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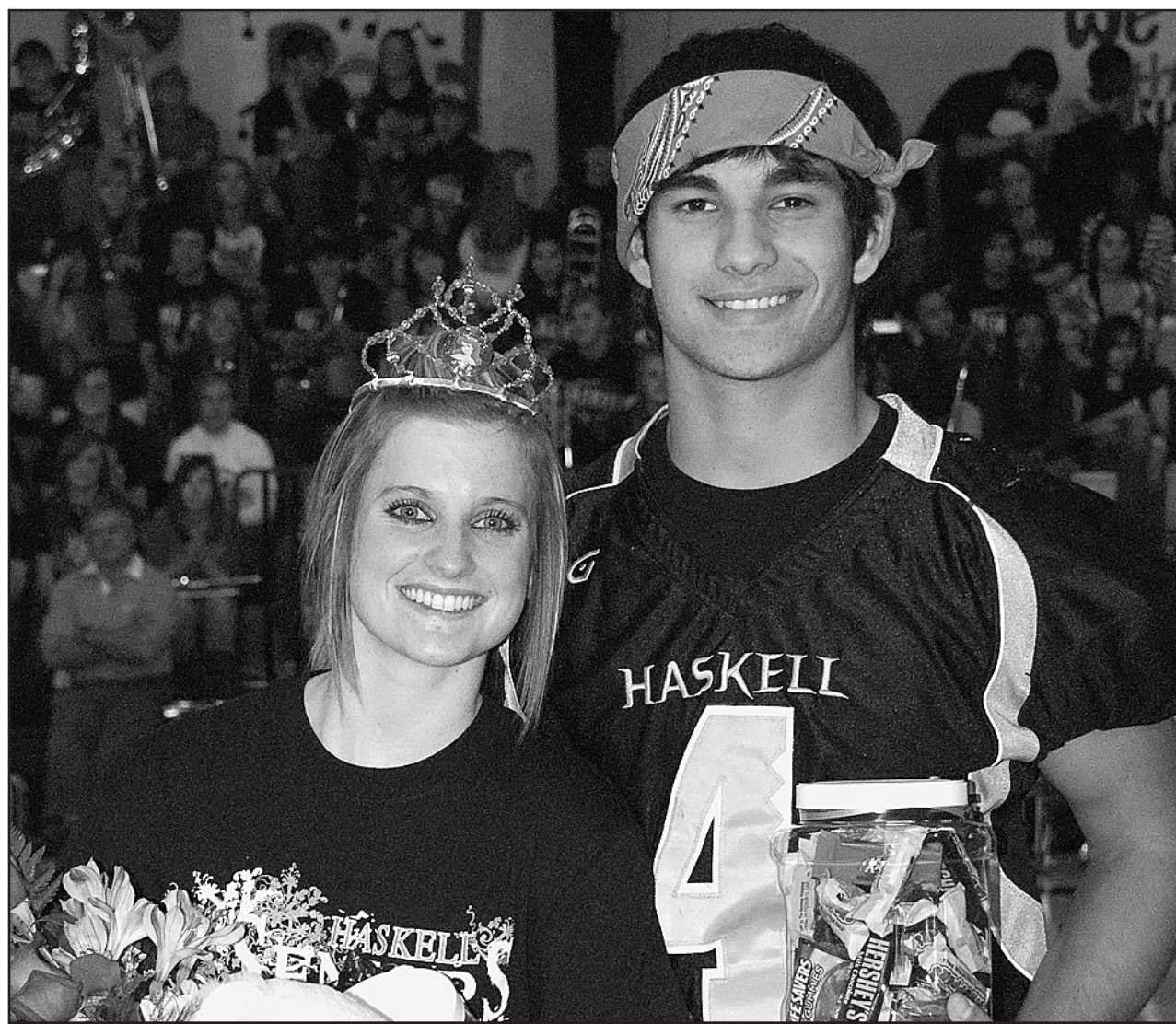

Lions roar over Indians

The state ranked Albany Lions roared loud in Indian Field Friday as they overpowered the Haskell Indians 51 to 12.

Albany opened the scoring scene by getting a safety from the Indians on a bad snap and the ball going out of the end zone. On the ensuing kick-off, Albany's running back Jeremy Corbin raced 60 yards to put six more points on the board for the Lions. The Indians, by the help of a 65 yard run back by Kelson Agüero, would score at the north end zone on an eight yard run by Tyrone Neskorik. The two point conversion try failed, but the Indians were back in the game 6 to 8.

