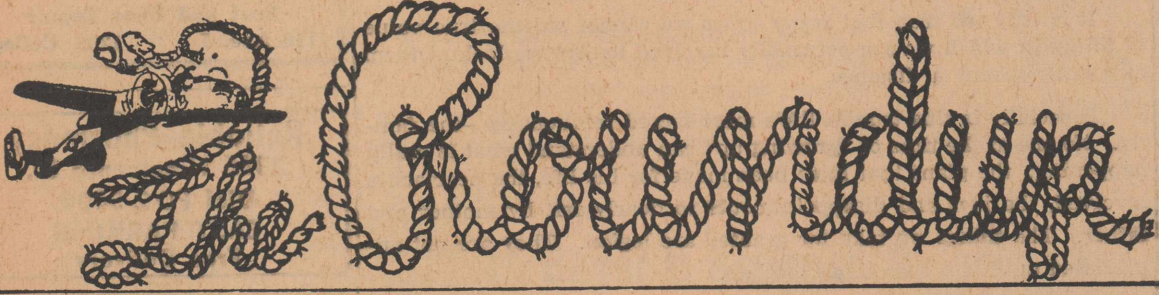

April Reveals Few Accidents; Safety Stressed

April marked a high spot in the Reese AFB ground safety program in that there were no disabling civilian accidents and no government vehicle accidents, Joe Lopez, ground safety technician, said Thursday. These two areas for many months had been the "bad spots" in the base safety record, he said.

Lopez added that there were no private vehicle accidents during April among military personnel and that two disabling accidents to military brought loss of 11 days. The accident cost for the month was \$526.36, a figure slightly higher than most months lately, but considered "fairly good," Lopez commented.

"We have entered a two-month period which can make or break a base," the ground safety technician said. "May includes Memorial Day holiday, while vacations start in June, when school is out. These two months are the "killer months" for the Air Force safety efforts, all too often."

He added that the Memorial Day period marks the start of "Operation Summer Safety", a campaign which brought praise and credit to Reese last year because base personnel marked up an accident-free record.

"Vacation time brings a sharp increase in private vehicle and swimming accidents," Lopez pointed out. "Reese last year fared well in these fields. I just hope everyone is as proud of our record and aims this year. Our base has established a safety reputation and each squadron seems to be alert to upholding that reputation. Right now is the time when we all face the sharpest test."

It also was pointed out that squadron commanders this week were instructed by Col. C. P. West, base commander, to take corrective action against personnel violating traffic laws and regulations. It was noted that Reese military and civilian personnel had been speeding and driving recklessly between the base and Lubbock. Special emphasis was placed on proper driving on War Highway 5.

Polio Shots

WASHINGTON (AFPS)—The Defense Department has announced that no plans have been made as yet to inoculate servicemen with the Salk polio vaccine.

The DOD statement followed reports that the vaccine might be administered to members of the Armed Forces during 1956.

However, the DOD said the vaccine soon would be available to military dependents overseas between the ages of six months and 16 years.

RAFB Personnel Fly Six Months Without A Crash

Another accident-free month was added at the end of April to the Reese AFB flying safety record of over six months without a crash, Col. C. P. West, base commander, said this week. The last accident was October 26 when a student on a night flight made an improper landing and damaged an aircraft.

Colonel West was quick to commend all personnel of the base for their part in the program.

"It is with great pleasure that I note the excellent record achieved by the pilots of this base for having flown six consecutive months without an aircraft accident," the colonel said.

"I feel that this record could not have been accomplished without the excellent support and supervisory control in maintaining our aircraft in the best possible condition, without efforts of the individual instructor pilots and supervisors and their interest shown in the accident prevention program, without cooperation of every student officer and cadet, or unless everyone on the base had made his or her contribution.

"It is gratifying to see people accomplishing their job so well. Each of us must extend every effort to maintain the fine record."

Reese pilots have averaged about 10,000 flying hours a month in establishing the record.

New Purchasing Plan Eliminates Much Paper Work, Impatience

Paper work and impatience are eliminated in the Air Force plan for local purchase, Col. C. P. West, base commander, said this week.

Civilians selling small supplies to Reese AFB are paid at the time the purchases are made, he pointed out, and as a result at least six different pieces of paper work are eliminated with each purchase.

