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Arrington, Axne Introduce "No Budget, No Recess Act"

WASHINGTON - Congressman Jodey Arrington (R-TX) and Congresswoman Cindy Axne (D-IA) introduced the No Budget, No Recess Act, legislation that would improve the congressional budget process by requiring Members of Congress to stay at work in Washington until they fulfill their budgetary duties for the year.

H.R. 1059, the No Budget, No Recess Act, would prevent Members of Congress from leaving town without passing a budget by April 15th each year and completing the appropriations process by the end of the fiscal year.

"Every year for the past twenty years, Congress has failed to meet its most basic responsibility to fund the government on time.

Special to The Hesperian-Beacon To add insult to injury, Members of Congress are allowed to go home on recess before finishing the job that they were hired to do" said Arrington. "There is not a single business, local government or family in our country that can operate this way, and Congress should be held to the same standards and play by the same set of rules as the American people.

> "To prevent Congress from skipping town before passing a budget, I introduced the 'No Budget, No Recess Act.' This bipartisan, bicameral legislation would ensure that Members of Congress do their job before they are allowed to go home. I want to thank Representative Axne for joining me to introduce this common-sense legislation and I look forward to working with her in our shared Services Committee.

SLATON - Despite a 19-10 run by the Sudan Nettes in the fourth quarter, the Lockney Lady Horns held on to clinch the Bi-District Championship in the Class 2A playoffs at Slaton on Feb. 12. The Lady Horns advanced to play the Gruver Lady Hounds in the Area round.

Lockney jumped out to a 16-10 lead after the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the teams played evenly, 9-9, while the Lady Horns hung on for a 25-19 lead at halftime.

Lockney extended their lead, outscoring the Nettes 14-8 in the third quarter. The Lady

Horns went into the final quarter leading 39-

In the fourth quarter, Sudan outscored Lockney 19-10 but in the end the Lockney Lady Horns held on for the 49-46 victory and claimed the Bi-District Championship.

For the Lady Horns, Reagan Nuncio led the way with 20 points, Madai Chavira scored 11, Townlie Hernandez and Ryann Castillo each scored six points, Gabby Cervantes scored four points and Yanallie Bernal scored two points.

On Thursday, Feb. 14, the Lockney Lady Horns fell to the Gruver Lady Hounds, 64-43 in the Area Championship at Amarillo High School to end the Lady Horns playoff run. No

Embezzlement Plea in Floydada's **Housing Authority**

Special to The Hesperian-Beacon LUBBOCK, Texas - Norma Cisneros McGowen accepted a federal plea deal on Thursday. She admitted to theft of public money -

more specifically, \$133,243. Court records said in 2006 McGowen was approved as a landlord under a federal program and leased out a house to her mother. Then in 2012 she began to receive additional government checks for properties she did not own.

Those checks were signed by Velma Sue Cochran who became the Executive Director of the Floydada Housing Authority in 2005. Cochran previously accepted a

plea deal for misprision of a felony and was sentenced in late January to probation and restitution.

Cochran admitted she knew McGowen was not entitled to the money but sent federal money via the housing authority to her anyway. McGowen embezzled more than \$170,000 according to federal court records but paid more than \$37,000

Federal authorities confronted both women in

If her plea deal is accepted, McGowen will be sentenced at a later date to no more than 10 years in federal prison.

A+ Audit Rating for County

The February meeting of the County Commissioners Meeting took place last Monday morning at the County Courthouse.

With a full agenda, Judge Marty Lucke introduced the business items, there was little discussion, and all items were approved.

Sheriff Paul Raissez presented the State-required Racial Profiling Report for 2018. According to the data, the Floyd County Sheriff's office wrote 782 citations last year. Divided amongst the twelve months, that translates to approximately 65 citations in the county each month. The demographic spread was relative to the racial demographic data for the county. County Commissioners accepted the report unanimously.

Rick Knapp, of Knapp & Company, P.C., Dallas, presented the County's 2018 Financial Audit. The report stated that there were no significant difficulties, no change of accounting policies, and no internal control deficiencies. Knapp commented, "If we gave audit grades, this audit would be an A+...Lori [Morales] and Linda [Nichols] have done a great job." The County Commissioners approved the report

John Clayton Campbell, Texas Parks and Wildlife, addressed the commissioners regarding their Antlerless Mule Deer Permit and Managed Lands Deer Programs in Floyd County. Campbell stated that 10 landowners in Floyd County had been given 34 permits out of the 770 permits issued statewide. TWPD is currently taking applications for the 2019 Season. For additional information, landowners should contact Campbell at john-clayton.campbell@twpd. texas.gov. or by calling (432)244-7574.

