

Bernal FTAF Rodeo Winner; Base Team High Point Scorer

Reese AFB outscored 13 other Air Force Rodeo Competition at James Connally AFB, Waco, Texas, last week.

2nd Lt. Henry J. Eykelhoff, 3500th Motor Vehicle Squadron Maintenance officer and project officer for the Rodeo, reported that Reese AFB drivers amassed the highest number of points, 1608 out of a possible 2250, of all FTAF bases, while winning first place in one event and second in another.

Top With Sedan

First place winner in the sedan event was A/1C Juan M. Bernal, 3500th Motor Vehicle Squadron. He had a total of 412 out of a possible 450 points, which was the high individual score for the entire competition.

S/Sgt. Jack V. Ming, with a score of 338, took second place in the bus event, Lieutenant Eykelhoff said.

As a team, Reese AFB drivers did an excellent job, the lieutenant said. There were 14 bases represented at the meet, and Reese took sixth place or better in every

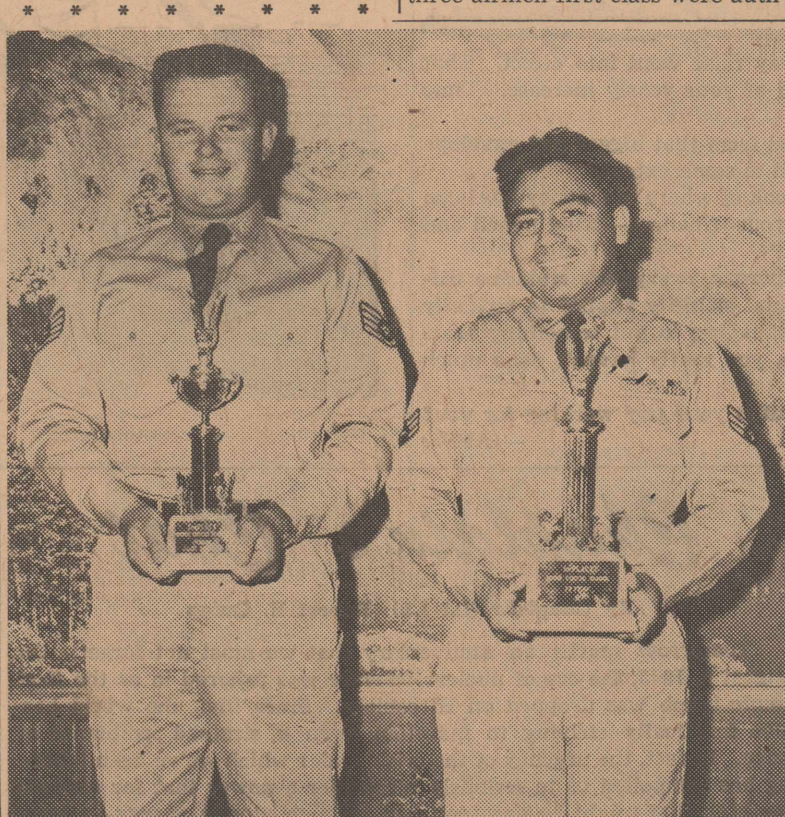
Academics Director Leaves For College AFROTC Position

Base Promotion Quotas Given For August-September Period

Squadron and wing promotion boards were busy this week preparing to give additional stripes to 144 airmen, five more than for June.

The August promotion quotas gave Reese AFB one master sergeant, the same as two months ago; two technical sergeants, just half the total for June; and 18 staff sergeants, one less than two months ago. The increases came in the two lower grades. Fifty-three airmen first class were auth-

orized, as against 51 for June, and 70 airmen second class were put in the quota, as compared with 64 two months ago.

Promotions this month will be handled the same as in the past. Squadrons will name lower grade airmen to get additional stripes, while wing boards will select the NCO's.

The second largest airman promotion quota in the last three years has been authorized by Hqs USAF for August-September cycle. Total spaces for the two months are 55,975.

This is the highest quota this year and on the top authorization since the 56,256 set for the cycle which began in December, 1954.

The spaces authorized also top by more than 6,000 the quota of 49,850 for the June-July cycle.

Most of the increase in the August-September cycle is spaces for airmen second class. Airmen first class also show an increase.

With the exception of staff sergeant, all promotions are subject to career field vacancies. In some crowded AFSCs, exceptions may be made for staff sergeants in this cycle, as in the two previous ones.

AF Secretary Talbott Resigns Position

Harold E. Talbott has resigned as secretary of the Air Force with effective date to be August 13. He took this action in a letter to president Eisenhower August 1, stating "My service to you, and our country, and to our Air Force has given me more satisfaction than anything in my life."