Under the program, authorized case purchasing officers at Reese AFB and other bases may buy supplies for base organizations, with a maximum of \$100 expended with any one vender at one time.

Administration of the petty cash funds through which the local purchases are made is through the retail sales store purchasing and contract office, and hospital supply units on base, the colonel said.

In the past, he added, local purchases involved a purchasing

order, purchase request, receiving report, invoice, voucher, and check. The new system requires a cash purchase receipt and in some cases an informal purchase request.

Besides eliminating a bulk of paper work, the petty cash purchase procedure does away with the sometimes drawn-out periods during which local merchants waited for payment, since payments now are made at the time of purchase, Colonel West said.

Major General G. P. Disosway, FTAF commander, paid a routine visit to the base Friday, April 29, spending only a couple of hours with the base commander, Col. C. P. West, before proceeding on further business.

M-Sgts. Mouchett, Boydston To Become Warrant Officers

A couple of master sergeants at Reese AFB—Clyde Mouchett and Ester Boydston—soon will become warrant officers.

Col. C. P. West, base commander, early this week was directed to notify the two non-commissioned officers they had been selected for appointment in the regular Air Force as WO-1 and to seek acceptance of the appointment. Both

Mouchett and Boydston accepted promptly, took necessary physical examination and this weekend were awaiting further word on when they will take their oaths. Indications were that the change of grade will become effective this month, although there may be delay. All new warrant officers will move up before the end of the fiscal year, June 30, under the announced program.

Sergeant Mouchett is an original member of the 3500th Pilot Training wing who came to Reese AFB when the base was re-activated, arriving October 3, 1949.

The sergeant has been in continuous service since December 4, 1941, serving during World War II in combat intelligence in the Air Corps attached to General Patton's army and commanded by him. Mouchett moved through eleven countries with Patton.

Sergeant Mouchett was assigned to personnel work in the Army when the Air Force became a separate organization in 1947, and he's been engaged in personnel matters since, serving at Reese AFB as chief of both the officer's and airmann's branches, as chief clerk of the personnel section, and as wing personnel sergeant major.

The sergeant's wife, the former Juanita Parkinson of Shreveport, La., is secretary to the provost marshal, the same position she held at Barksdale AFB when she met her husband. They have a daughter, Sarah, 29 months.

Sergeant Boydston has been in service nine years and has been assigned to Reese AFB as supply supervisor for the 3502nd Flight Line Maintenance squadron since March, 1954, when he returned from Korea.

The sergeant, from Jones, Okla., was assigned to the advisory group for Korea, filling an officer's slot. His duties on the 10-month tour had him working with the Korean Air Force, supervising

Sgt. Louie Evers, Last Of 3 Bros. To Leave Reese

Once there were three, now there are none of the Evers airmen stationed at Reese AFB. M/Sgt. Louie T. Evers left this week for French Morocco and duty at Nouasseur.

The sergeant came to Reese AFB in September, 1949, when the base was being re-activated and has been on duty since. He became a member of the 3500th Pilot Training wing when it was activated at Barksdale AFB in 1947 and moved with the wing to this base.

In 1951-52 the sergeant had his two brothers, M/Sgt. Lewis C. Evers, a finance specialist, and T/Sgt. Oral L. Evers, a supply specialist, also stationed at Reese AFB. But Oral left within a short time for Alaska and Lewis was shipped to Korea. Lewis came back after a year, left the service and then promptly reenlisted at Reese AFB. He left again a couple of weeks ago for duty in Germany. He left from the east coast on Thursday and Oral arrived on the west coast from Alaska on Saturday, prohibiting another reunion of the brothers by two days. Oral came to Lubbock to visit briefly before reporting to Laughlin AFB, Del Rio, and in a few days his brother, Louie, took off for French Morocco.

"We just don't seem to get together for long," Sergeant Louie commented.

M/Sgt. Louie Evers at Reese was assigned to the wing inspector's office. Then he moved over to serve as steward at the Officers Club, then to quality control for a year, and for the past six months he was first sergeant of headquarters squadron section, M&S group. The sergeant also was president of the Reese Federal Credit union two years, aiding in its growth.