A Seismic Survey was done at Forest Lawn Cemetery in 2018 to locate unmarked graves. One-hundred-forty-three unmarked graves were flagged. As a county-owned cemetery, commissioners discussed options for markers for the graves. Commissioner Smith asked that a set of rules and policies be formulated that could guide actions for county-owned cemeteries. Commissioners agreed unanimously. No action was taken on the markers at this time.

Commissioners approved the recommendation to join the TexBuy Purchasing Cooperative Region

Judge Lucke presented an estimate to replace the roof on the PAC building. Commissioners requested additional bids. No action was taken at this time.

Lucke reported that a number of computers within the county need to be replaced due to support and compatibility issues. He stated that the expense was built into this budget last year. Commissioners approved the expense unanimously. The need to purchase cabinets to store and lock up County Birth and Death records was presented. Again, the expense was built into the Preservation of Vital Statistics budget. Commissioners approved the purchase unanimously.

Road Crossing Permits were approved. The county received all of the permits mailed out. Commissioners approved the permits unanimously. Renewal of Private Road Contracts in Pct. 3 and Pct. 4 have been mailed and all have been received by the County. Commissioners unanimously approved the contracts for another year-October 2018 to September 2019.

Lucke presented a Drainage Project in Pct. 1, SW of McCoy Gin. The existing waterways will be cleaned out to allow water to flow down drainage as opposed to flowing across and damaging the roadway. Commissioners approved the project unani-

SANDHILL, TEXAS (Floyd County). Sandhill is at the junction of Farm roads 784 and 378, nine miles west of Floydada and ten miles southwest of Lockney in southwestern Floyd County. The area was settled before 1900. A school was built in 1892, and the community was designated a voting precinct by 1896. A post office, established in 1902, was known as Mickey for the names of several postmasters. Sandhill was one of thirty-two rural school districts in the 1920s. A school continued in the community until it was consolidated with that of Floydada in the 1950s. The Sandhill store, which was run by Mrs. Louise

Shurbet from 1940 to 1984, continued to operate, as did the Sandhill elevator. Regional crops include corn, seed maize, wheat, and cotton. Early settler family names were Miller, Shurbet, Mickey, Fox, Mackey, McLain, Darby, and McClesky. The post office was discontinued in 1943. In the 1980s the population was estimated at forty. By 2000 the population was thirty-three.

Need to give a whole lot of pieces to schoo activities so that those activities and the school can continue to be competitive? Kids just find more ways to give

Presumably, all of this 'adaptability' comes from parents, eachers, coaches, and mentors that set the highest standards of virtues, and pass those down to the next generation. I wonder if small-town kids are better at being pulled in different directions than kids that grow up and live in metoplexes--I don't have that answer.

What I see is a calendar that continues to be completely nked up; however, I have faith that our families-each and every member therein-can handle the demand. Perhaps. it's in our small-town jeans--or, genes.

there in 1970, and came to Pasadena Texas, but there is hardly a day that goes by that something doesn't remind me of my home-

Some of the main things I remember as a kid growing up in Floydada was the Old Settlers Parade and the festivities that went with it. We always made sure we had a new water gun and a bean shooter, so we could squirt the pretty girls and the bean shooters were for shooting at the people we were not so fond of. Had to do a lot of running, though.

We used to get up on top of the buildings downtown and watch the parade go by. I guess I have been on top of most every build-

ing downtown, except the courthouse, but I was up in the bell tower of the old court-I was born and raised in Floydada, left house that burned down in the 40's once. I miss Floydada very much. I wish I could have stayed there. All my folks are still there, out in the cemetery.

> One more thing that I remember as a kid were the medicine shows that would come through town. That was quite a thrill to watch their minstrel show and laugh at the ones who had all that black smeared on their faces. They sure sold a lot "get well medicine". I remember the boxes of candy they sold. Some of them had a winning ticket inside, most of them did not. They always had the shows set up behind The Palace Theatre, right close to where Bishop Ford had their

The old courthouse had a tall set of stairs leading up to the front doors, on both sides of the stairs running from the top to the bottom was a long run of smooth concrete that the handrails were connected to, which made a perfect slicky slide. Being the young kid that I was I shortened the life of a few pairs of Levi's that were hard to come by.

One more thing that has stayed with me all these years. This was in the mid 40's before television. When it came time for the election of new officials, they would set up a huge blackboard right out front of the old Hesperian building which was owned by Homer Steen at that time I believe. On the blackboard they would have the candidates name listed and the number of votes they were getting.
