

# 65 Will Receive Wings As Class 55-N Graduates Monday

D. M. Wiggins, executive vice president of the Citizens National Bank of Lubbock, will be the speaker Monday morning when Class 55-N is graduated from the Reese multi-engine pilot training program in exercises at 9 o'clock in the base theater.

The class will include 60 young men who trained as aviation cadets and five student officers. Members of the class will complete 13 months of flying training, the past six of which were spent at Reese AFB in the basic phase of training.

Dr. Wiggins will be presented by Col. Murray W. Crowder, Jr., wing executive officer, who also will award silver pilot wings to graduates. Maj. Tobias Schindler, commander of the 3500th Student Squadron, is to preside and administer the oath to the aviation cadets when they are commissioned second lieutenants. Lt. Col. William K. Pfingst will assist in awarding wings and Chaplain (1st Lt.) Henry N. Dunkel is to give the invocation and benediction. The Reese Volunteer band, directed by 1st Lt. Theodore Dahlfors, will play.

Among graduates is Capt. James T. Lokey, 1944 graduate of Lubbock high school and 1949 graduate of Texas Tech. The captain, who lives with his family at 2510 Thirty-fifth street, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. K. Lokey, 3314

Twenty-second street. He is a veteran of World War II.

Seven members of Class 55-N at Reese AFB have been named Distinguished Cadets on the basis of achievements in training and will receive special recognition at the class graduation Monday, Col. C. P. West, base commander, said.

The seven are Cadets Donald L. Bongfeldt, Van Nuys, Cal.; Robert V. Davis, Indianapolis, Ind.; Ray F. Fox, Claremore, Okla.; Therman E. Frazier, Tonkaway, Okla.; Lynn S. They will be eligible for special consideration for regular Air Force commissions for their leadership in flying, academic, and military training.

## AF On Display Armed Forces Day, May 21

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## How Would You Boost Morale?

(EDITORIAL)

There isn't one of us who doesn't find himself in a position of leadership at one time or another. And always, even when we are in a position of leadership, we are subject to some kind of discipline. Always, while we are leading and being led, we are concerned about morale—other people's and our own.

These words of wisdom about discipline and morale, published in a recent *Air Provost Marshal Digest*, should interest every reader of this paper:

"Too many people make the mistake of believing that high morale depends mostly on the presence of USO shows, elaborate layrooms, beer parties, dancing girls, moving pictures, and other facilities for being entertained in idleness.

Desirable morale may be enhanced by such factors but it assuredly does not depend solely on them. Morale is at its highest not when men are reclining in the lap of luxury, but when they're doing something they like to do...

"Morale and discipline go hand in hand... you can't have the one without the other... The state of morale makes the difference between maintaining or enforcing discipline. And if you can't maintain obedience and proper conduct without continually resorting to force, then something is wrong with your ability as a leader.

"The most important element of leadership and the one most difficult of attainment is this: give your men a goal and make them want to reach it. If they can see the reason for what they're doing and if they realize its importance, their morale will be high.

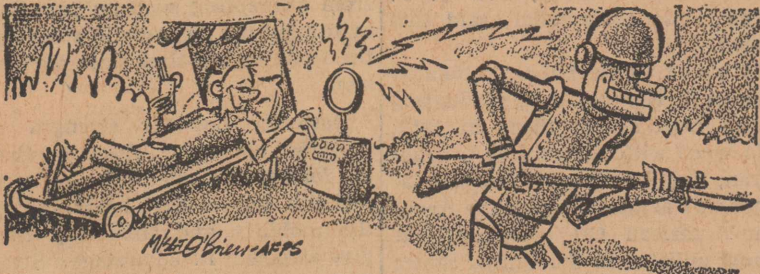
"Morale is enhanced by, but does not depend on material comforts. It is enhanced, too, by the knowledge that the man or a team has triumphed over difficulties. If you want your men to be proud of themselves and their unit, let them know that they've conquered adversities that might have broken lesser men. And most important, let them know that you realize and appreciate it."

Today's machines, invented and built by man are the true marvels of our present day life.

But have you ever seen a machine that has courage? Or a machine that can provide inspiring leadership? Or one that can form a determination?