Albany added another six points before quarter's end to lead 6 to 14. The Lions would add three more touchdowns and two PAT kicks to move the score to 6 for Haskell and 34 for Albany at intermission.

Albany scored on their first possession of the second half on a 38 yard run by Aaron Faith and added the PAT kick. Haskell on its second possession of the third quarter scored on a 20 yard run by fullback Agüero. The two point conversion try failed. Haskell used a four play 62 yard drive to convert the touchdown.

Faith, a strong running back for the Lions, would add another touchdown. The PAT kick was good and with 11:25 left in the game, the score was Haskell 12, Albany 48. On the strength of a successful 29 yard field goal, the Lions closed the door on this the final chapter of the Indians 2010 season, 12 to 51.

Haskell had 39 rushes for 247 yards as a team. Quarterback Isaiah Llewellyn got 27 yards on ten carries. Full back Agüero had 60 yards, on ten carries with one touchdown. Tailback Payne Utley got 12 yards on four carries and tailback Neskorik got 148 yards on 15 carries with one touchdown. Neskorik had 1067 yards this season, a job well done!

The coaching staff and the Indian players give a big thank you to all Indian fans for their support this season-next year is not so far away!

City Council report

The Haskell City Council met Mon., Nov. 8 in a regular meeting with Mayor John Gannaway, Mayor Pro Tem Randy Bowers, Councilmen Chan Guess, Sue Medford, Dan Hoover and Jason Hall in attendance. The invocation was offered by Hoover. The council approved Ricki Russell, Municipal Judge for the City of Anson, to position of Associate Judge

as allowed under Ordinance #060908.

The speed limits on Business 277 North of 380 were set as requested by TxDOT.

The sale and possession of substances known as synthetic cannabinoids or salva divinorum and frequently known as K-2 were prohibited.

The purchase of land (151 acres south of the city limits of the City of Haskell, adjacent to the wastewater treatment plan) but, also do diligence on the mineral rights and give the mayor the option to make the vital decisions concerning the purchase and authorizing the mayor to sign all pertinent documents was approved. The purchase was being paid out of reserved funds.

The Mayor read a letter recognizing the Haskell Indian Band.

In the City Administrator's report, Brandon Anderson stated:

•The City is looking at the option of leasing some of the City's equipment as recommended during the Budget Workshops.

•The City is looking at doing four clean up Saturdays throughout the year instead of just one clean up week annually. Currently the landfill is open two Saturdays in a row in April. Under the new plan the landfill would be open four Saturdays throughout the year.

•The Betterment Committee plans to focus their efforts on the state Statute pertaining to Junk Vehicles. The information will be in the paper for two weeks before any letters are sent.

After a long and full earthly life, the sweet spirit of Mrs. Holley went home to be with her Lord, Wed., Nov. 3.

She was the oldest child of William Jepsy and Johnnie Emma Johnson Carruth. Born Aug. 8, 1908 in a half dugout in the Animas Valley

area of New Mexico, she was the first white person born in what was then Indian Territory. She married Walter Thomas Holley Nov. 21, 1925 in Aspermont. When she and her husband built East Side Grocery Store in Haskell, she learned to order stock, keep the books and all the other jobs associated with running the business. She always said the hardest part of running the store was wearing shoes, which she had not had to do working on the farm.

She was preceded in death by her parents; her husband; brothers, Crawford and Ocie Carruth; sisters, Nellie Bird and Callie Moore; twin infant sons; son, Walter Thomas 'Tebo' Holley, Jr.; daughter, Dorothy Mae Blair, sons-in-law Kenneth Blair and Frank White, daughter-in-law Linda Berry Holley; great grandson, Donald Everett Blair; and great granddaughter, Misty Jo Holley.

Survivors include sisters,

Mattie Abbott, Frances Hutchinson and Helen White; son, William Carroll Holley; daughter, Dovey Joyce White; ten grandchildren; 21 great grandchildren; 31 great great grandchildren; and one great great great grandchild.