Sergeant Evers, native of Arkansas, entered active service in 1940. He served 37 months in the European theater during World War II, winning decorations.

Why Buy Bonds?

Another Savings Bond drive started this week at Reese AFB with a goal of 1,000 persons agreeing to monthly purchases set. Those spearheading the campaign are pointing out what a wonderful opportunity is offered for all base personnel to save; and some persons are bowing their necks to say "no" to the persons who seek to get their signatures on the agreement to buy Savings Bonds regularly.

Now as to both sides of the picture! Those Reese personnel who don't buy bonds regularly will have more money to spend for other things each month, and they will get their full checks each payday, without deductions for bonds. They also will be likely to reach old age if they continue their policy—without much, if any, backlog.

On the other side, those personnel who set aside something each payday for a Savings Bond will arrange their affairs to spend less each payday and when old age arrives they will have something to live on. Statistics show that of 100 proud men who start out to make a fortune at 21 years of age, 16 will die before they are 65. That leaves 84 persons who reach 65. Of these, one will have an income of over \$10,000 a year, and three will have incomes of \$5,000 to \$10,000, or a comfortable income. Then there will be 32 who will have enough to live on, say \$1,000 to \$4,000 a year. Another 32 will be poor, with less than \$1,000 a year, and 16 will be destitute, with nothing.

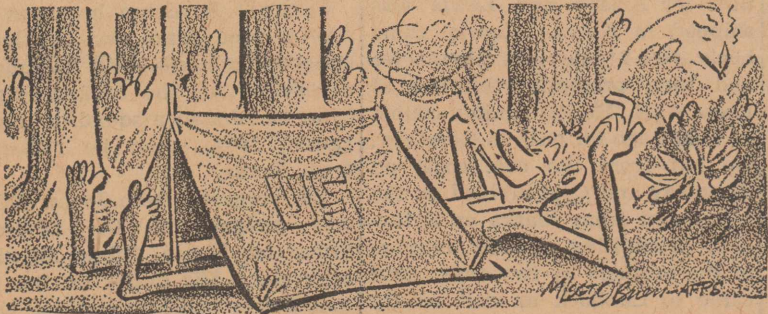
Now those 32 poor folks and 16 destitute persons did not plan to be failures—they just failed to make plans.

The 1955 Savings Bond campaign at Reese Air Force Base offers an excellent opportunity for all personnel to make and carry out plans—plans for a better future. A good newspaper presents facts. Those facts, in this instance, seem to add up to one thing—it's smart business to buy Savings Bonds, particularly when it is so easy to set aside money every payday for purchase, even if the sum is small.

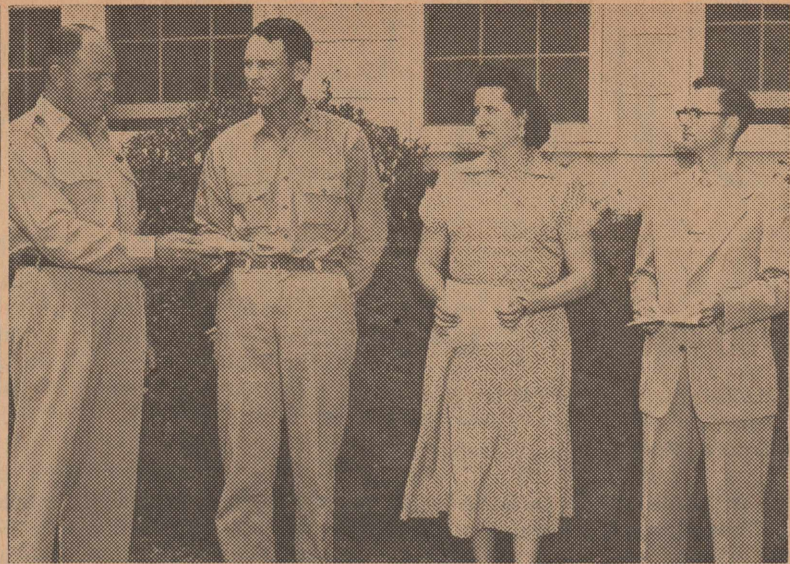

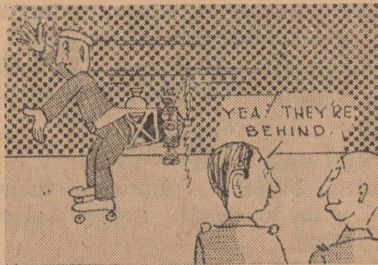
Since progress is a never ending process, Class 55P has taken over the positions and responsibilities of the first class, so well handled by their predecessors.

