Lockney, Floydada voters face choices Saturday By Kay Ellington

Voters in the Lockney city limits and the Lockney Independent School District boundaries head to the polls Saturday, May 7.
Residents in the city $8 f$ Lockney will be voting on two ballot options as well as the mayor and District 4 council positions.
Lockney voters will decide whether to allow alcohol change to a city manager form of government.
Also on the ballot, incumbent Tina Graves and challenger Archie Jones are running for the mayor's position, and incumbent George Villareal and challenger Velia Martinez are vying for the District 4 city council position. Lockney ISD has one at-large position open as Lenny Hooten is stepping down. Kirk Whon and Joe Smith are unning for that position.
LISD is also conducting a bond election with two proof $\$ 3,335,000$ of bonds by the district for the construction, acquisition, renovation and equipment of school buildings, excluding athletic facilities, and for the purchase of new school buses.
Proposition 2 would be the issuance of $\$ 3,335,000$ of bonds by the district for the construction of improvements

## Wayland opts out of Senate Bill 11

PLAINVIEW - The Wayland Baptist Uni-
versity Board of Trustee voted unanimously to versity Board of Trustee voted unanimously to
endorse the recommendation of Dr. Paul Armes to opt out of Senate Bill 11 which allows firearms
to be carried on college campuses by licensed into be carried on college campuses by licensed individuals.
Wayland will continue with its current policy
that prohibits that prohibits individuals from carrying firearm
on campus. It does, however, allow students, facon campus. It does, however, allow students, fac-
ulty and staff to store firearms in their vehicles or, for Plainview campus students, in a designated or Plainview campus students, in a designated
safe. Senate Bill 11, as passed by the 84th Legislature of the State of Texas, authorizes concealed handgun license or license to carry holders to
carry a concealed handgun while on the cam carry a concealed handgun while on the cam pus of public or private colleges and universities.
There is a provision that gives private universities three options based on the fact that private schools are located on private property, not state property.
Private
Private universities have the right to:

1. Accept and incorporate the law in its en-
tirety
2. Res
3. Restrict areas

Armes said he and other members of the administration had polled, surveyed and/or conucted discussion sessions with faculty, staff and cated in Plainview, Lubbock, Amarillo, Wichita Falls and San Antonio. He said while a small
majority of traditional students on the Plainview majority of traditional students on the Plainview
campus were in favor of the new law, the overampus were in favor of the new law, the over
whelming majority of non-traditional students, faculty and staff throughout the system were in favor of maintaining the current policy. Armes said he made his recommendation based on the survey and poll results as well as the notion that there are too many unknown vari-
ables and liabilities that may come into play. He ables and liabilities that may come into play. He
said, however, that there may be opportunity in the future to revisit the policy.
"We don't have all the answers," Armes told the Board of Trustees. "At some point in the future, if they will permit us to procure additional training for individuals who have licenses, you might look more favorably on some acceptance
of the law. At this time the law doesn't allow us of the lowat."

## Preparing flowers for Wildflower

 Show ArrangementsBy Willa F. Finley

Want to win a prize at the Wildflowe Show? Want to win the hearts of your friends and neighbors by taking them a fresh and glowing bouquet of wildflowers?
It's simple and fun
First let's guidelines.
Pick the flowers the day before the fowers. Pick them in the morning, preferably before 10 am before the summer sun has begun to zap their freshness.
Walk around the group of plants you want to harvest from, and visually select the nicest looking specimens. Choose flowers that are not fully bloomed, since they won't last long. Get a small bucket (one to two gallons) and fill it a third full with water. Get your garden clippers or a very sharp butcher knife or pocket knife. Take the bucket of water and your clippers right to the flowers you are your clippers rigg.

Clip the stem so that the stem is long enough plus a couple of inches for the arATELY put it in the water! There should be lag time of no more than 5 seconds between the snip and the baptism of the cut stem end in the water.

Select from your bucket the stem you want to start with, strip off the leaves so that there will be no submerged leaves in the arrangement, remove any remaining leaves that are unattractive, and THEN clip the stem to give the height you want, and IMMEDIATELY put it in the vase. You can move it around later, but don't leave any time between that snip and getting it in the water
From this point on, it's just a matter of select, snip, and insert, over and over, until you vision of the arrangement has been fulfilled. When you've finished, add water to cover the shortest stem end by one or two inches. Cut wildflowers are thirsty drinkers. You'll need to add some water every day.
Now you've got them all ready, and there's just one more thing to do
Be sure they are in a cool, dark, and humid place to spend the night.
Here are a few more points and pointers: Don't arrange flowers in the sun. Work in the shade for your sake and theirs.
Buds, or very young/immature blooms, will often wilt and stay wilted. Use flowers that are still young but a bit more open.
Some wildflowers do not lend themselves for use in arrangements. This is especially true of the milkweeds and the poppies, including prickly poppy, California poppy, and others. You can try this: cut the stem, hold the stem upside down, burn/char/cauterize the end of the stem to stop the sap from running. It may wilt anyway after all this effort.
Use native Texas wildflowers. If you're not sure whether it qualifies, search for it at http://www.wildflower.org/explore.php Practice these techniques ahead of time and use them often for the delight and enjoyment of your friends and family!
