Olney Cubs defeat Indians 20-60

The Olney Cubs used a big first quarter to help them overpower the Indians to the tune of 60 to 20. Olney scored three times and added all three PAT kicks to take a 21 to 0 lead at the end of the quarter.

Haskell retaliated at the 10:19 mark of the second quarter when tailback Kelson Agüero scampered

60 yards and quarterback Isaiah Llewellyn scored on the two point conversion try. The Indians got another touchdown on a one yard run by Llewellyn at the 1:28 mark of the second quarter, but failed on the two point conversion try. Agüero would score again for the Indians on a two yard run with only two seconds left in the half. This

score was set up by a 33 yard pass and catch play between Llewellyn and wide receiver Austin Nanny, who made a spectacular catch. The two point conversion try failed.

The Olney Cubs added three touchdowns of their own during this second quarter of play. The score at the half time intermission was Olney 40, Haskell 20.

The Cubs from Olney would add three more touchdowns during the last half of play, one touchdown in the third quarter and two in the fourth quarter. Their last touchdown was an 80 yard run by Alex Vega, who also added the PAT kick which was good.

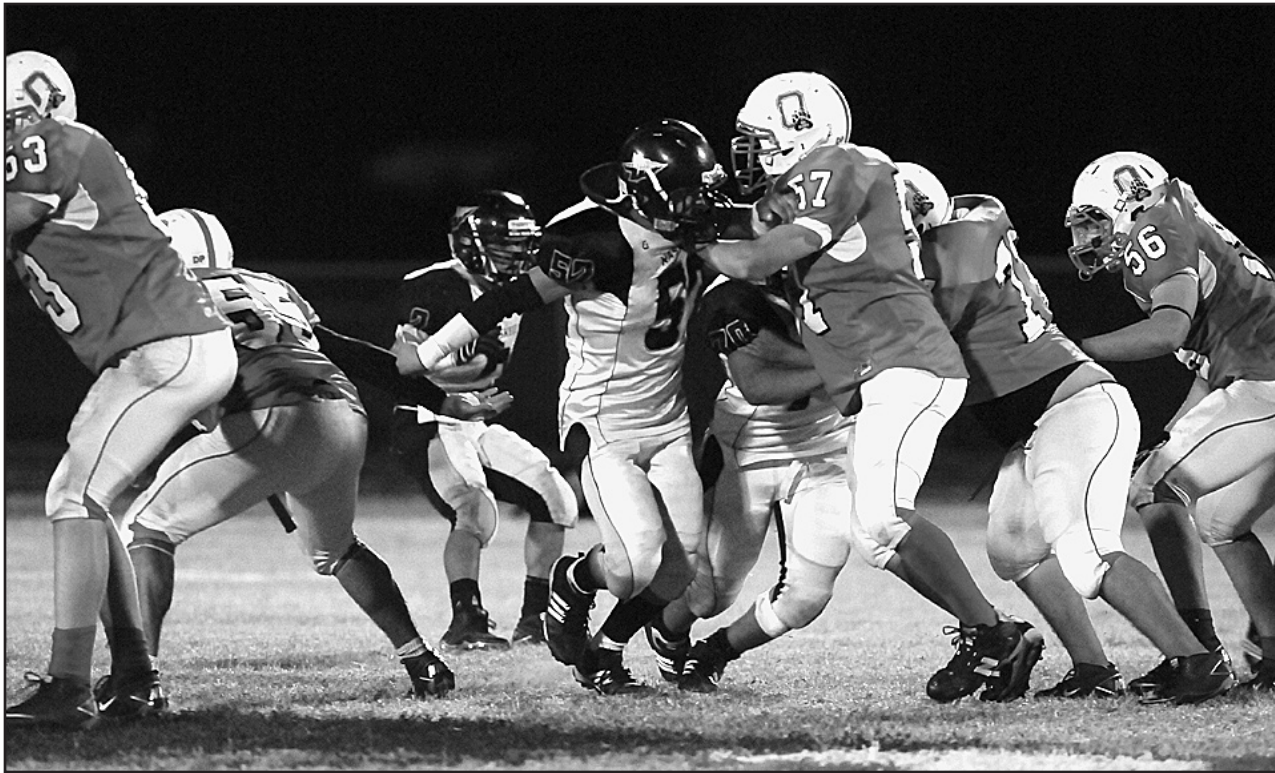
The Indians will close out their 2010 season Friday

