

As a young couple, my husband, Don, and I enjoyed riding bicycles. Later, because of my declining vision, we sold our bikes and bought a tandem bicycle. Since a "bicycle built for two" isn't a common sight, we got lots of smiles and waves — especially when we would put our child in a seat on the back and all three of us would ride through our neighborhood.

The person in the front seat on the bike is known as the captain or pilot. Lockney Co-Op Gin under new management

Lockney Co-Op Gin is under new management with the addition of Clay Lowrance as General Manager. Lowrance officially began his duties on April 16, 2018.

"It's fun!" stated Lowrance when asked how he is adapting to the Co-Op organization verses the independent gin he was managing. "What I'm realizing is that this is a big family. They want you to be at your best, and they give you the tools you need to be successful."

When asked the main difference between his earlier work and the Co-Op position, Lowrance explained, "At McCoy, I was in the gin all the time. Here at the Coop, I find myself needing to be in the office more." As he spoke, one of the employers

stopped at the door and gave a brief report on a current maintenance project. Lowrance chipped in, "Charge on!" Looking back at me he added with a smile, "There is always something going on."

The Gin processed around 39,000 bales, up from the year before. "We just had a lot of sticks and cleaning issues this year. The trash was choking up the machines." The primary reason causing the gins to run into February and March.

While discussing the farming industry, Lowrance pointed out, "Technology is changing things. A few years ago, it would take seven gallons of water for an acre of cotton. Now that drip irrigation systems are being utilized, we can take care of that same acre with only three gallons." But with the efficiency, the cost of those

systems increases. "All those one-button tractors, combines...they cost \$600,00, even \$700,000 so today's farmers have to have more ground to farm to make ends meet."

That is the primary difficulty in farming today, believes Lowrance. "It's hard to get started. Land is hard to come by and is expensive, especially land in the same general area. Equipment costs so much, but you have to have it to take care of the farm." Although today's farmers do have some tracts side-by-side, many are getting spread out across the county. "Fuel is killing us."

When asked what his goals are for the gin, Lowrance glanced up at the course, I want to build the business--we all want to gin more cotton." He added, "I

USDA to assist producers for livestock, honeybee, farm-raised fish losses

USDA will issue \$34 million to help agricultural producers recover from 2017 natural disasters through the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-raised Fish Program (ELAP), which covers losses not covered by certain other USDA disaster assistance programs. These payments are being made available today, and they are part of a broader USDA effort to help producers recover from hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria, wildfires and drought.

A large portion of this assistance will be made available in federally designated disas-

ELAP aims to help eligible producers of livestock, honeybees, and farm-raised fish for losses due to disease, certain adverse weather events or loss conditions, including blizzards and wildfires, as determined by the Secretary. ELAP assistance is provided for losses not covered by other disaster assistance programs such as the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) and Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP).

The increased amount of assistance through ELAP was made possible by the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 signed earlier this year. The Act amended the 2014 Farm Bill to enable USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) to provide assistance to producers without an annual funding cap and immediately for 2017. It also enabled FSA to pay ELAP applications as they are filed for 2018 and subsequent program years.

Other USDA Disaster Assistance Programs

The Act removed program year payment limitations and increased the acreage cap for the Tree Assistance Program (TAP), a nationwide program that provides owners of orchards, vineyards and nurseries with cost share assistance to replant eligible trees, bushes, and vines following a natural disaster. For example, the program will help owners of citrus groves in Florida, avocado trees in California, coffee plantations in Puerto Rico and vineyards reduce the cost of replanting, and speed recovery from the loss of fruit and nut trees, bushes, and vines.

Prior to the Act, there was a combined program year payment limitation of \$125,000 for ELAP, LIP and LFP per person or legal entity. The Assistance Program (TAP) had its own \$125,000 payment limitation. The Act removed the program year per person and legal entity payment limitation for LIP and TAP. As a result of the Act, a \$125,000 per person and legal entity single payment limitation applies to the total amount of program year payments received under both ELAP and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP)

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and program payments under LIP and TAP no longer have payment limits.


Under the updated program as amended by the Act, growers are eligible to be partly reimbursed for losses on up to 1,000 acres per program year, double the previous acreage limit of 500 acres.

In total, it is estimated that the Act will enable USDA to provide more than \$3 billion in disaster assistance, including the \$2.36 billion announced last week to be made available through FSA's new 2017 Wildfires and Hurricanes Indemnity Program. This includes \$400 million made available for the Emergency Conservation Program, which helps farmers and ranchers repair damage to farmlands caused by natural disasters. As signups across the country are completed, additional applications will be funded.

According to the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), the United States was impacted by 16 separate billion-dollar disaster events in 2017 including: three tropical cyclones, eight severe storms, two inland floods, a crop freeze, drought and wildfire. More than 25 million people - almost eight percent of the population - were affected by major disasters. From severe flooding in Puerto Rico and Texas to mudslides and wildfires in California, major natural disasters caused catastrophic damages, with an economic impact totaling more than \$300 billion.

For Assistance

Producers with operations impacted by natural disasters and diseases in 2018 are encouraged to contact their local USDA service center to apply for assistance through ELAP, TAP, LIP and LFP. Producers with 2017 ELAP claims need to take no action as FSA has begun paying those claims.

"These boys are going to ride. We can't stop them." states Leal, cofounder of Miniature Bull Riders, LLC. "But, we can provide a smaller bucking bull," to level out the playing field. To ride, one must be registered with MBR, LLC.