No, and the chances are you never will. Machines are man's servants, not his masters.



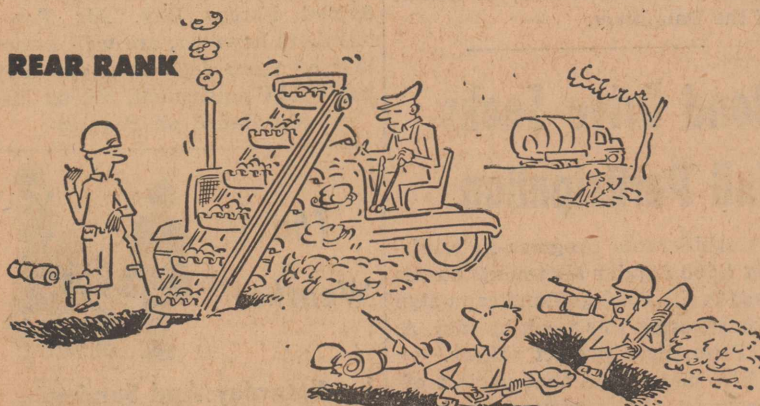
Some people have gone so far as to envision a time when wars, if they must occur, might be waged "untouched by human hands."

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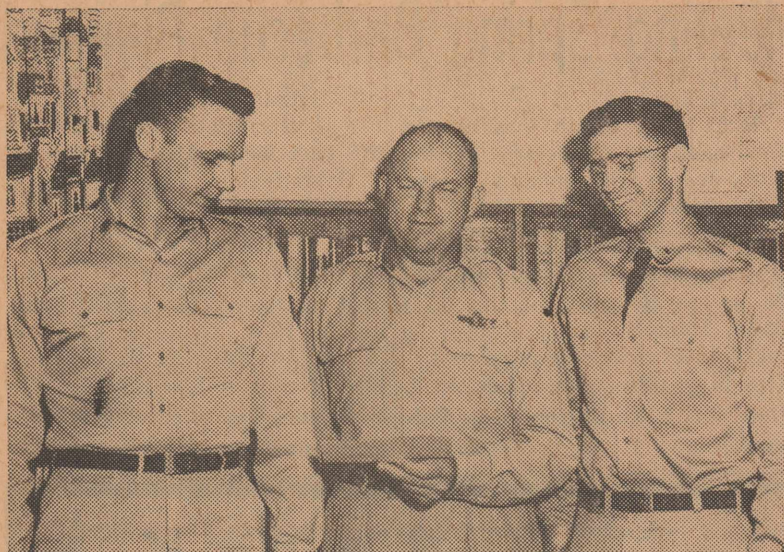

## Reese AFB Retains Second Place In ATC Ground Safety Contest

Reese AFB retained second place in the Air Training Command competition for \$25,000 in the Commanders Award for ground safety, but it slipped back a few points from first place latest statistics show, Capt. Bernie C. Mullins, ground safety officer said this week.

Latest statistics show Sampson AFB maintained its first place spot with an index of 2.015, while Reese AFB was second with 2.568, and McConnell AFB was third with 2.681. Ellington and Vance AFBs were in fourth and fifth places.

"The competition ends June 30; that means we are in the last go-around," Captain Mullins said. "There are only .444 points between second and fifth places and less than 1. between the top and fifth. Either of the bases in the first five places has a good chance to capture that \$25,000. Reese personnel have cooperated in fine shape, and we all hope that cooperation will continue. A lot of credit will come to Reese, a lot of publicity will occur, and a lot of satisfaction will come to all personnel if we can just keep our eyes and minds on safety so we will top all the 43 bases of ATC."

Latest statistics, he pointed out, show that Reese leads all ATC bases with the fewest private vehicle accidents and has moved from third to second in cost of military accidents. However, he said, Reese AFB is not in the first five in standings in civilian accident and USAF vehicle accidents.

## Nautilus To Sea On Shakedown Cruise

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — The latest addition to the Navy's Atlantic Fleet, the atomic powered submarine USS Nautilus, is now underway on a six-weeks shakedown cruise.

