Another obstacle that many is not having enough energy to get around, explained Hurt. Kindred at Home nurses monitor their patients' nutrition and diet, which can contribute to loss of energy, and provide therapy to ensure that "Sometimes that's bed hard"Sometimes that's the hardup out of bed," he continued up out of bed," he continued can still do that'...so they can have a quality of life doing the things they enjoy and that make them happy."

When Hurt was still out in the field, he encountered a woman who was extremely depressed. He found him-
self asking what he could do self asking what he could do
to help her. So he asked her to help her. So he asked her
what made her happy, and she eplied that she loved reading books. However, she couldn't read anymore because of the small print. So, he went to a used bookstore and bought her a stack of used romance novels (her favorite) in large print. When he returned to the assisted living facility, he made her promise to get
out of her room, go eat dinner with people in the common area, and participate in therapy. She read the books and shared them with others. It only cost him a few dollars out of his own pocket but the outcome was amazing, he shared. Dept in 1997. The herd had 36 left at that timetand there are now 140 with 13 new calves and more coming at this present time and ended back on the land they started on. The he
The herd is known as "The Texas State Bison herd" and are a pure breed. Last native

## Parks improvement plans from ' 13 bond election underway

When Floydada voters overwhelmingly passed a bond election in November 2013 to improve their parks it included
components to improve Floydada Park, sometimes referred to
as, High School Park, and Annie Taylor Park.
According to city manager Jeff Johnston, plans and designs are in process to improve the softball field and the playground at Annie Taylor Park.
"The plan is to put in bleachers, a new concession stand, and a playground," the city manager said. "It's a smaller area thought it would, but when we're done, it'll be a whole new park."
Already Floydada voters have benefitted from the enhancements of the bond election they supported more than two years ago.
