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


First day of school

f you identify with that RV fridge. We can just leave the door off. Maybe add some Plexiglas. Or not.

Meanwhile, exactly how did I get to be a redneck? When I was a kid, we attended Farm Bureau conventions in big hotels. We heard serious banquet lectures on agricultural topics. The meals included shrimp cocktail in fancy dishes that looked like champagne glasses to me - not that I'd ever seen a champagne glass. Sometimes we ended up in big hotel ballrooms, not that my parents danced. Everybody dressed nice, especially for those evening events.

OK, the men's necks were red. Their foreheads were white. They were farmers. But nobody was a redneck. That's how I remember it.

Then along came country songs that aligned all us hog-killing farm types with rednecks, whoever they were. It felt nice to be glorified, but odd. Did I know any rednecks? Was I one?

About the same time, farmers protested low commodity prices by driving their big tractors to Washington. Pet talk

'People food' as well as other "insider" not always good for animals

Many people spread holiday cheer through tasty treats, warm beverages, and feasts, but this type of celebration may not be fit for Fido. In fact, many "people foods" can cause health problems in cats and dogs. Dr. Christine Rutter, clinical assistant professor at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, explained what foods are unsafe for your pet.

"Grapes, raisins, macadamia ter by 9:30 a.m. if you would nuts, onions, peppers, garlic, like to donate an item to like to eat. Our phone chocolate, caffeinated beverages, alcoholic beverages, and Exercise fatty foods, such as gravy, butwith Dorothy - Monday, tery sauces, fatty cuts of meat, Wednesday, and Friday, sausage, or oily fish are the biggest mistakes I see over the holidays," Rutter said.

> She explained that grapes Thursday night pot luck. and raisins can cause kidney Bring a dish and a friend injury, which may not make the pet sick until two to four days later. Additionally, large quantities of onions, peppers, and garlic can damage a pet's red blood cells, which can lead to conditions such as anemia. Rutter also said caffeine and chocolate are toxic to pets, and fatty foods can cause stomach upset, vomiting, diarrhea, and pancreatitis, which may be evident immediately or up to seven days later after consuming the fatty food. Pet owners should also avoid placing wrapped food gifts, including alcoholic beverages, within the pet's reach to avoid any health concerns.

Floyd County Historical Museum "Memories, 1979"

RULEN A. BURROWS

Rulen Annon Burrows was born 16 October, 1876 in Tennessee. About 1885 he moved with his parents, Russell and Permelia Ott Borrows, sister Carrie and brother Theo to Coryell County, Texas. One sister Ethel was born there. After several years the family moved to Indian Territory, Oklahomna and settled near Lexington.

In 1897 Rulen married Margarette Henrietta Thomas, or Rettie as she was called, at Buckhead, Cleveland County, Oklahoma. She was born in 1882 in Indiana. Her parents were John B. and Emilee Shelton Thomas.

Rulen and Rettie moved to the Texas Plains in 1901 settling in the Ellen Community in Hale County. In 1908 they moved to Floydada.

Their first child Lethie Viola was born in Oklahoma in 1898. She married Luther James Hamm. After moving to the Plains, Neily Ruth was

born in 1901 in Hale County; she married Horace H. Allen. Agnes was born in 1905 in Hale County; she married Thomas Ernest McNutt. Roy Wallace was born in 1907 in Hale County; he married Lotella Hartsell. Pearl was born in 1909 in Floydada and she married Buck Formby. Kenneth Earl was born in 1920 in Floydada and he died at the age of six.

There were no railroads to Floydada in 1908 and Rulen turned to freighting. He hauled supplies from Amarillo, Canyon and Childress. He had two wagons and teams. All along the roads people would stop him and ask him to pick up supplies for them and on the return trip he would deliver them, sometimes leaving them in a designated place beside the road where they would be picked up later. He also carried the mail on a fairly regular schedule.

They rented a farm west to town where there was a large pasture and they got some cows

other people. Until this time the ranchers knew nothing of West Texas sandstorms. The wind blew a lot in the spring but with the native grass covering the land no sand blew. As land was plowed up to plant crops the more the sand blew.

During one of Rulen's freighting trips, a prairie fire threatened their house barn and stock. Rettie hitched a horse to the plow and plowed furrows around the property to keep from burning. She then covered the children with wet sheets until the smoke was gone.

When they first moved to Floydada there was just the Methodist Church. It sat between the courthouse and the big lake north of town. The Methodist and the Baptist shared it, with the pastors taking turns preaching on alternate Sundays. Later the building was moved southwest of the square and the Baptists built a building a block east of it on Main Street. Rettie, Rulen, and their children

to milk and horses to pasture for were members of the Baptist Church.

About 1920 Rulen bought an old White truck and began trucking from Lubbock to Floydada. He built a home on East Kentucky and also built a warehouse and office for his freight. He operated this business until he retired.

Rettie died April 15, 1952 and Rulen died June 9, 1962.

"Veterinarians most commonly think of sugar-free gum when considering xylitol intoxication, but it is becoming more common for xylitol to be used as a sugar substitute in baked goods, both purchased from a store and made at home."

Though there are many foods that should be kept out of your pet's reach, there are still healthy options if you
