### Jet Aircraft Seen In Future For Reese AFB

The pilot training program at Reese will be accomplished in jet aircraft after about two years, Col. C. P. West, base commander, said this week he has been unofficially informed.

The colonel said unofficial information reaching him indicates that the three basic multi-engine pilot training bases — Reese, Vance, and Goodfellow — will be converted to jet bases, using T-33 type aircraft, during the 1958 fiscal year. Present United States Air Force plans call for the change in first quarter of fiscal year 1958, or Standish. (Air Force Photo.) during the summer of 1957, the colonel said unofficial sources advised him. The change at Vance AFB would come during the second quarter and at Goodfellow AFB, San Angelo, during the fourth quarter, it was said. Colonel West said the dates may be changed, depending on several elements.

## Why Have Reds Changed Tactics?

We think that you'll be as interested as we were in these observa tions on the world situation made recently by our USAF Vice Chief of Staff, General Thomas D. White, in Cleveland, Ohio:

The chances for peace seem better now than for many years.

Why do the Communists seem more willing to cooperate these days?

I believe it is their reaction to the strength the free world has achieved.

When we were weak, they grabbed and grabbed. Now that we are strong, they have slowed down. Apparently the cold war is not as successful for the Reds as they had hoped. True they have been building their military strength too, and their force is formidable. However, their weapons have been built at the cost of everything else. There is famine in China, and widespread food shortage in Russia. They cannot make enough consumer goods, and what they are able to produce is poorly made and overpriced.

This is in marked contrast to the free world. While we have been building up our defenses, our standard of living has continued to rise. We are prosperous.

From this standpoint, the Reds are losing ground in the cold war They have been forced to change their tactics.

Thus, while we hope and pray for a sincere change in Communist intentions, we must assume that their current attitude is designed for two purposes:

One, to gain time in which to build internal strength;

Two, to lull us into peaceful complacency. Perhaps they think we can be persuaded to withdraw from the positions of strength that we have achieved around the Communist bloc-the positions that now force them to hold their aggressive tendencies in check.

We should be convinced, once and for all, that our chances for peace and continued prosperity lie in strength. This is true now, and it will be true until the Reds undergo a real change in heart. We have seen the penalty of weakness all too often.

Whether their hopes for peace be sincere or not, the Communists become less aggressive when confronted with strength.

At this point let me make it clear that I am not discussing the pros and cons of disarmament. General disarmament is the goal all peaceloving nations are working toward, but I believe it can only come as the result of a sincere desire for peace and friendship among all nations.

So for the time being-and that may be a long time, our job is to stay strong.

### **AF** Aid Society To **Begin Fund Drive**

AF Aid Society, which last year disbursed \$2,576,568 in non-interest bearing loans and \$243,546 in grants, begins its annual membership campaign on July 27. Campaign ends on 9 August.

More than 30,000 Air Force members and their dependents were aided by the Society in emergencies last year. This year, according to Society officials, the assistance program may cost more than three million dollars.







The afternoon entertainment gave the cadets a chance to turn the tables on their commanding officers and mimick some of their actions. It provided a welcome re-