The Nautilus, which was officially turned over to the Navy April 22, 1955, following an extensive test period, will visit San Juan, Puerto Rico, on her maiden naval voyage. She will return to New London, Conn., sometime in June.

With the exception of a few technical observers, the Nautilus will not carry any extra passengers on the routine cruise. The public will not be allowed aboard at any port of call, the Navy also said.

The Nautilus already had steamed more than 4,000 miles on nuclear propulsion, both surfaced and submerged, and has made more than 80 dives. She was placed on commission on Sept. 30, 1954.

Major Prim said that up to this week 449 bonds were being purchased regularly by Reese AFB personnel, with 15 percent participating. The breakdown by units showed:

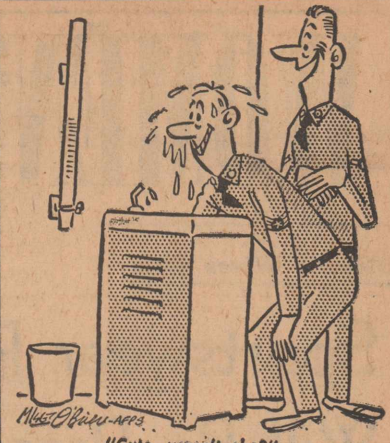

## Long Time Reserves May Be Retained

Air Force Reserve officers scheduled to be released for total commissioned service (28 or 30 years total active and inactive service) under the Reserve Officers Personnel Act (ROPA) may be retained on extended active duty in a temporary appointment. According to Hqs USAF this retention is a temporary measure which may be terminated or extended as a result of Congressional

action on amendments to ROPA presently under consideration. In no event will retention on EAD beyond the statutory age be permitted.

### Servicemen Able To Cancel Allotments

WASHINGTON. (AFPS) — The Joint Military Pay and Allowance Committee has ruled that enlisted men may now ask their respective services to cancel class "Q" allotments if their wives are found guilty of marital misconduct.

The committee also ruled that an allotment can now be stopped if the spouse should waive her right to support.

In the past, EM could not cancel a class "Q" until such time as they were granted a final divorce decree or were legally separated.

Under the new policy, if a man can furnish evidence of adultery or desertion without cause, the allotment will be stopped. The committee said such evidence must be "conclusive and irrefutable."

In the event that children are involved, EM cannot cancel their allotment under any circumstances but may change it.

Application for stopping allotments are processed through local finance offices on DD Form 234.

### Travel Reg. Gives Rules For Mileage To Trailer Owners

An amendment to Joint Travel Regulations will clarify the section in the new pay law which allows Air Force military families living in trailers a mileage allowance for moving their mobile homes on change of station in the Z. I.

Instructions for payment of this mileage allowance by AF finance officers will be contained in the amendment to the Joint Travel Regulations and will be made public as soon as the AF and the other services determine how much it costs to move a trailer, as well as other factors involved.

Under the law, AF military families who move on PCS by trailer any time after April 1, 1955, will be entitled to this transportation allowance, but payment will not be authorized until instructions have been approved and released by Hqs USAF in a change to the Joint Travel Regulations.

For those who make their home in a trailer, the mileage allowance is permitted in lieu of transportation of baggage and household effects. It is an alternate benefit to the dislocation allowance of an additional month's basic allowance for quarters, also permitted on PCS under the new pay law. An AF family will not be entitled to both a dislocation allowance and trailer allowance.

## New Insignia Is Developed For AF Physicians, Dentists

has been developed and approved for use by Air Force Medical Service physicians and dentists in the near future.

Major General Dan C. Ogle, Surgeon General of the Air Force, announced that the new insignia will enable AF doctors and dentists to be identified more readily. At present they wear no identification of their profession. Flight surgeons will continue to wear their wing insignia.

The new insignia is a small silver badge about the size of a quarter with a caduceus, or serpent, entwined on a staff and mounted in its center. The dental badge is identical to the one to be worn by doctors except for a "D" superimposed on the caduceus. The insignia will be worn above the left breast pocket. Use of the serpent as a medical symbol dates back to the 13th Century, B.C., with the A new medical insignia design

tradition of Aesculapius, recognized as the Father of Medicine.