He gave his reason for resignation as the recent publicity given to his continued association with a management — engineering firm, stating, "I am clear in my mind and conscience that my actions have been within the bounds of ethics. This connection has never influenced me, or interfered in the slightest with the discharge of my responsibilities as Secretary of the Air Force."

President Eisenhower accepted Talbott's resignation with regret, stating "Your decision to resign, of course, has been a difficult one for you, because there has been no intimation that your official duties have not been effectively and loyally performed. I know full well and appreciate deeply the tireless energy and effort you have given to the Air Force. Under your leadership, it has become even stronger in the defense of our nation. Your diligence in the administration of your department has been unexcelled on behalf of our people and their government. I commend you for your fine accomplishment as Secretary."

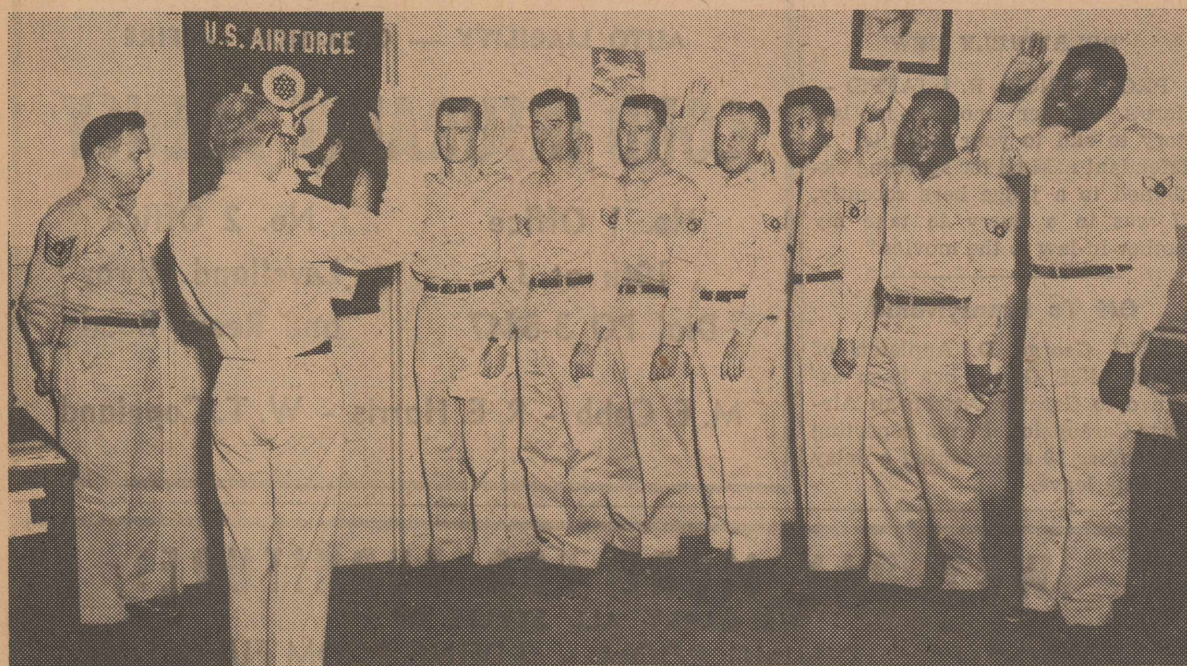

USAF Approves New WO Insignia Of Rank

Specifications for the new insignia for AF Warrant Officers have been approved by Hqs USAF and are being released to manufacturers.

The insignia are expected to be on sale at AF base exchanges and through commercial sources in late August or September. Cut-off date for wearing the old insignia is January 1, 1956.

Specifications were delayed because some manufacturers erroneously used the wrong shade of blue in early insignia. Correct shade is described as a medium blue.

Generally, the bars for the four statutory grades approved by Congress last year will be as follows:

Warrant Officer, W-1 — blue background split by single gold bar.

Chief Warrant Officer, W-2 — same background split by two gold bars.

Chief Warrant Officer, W-3 — same background split by single silver bar.

Chief Warrant Officer, W-4 — same background split by two silver bars.

The Air Force has approximately 4,000 Warrant Officers on active duty. This number includes 396 master sergeants who were given permanent W. O. rating in June.

Top participating squadrons in the drive are 3501st Maintenance with \$145, and Hq. Sq. PTW with \$101.