In addition to her loving family, she leaves behind a legacy of faith. She would quickly tell you the best thing that ever happened to her was becoming a Christian. Even though she saw many hard times and changes in her lifetime, she truly was an example of the virtuous woman described in Proverbs 31: "a woman who fears the LORD is to be praised. 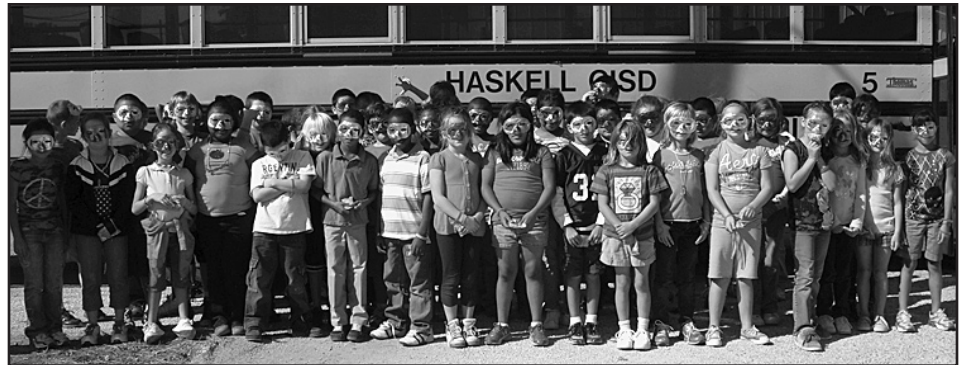

Republicans enjoy swath of victories on Election Day

AUSTIN—Republican candidates in the Nov. 2 election picked up 21 seats in the Texas House of Representatives and voters “rehired” incumbent Gov. Rick Perry for a third consecutive four-year term.

Perry outpaced former Houston Mayor Bill White, a Democrat, with a 13-point margin of victory, claiming 55 percent of the nearly 5 million ballots cast to White’s 42 percent.

Now, the GOP claims 99 seats in the 150-seat Texas House to the Democrats’ 51. No incumbent Republican House member lost their seat. Here is the list of incumbent Democrats who lost theirs to Republican challengers, as follows:

Anderson; Allen Vaught of Dallas, to Kenneth Sheets; David McQuade Leibowitz of San Antonio, to John V. Garza; Kristi Thibaut of Galveston, to Jim Murphy; and Ellen Cohen of Houston, to Sarah Davis.

In the 31-seat Texas Senate, the GOP’s edge over Democrats in the Senate remains at 19-12. No incumbent lost to a challenger, and Democrat Jose R. Rodriguez of El Paso won the Senate District 29 race to succeed a retiring Democrat, Sen. Eliot Shapleigh.

Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, Attorney General Greg Abbott, Comptroller of Public Accounts Susan Combs and Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples—all Republicans—were reelected. Each outdistanced their Democratic rivals by comfortable margins.

In State Board of Education races, Dist. 1 incumbent Democrat Rene Nunez lost to Republican Carlos

“Charlie” Garza. Elected to other SBOE seats were Dist. 3 Democrat Michael Soto; Dist. 9 Republican Thomas Ratliff; Dist. 10 Republican Marsha Farney; and Dist. 11 Republican George M. Clayton.

In the U.S. Congressional District contests, Republican challengers unseated three Democratic incumbents: U.S. Rep. Chet Edwards, D-Waco, lost to Republican Bill Flores; U.S. Rep. Ciro Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, lost to Republican Francisco “Quico” Canseco; Solomon Ortiz, D-Corpus Christi, lost to Republican Blake Farenthold.

Republican candidates also enjoyed a sweep of the Texas Supreme Court and Courts of Criminal Appeals races.

Speaker receives enough pledges

State Rep. Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, who was first elected speaker of the Texas House in January 2009, has been collecting pledges in support of his candidacy to serve a second term as speaker. So far, he said, he’s received pledges from all but about 20 members.

State Reps. Leo Berman, R-Tyler, and Warren Chisum, R-Pampa have been working to relieve Straus of the speakership. They’ve indicated that Straus, who enjoyed ample support from Democrats in the 2009 legislative session, did not push the Republican agenda hard enough to suit them or a number of conservative interest groups.

AGs file against health care law

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott and 19 other state attorneys general and governors on Nov. 5 filed a legal brief urging the federal district court in Pensacola, Fla., to strike down the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

The brief alleges the act violates the U.S. Constitution on several grounds because it forces all Americans to obtain and maintain federally approved health insurance coverage or pay a penalty.

Seguin lawmaker dies in Austin

Rep. Edmund Kuempel, R-Seguin, died of a heart attack in Austin on Nov. 4. He was 67.