The distinctive new insignia was developed by the Heraldic Section of the Air Force under the guidance of Brigadier General Otis O. Benson Jr., a flight surgeon with the AF Medical Service.

The insignia is not in production as yet. It will be several months before exact specifications are released as yet. It will be several months before exact specifications are released to manufacturers.

### House Committee Began Housing Discussions

The House Armed Services Committee began hearings May 4 on additional family housing being sought for Air Force members by Secretary Talbott and other AF officials. Air Force officials are scheduled to appear before the Committee during the week of May 9.

Family housing is included in the military construction authorization proposal for fiscal 1956, already submitted to Congress. It calls for more than 8,000 additional AF family housing units, as well as a review of all family housing in the AF.

Earlier during this session of Congress both Secretary Talbott and General Twining appeared before the Senate Armed Services Committee to make strong appeals for more and better family housing for AF members.

### AF Strength Rises

Total numerical strength of the Armed Forces showed a decrease of 53,312 at last count according to the Department of Defense.

Strength on March 31, 1955, based on preliminary reports, was 3,106,389. Figures represent full-time military personnel, including Regulars, Reserves on continuous active duty, and cadets and midshipmen.

Air Force strength on March 31 was estimated at 957,430 compared to 955,866 on February 28.

### AF Institute Of Technology

## Officers Encouraged To Enroll

Officers who are interested in attending the Institute of Technology will welcome the clarification of the entrance requirements by the Dean of Admissions of the institute, J. F. Reeves, of the Base Education Office, stated recently.

The sixty semester hours required for admission may be obtained in the following manner: 1. 30 semester or 45 quarter hours of credits of at least "C" grade may be obtained through USAFI or from universities. 2. 24 semester or 36 quarter hours will be granted for passing the college GED Test. 3. 6 semester or 9 quarter hours of physical education and military experience credit will be given automatically to all officer applicants. 4. In the field of engineering, mathematics through integral calculus is required for entrance.

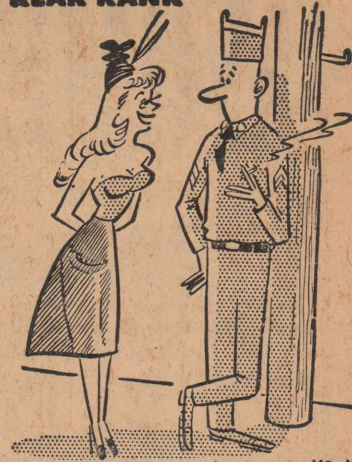
The Institute is encouraging officers who at this or some future time desire to make application for a USAF Institute of Technology program to do so immediately by requesting evaluation of their credits. If this is done, two things will be accomplished: 1. The officers will receive counseling and guidance and can therefore work

towards a definite goal insofar as USAF Institute of Technology programs are concerned. 2. By having the officer's application on file, he will be notified of any special quotas for which he may be eligible.

All officers, both college and high school graduates, are urged to request evaluation of their credits as quotas are available on both graduate and undergraduate levels.

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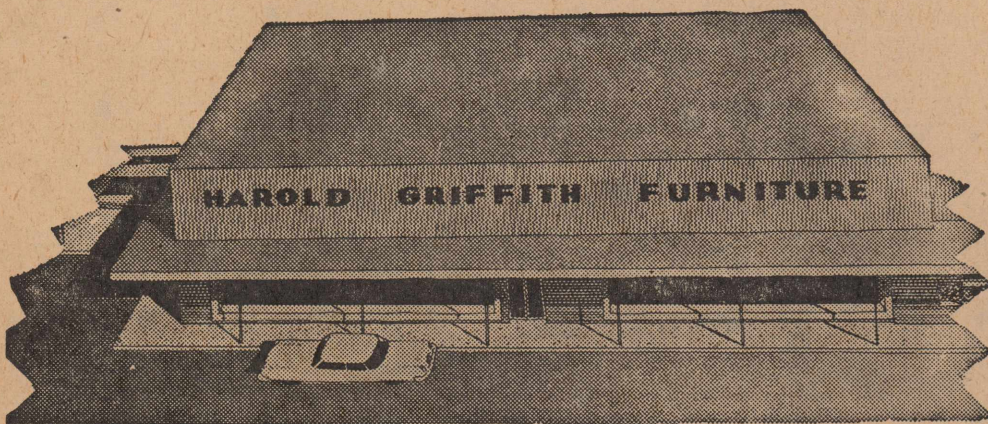