evening at Indian Field against the state ranked Albany Lions. The Lions are leading district 4-A. Haskell is 0-3 in District play and 2-7 overall. The Indians have had a number of players injured and out for the season; however, the younger players are getting plenty of experience.

Haskell had 49 rushes for 187 yards with Llewellyn getting 18 carries for 33 yards and one touchdown. Agüero had a big evening with 20 carries for 121 yards and two touchdowns. Full back Kiefer McNelly got 30 yards on six carries and Payne Ultey, tailback, got three yards on five carries. Quarterback Llewellyn had four completions on ten attempts in the air for 77 yards. Nanny had a big night on the receiving end with four catches for 77 yards, two big ones—one for 37 yards and one for 33 yards.

The 7th and 8th grade Warriors will play in Albany Thursday evening followed by the JV Indians. Games start at 4 p.m. This will close out the sub-varsity teams games for 2010.

Area events to honor Veterans Nov. 11

Thurs., Nov. 11, marks the ninety-first year the United States has observed what has come to be known as Veterans Day.

In 1919, President Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day, a day set aside to honor veterans of the first World War.

However, in 1954, Congress amended the Act of 1938, which made the 11th of November each year a legal holiday, by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans."

The eleventh has significance, because it was at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when major hostilities of WWI formally ended with the German signing of the Armistice.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, in 2008 there were 23.2 million military veterans living in the United States. 1.7 of those veterans live in Texas.

The Veterans Day National Ceremony is held each year on Nov. 11 at Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony begins precisely at 11:00 a.m. with a wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknowns and continues inside the Memorial Amphitheater with a parade of colors by veterans' organizations and remarks from dignitaries.

At the local level, there will be several observances honoring all veterans. Haskell Elementary will continue their annual Veterans Day Breakfast

hosted by the fifth grade. The activities begin at 8:45 a.m. with a flag raising ceremony held on the front lawn at the elementary school. This will be followed by a breakfast served by students, along with a musical program also performed by elementary students.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m. at Slim Sorrells Park in Rule, another ceremony will be held. Included on the program will be a 21 gun

salute. In case of inclement weather, the ceremony will take place at Rule High School. The Haskell Church of Christ will serve lunch on Nov. 11 to all veterans and their spouses or guests, from 11 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. at the church activity building. The Progressive Study Club continues working toward a permanent marker honoring veterans. In fact, they have raised almost a

third of the needed funds for the project. The beveled pieces containing names of killed or missing in action have now been ordered. These will be placed on the top of the existing marker. Project chairman, Dorothy Hartsfield, reminds everyone they have flag holders for sale. They are continuing the scrap metal drive, as well. Over \$800 has been collected through this drive. Of course, they are always

All veterans living in our county are encouraged to participate in some or all of these events. They serve as a way to honor each of you for your patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice.

High speed pursuit ends in Rule

On Tues. morning, Oct. 26, Knox County Chief Deputy Chris Mendoza stopped a vehicle north of Rule, if the suspect made it pass Trooper Tidmore.

At the north city limits of Rule, the vehicle ran over the spikes and drove into the path of a pickup pulling a trailer driven by Williams Steven of Odessa. The suspect hit Stevens nearly head on. Both vehicles were totaled in the crash. Stevens was lucky and was not injured as a result of the crash.

The driver of the fleeing vehicle was injured and was transported to Haskell Memorial Hospital and then to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene with a broken ankle and broken ribs. The driver was identified as David Reyes of Stamford, and his wife, Dorothy Grey Reyes. Reyes was wanted on parole violation from Jones County on manslaughter. More charges are pending from Knox County for

fleeing to elude in a motor vehicle and also charges from Haskell County for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon (motor vehicle).