The popular lawmaker had served in the Texas House since 1983. He suffered an earlier heart attack while working at the Capitol during the 2009 legislative session.

Burial was in the Texas State Cemetery on Nov. 9.

Lawmakers now can file legislation

Nov. 8 marked the first day legislators could file bills in advance of the 82nd session of the Texas Legislature, which opens Jan. 11.

The 2010 election is over so we will not be seeing any more campaign ads for awhile, but don’t get too excited because it won’t be long until they start again. Whether your candidate won or lost is not as important as is the fact that you voted. I agree with the old adage that says, “If you didn’t vote, don’t complain.”

At the suggestion of TxDOT the speed limit has been changed on U.S. 277 North between 13th and 16th Streets to 30 mph entering and leaving Haskell. New signs are pending.

Be extra careful in the school zones; children are busy crossing the street and they are not always looking out for you so you must look out for them. A reminder: Do not use your cell phone in the school zones—it is a distraction you do not need in this area. Fines for speeding in school zones vary depending on how fast you were going over the speed limit, but in addition you will be charged court costs plus a \$25 zinger because the infraction was in a school zone. Is being 5 minutes late that important?

Metal for the Veterans Memorial project that is being undertaken by the

Progressive Study Club is still needed. I would encourage you to put your contributions inside the appropriate container. Someone left a refrigerator at the drop-off site and before it was put inside the container, it disappeared. I don’t know whether someone needed this appliance to use or if they needed it to sell. Anyway, it is gone. This is a very worthy project and when the memorial is a reality, we can all take pride in it.

It has come to my attention that several cities are enforcing the state requirement of car insurance and having proof of that insurance in your possession. These cities have an ordinance that if one is unable to provide proof of insurance when stopped by an officer, the vehicle is impounded. The charges are cost of towing and impoundment fee which accrues on a daily basis until proof of insurance is received. I am encouraging City Council to consider a similar ordinance for Haskell. 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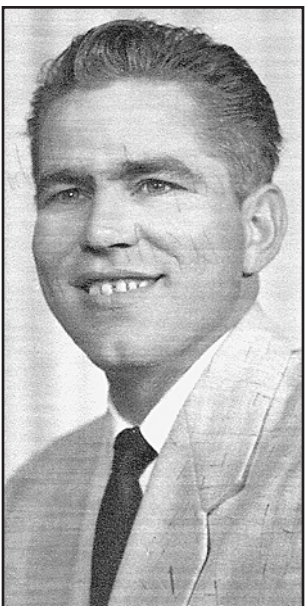
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PC seniors to host play, meal and auction

