Bronze Star Award Received By Reese World War II Hero

A World War II decoration, the Bronze Star Medal, has caught up with M/Sgt. Joe Cardwell, first sergeant of headquarters squadron section, Air Base group at Reese Air Force Base.

The Bronze Star was pinned on the sergeant by Lt. Col. Quinn L. Oldaker, executive officer of the group, "for heroic achievement at a bomber base in France on the night of 26 December 1944."

The citation said that during a strafing attack by JU 88's, Sergeant Cardwell "courageously and with utter disregard for his own safety, assisted in moving a B-17 aircraft parked next to a burning B-24 bomber and despite exploding fuel tanks and belts of .50calibre machine gun ammunition and the ever present danger of a return of enemy attack, the bomber was removed to safety." It was stated further that the sergeant's action was largely responsible for saving a valuable aircraft.

Sergeant Cardwell came to Reese AFB in June, 1953, from duties as assistant sergeant major of Craig AFB, Ala. He was in serthree years in Europe and two years in Alaska. Sergeant Cardwell, his wife, and two daughters Sandra, 11, and Patricia, 8, live at 2611 30th Street, Lubbock.

WASHINGTON (AFPS) - The Air Force has announced plans to call to active duty about 3,900 officers commissioned last year un- in an interim change to AFM der the AFROTC program.

Of the total, about 3,500 are Air National Guard appointees obligated to serve 36 months on active duty. They will be called for service August 29.

The other 400 are already on active duty as airmen. The AF said these men will likely begin serving as officers in August, September and October.

If Congressional approval is given, funds to cover the move will be obtained by transferring a portion of the sum earmarked for Air National Guard activities to the

The AF also said that about 900 AFROTC graduates who have not yet been called to duty will be given the opportunity to enlist in the AF for two years. If they accept, they would be commissioned after 18 months.