All agencies involved worked to get this incident stopped as soon as possible with no one getting hurt.

"Thanks to the Rule Volunteer Fire Dept. and the TxDOT men for their help," said Haskell County Sheriff David Halliburton.

Air Evac Lifeteam to offer membership presentation

Air Evac Lifeteam will be in Haskell Mon., Nov. 8 at 7 p.m. at the Haskell Memorial Hospital Education Building offering a membership presentation to citizens of Haskell County. Air Evac operates 95 air medical bases in 14 states serving over 1,700 diverse referral sources, including over 1,000 hospitals and

700 EMS agencies. Air Evac is the largest air ambulance service in Texas with twenty bases. Air Evac participates in the Air Med Care network which increases an Air Evac Members coverage to 136 bases in 24 states. The Air Med Care network adds an additional seven bases in Texas.

Locally, Air Evac helicopters serve Haskell Memorial Hospital and any remote emergency scene in Haskell and nine surrounding Counties, providing quick, critical care services to rural areas. Air Evac offers an unwavering dedication to providing access to advanced emergency medical care to rural communities.

Crews are available 24 hours a day responding to scenes of medical emergencies or making critical care inter-facility transfers. Helicopters frequently respond to scenes of motor vehicle accidents, heart attacks, farm accidents, respiratory distress incidents and other traumatic injuries. The air ambulance transfers patients from rural hospitals to metropolitan hospitals that can offer patients acute trauma care in less than half the time driven by a ground ambulance.

Air Evac is the largest members supported air medical service in the U.S. with over 800,000 members and is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Medical Transport Systems.

Celebrating 25 years of service in 2010, the company has grown from a single helicopter in August 1985 to a fleet of over 100 helicopters all utilizing night vision goggles, GPS and Radar Altimeters.

The Abilene base was recognized as the most improved base of 2010, and boasts the Regional Pilot of the Year, Abilene pilot Tom Adams.

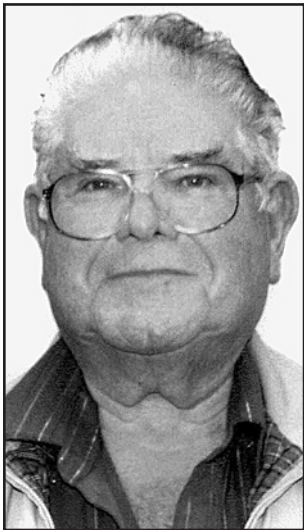

Most big newspapers favor White, but pre-election polls favor Perry

AUSTIN—By Oct. 19—the first day of early voting before the Nov. 2 general election—the editorial boards of 12 of the larger daily newspapers had endorsed Bill White, the former mayor of Houston and the Democratic candidate for governor. And one editorial board, the Waco Tribune-Herald's, endorsed incumbent Republican Gov. Rick Perry. But, by Oct. 29—the last day of early voting—polls of likely voters showed Perry with a lead of around 10 percentage points.

Now, back to the newspapers. The 12 that endorsed White were listed as the Amarillo Globe-News, Austin American-Statesman, Beaumont Enterprise, The Bryan-College Station Eagle, the Corpus Christi Caller-Times and The Dallas Morning News. Also, The Galveston County Daily News, Houston Chronicle, Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, San Angelo Standard-Times, San Antonio Express-News, and Wichita Falls Times Record News.

A rundown of results in the major races will be in next week's column.

Thousands attend 'Sanity' event

Between 5,000 and 6,000 people gathered on the Capitol grounds Oct. 30 for the Texas version of cable television "infotainment" czar Jon Stewart's "Rally for Sanity."

The event was in tandem with Stewart's national rally on the Capitol Mall in Washington, D.C., which was attended by more than 250,000 people.

Social networking expands reach

Back on May 11, the Senate Committee on State Affairs met and heard testimony on how advances in technology and the emergence of various forms of social media have affected communications by and within governmental bodies.

So, the use of social networking by governmental officials is on the table for the upcoming session of the Texas Legislature.