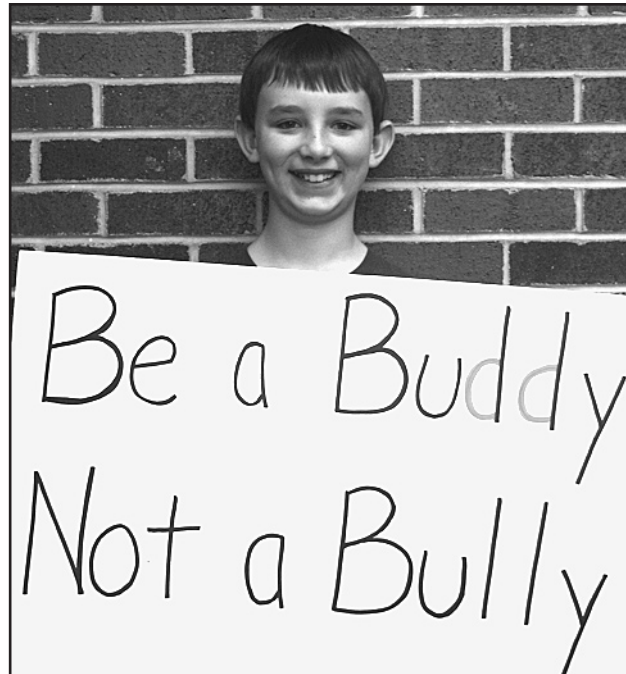

ORDINANCE NO. 11082010
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS REGULATING AND PROHIBITING THE SALE OR DELIVERY OF RESTRICTED SMOKING MATERIALS; PROHIBITING THE POSSESSION OF RESTRICTED SMOKING MATERIALS; PROHIBITING THE SALE OF RESTRICTED SMOKING MATERIALS; SMOKING MATERIALS SUBJECT TO THIS REGULATION SHALL BE THOSE SUBSTANCES KNOWN AS SYNTHETIC CANNABINOIDS OR SALVA DIVINORUM AND FREQUENTLY KNOWN OR MARKETED AS PRODUCTS SUCH AS "K-2," "K-2 SUMMIT," "K-2 SEX," "GENIE," "DASCENTS," "ZOHAI," "SAGE," "SPICE," "KO KNOCK-OUT 2," "SPICE GOLD," "SPICE DIAMOND," "YUCATAN FIRE," "SOLAR FLARE," "PEP SPICE," "FIRE N' ICE," AND "SALVIA DIVINORUM"; PROVIDING A PENALTY OF A FINE NOT TO EXCEED TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,000.00); PROVIDING A

SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND PROVIDING A EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas has been provided with documentation by competent, well-recognized medical professionals and law enforcement officials of the growing presence of a new and potentially dangerous substance affecting the public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens, particularly the youth, of the City of Haskell;

WHEREAS, in response to these warnings, the City Council has secured information indicating that this threat is presented in the form of retail products sold or distributed as a mixture of dried vegetation that, when covered or mixed with certain specific chemicals, produces and provides the physiological and psychological effects of a controlled substance like marijuana;

WHEREAS, such substances are reported by competent sources to cause hallucinations, vomiting, agitation, panic attacks, tachycardia, elevated blood pressure, pallor, numbness and tingling, disorientation, loss of time awareness and, in certain cases, tremors and seizures, as documented by the National Drug Intelligence Center of the United States Department of Justice in EWS Report 000006 issued May 18, 2010;

WHEREAS, the medical evidence and treatment response and documentation of these symptoms have been confirmed by Dr. Anthony J. Scalzo, the Medical Director of the State of Missouri Poison Control Center in a special newsletter alert to the medical community generated as Volume 4, Issue 1, 2010;

WHEREAS, the substances identified above are considered to be generally described as synthetic cannabinoids or salvia

divinorum distributed, sold and marketed under such names as "K-2," "K-2 SUMMIT," "K-2 SEX," "GENIE," "DESCENTS," "ZOHAI," "SAGE," "SPICE," "KO KNOCK-OUT 2" "SPICE GOLD," "SPICE DIAMOND," "YUCATAN FIRE," "SOLAR FLARE," "PEP SPICE," "FIRE NICE," AND "SALVIA DIVINORUM"; and

WHEREAS, the substances identified above have not yet been designated as controlled substances under the laws of the State of Texas or under the laws of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the substances described above may be marketed as incense but are commonly being used as an alternative to marijuana which is an identified and documented controlled substance, and the sale and use of which is prohibited under the laws of the State of Texas and the United States; and

WHEREAS, the synthetic cannabinoids substances identified above may be presented under a variety of street names but share the common ingredients including JWH-018 and JWH-073; and

WHEREAS, salvia divinorum contains the ingredient known as Salvinorin A; and

WHEREAS, these unregulated synthetic cannabinoids and salvia divinorum produce a very potent, intoxicating effect which is estimated by the medical community to produce effects ranging from three to one hundred times greater and more potent than THC, the active ingredient in marijuana; and

WHEREAS, the substances identified above manifest all the demonstrated attributes of substances that deprive individuals of judgment, coordination and the ability to conduct themselves in a safe and appropriate manner in modern society; and

WHEREAS, the available medical and law enforcement information on these products indicates that individuals under the effects of these substances may be a clear and present danger to themselves and others; and

WHEREAS, Texas law has long recognized the need to limit the access to intoxicating substances such as alcoholic beverages; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the Texas Legislature will consider appropriate regulation of these types of commodities in its upcoming legislative session but that it is essential for the City of Haskell to enact a restriction on these products until a statewide regulatory system may be properly implemented; and

WHEREAS, the risk posed by these substances creates a danger to the public health and safety that must be immediately addressed by the adoption of a local ordinance to protect the interests of the citizens of Haskell, Texas; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS;

PART 1. ENACTED. THAT the following restrictions on the sale, delivery,

and possession of certain restricted smoking materials are hereby enacted and as enacted shall read as follows:

SECTION 1.

Section 1.01. Definitions.

