You just innately trust that people will care and nurfure your loved ones not only because it' their job but because it's just the human thing to do. In hindsight, there are so many things I should have questioned and even demanded. I trusted my mother was get ing the care she needed, all the while see ing with my own eyes she wasn't. ## MEMORIES 1979

THE JOHN KELLY FAMILY
Earnest Hays was born in Rusk Chem and old friends visit her. The immigrant ancestors of John Roster Kelley, who is a resident of the Cedar Hill Community in the northeast part of Floyd County, Texas, were Patrick and Margaret Nolan Kelley. They left their home in Ireland along with their three children, Henry, James, and Marcella about 1845 and were near Great Barrington, Berkshire County, Massachusetts, USA when John Roser's (John Kelly's father) was born in 1847. Henry and George were in the Civil War and the last time the two brothers saw each other was in New Orleans, Louisiana. Each went their separate ways and George Kelley later Texas. They reared 10 children: James (Jim), George Jr, Martha, Marcella, Sam, Rosi, Walk, Baylor, Emma, Nona, Twins (John Roster and Callie Nan). John and Callie were born October 4, 1896 in Indian Territory, Johnson County, Oklahoma. Their mother died while they were young and John was reared in the Littlefield Bend, Parker
County, Texas, by his mother's sister and her husbandCounty, Texas, by his mother's sister and her husband-
Deedy and John Estes. All the children have passed on Deedy and John Estes.
Jopt John and Calli. John attended school and church at Soda Springs in
Littlefield Bend and at Grindstone School near Milsap, Texas. John enioyed horseback riding and fishing on the Texas. John enjoyed horseback riding and fishing on the
Brazos River. He always looked forward to the coconut birthday cake baked by Aunt Deedy each October 5 for him and his cousin, Mattie Estes. Her birthday was Ocober 6.
John came to Quitaque in the fall of 1915 to visit two of his mother's sisters and their families. He decided to ry his luck at farming here. While farming on the Motley and Floyd County line, with his brother Walk Kelley, he was drafted into the army, during World War I, departing the war in 1919 and began farming in the Cedar Hill Community, living with John and Callie Gilbert. Later he batched with Ace Monk and others. While batching, it was not uncommon for him to spend a portion of Sundays cutting hair for neighbors and riding horses with the boys.
John Roster Kelley and Nancy Evelyn (Peat) Fortenberry were married in Lockney, Texas, May 9, 1925, by
rev. McCarthy, Peat was the youngest daughter of John

Cephus I and Ann Riley (Skates) Fortenberry, who came from Denton County, to Floyd County, Texas in 2 covered wagons, October 1890. They brought their 3 children; Mary Elizabeth, Hugh, Ell Bohn Cephus II with them iver), Jennie Lee, Nancy Evelyn and Thomas Bandy were born here in the Cedar Hill Community. All have passed on except Lizzie, Belle, Peat and Tom.
Peat attended school in both the old wooden and the $1 / 2$ brick, $1 / 2$ stucco school buildings at Cedar Hill. She also attended church at both the Baptist and Assembly of
God. She enjoyed basketball, mumblety peg horseback riding, crochet, tatting and playing the piano
The first year John and Peat were married they lived northwest of the Alcino General Store and Post Office operated by Mr. John D. Dillard. The next year they lived $1 / 2$ mile Northeast of Cedar Hill School, two churches and general store, operated by Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Dillard. Here their first child, George Milton was born March


16, 1926 and died 3 days later, buried at Lockney. They moved 1 mile north of Cedar Hill where their daughter Norma Deen was born May 19, 1928. About 1937 they They drilled an irrigation well $21 / 2$ miles north of Cedar Hill in 1950, which was among the first to be drilled in he Cedar Hill Community
Norma Deen married J. A. Welch and they have a daughter, Connie Elaine, who is the pride and joy of her grandparents.
Peat and John celebrated their 50 th wedding anniversary, May 11, 1975, and are still active in farming and anching the Cedar Hill Community

ing loans declined modestly, while volumes of all other third quarter. District dryland values ticked up this quarte while irrigated cropland and ranchland values declined. According to bankers who responded in both this quar ter and third quarter 2017, Texas nominal dryland and ranchland values increased

A freeze is a period when

Plant cells are filled with water. When that water turns to tiny shards of ice, they slice open the cell walls and ruin the plant tissue.

In weather reports, a freeze is any air temperature below 32 degrees, the freezing point
of water. Whether that cold air actually damages plants in your garden will depend on how low it goes, the species of plant, whether it is in a sheltered spot in your yard, how long the low temperature lasts and many other factors. he silvelany refers to the silvery coating of ice crystal occurs when there's lots of wa ter vapor in the air However gardeners often use "freeze" and "frost" interchangeably to refer to a cold spell.
In gardening terms, a "light freeze" or "light frost" refers to temperatures that fall just few degrees below freezing for a few hours. Some hardy plants may not be damaged. A "hard
frost" or "killing fros"" frost" or "killing frost" comes
when the temperature drop further, below 28 degrees, for a longer time. It will kill the top growth of most perennials and root crops.
You can often protect plant
against cold temperatures covering beds with an old she or floating row cover, a product