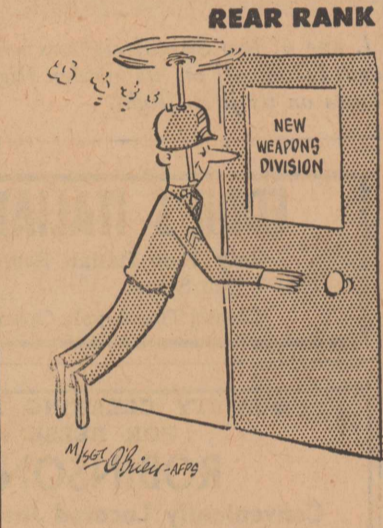

All servicemen able to meet USAF standards on the tests are presented diplomas which are equivalent to a high school diploma.

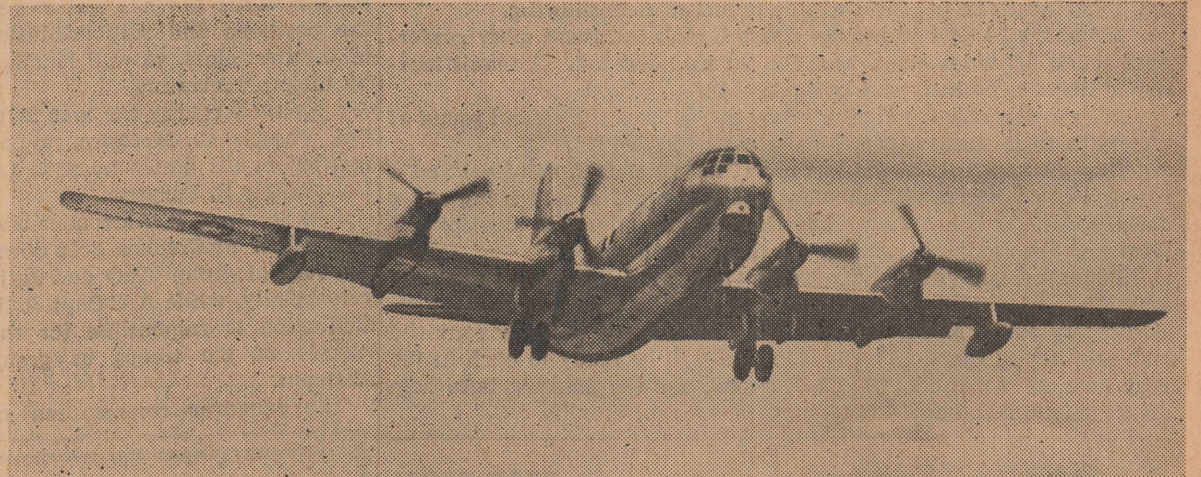
Tests for non-high school graduates are composed of five divisions, English, social science, natural science, mathematics, and literature, Reeves stated.

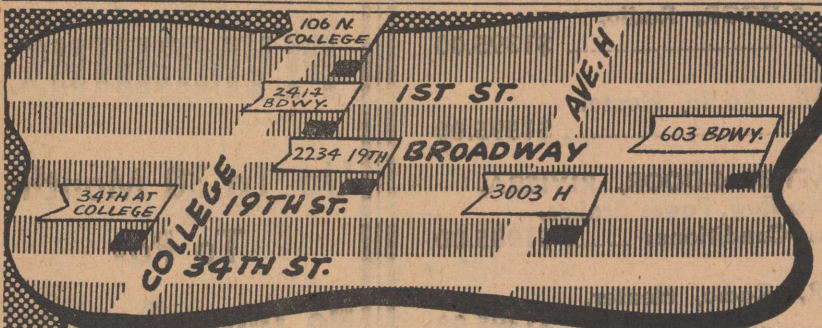