Now, here's a new twist. Recently, an incumbent running for reelection posted a negative comment about his campaign opponent on the local government body's Facebook page.

The Texas Ethics Commission said the candidate's posting was not campaign speech. (The State Election Code addresses paid political advertising not social networking communications in campaigns for public office.)

Last April, Ethics Commission Advisory Opinion No. 491 said political advertising that appeared on a social networking site (like Facebook) requires a

political advertising disclaimer statement that is linked to information about who paid for the advertisement.

If legislation addressing officials' use of social networking for routine communications is filed in the coming months, perhaps social networking's effects on campaign communications might also be addressed.

TCEQ-Mexico border plan in place

Did you know the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has its own border initiative with Mexico? The initiative, created in 2008, aims to:

- Continue bi-national air quality monitoring in Ciudad Juárez;
- Develop a Lower Rio Grande water quality initiative;
- Provide technical assistance on the pretreatment of fats, oil, and grease;
- Improve municipal management of scrap tires; and
- Develop coordinated emergency response measures with the International Boundary and Water Commission.

Magazine honors two of our own

GOVERNING, a national monthly magazine published in Washington, D.C., on Oct. 26 announced its top governing officials for the year 2010. On the list of eight honorees are two Texans.

The announcement said, "Sen. John Whitmire and Rep. Jerry A. Madden, State of Texas, teamed up to oppose funding another round of prison building in Texas, the world center of incarceration; opting instead for a smaller investment in treatment and diversion that has since become a model for corrections reformers everywhere."

A short list of Public Officials of the Year from state, city and county government have been singled out and honored for outstanding accomplishment annually by the magazine for the last 17 years.

Whitmire, D-Houston, is chair of the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice and dean of the Senate. Madden, R-Plano, is vice chair of the House Corrections Committee.

Texas wines duel with New York

The New York Giants won the Oct. 25 NFL match-up with the Dallas Cowboys at Cowboys Stadium in Arlington 41-35, but Texas beat New York 8-3 in a nearby pre-game wine-tasting contest hosted by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The 2010 Grape and Gridiron Classic, a blind taste-testing event featuring a selection of 11 wines, was conducted in Dallas at El Centro College's Food & Hospitality Institute.

Ask the Mayor

Fall is in the air—temperature is cooling, leaves are turning and dropping, cotton is being readied for harvest, voters have gone to the polls and clean-up in Haskell is progressing.

There have been comments and concerns about our efforts to rid the city of junked vehicles. We are only enforcing the Texas State Statute on Junked Vehicles which can be found under the State of Texas Transportation Code, Section 683.071. The Betterment Committee will find all of the junked vehicles in town, notify the owners that they are in violation of the State Statute and ask them to get in compliance with the statute. If the owner so chooses, he can receive \$100 for the vehicle if he has the title or \$50 if he does not have the title. The vehicle will be towed and we will all be one step closer to having our town rid of all the junked vehicles. If the owner of a junked vehicle cannot comply with the statute, then he should contact our City Administrator, Brandon Anderson at 940-864-2355 or 940-256-0777. We are willing to work with anyone who for whatever reason, CANNOT comply with the statute. If the owner of the junked vehicle absolutely

REFUSES to comply, then they will be fined.

If for some reason, you doubt that this effort is needed, I suggest that you get out and drive around our city and look for yourself. Get off your beaten path and go to some areas where you have never been—you will be shocked. Here are some quotes from one person who did just that:

Commissioner's Court report

The Haskell County Commissioners' Court met in a special meeting Tues., Oct. 26 with David Davis, County Judge, and Commissioners Johnny Scoggins, Tiffen Mayfield, Kenny Thompson and Bobby Smith present.

A motion to pay all bills presented to the Court was approved.

A motion to approve the 2011 Haskell County Resolution Indigent Defense Grant Program passed.

A motion to issue time warrants to Rule Banking Center for a new motor grader in the amount of \$66,000 on a five year payout was approved.

Oct. sales tax receipts reported

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said state sales tax collections totaled \$1.57 billion in September, up 6.8 percent compared to a year ago.