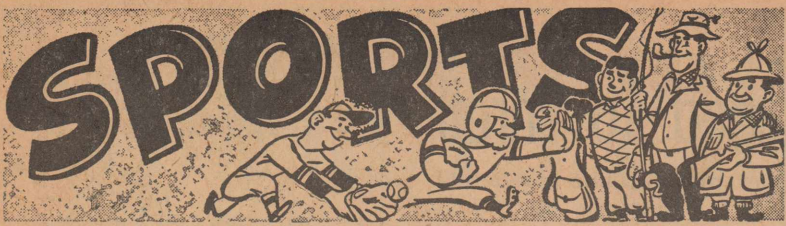

The manual is to be used as a handy reference guide for all USAF noncommissioned officers, and is expected to find its way into NCO schools for text and reference purposes.

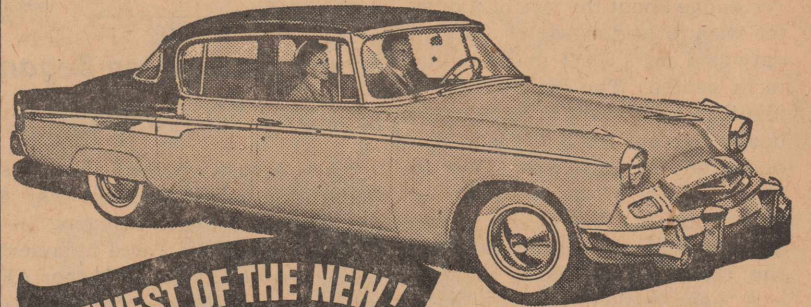

## It's A Fact

Q. When was the Air Force Created?

A. Actually, the Air Force had its beginning in 1907 as a small section of the Signal Corps. It functioned as a branch of the Army until September 19, 1947 when it was separated from the army, in accordance with the National Security Act of July 26, 1947.

Q. What is the personnel strength of the Air Force today?

A. The Air Force military strength was approximately 947,000 as of June 30, 1954.

Q. How big should the AF be?

A. The size and composition of the USAF must be based on its assigned mission, the weapons available to accomplish this mission and the size of the potential enemy. Under present conditions, our Air Force must be a force-in-being of a size sufficient to act as a deterrent to any potential aggressor, and provide a prompt and effective weapon capable of attaining decisive and ultimate victory in any war in which we might become engaged.

The AF Chief of Staff has stated that, in consideration of the above facts, the USAF requires 137 combat wings, plus supporting units, in order to accomplish its assigned mission.



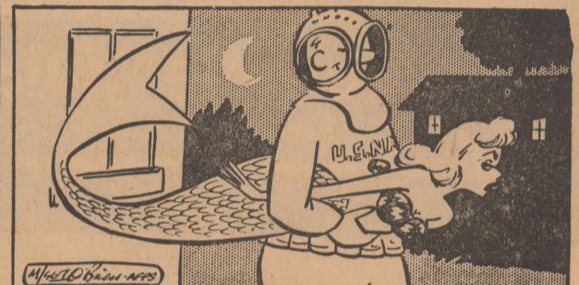

**Discharge Policy In Effect By June 1**

The short discharge policy for Airmen will probably be in effect AF-wide by June 1 or before, headquarters sources said this week. Before that date eligible airmen will want to do some close figuring.

For some, the re-up bonus will be a big attraction. But for many, it may mean trading future benefits for quick, and smaller bonus payments.

The short discharge policy is only one of the early release provisions which are going into new AFR 39-14. Release up to 90 days before normal separation will be allowed for airmen who are accepted by colleges and other schools. Airmen whose units are to be re-assigned within 90 days of their separation will be released only if it is proved cheaper than moving the airman for the remaining time, it was pointed out.