For the purposes of this ordinance; certain terms and words are hereby defined. Words used in the present tense include the future, the singular number includes the plural, and the plural the singular; reference to the male gender includes the female, and references to any person or animal without specifying gender include both male and female; the word "shall" is mandatory and directory wherever it is used in the Ordinance.

The following terms and words are defined:

RESTRICTED SMOKING MATERIAL shall mean any substance, however marketed, which can reasonably be converted for smoking purposes whether it is presented as incense, tobacco, herbs, spices or any blend thereof if it includes any of the following chemicals or comparable chemical:

A. Salvia divinorum or salvinorin A; all parts of the plant presently classified botanically as salvia divinorum, whether growing or not, the seeds thereof, any extract from any of such plant, and every compound, manufacture, salts, derivative, mixture or preparation of such plant, its seeds or extracts;

B. 2-[(1R,3S)-3-hydroxycyclohexyl]-5-(2-methyloctan-2-yl)phenol (also known as CP47,497) and homologues;

C. (6aS,10aS)-9-(hydroxymethyl)-6,6-dimethyl-3-(2-methyloctan-2-yl)-6a,7,10,10a-tetrahydrobenzo[c]chromen-1-o1) (also known as HU-211 or Dexanabinol);

D. 1-pentyl-3(1-naphthyl)indole (also known as JWH-018);

E. 1-butyl-3-(1-naphthyl)indole (also known as JWH-073); or

F. 1-pentyl-3-(4-methoxynaphthyl)indole (also known as JWH-081).

Products containing some of the above substances are currently being marketed under the following commercial names:

"K-2," "K-2 SUMMIT," "K-2 SEX," "GENIE," "DESCENTS," "ZOHAI," "SAGE," "SPICE," "KO KNOCK-OUT 2" "SPICE GOLD," "SPICE DIAMOND," "YUCATAN FIRE," "SOLAR FLARE," "PEP SPICE," "FIRE NICE," AND "SALVIA DIVINORUM"

It is anticipated by the council that new products will be marketed under different names but will be subject to this definition if they contain any of the chemical components set forth above.

RESTRICTED SMOKING MATERIAL PARAPHERNALIA shall mean any paraphernalia, equipment, or utensil that is used or intended to be used in ingesting or inhaling any illegal smoking materials and may include:

A. A metal, wooden, acrylic, glass, stone, plastic, or ceramic pipe with or without a screen, permanent screen, hashish head, or punctured metal bowl;

B. A water pipe;

C. A carburetion tube or device;

D. A smoking or carburetion mask;

E. A chamber pipe;

F. A carburetor pipe;

G. An electric pipe;

H. An air-driven pipe;

I. A chillum;

J. A bong; or

K. An ice pipe or chiller.

Section 1.02. Restricted Smoking Materials: Purpose. The purpose of this section is to prohibit the sale or delivery of restricted smoking materials as defined herein to any individual within the city limits and to prohibit the possession of restricted smoking materials by any individual within the city limits of the City of Haskell. Any form of delivery to include a simple gift constitutes a violation of this ordinance.

Section 1.03. Sale, Delivery, Offer, or Gift.

It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, offer to sell, deliver to, or to give any restricted smoking material to

any person.

Section 1.04. Use or Possession of Restricted Smoking Material.

It shall be unlawful for any person to have in their possession or to use restricted smoking materials within the corporate limits of the City of Haskell.

Section 1.05. Use or Possession of Restricted Smoking Paraphernalia.

It shall be unlawful for any person to have in their possession any restricted smoking paraphernalia with the intent to use it to ingest, inhale, or otherwise consume restricted smoking material. If an individual is found in possession of this type of paraphernalia, it will be a violation of this ordinance if appropriate forensic testing is done on the paraphernalia and traces of restricted smoking material are present on the device.

Section 1.06. Defenses to Prosecution.

It shall be a defense to prosecution for a violation of this section if the use of the restricted smoking material is in the direction or under a prescription issued by a licensed physician or dentist authorized to prescribe controlled substances within the State of Texas.

It shall be a defense to prosecution under the terms of this section if an individual charged with a violation can provide proper and complete historic documentation that the use of such materials is a portion of a religious undertaking or activity of religious denomination in which they have long standing historic membership supported by documentation from clergy or spiritual leader recognized by the State of Texas.

Section 1.07. Penalty.

Any person, entity, or firm violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction in the Municipal Court of the City of Haskell, Texas, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for each offense, and each and every day and such violation shall continue be deemed to constitute a separate offense.