"This increase is significantly larger than recent monthly gains which have been in the 0 to 2 percent range," said Combs. "Sales tax increases were posted across almost all sectors including oil and gas, construction, manufacturing, wholesale trade, retail trade and restaurants."

Combs will send local governments \$443.5 million in monthly sales tax allocations, a 6 percent increase compared to a year ago. So far this calendar year, local sales tax allocations are still down 1.3 percent compared to the same period in 2009.

Combs distributed monthly sales tax allocations of \$300.1 million to Texas cities, up 6.1 percent compared to last October. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are running 1 percent lower than the same time last year. Texas counties received sales tax allocations of \$26.9 million, up 5.6 percent compared to a year ago. For the calendar-year-to-date county sales tax allocations are down 3.8 percent.

The 167 special purpose taxing districts around the state got \$18.7 million in sales tax revenue, an increase of 12.2 percent compared to last October. The state and local sales tax figures represent sales that occurred in August.

The Comptroller's November local sales tax allocation will be made Mon., Nov. 15.

Haskell County had a 9.00 percent increase for October 2010 of \$35,807.49 in comparison to \$32,850.53 for October 2009. 2010 payments to date of \$345,660.59 reflect a 2.06 percent increase over 2009 payments to date of \$338,676.62.

The City of Haskell had a 7.82 percent increase for October 2010 of \$32,950.13 in comparison to \$30,559.24 for October 2009. 2010 payments to date of \$317,457.88 reflect a 2.18 percent increase over 2009 payments to date of \$310,677.38.

The City of O'Brien had a 38.62 percent increase for October 2010 of \$139.72 in comparison to \$100.79 for October 2009. 2010 payments to date of \$1,942.56 reflect a 64.56 percent increase over 2009 payments to date of \$1,180.41.

The City of Rochester had a 55.72 percent increase for October 2010 of \$717.22 in comparison to \$460.56 for October 2009. 2010 payments to date of \$5,360.76 reflect a 2.91 percent decrease over 2009 payments to date of \$5,521.88.

The City of Rule had a 16.99 percent increase for October 2010 of \$1,765.56 in comparison to \$1,509.04 for October 2009. 2010 payments to date of \$18,783.19 reflect a 1.31 percent increase over 2009 payments to date of \$18,540.06.

The City of Weinert had a 6.31 percent increase for October 2010 of \$234.86 in comparison to \$220.90 for October 2009. 2010 payments to date of \$2,116.20 reflect a 23.23 percent decrease over 2009 payments to date of \$2,756.89.

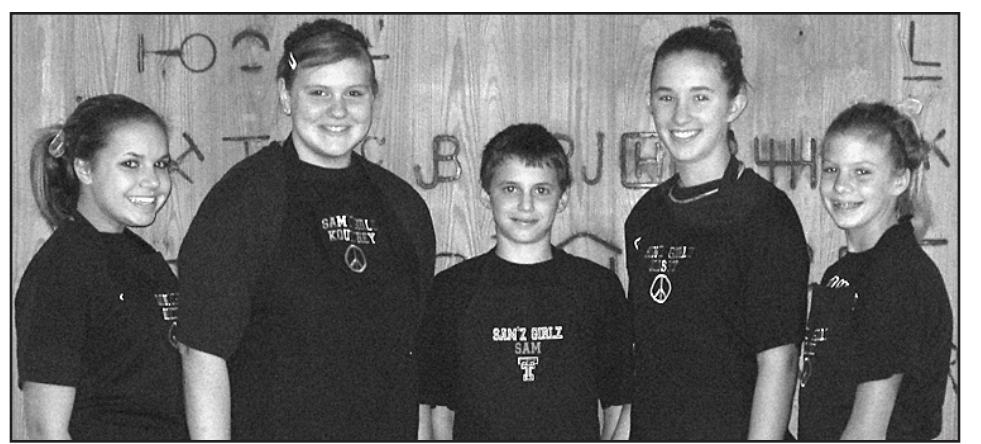
