force Exchange Service make a profit? If so, what does the exchange service do with its earnings? Both are recurring questions, exchange service officials report. They point out that there is a profit. In fact, in fiscal 1981, the exchange service earned \$183.7 million on sales of more than \$4.2 billion. Earnings were 4.71 percent of sales. In fiscal 1981, \$92 million was contributed to Army and Air Force morale, welfare and recreation activities for sports equipment and uniforms, gyms, hobby shops, tennis courts, softball diamonds, swimming pools, recreation centers, squadron picnics and other functions. The remaining earnings were spent for renovation, construction, equipment and expansion projects to serve customers, officials added.

BAS can be paid even while TDY

Air Force directives allow finance units to pay all enlisted members their BAS while they are TDY. BAS is paid through the TDY member's paycheck. The BAS payments are based on the period of TDY. For example:


TDYs less than 30 days mean the member gets paid after the TDY and after completion of the appropriate voucher which is processed by the finance's Travel Pay Section.

TDYs lasting 30 days or more entitle the member to BAS payment even while TDY. The start and stop dates are determined by the travel orders. When the TDY member files their voucher, then the Military Pay Section makes adjustments for over-payments and under-payments.

Over-payments happen if a member's TDY is suddenly shortened, military pay has no way to know when it happens. All together, it takes prompt filing to insure good customer service and correct BAS payments.





she performed her duties as a position classification specialist.


Her next assignment lead her to duty in Okinawa where she performed her classification duties.