PART 2. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.

If any section, sub-section, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or portion shall be deemed to be a separate, distinct and independent provision and such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions.

PART 3. REPEAL.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.

PART 4. PUBLICATION.

The City Secretary is authorized and directed to publish the caption and penalty prescribed by this ordinance in accordance with State Law.

PART 5.

EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its publication.



This is to give notice that the City of Haskell, Texas, has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 and/or 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24CFR 55.20 Subpart C, Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management, to determine the potential affect that its activity in the floodplain and wetland will have on the human environment for Sewer System Improvements under Contract Number 710319. The proposed activities will include the construction of a center pivot irrigation system with effluent piping, irrigation pumping facility and flowmeter/pump control at the wastewater treatment plant, located south of town; a portion of the site is located within the floodplain. The proposed project is located outside the City of Haskell, Haskell County, Texas.

The City of Haskell, Texas, has considered the following alternatives and mitigation measures to be taken to minimize adverse impacts and to restore and preserve natural and beneficial values:

Site alternatives are not practical because of the existing location of the WWTP. All proposed improvements will be done in compliance with State and local floodplain protection procedures.

The City of Haskell, Texas has reevaluated the alternatives to building in the floodplain and has determined that it has no practicable alternative. Environmental files that document compliance with steps 3 through 6 of Executive Order 11988 and/or 11990 are available for public inspection, review, and copying upon request at the times and location delineated in the last paragraph of this notice for receipt of comments. This activity will have no significant impact on the environment for the following reasons:

There are no unique, special, or endangered features and/or resources that exist at the project site; surrounding land is vacant. The project will result in marginally improved environmental conditions because of upgraded wastewater treatment measures.

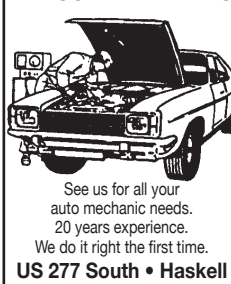

Veterans to be honored

Thurs., Nov. 11, marks the ninety-first year the United States has observed what has come to be known as Veterans Day.

In 1919, President Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day, a day set aside to honor veterans of the first World War.

However, in 1954, Congress amended the Act of 1938, which made the 11th of November each year a legal holiday, by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans."

The eleventh has significance, because it was at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when major hostilities of WWI formally ended with the German signing of the Armistice.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, in 2008 there were 23.2 million military veterans living in the United States. 1.7 of those veterans live in Texas.

The Veterans Day National Ceremony is held each year on Nov.

11 at Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony begins precisely at 11:00 a.m. with a wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknowns and continues inside the Memorial Amphitheater with a parade of colors by veterans' organizations and remarks from dignitaries.

At the local level, there will be several observances honoring all veterans. Haskell Elementary will continue their annual Veterans Day Breakfast hosted by the fifth grade. The activities begin at 8:45 a.m. with a flag raising ceremony held on the front lawn at the elementary school. This will be followed by a breakfast served by students, along with a musical program also performed by elementary students.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m. at Slim Sorrells Park in Rule, another ceremony will be held. Included on the program will be a 21 gun salute. In case of inclement weather, the ceremony will take place at Rule High School.

The Haskell Church of Christ will serve lunch on Nov. 11 to all veterans and

their spouses or guests, from 11 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. at the church activity building.

The Progressive Study Club continues working toward a permanent marker honoring veterans. In fact, they have raised almost a third of the needed funds for the project. The beveled pieces containing names of killed or missing in action have now been ordered. These will be placed on the top of the existing marker.

Project chairman, Dorothy Hartsfield, reminds everyone they have flag holders for sale. They are continuing the scrap metal drive, as well. Over \$800 has been collected through this drive. Committee to enforce junked vehicles law

The Betterment Committee of Haskell would like to inform the citizens of Haskell of their intent to enforce the Texas State Statute on Junked Vehicles. This is found under the State of Texas Transportation Code, Section 683.071.

The committee's intent is to get junked vehicles, as defined by the statute, off of overgrown lots with dilapidated houses or

buildings. The committee sees this as the first step in cleaning up these lots.

The committee wants you to know that if these vehicles are out of compliance with the statute and if towed off the owner will receive \$100 if they have the title and \$50 to owners of vehicles without a title.

The Committee sees this as a crucial step to getting the community looking

better and taking pride in Haskell.
