



The price tag for each proposal is \$3,335,000 or 7.22 cents of tax per \$100. The combined total would be \$6,670,000 or 14.44 cents per \$100. The bond would be issued with a proposed 15-year payoff but could be paid off sooner if additional property values were added to the tax rolls during the life of the

Homeowners 65 and older will not see their taxes increase on their homestead since their taxes are limited to the amount of the previous year's taxes.

Lockney voting will be at the First Methodist Church, 120 W. Poplar Street, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In Floydada, the At-Large City Council seat is being contested in the May 7 election. Corey Speed, deputy with the Floyd County Sheriff's Department, has filed to run for this position. Incumbents Sam Green, a farmer, and Gabriel de la Fuente, previously with the Walmart Distribution Center, are also running for the two at-large positions.

Voting will be at Massie Activity Center, and election day hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All registered voters must bring a photo identification to cast a ballot.

The Paperboy Celebrating Cinco de Mayo After my purchase, I

Like other days of celebration, Cinco de Mayo has grown to a party across the country. Ever wonder what we are celebrating?

The following is from history.com in regards to the Mexican National Holiday of Cinco de Mayo:

During the French-Mexican War, a poorly supplied and outnumbered Mexican army under General Ignacio Zaragoza defeats a French army attempting to capture Puebla CHRIS de Los Angeles, a small town in east-central If you're gonna perpetrate a BLACKBURN Mexico.

Victory at the Battle of Puebla represented a great moral victory for the Mexican government, symbolizing the country's ability to defend its sover-

eignty against threat by a powerful foreign nation. In 1861, the liberal Mexican Benito Juarez became president of a country in financial ruin, and he was forced to default

on his debts to European governments. In response, France, Britain, and Spain sent naval forces to Veracruz to demand reimbursement.

Britain and Spain negotiated with Mexico and withdrew, but France, ruled by Napoleon III, decided to use the opportunity to carve a dependent empire out of Mexican territory.

Late in 1861, a well-armed French fleet stormed Veracruz, landing a large French force and driving President Juarez and his government into retreat.

Certain that French victory would come swiftly in Mexico, 6,000 French troops under General Charles Latrille de Lorencez set out to attack Puebla de Los Angeles.

From his new headquarters in the north, Juarez rounded up a rag-tag force of loyal men and sent them to Puebla. Led by Texas-born General Zaragoza, the 2,000 Mexicans fortified the town and prepared for the French assault.

On the fifth of May, 1862, Lorencez drew his army, wellprovisioned and supported by heavy artillery, before the city of Puebla and began their assault from the north.

The battle lasted from daybreak to early evening, and when the French finally retreated they had lost nearly 500 soldiers to the fewer than 100 Mexicans killed.

Although not a major strategic victory in the overall war against the French, Zaragoza's victory at Puebla tightened Mexican resistance, and six years later France withdrew.

The same year, Austrian Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian, who had been installed as emperor of Mexico by Napoleon in 1864, was captured and executed by Juarez' forces.

Puebla de Los Angeles, the site of Zaragoza's historic victory, was renamed Puebla de Zaragoza in honor of the general. Today, Mexicans celebrate the anniversary of the Battle of Puebla as Cinco de Mayo, a national holiday in Mexico.

PLAINVIEW - The Wayland Baptist University Board of Trustee voted unanimously to endorse the recommendation of Dr. Paul Armes to opt out of Senate Bill 11 which allows firearms to be carried on college campuses by licensed in-

Wayland will continue with its current policy that prohibits individuals from carrying firearms on campus. It does, however, allow students, faculty and staff to store firearms in their vehicles or, for Plainview campus students, in a designated safe. Senate Bill 11, as passed by the 84th Legislature of the State of Texas, authorizes concealed handgun license or license to carry holders to carry a concealed handgun while on the campus of public or private colleges and universities. There is a provision that gives private universities three options based on the fact that private schools are located on private property, not state property.

Private universities have the right to: 1. Accept and incorporate the law in its en-

2. Restrict areas on campus in which concealed

carry is permitted

3. Continue with current policies Armes said he and other members of the administration had polled, surveyed and/or conducted discussion sessions with faculty, staff and students at each of Wayland's Texas campuses located in Plainview, Lubbock, Amarillo, Wichita Falls and San Antonio. He said while a small majority of traditional students on the Plainview campus were in favor of the new law, the overwhelming majority of non-traditional students, faculty and staff throughout the system were in favor of maintaining the current policy.

Armes said he made his recommendation based on the survey and poll results as well as the notion that there are too many unknown variables and liabilities that may come into play. He said, however, that there may be opportunity in the future to revisit the policy.

