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How Would You Boost Morale?

(EDITORIAL)

There isn't one of us who doesn't find himself in a position of leadership at one time or another. And always, even when we are in a position of leadership, we are subject to some kind of discipline. Always, while we are leading and being led, we are concerned about morale—other people's and our own.

These words of wisdom about discipline and morale, published in a recent Air Provost Marshal Digest, should interest every reader of this paper:

"Too many people make the mistake of believing that high morale depends mostly on the presence of USO shows, elaborate layrooms, beer parties, dancing girls, moving pictures, and other facilities for being entertained in idleness.

Desirable morale may be enhanced by such factors but it assuredly does not depend solely on them. Morale is at its highest not when men are reclining in the lap of luxury, but when they're doing something they like to do...

"Morale and discipline go hand in hand . . . you can't have the one without the other . . . The state of morale makes the difference between maintaining or enforcing discipline. And if you can't maintain obedience and proper conduct without continually resorting to force, then something is wrong with your ability as a leader.

"The most important element of leadership and the one most difficult of attainment is this: give your men a goal and make them want to reach it. If they can see the reason for what they're doing and if they realize its importance, their morale will be high.

"Morale is enhanced by, but does not depend on material comforts. It is enhanced, too, by the knowledge that the man or a team has triumphed over difficulties. If you want your men to be proud of themselves and their unit, let them know that they've conquered adversities that might have broken lesser men. And most important, let them know that you realize and appreciate it."

You Are the Master

Today's machines, invented and built by man are the true marvels of our present day life.

But have you ever seen a machine that has courage? Or a machine that can provide inspiring leadership? Or one that can form a determination?

No, and the chances are you never will. Machines are man's servants, not his masters.



Some people have gone so far as to envision a time when wars, if they must occur, might be waged "untouched by human hands."







THE HEALER by Frank G. Slaughter

"It was four o'clock in the morning. The young woman on the operating table was dying. Working with an electro-surgical scalpel deep within the cranial wound, Dr. Carter thought that he had switched from a cutting to a coagulating current. But the patient died.

The doctor was tormented with self-doubt. Had he been careless with human life? Only one person—Laura Jordan—his operating room nurse, could tell him. When she lost her memory in an accident he faced the most difficult decision of his career: would a shaken faith in the skill of his hands permit him to perform an operation to bring back Laura's memory and with it, perhaps the one fact that could expel him from the medical world forever?"

This is an intense fast-paced novel of professional competition.

MR. JONES, MEET THE MAS-TER by Peter Marshall



Servicemen Able To **Cancel Allotments**

WASHINGTON. (AFPS) - The Joint Military Pay and Allowance Committee has ruled that enlisted men may now ask their respective services to cancel class "Q" allotments if their wives are found guilty of marital misconduct.

The committee also ruled that an allotment can now be stopped if the spouse should waive her right to support.

In the past, EM could not cancel a class "Q" until such time as they were granted a final divorce decree or were legally separated.

Under the new policy, if a man can furnish evidence of adultery or desertion without cause, the allotment will be stopped. The committee said such evidence must be "conclusive and irrefutable."




New NCO Manual **Ready Next Fall**

A new "Noncommissioned Officers Manual" (AFM 39-3), to be published by Hqs USAF, is expected to be ready for Air-Force wide distribution early next fall.