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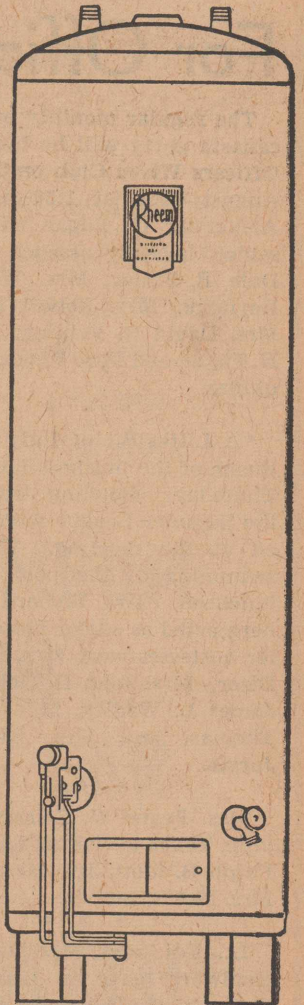



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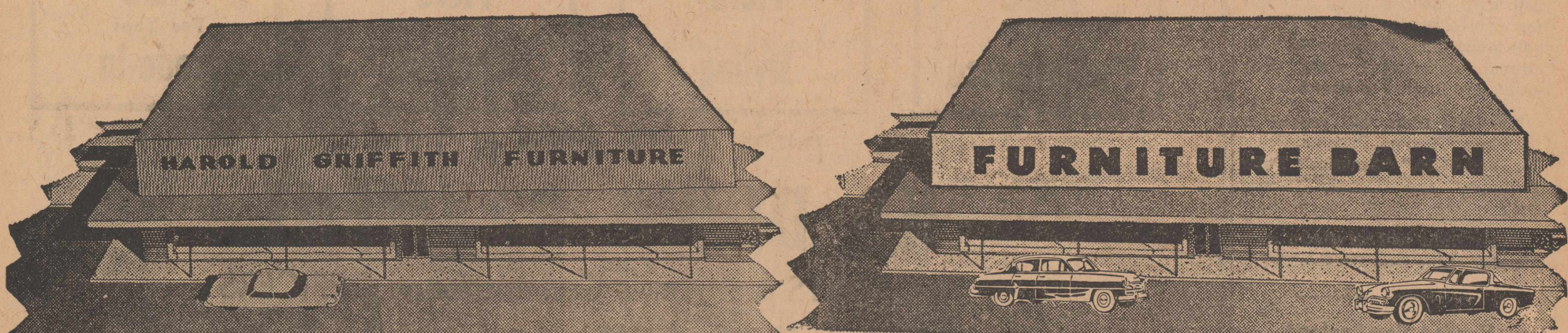

Representatives from the Legion post will be in the Reese BX from 1-2:30 p.m., Wednesday, August 10, and Monday, August 15, to sell tickets.

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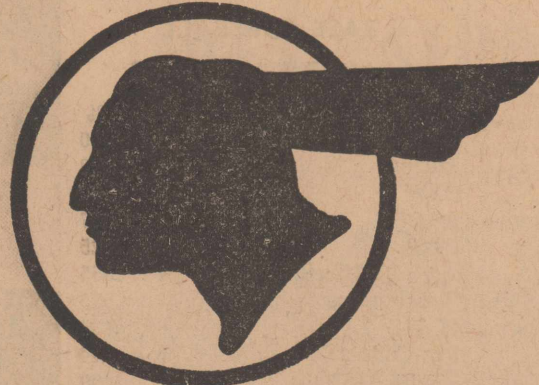

The Reese AFB team goes into the tournament with a record of 21 and 6 losses. Eleven of the team's wins were shut-outs.

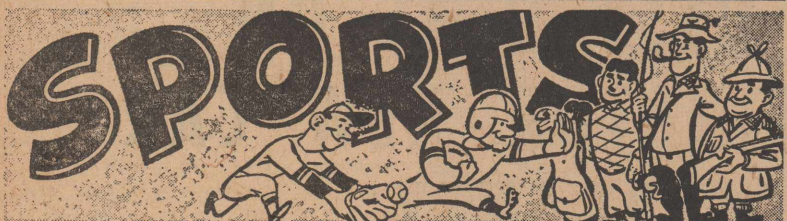

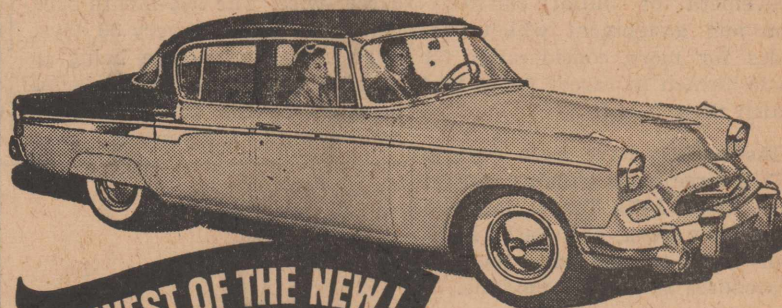
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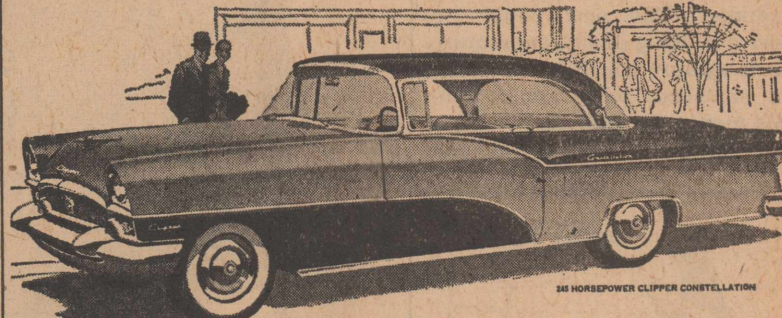

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AF Improves Basic Career Field Selections

USAF has announced an improvement of initial classification and assignment which provides for more consideration for basic airmen in career fields that match their talent.