"We don't have all the answers," Armes told the Board of Trustees. "At some point in the future, if they will permit us to procure additional training for individuals who have licenses, you might look more favorably on some acceptance of the law. At this time the law doesn't allow us

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




As well as the cook-off, a doubles horseshoe tournament will be held that Saturday beginning at 10:00 a.m.



William McGehee Family

William McGehee was born in Salado, Bell County, February 24,1872. His father was James Herman McGehee and mother was Josephine Aiken. Katie Mae Nichols was born in Limestone County, May 6,1876. Her father was Washington C. Nichols and her mother was Tibitha Ann Cameron. They were married May 10,1896. The ceremony was in the Christian College in Lockney. All friends and neighbors were invited. William took a \$20.00 bill to Floydada to buy the license. It could not be changed so he got the license and paid later. They went to Matador in a covered wagon for their honeymoon. The material for her wedding dress was ordered from Montgomery Ward, was made by Mrs. Daff Griffith.

Their first house was a one-room dugout, with shingle roof and glass windows. The floor was 12 inch boards. The well had a tower and wheel. The water would run through the milk trough to an earthen tank, where the stock drank. When the wind stopped blowing, a rope would be tied to the wheel and pulled by hand. Later all of this was replaced with a three-roomed house, an over-head tank and water piped to outside the kitchen. There was still the shelf with the water bucket dipper.

hi 1908, the family moved to Lockney to be near the church and school, taking an active part in both, also, helping to build an electric plant for the town, and helping to get the right of way for the two railroads. On a farm south of Lockney, he built the first silo and irrigation well. In 1935, four grandsons, six great grandsons.

they moved to Hereford, pioneering in drilling wells, and selling pumps.

Now, memories go back to when he was commissioner. He would go in a wagon to Floydada, take his food and feed for the horses, then sleep

in the wagon yard. As a Stock fanner, he would grow his feed, thrash and grind it using horses for power. When the cattle were ready for market, they were driven to Amarillo, then, go by train to Kansas City. Sometimes this took three weeks.

Hog killing time, when neighbors came to help. After all the hard work, the meat was hung in the smoke house to cure. Lard was rendered in the iron pot out doors. Later soap was made in the same pot and the pot was used to heat water on wash day.

The Farm Assistance study consisting of 1,800 acres of native pasture and 200 acres of established Coastal Bermuda grass used for grazing only. Under normal stocking rates, the cowherd included 200 cows or a stocking rate of one animal unit to 10 acres and eight bulls, or one bull to 25 cows.

The study took in consideration production inputs, yields, costs and overhead charges

based on typical rates for the region. In 2014, hunting income for the ranch was \$10 an acre. Assets, debts, machinery inventory and scheduled equipment replacements for the projection period were the same in all management scenarios.

With no selected calf management practices, average net cash farm income was \$76,970 a year or \$385 a cow per year and \$428 a calf per year. An all calf-management program of clostridial vaccinations, castration/implants and deworming led to net cash farm income of \$89,360, representing \$477 a cow per year and \$496 a calf per year.

"This reflects a 16.1 percent increase or \$12,390 increase versus no calf management practices," Young said. "All of these practices help produce more dollars when selling calves. The worst thing you can do is have a cow out there that isn't having a calf. That's cutting into your profits.

"The points I'm trying to make is you are going to have good market prices and you are going to have bad market prices. That's why as a producer you need to produce as many pounds as possible. To me, it's a hedge. You are trying to increase your volume of calves, which in the end will help your

USDA offers new portable farm storage and handling equipment loans

COLUMBUS, Ohio -USDA will provide a new financing option to help farmers purchase portable storage and handling equipment.

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Val Dolcini and Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) Administrator Elanor Starmer announced changes to the Farm Storage Facility Loan (FSFL) program recently during a local and regional food roundtable in Columbus, Ohio. The loans, which now include a smaller microloan option with lower down payments, are designed to help producers, including new, small and mid-sized producers, grow their businesses and markets.

"As more communities reconnect with agriculture, consumer demand is increasing for food produced locally or regionally," Dolcini said. "Portable handling and storage equipment is vital to helping farmers get their products to market more quickly and better maintain product quality, bringing them greater returns. That's why we've added this type of equipment as a new category for our FSFL pro-

The program also offers a new "microloan" option, which allows applicants seeking less than \$50,000 to qualify for a reduced down payment of 5 percent and no requirement to provide three years of production history. Farms and ranches of all sizes are eligible.

