LOCKNEY - Following a scrimmage between the Lockney Longhorns and the Springlake-Earth Wolverines, the Mitchell-Zimmerman Football Field was officially rededicated.

Members of the Milton Zimmerman family, including his sister, Pat Adams were present for the rededication.

American Legion Post 141 of Lockney posted the colors, provided a 21-gun salute and played Taps to honor the sacrifices of Clinton Mitchell and Milton Zimmerman.

Mitchell and Zimmerman were teammates at Lockney High School in the 1940s. Following high school and at the apex of World War II, Mitchell enlisted in the Marine Corps and Zimmerman enlisted in the Army.

Buy this light to match your moods. Need more pep? The colors contrast. Need some sleep? The colors blend. Buy it now and get a free hamsa. Protect yourself from the Evil Eye.

Don't use climbing spikes when pruning trees

Is your tree care provider using spikes to climb while pruning your trees? Ouch!

Climbing spikes are sharpened steel spikes attached to the climber's leg by leather straps and padded supports. A tree worker should only use them to access trees being removed. When these spikes are used on living trees, it is traumatizing to the tree and creates unnecessary damage.

spike produces a certain amount of tree tissue death, though this varies from tree to tree. In most cases, isolated wounds will seal, but over time, groupings of spike holes can cause the entire area on the trunk to die back with no chance of recovery. This happens when a tree is repeatedly climbed for pruning while using spikes.

The likelihood of piercing the cambium (living tissue beneath the bark) is high, even with larger trees and thick bark. If soon after the work is performed with spikes there is sap oozing from the wounds, the tree is responding to spike damage. Repeated damage of this type is harmful to

So why would climbers use spikes if they are harmful to the tree? There are a few exceptional situations where using spikes is appropriate, such as:

· when the tree is being removed.

when branches are more than throwline distance apart and there is no other means of climbing the tree (for example: when there are no branches lower than 50 feet), with no access for an aerial lift device or crane.

if the tree is too close to power lines and cannot be accessed safely by other means.

to reach an injured climber.

Professional tree care companies are aware of the dangers of spikes and use proper tree equipment such as ropes and climbing harnesses to climb (or aerial lift devices or cranes, if accessible). This, coupled with their training and experience, contributes to the future health of the tree.

Homeowners searching for qualified tree care companies should look for the following:

Good References: Ask for references, and check on the quality of their work. Don't be rushed by a bargain and don't pay in advance.

Proof of Insurance: Ask for current certificates of liability and workers' compensation insurance, if applicable. Be aware that if the tree care company you hire doesn't have insurance or is not a legal company, you could be held responsible as a contrac-

Solid Reputation: Verify professional affiliations the company might have, such as memberships in business and/or professional organizations such as the Tree Care Industry Association.

Up-to-Date Knowledge: Ask if they follow ANSI Standards. A professional arborist will be aware of the current safety, pruning, fertilizing and cabling standards.

Contract: Insist on a signed contract as to cost, dates when

work is to be performed, and exactly what is to be done. Insist that climbing spikes are used only if the tree is to be cut down.

Find a Professional A professional arborist can

assess your landscape and work with you to determine the best trees and shrubs to plant for your existing landscape. Contact the Tree Care Industry Association, a public and professional resource on trees and arboriculture since 1938. Celebrating its 75th anniversary this year, TCIA has more than 2,300 member tree care firms and affiliated companies who recognize stringent safety and performance standards and who are required to carry liability insurance. TCIA also has the nation's only Accreditation program that helps consumers find tree care companies that have been inspected and accredited based on: adherence to industry standards for quality and safety; maintenance of trained, professional staff; and dedication to ethics and quality in business practices. THE BIRCH FAMILY

Edgar Allen Birch and his wife, Phidelia Jane (Dell) Lackey Birch, and their six children; Walter, Ora, Ross, Nell, Eva, and Verna- came from Rice County, Kansas, to Wilbarger County, Texas, in 1907. In 1916, their oldest son, Walter Franklin, and his wife, Hulda (whose parents were Swedish immigrants to Kansas), accompanied the parents to Floyd County, Texas, where E. A. Birch purchased a half section of land, three miles east and two miles north of Floydada, from R. S. Staley of Springfield, Missouri.

Grandfather Birch was a carpenter, a craftsman, and an artist as well as a farmer. He carved his name in the front concrete steps of the house which he built. He also constructed the barn, cabinets, milk coolers, etc. He hung

shells, gathered from a trip to San Diego, in an unusual decorative pattern in the colonnade between the living and dining rooms. In later years, he drew landscapes and carved minature log cabins.

Walter and Hulda had two daughters, one of whom died in infancy. The oldest, Cleo, always attended school in Floydada, her parents moving into town in winter and back to the farm in summer for the wheat harvest.

Cleo remembersher her first two years at old East Ward School and marching at the head of a parade singing in chorus, "Old East Ward, she ain't what she used to be!" Mrs. Klebold was her first-grade teacher. The grandparents always took Cleo to the Methodist Church at Floydada, where Mrs. Robbins was her first Sunday School teacher. At one time Walter sang bass in the choir, and Hulda always

attended the Pastors Helpers Class's quilting bees.

In 1929, the year Mrs. E. A. Birch died, a daughter Nell and her husband, Albert Noyes, and their two sons, Coy and Lester, came to live with the father, E.A. Birch. The boys attended Center School and later Floydada High School. The Noyes family returned to Vernon in 1935.

LOCKNEY - Following a disappointing 3-7 season in 2016, the Lockney Longhorns are looking to make a push to the playoffs with 10 seniors leading the way. Richard Jackson takes over the head coaching duties after Jay Ragland left for Seagraves. Jackson is starting his fourth year at Lockney.
