December 17 Set As Probable Start Of Holiday Leave Period

West, base commander.

The colonel said in his policy letter that if training could be carried on in a normal fashion to end it a week before Christmas, the training would halt at that time. Final decision was promised as early as possible.

The unit commanders were authorized to extend holiday leaves to January 3, taking into consideration requirements of the individual organization. It was cited that approximately eight percent of personnel could be on leave after January 3.

50 Percent Strength

During the holidays base strength will be maintained at about 50 percent and efforts will be made to carry out projects in each section which will be beneficial to the base mission. FTAF has recommended that the holidays be utilized to correct deficiencies, with emphasis on rehabilitation of training aids, revision of base defense plans where applicable, and other moves.

No Letup In Safety

Maj. Gen. G. P. Disosway, FTAF commander, advised all base commanders that there will be no letup in Air Force functions and that safety, particularly on the highways, must be emphasized. At Reese unit commanders will counsel all persons going on leave to use all precautions in getting to their destinations and back without mishap. In past years Reese personnel have established safety records during the holiday season and Colonel West is asking that another one be set through no accidents.

Base Contributes To Local Fund Drives From United Fund

Reese Air Force Base personnel have contributed \$5,455.29 into charitable funds of Lubbock and elsewhere during the fiscal year which started last July 1, with additional funds available as organizations make their drives.

There was a United Fund drive at the base this year for the first time as a single campaign was used to replace many campaigns staged previously. Each person, military and civilian, was asked to give a day's pay and from the fund raised, contributions are made to individual units.

Colonel West said that in addition to one check for \$4,482.87 given the Community Chest of Lubbock, contributions also had been given to six other charities. Selection of better equipped non-commissioned officers is the objective of a proposed regulation on NCO testing received this week at Reese, with a request for suggestions on the regulation and the program.

The proposal would require that airmen first class and staff sergeants be tested in April and October to find out how much they know on organization, mission, and history of the Air Force. The tests also would show knowledge and judgment on how to organize personnel and equipment to accomplish a mission, and how much the airman tests know on military courtesy, conduct, and related military subjects.

The purpose of the tests would be to assist in identifying and selecting NCO's with the ability to lead, supervise, and train others.

So You Have Principles!

You've probably seen the poster on the military Code of Conduct, now being widely displayed here. Section Six of the Code says: "I will never forget that I am an American fighting man, responsible for my actions, and dedicated to the principles which made my country. free. I will trust in my God and in the United States of America."

We are dedicated to the principles that made our country free-or we would not be where we are. But how well do we understand the principles?

Some of the principles we stand for are outlined in a pamphlet recently given limited distribution by the Department of Defense. It says that the basic freedoms that every person is entitled to go hand in hand with certain basic responsibilities. Among the basic freedoms and responsibilities are these:

Basic Freedoms

- Freedom of worship and religion for individuals and organized groups.
- Freedom of opinion, speech, and expression.
- 3. Freedom of association, assembly adn action.
- Freedom of the individual to choose and elect his own
- Freedom of movement within one's own country and freedom to visit other countries.
- Fredom for educational, social, and economic opportun-
- Freedom to choose one's own occupation.
- 8. Freedom of the individual to own property alone or in association with others, including the freedom to own means of production.
- Freedom from arbitrary arrest, detention or exile and the right of equal protection under the law.
- 10. Freedom from torture, cruelty or degrading puishment or treatment.

Basic Responsibilities

- 1. Responsibilities for tolerance between the religious beliefs of individuals or organized groups.
- 2. Responsibility for reactions and results of written and oral expression.
- 3. Responsibility for purposes and actions of association and assembly.
- 4. Responsibility to exercise the right to choose leadership for best community interest.
- 5. Responsibility for constructive use of freedom of movement.
- 6. Responsibility to utilize educational, social and economic opportunity for individual and national welfare.
- 7. Responsibility to be a productive and useful citizen.
- 8. Responsibility to use and conserve property and resources for legitimate and productive purposes.
- 9. Responsibility of all citizens to assist ,uphol dand insure justice, law and order.
- 10. Responsibility to maintain vigilance against illegal practices, discrimination, torture, cruelty degrading punishment or treatment.

These are only some of the facts we need to know about our principles. We must, for example, know something about the source of these principles. Do your basic freedoms and responsibilities come from the Government? We'll examine this question in an early issue of this paper.



The concept of Militant Liberty, recently approved by the Defense Department, is a strong reminder to men in service that in this democracy liberty and responsibility go hand in hand.

Democracy is like a two-sided coin; liberty is on one side, responsibility on the other. In fact, every basic freedom implies a basic responsibility.

Freedom of religion, speech, press and assembly mean also a responsibility to be tolerant of the beliefs of others. Freedom from arbitrary government regulation and control means also responsibility to guard against the granting of arbitrary powers o government.

The freedoms are the obvious side of the coin. They are in the Bill of Rights or in law. But, the responsibilities are a bti more subtle. They are the personal burden of everyone. A people who refuse their responsibilities are running the risk of losing the corresponding freedoms. (AFPS)