The microloan option is expected to be of particular benefit to smaller farms and ranches, and specialty crop producers who may not have access to commercial storage or on-farm storage after harvest. These producers can invest in equipment like conveyers, scales or refrigeration units and trucks that can store commodities before delivering them to markets. Producers do not need to demonstrate the lack of commercial credit availability to apply.

"Growing high-value crops for local and regional markets is a common entry point for new farmers," Starmer said. "Since they often rent land and have to transport perishable commodities, a loan that can cover mobile coolers, or even refrigerated trucks, fills an


important gap. These producers in turn supply the growing number of food hubs, farmers markets or stores and restaurants interested in sourcing local food."


Earlier this year, FSA significantly expanded the list of commodities eligible for FSFL. Eligible commodities now include aquaculture; floriculture; fruits (including nuts) and vegetables; corn, grain sorghum, rice, oilseeds, oats, wheat, triticale, spelt, buckwheat, lentils, chickpeas, dry peas, sugar, peanuts, barley, rye, hay, honey, hops, maple sap, unprocessed meat and poultry, eggs, milk, cheese, butter, yogurt and renewable biomass. FSFL microloans can also be used to finance wash and pack equipment used post-harvest, before a commodity is placed in cold storage.

AMS helps thousands of agricultural food producers and businesses enhance their marketing efforts through a combination of research, technical services and grants. The agency works to improve marketing opportunities for U.S. growers and producers, including those involved in specialty crop production and in the local and regional food systems. 

Preparing flowers for Wildflo **Show Arrangements**

Want to win a prize at the Wildflower Show? Want to win the hearts of your friends and neighbors by taking them a fresh and glowing bouquet of wildflowers?

It's simple and fun to do by following these few basic guidelines.

First, let's talk about harvesting the flowers. Pick the flowers the day before the show. Pick them in the morning, preferably before 10 am before the summer sun has begun to zap their freshness.

Walk around the group of plants you want to harvest from, and visually select the nicest looking specimens. Choose flowers that are not fully bloomed, since they won't last long.

Get a small bucket (one to two gallons) and fill it a third full with water. Get your garden clippers or a very sharp butcher knife or pocket knife. Take the bucket of water and your clippers right to the flowers you are about to harvest.

*** This section has stars to tell you that this is the most crucial part in the process:

Clip the stem so that the stem is long enough plus a couple of inches for the arrangement you have in mind. IMMEDI-ATELY put it in the water! There should be a lag time of no more than 5 seconds between the snip and the baptism of the cut stem end in the water.

Now you're back home, or on the porch, ready to arrange them.

Get the flowers out of the sun into a cool place as quickly as possible.

Add some plain water, or preservative-containing water, to your vases, up to about half the height.

Select from your bucket the stem you want to start with, strip off the leaves so that there will be no submerged leaves in the arrangement, remove any remaining leaves that are unattractive, and THEN clip the stem to give the height you want, and IMMEDIATELY put it in the vase. You can move it around later, but don't leave any time between that snip and getting it in the water.

From this point on, it's just a matter of select, snip, and insert, over and over, until your vision of the arrangement has been fulfilled.

When you've finished, add water to cover the shortest stem end by one or two inches.

Cut wildflowers are thirsty drinkers. You'll need to add some water every day.

Now you've got them all ready, and there's just one more thing to do:

Be sure they are in a cool, dark, and humid place to spend the night.

Here are a few more points and pointers: Don't arrange flowers in the sun. Work in the shade for your sake and theirs.

Buds, or very young/immature blooms, will often wilt and stay wilted. Use flowers that are still young but a bit more open.

Some wildflowers do not lend themselves for use in arrangements. This is especially true of the milkweeds and the poppies, including prickly poppy, California poppy, and others. You can try this: cut the stem, hold the stem upside down, burn/char/cauterize the end of the stem to stop the sap from running. It may wilt anyway after all this effort.

Use native Texas wildflowers. If you're not sure whether it qualifies, search for it at http://www.wildflower.org/explore.php

Practice these techniques ahead of time, and use them often for the delight and enjoyment of your friends and family!

- If the wind companies fulfill their contracts they have with the school and the bond does not pass, the community cannot fully capitalize on this new source of revenue. If the wind companies do not fulfill their obligations, the school is not required to follow through with the program. They will not spend money until they are assured it will be paid by the wind ✓ companies.
- The wind companies will pay approximately 80% of the bond. The cost for local taxpayers will be approximately 20%.