Instructions have been sent to ATS's three basic training centers—Lackland AFB, Texas; Sampson AFB, New York; and Parks AFB, California—to implement the new procedures as soon as possible.

This action provides a greater backlog of positions to which personnel are classified for initial assignment. Under present methods the training centers use weekly quotas. All basic airmen in a given week's class are assigned at the end of the week in which they graduate. The new policy provides a backlog of 60 days requirements against which basic airmen are matched with assignments. This means the individual will be more likely to be assigned in a

job in which he will succeed career-wise. The two-month backlog will be revised every 30 days.

Training centers are being instructed to consider four principal qualities of the basic airman in making initial assignments. These

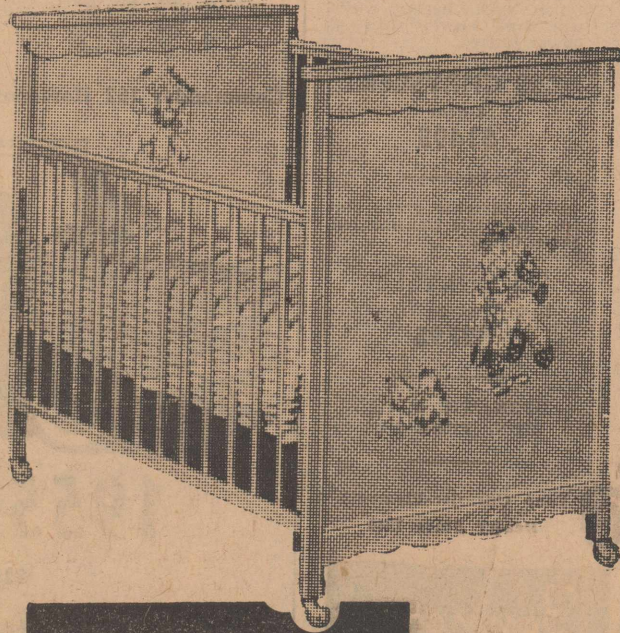
four are: (a) interest, (b) experience, (c) education, and (d) aptitude. In the past, because quotas had to be met weekly, often only one factor, such as aptitude, was emphasized. Now consideration of all four is required.

This change is in line with the AF's efforts to take every possible action to improve the initial classification assignment, which is to the advantage of the AF as well as to the individual. This will enable training centers to hold exception-

ally well qualified airmen until they fit an assignment to their best advantage and where they're needed.

The Air Force has approximately 33,000 basic airmen in training at the present time.

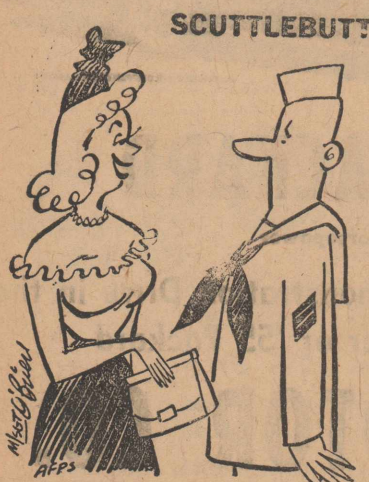

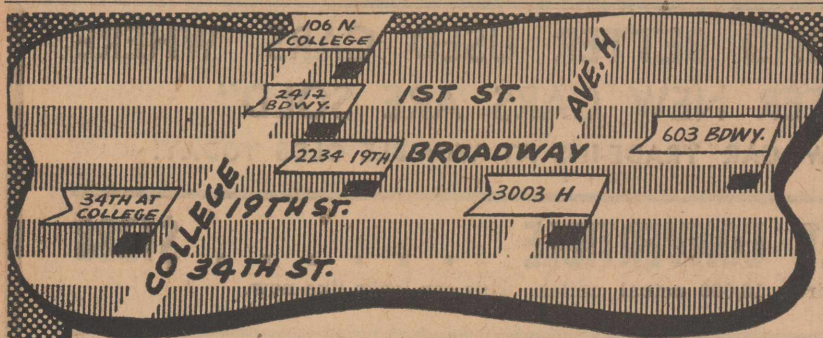