- ✓ This is a very small bond program compared to many other schools in the area.
- ✓ State law limits bond money to be spent only on:
 - √ Buses
 - Renovations
 - **New Facilities**
- It cannot be spent on salaries or supplies for the classroom
- The projects proposed in the bond will greatly reduce maintenance costs for many years. Most of the projects are renovations that will provide a more permanent repair than the patches that have been applied over the past few years.
- The school has a 99 year lease on the city owned baseball field. The new FFA ag facility will be built next to the current site or at a site that is available. All rights for whatever property it is built on will be secured ahead of any construction.

Police responded to an attempted burglary in the 500 Block of West Kentucky in the early morning hours of April 24. The victims stated they were woken up to glass breaking in the living room of the residence. The suspects did not make entry to the residence and were unable to be found when police arrived a couple of minutes later. While police were patrolling the area looking for the suspects involved in the attempted burglary, the officer observed a back window to a vehicle in the 500 Block of West Georgia broken out with a piece of cinder block. There was also a window broken out in a car on the 1000 Block of South Third Street at around the same time as the attempted burglary; however the victim did not notify police to the incident until the next day. A window to a pickup in the 300 Block of West Georgia was reported to have been broken with a cinder block the same night as the previous cars were damaged. A window to the press box at the High School softball park was broken out, likely by the same suspects. During the same weekend, the windows to a travel trailer in the 500 Block of South Ninth Street were broken out. Although police have not identified the suspects, they are believed to be less than 20 years of age and they were more than likely on foot when they commit-

ted the crimes. The doors to the Massie Activity Center were vandalized sometime between Friday, April 22 and Sunday April 24. It is possibly related to the vehicles that were vandalized during the same weekend. A juvenile was taken into custody on April 26 on a charge of Deadly Conduct. The juvenile is accused of grabbing the steering wheel of a school bus the juvenile and several other children were riding in and jerking it back and forth.

Police responded to a dog attack on April 18 in the 100 Block of North First Street. An elderly woman was injured after being bitten by three dogs, however the injuries were minor. A neighbor who helped fend off the dogs identified them as a short blond colored bull dog and a large brown pit bull, but the witness was unable to get a good look at the third dog. Police were later able to identify the dog owner. The same three dogs involved in an attack earlier were loose again

that evening. Police found the owner and a citation was issued for allowing dogs to roam freely.

Floydada Police were assisted by Deputies from the Floyd County Sheriff's Office to restore order and investigate the incident. However, all of the victims in the incidents refused to file charges, which severely limits what police can do to help. After a fight on the night of April 30, a loaded pistol was found on the ground outside of Allsup's and is believed to have been dropped by one of the parties involved. The pistol was collected and will be processed for fingerprints to try to determine the owner of the weapon. Floydada Police answered a total of 159 calls for service between April 17 and April 30. Police are asking anybody who knows deabove or any other incidents to please contact Floydada City Hall at (806) 983-2834 at any time and the message kept confidential. The public is the number one tool in solving cases such as thefts and burglaries. Q: What's the most amount of rainfall in the United States in one day?

A: Those who remember Tropical Storm Claudette that hit the Texas coast in 1979 will likely know the answer to this question, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Tropical Storm Claudette produced the greatest amount of rain in a 24-hour period in U.S. history," he says. "From July 24-25, an amazing 43 inches of rain fell at Alvin, Texas and other parts around Houston. The winds were not that bad, clocking in at just over 50 mile per hour, but its heavy flooding produced losses at more than \$1 billion in today's dollars. Claudette was one of three bad storms during the 1979 hurricane season."

Q: What about other rainy states?

A: Usually the island of Kauai in Hawaii boasts some of the wettest places on Earth, McRoberts says. "The rains in Kauai often set several records. Waialeale means "rippling water" or "overflowing water" in Hawaiian and is the one of the wettest spots on earth, receiving about 450 inches of rain each year. The greatest 24-hour rainfall amount in the world is nearly 72 inches at La Reunion Island, an island located in the Indian Ocean off the east coast of Madagascar, on Jan. 7-8, 1966. The rain was caused by a tropical cyclone churning nearby."

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the market or appraised value of your property · the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- · any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property • the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of the property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- · any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board (ARB) that applies to and adversely

Review by the ARB

If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You will receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any materials - whether in paper or electronic form - intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. (Multiple copies of these materials typically must be brought to the hearing so that each ARB member has a copy of all the materials to review.) To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative

will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office or from the Comptroller of Public Accounts at comptroller.texas.gov/taxinfo/taxforms/50-132.pdf.

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order," filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment

You must pay the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

On or before April 30 for residence homesteads and May 31 for all other property (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are not allowed after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was delivered to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the change was delivered to you.

(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxbecome delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

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* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or legal, state or national holiday.
